Over the first weekend in August thirty-six members of the Drayton Twinning Group journeyed by car, ferry and air to meet up in our twin town, Lesparre-Médoc.

Once there we were welcomed most warmly by our many friends in Lesparre and during our stay we were treated to many of the delights that the region has to offer — including some gloriously sunny days.

Our hosts had worked hard on a programme that included:- a guided walk round the *maraise* (a nature reserve on the shores of the Gironde estuary); a boat trip on the same estuary; and visits to various aspects of the local industry – the vineyards.

This included an evening barbeque at Château Mazails in Saint Yzans de Médoc, the fermentation vessels where it all happens, and the *chais* where the barrels of wine are matured. We also visited the Uni-Médoc in Gaillan where we saw their *chais*, bottling, labelling and packing plant. It would have been churlish to have refused to broaden our education by turning down the comparative tastings that were offered throughout. The programme also allowed time to visit the celebrated Montalivet street market and spend an afternoon at the beach on the famous Atlantic Coast – Le Côte d'Argent.

There were plenty of chances to relax, to improve ones' French and to cement the wonderful friendships that continue to grow during each visit. We will always remember the giant paella for one hundred people at the dinner-dance held in the Saint-Threnody church hall; our indoor pique-nique which was held in the local sports club — owing to heavy showers — but perhaps most memorable of all, sharing meals and the hospitality offered in their homes by our hosts.



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

Letter from The Revd Dorothy Derrick

Dear Friends.

I have just returned from a few days holiday on the South Pembrokeshire Coast. We were blessed with wonderful sunshine and glorious hours for walking the coastal path. The beauty of the blue sky and glistening sea was awesome. The cliff path was skirted with the purple heather and sun bright golden gorse - so much glory and peace. Yet on one of our walks as we drank in the beauty and peace we only needed to take a few paces towards the cliff top to lean over and see and hear the turmoil of the surf crashing below with great power and eroding the cliffs into arches and stacks. Having returned to the path we looked inland over the M.O.D. range to see tanks and armoured cars which are obviously bombarded during army training and manoeuvres

I was reminded that life is a bit like that. Some of the time in our journey of life we walk in tranquillity; sometimes we are battered by the trials of life before we can return to easier paths; sometimes we ourselves decide to get involved in wrong things and need to be rescued and brought back to the right path.

This also applies to our faith journey. There are times when we see clearly and follow the path that God has set before us. There are times when we allow ourselves to be led astray. There are times when we decide that God is irrelevant and we need to find the way back.

Jesus said "I am the way, the truth and the life." (John 14:6). It is good to remember that we are called to follow him. It is good to remember that although we follow he has promised to walk with us on the way. It is also good to remember that we walk the way with others. We are fellow pilgrims on the road.

* * * * * * As this will be my last letter to you, I would like to thank you for welcoming us both into this, your community of Drayton. It has been a privilege for me to serve as your Parish priest. To be given the care of a parish, as happens with the Church of England, is an awesome task. I am conscious that I have not touched as many lives as I might have done. I am also conscious that I have been blessed to share on a deep level with those who have lost loved ones during the six and a half years that I have been here and I would like to thank you for that. When we leave for Carlisle in September we shall be seeking God's way for us in our retirement. This is both exciting and daunting, but we put our trust in the Lord.

I am delighted that the Revd. Sister Josie Midwinter has been appointed as my successor. She will be coming to Drayton from Didcot in February 2005. I trust you will welcome her as you welcomed me. I am sure she will serve you faithfully.

Max Smith (1912 - 2004)

We said a fond farewell to dear Max, who was a member of the Drayton Baptist Church. The Church was full and needed extra chairs to seat everyone. It was a celebration of her life; the service flowed with a peace and grace, reflecting Max's nature. It's sad to say goodbye, but when you are at a funeral of someone who has been a Christian for most of their life and their faith has been at the top of the list, there is a very different feeling to the service. There is a strength and peace that can not go unnoticed. She will be missed dreadfully! But has only gone to the loving arms of Jesus Christ.

Larry Kavanagh led the service and spoke, with such conviction in his voice, of her faith. There were lots of Max's favourite hymns. Kathy Kavanagh and Marion Pengelly Phillips sang a duo, The Lord's my shepherd, 23 Psalm. David Waghom read from the Gospel of John (Ch 3:1-8 & 16-21) and prayers led by Bob Pengelly Phillips. Our dear friend Rev Dorothy Derrick took part in the service too.

Max Smith has been in Drayton for as long as I can remember. Thirty years or so at Hilliat Fields with her family and only had to move from there because her house was bulldozed to make way for Lyford Close to be built. So she and the family moved to a bungalow in Comneville Rd where she has been for the last twenty years.

Max was always known for her wonderful cakes that she made. She was always found in the kitchen when help was needed, like the Drayton Bazaar and the help she gave to the late Mrs Morse in the Woman's Fellowship. Years ago our Baptist church used to have students from Regent Park, Bible College, Oxford, helping us with many services, as this would help them in their training. They would come from Oxford and more than likely stay in Drayton for the day.

Mrs Smith would give them a warm welcome at her home. They would stay for dinner and high tea, and if you have ever been to one of Max's high teas you were in for a real treat. Well! It was a table full of so many goodies, cakes, scones, Victoria sponge cake, and lots of different sandwiches. You would literally take a step back and hold your breath and stand with your mouth open wide at the feast set before you. It must have taken hours and hours to cook and prepare if not days, but it was her way of serving God in the way she knew best.

I'm sure every student pastor that ever came will never forget, her unselfish generosity and the real feeling of being in a homely environment for the day, must have helped them. As they would be missing their own homes and family while training. I'd like to think that when Max got to the gates of heaven, God would say, sit down have a cuppa and a nice piece of cake you've done well.

In the past three years her health became poor but her daughter Ira looked after her at home, and more recently her other daughter Pam came up from Worthing, to help in the care of their mother.

I must just mention the courage Max showed after having her leg amputated at the John Radcliffe Hospital, due to diabetic gangrene. Her faith really shone out in her recovery at Abingdon Hospital, in never complaining or asking WHY me! She just accepted everything with such grace. Many people will always remember Max by her charming warm smile, which never left her.

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Fireworks Regulations 2004 - 7 August 2004

On 7 August 2004 the Fireworks Regulations 2004 (SI 2004 /1836) came into force (except for reg. 9 - Licensing of Fireworks Suppliers and reg. 11 - Importation of Fireworks - which come into force on 1st January 2005).

The provisions of these new Regulations include prohibition of persons under 18 years from possessing adult fireworks in public places, restrictions on the use of adult fireworks between 11pm and 7am except at New Year's Eve, Chinese New Year, or Diwali (until 1am) and on 5th November (until midnight); also a prohibition on the supply of excessively loud fireworks (120 decibel).

In view of the exceptional public annoyance at anti-social use of fireworks, **people should be aware** that the police intend to be pro-active in applying the penalties for illegal usage, and supply, as necessary.

Massive Expansion Plans in Oxfordshire

When the South Oxfordshire District Council approved planning permission for the Didcot extension, some of the proposed dwellings trespassed on Vale of White Horse District land. Now Oxford City Council is at it! A proposal has been made by OCC to develop a strategic development area (SDA) of an extra 25,000 houses between Oxford through to Harwell. Most of the development would be in the Vale, and much of it on green belt land. What is behind their action money. Grants would go chiefly to the Labour led OCC. A motion at the Vale Full Council to reject this proposal by Oxford City Council was supported by the Lib Dems and only two conservatives. This issue is of serious concern because if the SDA is approved at the unelected South East England Regional Authority it will have very serious implications on all people living in the Oxford to Harwell band and surrounding areas. There is a need for further dwellings in the area and this is being managed under effective control; to cater for another 25,000 houses with all the infrastructure problems I believe will bring chaos to the district. It was a shame the majority of Conservatives did not attend this important discussion which will have serious implications for a massive swathe of Vale communities.

Wind Farms Cause A Storm

Planning permission for wind farms (and other renewable energy sources) will be easier to obtain as a result of new guidance to local authorities from John Prescott, the deputy Prime Minister. These guidelines issued in August, are indeed instructions to local authorities, such as the Vale of White Horse District Council. Large wind farms can be allowed right up to the boundary of National Parks and small scale developments should be permitted within such areas as national parks, areas of national beauty and heritage coasts, provided there is no significant environmental detriment to the area concerned.

Many protestors argue that wind farms are a scar on the landscape, that wind is not a reliable technology and does not produce the energy its supporters claim. The government has told local councillors to ignore such protests and instructs local authorities to work on the basis that the renewables are a necessary part of reaching the government's climate change targets.

It is currently taking nearly 12 months on average for wind farm planning applications to be determined, so this new edict will reduce decision time. The Vale already has a planning application for a wind farm at Watchfield in the west of the district. This was for five windmills and the decision included conditions over landscape and noise emissions. It took many months of listening to arguments for and against, before a decision was reached.

Before the five turbines were erected a planning application was lodged to substitute these by more sophisticated machines (the number remains unchanged). From memory these were slightly taller windmills, but with a slower speed. Decision on the application was delayed for legal reason, (protestors taking legal action against the Vale, communications between the council and the government.) Fed up with the delays, the applicants decided to proceed with the original plan. I can't say I blame them!

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PARISH COUNCIL (meeting Aug 2)

Three parishioners turned up to contribute to the debate on traffic calming and the state of our roads and pavements for 'mobility scooters'. The relatively uneventful meeting reflected the absence of concern about where the 40,000 homes planned for the County might be built that the Parish council has no part to play in the issue. OK, so nobody on the parish council thought it would really happen, and that this is scare-mongering by people in Oxford or Guildford. But there may be some fire behind the smoke-signal that the area between Oxford and Didcot would be the best place to meet the need for the Oxfordshire contribution to housing land requirements in the South East.

Find or draw a map of south Oxfordshire. All the land between Oxford and Abingdon is Green Belt. Much of the land between Abingdon and Didcot is where we live. It doesn't have to be 40,000 houses to make Drayton a likely target for housing promoted speculatively or through the planning process. The Structure Plan and Local Plan that are currently being approved make no mention of this possibility. However, these plans incorporate the planners' view of housing supply and the environment (down from John Prescott) rather than the Treasury view of what is reasonably necessary for economic reasons (from Gordon Brown). There are problems, in that the A34 would become even more congested and the Ock Steet/Drayton Road junction would have to be grade separated. However, the idea seems to be that if we (the Local Councils) embrace the idea of growth we could benefit from improved infrastructure and services that would otherwise be overrun by development that would happen in any event and in an unplanned way.

Did you know that most of the development of Grove was an alternative to a proposal to build a Drayton / Sutton Courtenay / Steventon / Milton new town? Although most of the new housing in the VWH is still planned for Grove, this may not be enough, and the original scheme may be back on the drawing board.

Did you know that the 'Drayton Division' will be no more, and Drayton will be part of an Abingdon ward in the make up of the County Council. If this will make it more difficult for Drayton village to get its distinctive voice heard then this may be very convenient for those who regard it as part of the Abingdon/Didcot suburban sprawl.

Other business was discussed at the meeting, including the replacement of swings and safety flooring at the Lock Way playground and the appointment of a new clerk.

It would be wrong to say that your voice at parish meetings or even on the Parish Council would make it more or less likely that Drayton will join up with either or both Abingdon or Didcot. However, it may true to say that local opinion can have an influence over the least worst places to build and what services and facilities would be required.

Anybody who has opinions on the above, or other ideas, should come to a meeting of the PC (usually the first Monday - Sept 6th - 7.45 pm at the Caudwell Day Centre).

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More Traffic

After the interesting text in last month's Chronicle, highlighting that rush-hour traffic needs little speed control due to the congestion, and that issue's editor Derek Pooley putting his point of view, here's my <u>personal</u> opinion. It may well be influenced by many years of driving over 20,000 miles a year, mostly on main A-roads and motorways.

We seem to have two points of view being expressed, with little understanding of common ground.

There are opinions that we have a dangerous roads problem, with masses of selfish speeding drivers taking every opportunity to exceed speed limits and drive recklessly. To many motorists, such people as believe this version of events would want every car preceded by a man with a red flag, as in the earliest days of motoring.

There are several reasons why many motorists do not respect present speed limits. One is that a few years ago, in many counties, certainly including Oxon, lots of roads had their existing limit cut by 10, 20 or 30mph, for no apparent reason other than local councils and police discovering what a lot of extra funding could be obtained from motorists' pockets. A host of letters have appeared in the national press, from all over the country, expressing this point.

One local piece of road that is commonly believed to be an example of this would be that between Drayton and Steventon.

Further evidence would be the odd location of many speed cameras. Between Henley and Wallingford is a most dangerous road, the location of a number of fatal accidents in recent years. And the nearest speed camera is . . . on a right-angled bend in Nettlebed, completely useless. Why is there a speed camera by Hartwells, on a short piece of road between two roundabouts? You'd think Saxton Road, or maybe Hilliatt Fields or Whitehorns Way, would make more use of one if safety was really on the authorities' minds?

A third reason is that the braking distances often quoted in relation to speed are now completely out of date, modern cars are easier to control and have much better braking than before.

Those who would say, any vehicle can be a killer, and would flood Drayton with speed bumps (they could see what they've done for Kennington) might like to consider recent news from Reading, where the bus drivers threatened to go on strike unless many of them were removed again – they are causing bus (and other professional) drivers to suffer back injuries.

A further problem with speed bumps is the extra pollution caused by cars slowing, then accelerating again.

As I've expressed before, I think the speed detector sign is most effective, illuminating in front of speeding drivers, giving a large 'SLOW DOWN' with a reminder of what the limit is.

They work well up at Botley on the A34, we could have one at each entrance to Drayton.

Having said that, as a motorist and occasional pedestrian, I don't think Drayton has a major problem; the most likely time I've noticed for cars to really speed through the village is late at night. If crossing the road is really a problem at certain times—perhaps a couple of pedestrian crossings, near the Green and the Mace shop, would help reassure people?

Any speed bumps would need to be the 'stud' shaped ones, so that buses and emergency vehicles would be least obstructed, and it may be an idea to have one or two in Hilliatt Fields and Whitehorns Way, as they have children at risk?


