2. A 3¹/₂" disk, in PC format, preferably 'Saved As' WORD. *Please include hard copy* for checking the formatting and *your address* so that the disk can be easily returned. 3. A good, **black typescript** on white A4 paper or smaller. The scanner can read in typescripts and this is still much easier than re-typing. IF you prepare text on a PC to print the output and send it to us, thanks, BUT PLEASE SEE 2 above - we do return disks, honest!

We were very grateful to Sir Tom Shebbeare who willingly came to our meeting on January 27th to give us a very informal, very entertaining but very informative talk on his work, originally with the Prince of Wales Trust but now with the Prince's Charitable Foundation. We learned so much more about the manifold activities the Prince is involved in than one hears of in the media.

The Prince's Trust is now the U.K's leading youth charity with an annual turnover of about £50,000,000 and targets the fourteen to thirty year olds facing difficulties such as unemployment, homelessness, crime and poor basic skills.

The Prince's Charitable Foundation, which was started in 1979 supports a wide, range of charitable causes and projects and receives ever-increasing requests for assistance. It is mainly funded by Duchy Originals, the food company the Prince launched in 1992. The Foundation raised £923,000 in the year 2001–2002 and more than 100 charities benefited from the Fund.

As a member of the Drayton Art Group, I was very interested to learn that as most Art schools today give no drawing instruction, the Prince started a Drawing School in the year 2000 to give artists a chance to widen their skills especially in observational drawing. Each week this school attracts 300 students and there is a waiting list for entry.


This was a most fascinating evening for us all.

The next committee meeting wil be held on Monday 15 March at 8pm.




DRAYTON W.I.

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Letter from The Revd Dorothy Derrick

Dear Friends,

Today I travelled to Bath on my day off. It was a delight to see that the hedgerows were tinged with green, indicating that spring is just around the corner. In England we are very blessed that we have clear seasonal differences to look forward to year by year. It is all part of God's ongoing care for his creation. A creation that we so often take for granted. However the truth is we have a part to play in it. Yes, God has promised to provide for us as his creation, but he has also given to us a huge responsibility for it as we can read in the book of Genesis.

How do we even begin to tackle issues concerning our stewardship of God's created world? The usual cry is to look on it as someone else's responsibility; the government's, the environmentalist's, the industrialist's, the scientist's. The truth is that we all need to play our individual part. We have choices to make as to how we use and share the earth's resources. We can deal with life in a selfish 'I'm all right Jack' sort of way, or we can live life with a concern for others and for the future of this world in which we are set.

I am reminded that the less developed countries have less access to the world's resources which are being gobbled up by the more developed countries. The balance has gone wrong.

One of the ways that we can help with this problem is to make an effort to buy Fairly Traded Goods - a way of making sure third world producers get a fairer market price for their products, rather than exploiting them as we have in the past.

Many of our supermarkets do have Fairly Traded Goods on their shelves. Have you seen them? Have you bought some? It seems to me that if we all made a conscious effort to buy at least a percentage of our shopping in this way every week we could make a difference.

At St. Peter's we are trying to encourage people to do just that. We also **sell Fairly Traded Goods** after the Service at about 11.15 am on certain Sundays in the month. If you are interested the following dates are booked:- 14th March, 18th April, 9th May, 20th June, 11th July. There will also be a **Coffee Morning in Church on 13th March**.

Perhaps it is particularly appropriate to do a bit extra as we come into the Lent Season in the Church's year when we take stock of our spiritual lives - where we are with God. It reminds us that we are all children of the same heavenly Father and therefore we are all interconnected and have a shared responsibility to care for each other and the world in which we are set.





YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Council Tax

I am sorry to say the Council tax rise in April will be above the rate of inflation, again. The government - so concerned with the increasing rates - is making special payments to Councils to keep the rates down. Unfortunately this message hasn't percolated to all government departments as some of them are still requiring the Councils to do additional work, without any financial compensation and consequently the cost has to be passed on to the ratepayers.

The Local Government Association, (the representative body for all councils) is expecting that most district councils, like the Vale, will receive a grant below the rate of inflation. The Vale is already looking to see if and where additional cuts can be made in providing services. This year's rate is expected to be at 5.5%. (As you will recall, last year the Vale's increase of just under 6% was the lowest of all the other district councils in Oxfordshire.) The County Council (OCC) is trying to keep its increase to around 6.5%. The increase in funding to county councils looks to be heading for education, at the expense of other services.

Did you know that over the last 10 years there has been a significant shift in local taxation from business to the residents? Non domestic (business) rates accounted for 29% of local revenue; now it is down to 22%. Whilst business rate increases have been pegged to inflation any shortfall has fallen on the householders, like you and I. The Vale of White Horse District Council has asked the government to axe the tax and replace it with a form of local income tax, so that it is proportional to income.

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Police

The Thames Valley Police Authority has now become the second largest rate demand, having overtaken the Vale last year with a 45% increase. Much of the government cash this coming year is earmarked for central initiatives and national police bodies. A hefty rise is expected, (I hope I am wrong) and may not result in an improvement to local policing in Oxfordshire. The police, I understand have been told to concentrate on the crimes that are more common in Reading or Slough. (I ask myself is it time to make the police authority accountable to the public; should we have elections for the Chief Constable as we do for district and county councilors?).

Lords Stick up for Local Planning Decisions

A change to the Planning process was defeated in the House of Lords. Had the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Bill been passed then it would have removed a whole layer of elected people from the planning process (County, district, unitary and parish councils) and passed it to an unelected and remote South East regional assembly based at Guildford. Whilst it is recognised that the Government says it is committed to devolution, the Bill appeared to put convenience before democracy.

Transport

It seems that the County Council are **losing the battle** to maintain a viable bus service, one that can be relied on by commuters, for late night journeys back from Oxford and Abingdon and at weekends. The detail of the latest consultation defeated your council who have made some general comments that we seem to be riding a vicious circle towards ever more reliance on the car and blamed deregulation and the complexity of the services offered. While buses are deregulated the decline in service and increase in subsidy is no more a bus company or council problem than one for each of us as we make travel choices. A case of use it, or lose it.

Drayton sits between Abingdon and Didcot each having money to spend in 'integrated transport'. Powerless to prevent the decline of the bus service, 'integration' means reducing the impact of village traffic. As there is nothing proposed to reduce traffic levels we seem to be looking at ramps, mini-roundabouts, chicanes and signals to reduce speed. These measures will be controversial so the **PC would** welcome views before, NOT after the work has been commissioned!

The widened cycle track has been completed. Integrated transport would mean making it safer for cyclists in both Abingdon and Drayton or what was the point?

Boundary Change

In order to maintain the ratio of councillors to electors there is a proposal to join Drayton into a County Council constituency with South Abingdon. Although we share issues relating to the B4017 including bus services, this council is **generally opposed to merging** a rural with an urban parish as their interests are likely to be different. **Questions & comments by 8 March** to:- Team Leader, Oxon County Council Review, The Boundary Committee for England, Trevelyan House, Great St Peter Street, London, SW1 2HW (0207 271 0682); (Copy to OCC County Hall New Road Oxford OX1 1ND).

Money / Grants

The PC makes a number of grants to bodies serving residents in the village. It seems that plenty of people visit the Abingdon Citizens Advice Bureau which has been given £300. The Damascus Project serves Drayton, Milton and Sutton Courtenay and received £500. We hope that young people take what is on offer and let us know whether we should continue to support Damascus at the same or different levels. Money will also have to be spent on renewing the equipment on the Lock Way playground.

Litter Etc

For the first time in several months we have engaged somebody to undertake general maintenance duties for the village, including litter picking. This does not seem to be a very clever use of public money. There seems to be two kinds of people; those who think it is okay to drop litter and those who're offended by it. However, we all pay to have it removed (money spent on this cannot be spent on other things). The PC wondered whether it was worth even entering the best kept village competition while the village looked like a tip.

Anybody who has opinions on the above, or other ideas (we are considering a proposal for a village plan) should come to meeting of the PC (next meeting 7.45 pm on <u>29 March</u> at the Caudwell Day Centre). Daniel Scharf

Brian Stimpson has agreed to stand as Vice-Chair when Peter Fleming moves away – thanks Brian.


Following the events of the New Year's Eve event (family disco), when the actions of a few young people spoilt a wonderful evening for a lot of people, **front door security is to be investigated**.
