TRAFFIC CALMING

Recent issues of the Chronicle have seen the Parish Council refer to the prospect of traffic calming for the village, and requesting input

Years ago I researched and wrote an article on this subject, listing the various options available, speed bumps, chicanes, and others.

Speed bumps are still a problem, as generally people living nearby don't like the noise they generate. Chicanes are probably not suitable for Drayton, they were imposed on Milton and then withdrawn after protests as they were so unpopular.

Having recently visited Norfolk, I can vouch for another idea that seems most effective. This is a speed detector, a little like a camera, but instead of taking pictures (and running out of film after a couple of hours) this is a black sign that illuminates in front of speeding drivers, giving a large 'SLOW DOWN' with a reminder of what the limit is.

I can't recall such a sign in this area, so residents are perhaps unfamiliar with the concept, about the nearest is in Long Compton, near Chipping Norton. They can also be programmed to show a 'smiley' face if you're doing the right speed, and the opposite if you're not.

I've seen reports that there are excellent safety statistics for these signs, and they are considerably cheaper than speed cameras; having seen them in action, they might be considered an effective deterrent for drivers approaching Drayton.

Drayton TODDLER GROUP Anna Loughlin

Thanks to all the ladies who participated in the Big Toddle for Barnardos at Beale Park, and all of you who sponsored us. We raised money for Barnardo's, the toddler group (we kept 25% of the takings) and had fun in the bargain!

The life of Thomas Barnardo is a fascinating and inspiring story and one to be shared. Barnardo's work began 133 years ago when he rescued thousands of homeless children. He went to London in 1866 to train as a doctor, and lived in a poor area. Parents had to pay for children to attend school, and many poor children never learnt to read or write. Children often worked all week in factories or sweeping chimneys for just a few pennies.

It made Barnardo angry to see children starving and living on the streets, so he decided to help them. He wasn't rich and couldn't give money to all the children. So he worked hard all his life raising money by speaking and writing newspaper stories, asking everyone to help get poor children off the streets. When people gave him money he built homes where children were kept safe, fed and taught to read and write. Barnardo built childrens' homes all over the country and when he died, 8,500 children lived in Barnardo's homes. His supporters have continued his work to the present day.

Barnardo's don't build big homes any more, but they work with children and their families to overcome problems and face a brighter future. As a charity, Barnardo's rely on all sorts of people, from toddlers to big businesses for financial support, and all donations are very gratefully received (www.barnardos.org.uk, or Barnardo's, Tanners Lane, Barkingside, Ilford, Essex, IG6 1QG).

Due to the drop in attendance over the summer months, the Thursday toddler session will relocate to people's gardens within the village from 22 July until the end of August. The sessions will run from 9.30 to 11.30am, weather permitting, and there will be a charge of 50p to cover tea, coffee, juice and biscuits. YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

High Hedges

Just to let you know that Councils will now be responsible for dealing with high hedges that affect the enjoyment of neighbouring property. In the first place neighbours will be expected to resolve such problems between themselves before seeking official involvement.

On receipt of a complaint, councils must first assess whether the hedge is affecting the amenity of adjoining property before deciding what action should be taken in the form of a Remedial Notice. Once served, the Notice will specify what steps the owner of the hedge must take to alleviate the problem.

Non-compliance will enable the council to carry out the work and re-charge its costs — or alternatively prosecute. There is however the right to appeal to the Secretary of State. The regulations governing the maximum fee which a local authority can charge to anyone seeking its involvement in a hedge dispute have yet to be finalised by the government. An initial fee of £300 is currently being suggested by the government.

Local Plan (Update)

The Second Deposit draft as it is legally called, (in reality it is a revision to the Initial Local Plan), has just been issued by the district council. The only change I could see affecting Drayton is the recommendation made by the consultants to the Wilts and Berks Canal Trust. The planned route moves closer to Drayton in the west, skirting the village before meeting up with the original planned route, just south of Oday Hill. It then travels east to the Thames. British Waterways intend the canal to be used for full navigational use, as it once was back in 1810 up to the 1840's, when railways took over.

It is likely some development on or close to the route of the canal will be permitted to facilitate the recreational potential of the waterway.

Another local change is the extension of the Ock Valley Green corridor just south of the Tesco's roundabout to the A34. This change acknowledges it is part of the river Ock flood plain and the land will not be built on whilst the current council is in authority at the Vale.

PARISH COUNCIL (meeting June 7)

A resident of Dropshot raised the issue of traffic between Drayton and Sutton Courtenay that ignores the 40mph limit and the danger of the de-restricted road to Milton village. These issues may be overlooked in the calming measures that are coming through the Didcot Integrated Transport Study. We will be suggesting a roundabout on the Milton turn but there can't be a regulation or physical obstruction to control every case of bad or irresponsible driving.

On the planning front, comments are now invited by the VWHDC on the second deposit draft local plan that does not include the proposals to build houses between the village and the A34 or those on the field between Henleys Lane and Manor Farm. Growth is directed to Abingdon, Wantage/Grove and Faringdon as villages like Drayton are regarded as 'unsustainable'. If anybody is interested in the village plan that could look at why village lifestyles are unsustainable and what could be done about it, please come to a parish council meeting, contact me, or watch out for further announcements.

Every year the VWHDC has money to spend on amenity planting. If you have an idea of where some new trees would improve the village and its setting please let the PC know.

In a week where the claims are made that the low turnout for European elections is a measure of the indifference for that level of government, it may be worth noting that at the opposite end of the scale, we cannot even get a full parish council and numbers are falling. It might be worth coming to a meeting or two just to see what it is that Parish Councils do in case there is something that **you could offer**.

Anybody who has opinions on the above, or other ideas, should come to a meeting of the PC (usually the first Monday - July 5th - 7.45 pm at the Caudwell Day Centre). Daniel Scharf

NOTICE BOARD

Wooden Spoon Recipe No. 2 - From June 1966

Tunisian Chicken (serves 6):- One 5 lb roasting chicken, salt, pepper, 2 oranges, ½ lb honey and 1½ glasses vin rosé (by Lois Rennells)

- Season inside the bird. Make several cuts through the skin of one of the oranges and put inside the chicken. Place in a roasting tin (the tin should leave only an inch or so either side of the bird)
- Sprinkle with salt and pepper and pour over the juice of the second orange and the honey.
- Roast at 170 C, gas Mark 3 for 1½ hours, basting very frequently. Pour over half the wine and cook for a further 40 minutes, basting well. Lower oven temperature if the liquid in the tin is becoming too dark. It should be a rich dark brown but must not burn.
- When cooked remove from the oven, take out the orange and squeeze the juice over the chicken. Pour out the fat from the liquid in the roasting tin and add the remainder of the wine. Stir well and serve with the chicken.
- Accompany with orange rice and chicory and watercress salad.
