I am sure that by now quite a lot of you will have heard of, read about or seen the damage done to the windows on the southern end of our village hall. If not, here are some photographs taken before the mess

was cleaned up. This damage has taken place over the last 4-5 weeks. Repairs, temporary permanent, have to be done immediately for the safety of the Hall users. This means that few people verv actually get to see the extent of the damage. also means



finding a good Samaritans with a supply of plywood or pay very expensive emergency call out fees to companies that specialise in this type of incident.

Unfortunately, most of this damage takes place at evening or weekend and this means that we have to respond quickly to protect the building from the weather, keep out unwelcome visitors and, of

course, make it safe for the people who use the building.

Our pot of money is not bottomless and our funds come from the Hall fees. If we have to keep paying out at this rate,



your own commonsense will tell you the outcome – the fees will go up – followed by howls of protest.

We need to know who does this damage. We know it is young people from this village and we know some of their names. What we would like to know is why? Today's youngsters have more money and



more possessions to occupy their time than any previous generation but they seem to the most destructive. *Why?*

The cost of repairs of this year is approaching £2,000. This is only for the work that has been charged-there are a lot of repairs and cleaning


up done for free by willing volunteers and obviously is not included in this figure. The club room is now devoid of daylight. The toilets are, for the time being, also dark; this will be rectified when cages are made to protect the glass. It really should not be necessary to have to pay out this amount of money to protect what is, after all, a public building provided for the benefit of everyone in the village.

What is Neighbourhood Watch?

Neighbourhood Watch is......





- knowing what to do when a crime or emergency occurs
- community awareness of local crime risks and the measures to take against those risks
- reducing the opportunities for crime and to make it more difficult for the criminal to act.

How does it work?

Neighbourhood Watch schemes can be large, covering for example most of the households in a village or they might involve just half a dozen houses It depends on the area and what people living there want

A scheme is led by a volunteer co-ordinator with ideally a deputy who plays a supporting role. The role of the Co-ordinator is to act as a liaison point between their neighbours, the Regional NHW Administrator, the Police and other groups who have responsibility for Community Safety.

What is Ringmaster?

Neighbourhood Watch started in 1982 and it now has a new weapon to help fight crime - Ringmaster provides a fast and effective way for police officers to communicate with communities. Ringmaster is a hitech message service that has contact details of all Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators stored in its memory.

A message is recorded onto the Ringmaster system, which then automatically telephones the Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators - at a time that they have said, is convenient to them - and plays it back to them. The message can also be sent by fax or e-mail. Co-ordinators then pass the message onto members of their scheme.

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Letter from the Revd Dorothy Derrick

Dear Friends

I have just returned from a few days of Retreat at Burford Priory. This place has been the home of an Anglican Benedictine Community of monks and nuns since 1949. The main house is built on the medieval foundations of an Augustinian religious house. Today's Community seeks to witness to Christ through its common life of prayer, study and work. It welcomes individuals and small groups who wish to come on retreat or quiet time in the environment of recollection and silence in which the brothers and sisters try to live. Central to the way of life is a regular daily pattern of prayer and communion.

What a blessing it has been to have the privilege of sharing in that community for a few days. Time to rest, time to be silent, time to pray, time to reflect and just time to be. In the busy everyday lives that most of us lead these days it is hard to find space for ourselves and for God. As I walked in the wooded grounds and by the river, I saw many delightful things that I would normally have passed by, but with time to stand and gaze there were so many treasures to be discovered. For example, there was the mother duck proudly escorting here nine ducklings from the Priory garden back to the river, shepherded by the gentle coaxings of one of the brothers, reminding me of the shepherding of the Good Shepherd that Jesus spoke of in the gospels. Then there was the one hidden cowslip in amongst the bluebells doing its own thing reaching up in glorious praise to the Creator.

I have returned to the Parish with fresh eyes and renewed vigour as I approach my final months here in Drayton. Some of you may wish that you could take time out in your busy lives. Some of you may see that as a daunting prospect. Summer is a good time to try to set aside a little time to withdraw from the rat race of our every day commitments. Holidays can be used for this unless we fill them with a different kind of "busyness". You don't even have to go away. The Church is usually open and I know that many people do just pop in to be quiet, to say a prayer, or to leave a prayer on the Prayer Request Board. Please do feel free to enter that space of peace and quiet - a place where you may find the presence of God.

For those going on holiday - have a wonderful time and come back refreshed and renewed to carry on with the business of living.

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



DRAYTON WIVES

I think we have been fortunate to have some very interesting speakers lately and Dr. George McGavin at our meeting on 27th April was absolutely fascinating. He is an entomologist and went as part of a research team in the early nineties on an expedition in the Kanchanaburi Province in Thailand. The team was doing a survey in order to find out what kinds of insects, plants and fungi were present in the caves

After braving mosquitoes and sleeping on wooden slats in houses built on stilts over a lake, they eventually found one of the caves that they were seeking. This was a river cave 3½ miles long with an entrance through deep water some hundreds of metres long. George McGavin found swimming through this quite terrifying, as was having to squeeze through some very suffocatingly tight places between cracks in the rocks. He had to set traps for insects baited with blue cheese of all things and had to return to examine them every day for three weeks. Fifty-seven species of mould were found on wood in the cave, eighteen kinds of blind cave millipedes, cave crickets one and half inches long and huge, fearsome whip and spider scorpions. As this was a river cave there were occasional floods that reached the roof of the cave, bringing in fallen logs from outside which, as the waters receded, could drop suddenly on unsuspecting heads.

It was a pity that our numbers were down on that particular evening, especially as it was also our Annual General Meeting.

Our President Georgie Logan gave us a resume of our programme over the last year and our Treasurer Trudi Buckner told us that we remained solvent despite organising fewer fundraising events. We have been helped with the increased subscription of £7.50, our coffee mornings and whist evenings, etc. We are hoping to have a special antiques evening later in the year. The speaker asks for a substantial donation for Breast Cancer research, so that this will be our charity for the year. Daphne Barrand has organised our programme for several years now and is to be congratulated on the variety and interest of all our evenings. 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HOW TIMES CHANGE - PART 3

In 2003, our printer – Oliver and Son, Ltd – moved from George Street, Oxford, to new premises in Botley. At the same time, the old printing presses were replaced with the most modern technology, which provided the ability to print directly from a computer file. A CD–ROM disk easily held all the files necessary to make up an issue of the *Chronicle*. Better still, the files could be sent by e–mail, cutting out the need to deliver anything by hand to the printer – with more downsizing of the *Chronicle*

downsizing of the Chronicle team!

team:

Things, however, did not work out quite like that. The Word files did not appear on the printer's computer exactly as they left the editor - fonts were not always right and bits of text appeared in the wrong places. The printer therefore needed a paper copy as a check and so we were not that much further forward. Furthermore, the files were large and sending the emails took the editor's time - and money. But technology was at hand to come to the rescue. Tony



Holmes showed that converting the files into a different format – the Adobe 'Portable Document Format', or PDF – cut down the file size dramatically and 'froze' the layout. The editor could be then certain that the *Chronicle* pages run off by the printer would be identical to those on his computer at home – mistakes and all.

The March issue was the first one to be sent to the printer in this way, without difficulty. So we are now in the position that a contributor feeds ideas into the computer which are then sent to the editor by email, manipulated and inserted into an appropriate place on the *Chronicle* page in the editor's computer, sent to the printer, again by email, and in the end appear as the printed word totally untouched by human hand.

Another spin-off from this change is that the quality of the final print is determined by the quality of the printer's professional equipment rather than by the more restricted resolution of a home printer. Half-tone pictures are reproduced much more clearly and we have been able to use shading more effectively – as in the main headings, all of which leads to a more attractive and interesting *Chronicle*.

Just as technology has made great impacts on employment in the workplace, these changes have over the years displaced many of the more mundane tasks once requiring dedicated effort by many individuals – turning the crank handle, humping heavy equipment between typists and editors, trekking in all weathers with copy to and from the typist and to the printer. There are, however, still plenty of tasks that can only be done by people and it is thanks to the dedication of the production, distribution and lottery teams that the *Chronicle* continues to appear regularly each month. Everyone in the village should be grateful to them all.

Again, as in the workplace, new ways of doing things have a down side. At one time preparing the *Chronicle* meant that the editor met – and chatted with – lots of people; the Coordinator with the details of the current *Chronicle*; the typist; contributors for help with difficult handwriting; the courier; and so on. Now it's all emails and an occasional telephone call. So although the job itself has lost some of its routine chores it has certainly lost some of its richness.

For the future, it is now no problem to send an email copy of the current *Chronicle* in the easily-read Adobe PDF format to anyone who wishes to have it, whether in the village, in this country or anywhere in the world, provided we have the email address. Indeed, one wonders how soon it will be before we incorporate each issue into a village web site, and as more and more homes have access to the internet to read it, even the print shop becomes redundant.

The treasurer reported that things were looking acceptable at the moment.

The items that received the most discussion were the damage to the windows and how to stop children getting

onto the roof. It has been brought to our notice that a few youngsters are again, literally, playing with fire. Parents please be aware of this — the last thing we want to hear is that a child has been badly burned because no one told you what they are up to when out of your sight.



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

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WOODEN SPOON RECIPE No. 1

Lois Rennells

Salmon Roll with Mushroom Sauce

Make a scone dough, using

8 oz self-raising flour and

1 rounded tsp baking powder,

a pinch of salt,

2 oz margarine,

1 beaten egg made up to 1/4 pint with milk. (Save a little of the egg and milk mixture for brushing over the scone)

Roll out on a floured board into a piece 8" long, 1/4" thick.

Mix together an 8-oz tin of salmon, the juice of a lemon, 2 tsp grated onion, a good pinch of salt and a dessert spoon of chopped parsley.

Spread evenly on the dough; roll up like a Swiss roll. Brush with the saved egg and milk mixture.

Bake on an oven sheet in a hot oven, Gas No 6, 400 deg F (no centigrade ovens in those days) for 30 minutes.

Serve very hot, in slices with a sauce made from a small tin of cream of mushroom soup, spiced with a pinch of mace and a dessert spoon of sherry. Serves four.

This was our very first recipe, prepared in April 1964.

Vandalism

At long last the police are using what I believe is a real deterrent to reduce vandalism. You may have read about ASBO's, (Anti-social Behaviour Orders), but now they are being used effectively. Very recently, an Abingdon 20 year old was issued with an ASBO. The terms are that he is prohibited for the next 5 years from using intimidating behaviour or violence towards any person, engaging in any behaviour that causes or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person, using any abusive or insulting language. The list goes on and on. Other restrictions relate to entry to certain areas (e.g. Peachcroft) and prohibit drinking in a public place. According to the youngster he felt he was hard done by. He also believed that he was above the law for he disobeyed the terms of the ASBO. This breach is a criminal offence and he will soon be serving a prison sentence.

Hopefully if this message can be spread throughout the village it may deter the vandals who have recently damaged the village hall (see the article from Mrs Ann Webb,) and more recently attacked a French lad one late evening in May.

I have asked the Police to help reinforce the message of reporting actual or potential crimes and you should find in another part of the Chronicle details of the Neighbourhood Watch scheme that I would like you actively to support. I know there have been problems in contacting the police, but I am assured that the situation has improved.

The Chief Constable of Thames Valley Police Force will be attending the next Council meeting and I am intending to ask him why, considering the substantial rate increase (45% and 14%) in the last two years, Drayton still does not have adequate policing.

Change of Leader

After a very successful four years as leader of the council Paul Bizzell has stepped down to focus on his IT business. The new leader is Jerry Patterson. He represents Kennington ward and has considerable experience with the Vale Council. For the last few years he has served as deputy leader and a member of the Executive. Other notable changes include Terry Frazer, of Steventon and Hanneys ward as the Chair of the Council.

Local Plan

With the government demanding an increase in homes, the main site will be at Grove, where some 750 dwellings are planned for the period ending 2011, and with a total of 2,500 through to 2021. The Vale is making it conditional that the infrastructure, including roads, is in place before the properties are developed. As for Drayton, the request by the owners, the Earl of Plymouth's Estate, to have the area to the west of the village up to the A34 designated as building land has been rejected. The only building to be allowed in the village will be infilling, for example between Gravel Lane and Henleys Lane.



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Barton Garage Development

At long last approval of the latest revised application for the Barton Garage plot is expected on Monday 24th May. The number of dwellings will reduce by two to eleven. There has also been a reduction in the height of the buildings requested by the Planning Committee at their previous meeting. This had the effect of turning four flats into a pair of semi-detached. Parking spaces are above Government guidelines at 1.9 per dwelling. Let us hope this will be the last in the revisions to the planning requests so that building can commence soon and remove one of the local eyesores.

The Government's Planning Power Strategy

Earlier this year I advised you that the government's bill to give strategic planning powers to an unelected and remote regional body (at Guildford) was rejected by the House of Lords. (I mentioned that the Bill appeared to put convenience before democracy.) The Lords threw out the proposed bill again and the Government has conceded defeat. This is very much a victory for local communities.

Post Office in Steventon

Just to let you know that the Post Office has advised of a change in Steventon. The new Co-op at Steventon (where the garage used to be) will have Post Office facilities. By the time you read this notice the new Co-op shop should be open.

And Finally.....

The next Surgery will be held at 9.00 at the Village Hall on Saturday 5th June. I look forward to meeting any Drayton residents who wish to come along and discuss their concerns.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

MEETING held on 10 May 2004

Unusually, a member of the public came to raise an issue and ask for help from the Parish Council. Remember that every meeting begins with the opportunity for public participation and that not everybody who asks for assistance or provides information gets asked to become a Parish Councillor.

Traffic issues - your comments wanted

Traffic calming is heading towards Drayton at a time when there is a lively debate about what are the most effective and acceptable methods of slowing traffic. We hope to be involved in the consultation having succeeded in getting Drayton close to the top of the list of villages that will benefit from investment arising from the growth of Didcot. This is an issue where the Parish Council expects to receive feedback and would prefer to receive comments from residents before rather than criticism after.

Village Notice Boards

Another hot topic was the state of the notice boards and it would be helpful if people let the Council know how useful they find them in the four existing positions.

Plans for a Village Plan

The Oxford Rural Community Council held a seminar on the preparation of village plans. Shock news, "Village Plans raise house prices". Property prices are higher in villages that have produced a village plan. Apparently this is because it shows the strength of the community that is reflected in the way the village looks and functions. The plan helps local businesses and local services and improves the chances of affordable housing being provided, to counterbalance the effect of generally higher values. Drayton does not have a village plan but the Parish Council will be considering whether to start to process and see if there is the enthusiasm in the village to produce one. Normally the village plan is produced by a group outside the Parish Council and requires volunteers from all parts of the community. If you have or would like to develop particular skills such as IT, writing, editing, web design, graphics, photography, video, communications, or just like the sound of the idea, then it would be helpful if you could let the Parish Council know of your interest. This column will include further reminders on this topic and report on the views of the Parish Council when the matter has been discussed.
