DOROTHY AND JOHN DERRICK LEAVE DRAYTON

The headline across the top of the August edition of the Chronicle read 'The Derrick Era Draws To A Close' and now, sadly, it has closed.

Dorothy and John Derrick have retired and we wish them every happiness and a long and healthy time together in Carlisle where they will be much closer to both arms of their family in Scotland and Northern Ireland

They may be gone but they are certainly not forgotten. Dorothy and John did so much for all sections of the Drayton community that I would be surprised if anyone in Drayton will not notice the enormous hole that they will leave in our lives.

It is, perhaps, not insignificant that the number of couples asking Dorothy to marry them before she retired was several times the norm. I know because my new wife, Mary, and I were one of them!

Dorothy's final Sunday services were on 5th September and there were over a hundred people in church for the 10 o'clock

Eucharist. It was a wonderful bright morning but it was tinged with sadness, not so much because it was Dorothy's final Sunday, but because of the news that had just broken of the massacre at the Russian school and Dorothy felt she had to amend her sermon to record the shock and deep compassion that she felt at man's inhumanity to man.

It was an emotional time but Dorothy coped admirably and made a point of



spending extra time wishing everyone well and spending a little longer as the congregation said their 'Goodbyes' in the church porch.

As always, Dorothy was ably supported by her husband, John, who was always there, quietly and efficiently supporting and helping to ensure that everything went smoothly. He, too, will be sadly missed and we feel it will probably take at least four people to cover the list of all the jobs he regularly undertook around the church, churchyards and Almshouses.



The weather wasn't so bright on Saturday 11th September, but the rain kept off and our spirits were not dampened as we prepared for Dorothy's service of Celebration and Farewell. Her theme, reflected in the first hymn was 'The Lord has done great things for me, Holy is his name!'

During the afternoon, the bell ringers rang a quarter-peal in honour of John's years of unstinting support as a loyal and steady ringer.

The bell ringers rang

again just prior to the service whilst the congregation came in and kept coming in. There wasn't a spare seat in the church. What a joy and how appropriate that so many people should turn out to wish Dorothy and John farewell!

The service consisted of a wonderful selection of Dorothy's favourite hymns with the service in between these hymns being devoted to each of the five Ministry Groups – Healing, Care, Prayer, Worship and Discipleship. Each group leader read an appropriate Bible reading and members of each group offered up symbols relevant to each group's function.

The service continued with prayers including a 'Praying Farewell' where Dorothy and John prayed for the congregation and then the congregation reciprocated. *Continued on page 98*

Dorothy's final service was very much a Celebration, featuring readings and presentations of symbols by members of the church community interspersed with a wonderful collection of Dorothy's favourite hymns. It was followed by a supper and a very memorable evening came to a close.

THE CHILDREN'S SOCIETY

I am writing as an Honorary Local Secretary for The Children's Society. As one of the country's leading children's charities we have recently launched 'Safe and Sound' – a major national campaign to highlight the dangers faced by young runaways.

Over 100,000 children run away from home or care in the UK every year. A quarter of these are under 11 – some as young as six years old. Many young runaways are exposed to drug abuse, prostitution and violent crime. Our research shows that 15,000 of these runaways are 'thrown away' – forced to leave home by their parents or carers before they are 16.

We are asking every political party to support our Safe and Sound Test. This calls on local authorities to provide a manager with responsibility for young runaways and a plan to respond to their needs. We are also campaigning for a national network of safe places for under-16s who run away.

It would be helpful if the local spokesmen of the main political parties in the area would write to the local newspapers explaining their policies to help young runaways.



The PACE Centre provides an 'education for life' for children with cerebral palsy, teaching them essential daily living skills such as walking, eating and using their hands, which most children are fortunate to be able to take for granted. There are currently 59 children, aged from six months to twelve years old, who attend PACE and, although the Centre is based in Aylesbury, due to it's uniqueness children travel from up to a 50-mile radius, including a large number from the Oxfordshire area.

Many of you may know Judy and Derek Henman, whose granddaughter Natasha comes to PACE. Natasha is 5 years old and is in a group with seven other children who have similar abilities and difficulties. She has achieved so much since she started here, and is now learning to walk alone, eat and drink by herself and, much to the delight of her family, is starting to speak all things which she was unable to do before PACE. The aim, where possible, is to prepare the children for successful integration into mainstream education, and it is hoped that Natasha will be ready for this progression after another 2-3 years of intensive input at PACE. However Natasha's Local Education Authority will not fully fund her place, and an additional £15,000 is needed each year to continue with Natasha's programmes. The approach at PACE is very intense and specialist, but is well worth the high cost when the children make such fantastic progress.

Sadly, Natasha is in a similar situation to many of the children at PACE, and we have to rely on the generosity of grant-making trusts, companies, community groups, schools and individuals and on a variety of fundraising events to help us make up this shortfall every year. There are also numerous plans to improve the facilities at PACE in the future, as at the present time there is a waiting list, cramped conditions, and a lack of outdoor space for the children. Eventually it would be great to extend the PACE service, and open up other centres around the whole of the UK.





WHAT TO DO WHEN YOUR **G.P. SURGERY IS CLOSED**

A new 'Out of Hours' emergency health care service in South West Oxfordshire was introduced on 1st September 2004, The new service will offer care for urgent health problems when GP surgeries are closed – that is between 6.30pm and 8.30am Monday to Friday and 24 hours over weekends and bank holidays.

The Out of Hours Service can be contacted on 0845 345 8995. This number will also be available on your regular G.P. surgery's answer-phone.

Your personal details will be taken and passed onto a duty GP, who will return your call and assess your medical requirements. This may involve advice about self-care, a visit to the Primary Care Centre for our district, (at the Abingdon Community Hospital, Marcham Road) or a home visit by a GP or specialist Paramedic. If appropriate, patients will be given an appointment and advised when and where to attend The Primary Care Centre

As with the existing out of hours service, calls should be restricted to genuinely urgent health care problems only. Out of hours cover does NOT, for example, deal with the following:

- Prescriptions for medicines that can be bought at the chemist
- Repeat prescriptions
- Second opinions on problems being dealt with by your doctor
- Problems that can wait until your surgery is open

Emergencies

Please remember - if you are faced with a real emergency and the patient needs immediate care:

- either Dial 999 and ask for an ambulance
- or Go straight to the nearest Emergency Department at the John Radcliffe Hospital in Oxford, the Royal Berkshire and Battle Hospital in Reading or the Great Western in Swindon

Health Advice

General advice on health (e.g. on minor ailments, coughs, colds and headline, etc) is available from NHS Direct advice 24 hours a day on 0845 4647.

Your local pharmacy can also offer you a range of services, including advice and medicines to relieve symptoms of minor ailments.

YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLOR COLUMN

Grahame Ash

Did you know?

"Did you know that most of the development of Grove was an alternative to a proposal to build a Drayton / Sutton Courtenay / Steventon / Milton new town?" asked the Parish Council scribe in last month's Chronicle. Well, I for one didn't! Nor does the Planning Directorate at the Vale. Nor does the Oxfordshire County Council!

At the Lib Dem meeting on the local plan, I do remember arguing persuasively and successfully that there should not be any developments on the outskirts of villages, as people moving to village communities wanted to retain the village image rather than find it swallowed up by a nearby town. At the planning meeting it was agreed that the main area of development would be in Grove. The land was not green belt. It was also agreed that strict conditions on facilities, including roads would be introduced before the development took place. To suggest Grove was an alternative to a local new town is absolute nonsense.

I would mention that when I canvassed to be district councillor some six years ago, a rumour abounded that a considerable tract of land south of Abingdon was going to be built on, linking up with Drayton to make it essentially a suburb of Abingdon. The truth was that it was not the case then and is not the case now.

Boundary Changes

In the same Parish Council meeting article, the writer asks if we knew that the Drayton division of the Oxfordshire County would be no more. Both your district councillor and the Parish council objected to this change by the Boundary Commission, but to no avail. The Commission has been given its target by the Labour Government to re-align the County Electoral divisions by numbers of voters; in other words each councillor represents approximately the same number of voters. As far as the Commission is concerned, if the new boundaries link villages with towns it is apparently of little consequence, as long as the voting ratio is maintained.

There will be the opportunity in May to vote for two County councillors to represent you in the new South Abingdon and Drayton division.

I thought I would just mention that the Vale's wards were changed for the last district elections. Although Drayton remained unchanged, Steventon lost its independence and became integrated with the Hagbournes. Two district councillors represent this new ward.

- → All Charities now have to comply with the Home Office Guidance; this details certain disclosures, such as the remuneration of the collectors, and style of collection. It really is trying to stop rogue collections. If you are uncertain about donating, the Charity Check suggests you ask the collector the following two main questions:
 - 1. Do you conform to Home Office Guidance?
- 2. And How? (For example what is the charities solicitation statement when requesting a donation?)

Personally I am not quite sure if the Charity Check organisation expects you to dash to the computer and check the answers whilst the collector is still standing waiting for a donation. I would also add a third question: - can I see your collection authority (Which all collectors must have)!

What ever you decide to do, please don't let the collector have the opportunity of entering your home. There have been far too many instances where this has led to stealing. You know it makes sense to be safe rather than sorry.

Travellers Management Unit

The removal of travellers occupying land without consent is very often far from easy. Any decision to evict travellers from unauthorised encampments must also comply with the Human Rights Act of 1998. This article is to advise that a Management Unit, comprising of county staff and a police inspector has been established to cover the Oxfordshire area. Its objectives are to work closely with the travellers to help them and, in addition, to arrange earlier removal of unauthorised encampments under Police powers rather than going through the tortuous routes available to the District Councils.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Daniel Scharf

At its meeting on 6 September the Council welcomed the new Clerk, Marie Selwood, and said goodbye to Maria Wysocki-Jones who had given the Council valuable service.

Village residents came to the meeting to raise the issue of the access being created to a garden in Sutton Wick near to the pond. The issue of the use of motorbikes on Eastway was also raised. This is an offence, as Eastway is a bridleway that can only be used legally by horses, pedestrians and bicycles.

Work will start very shortly on the replacement of the swings and safety surface on the Lockway playground.

The usual discussion on traffic management revealed that consultation on the calming measures that are available to the village as a result of the Didcot Integrated Transport Study will be discussed in October/November.

The Council received a report from its member Chris Thurston-Davis who had carried out a careful analysis of the proposed boundary changes that would put Drayton in the same County Council constituency as an Abingdon ward. The Council decided to make a strong late objection to this proposal, explaining how Drayton could stay with Sutton Courtenay, Steventon, Milton, and Appleford.

As always, residents are encouraged to attend the next meeting on 4 October at 7.45 at the Caudwell Day Centre.

BE AWARE! ANOTHER SCAM

Please be aware of the following and inform friends and family as appropriate. We have been made aware of a telephone fraud currently in operation both to home and/or work telephones - landlines and mobiles:

Upon answering the telephone you will hear a recorded message congratulating you on winning an all expenses trip to an exotic location. You will then be asked to press 9 to hear further details. If you press 9 you will be connected to a premium rate line that costs approximately £20 per minute. Even if you disconnect immediately it will remain connected for a minimum of 5 minutes, costing around £100. The final part of the call involves you being asked to key in your postcode and house number (which has other serious consequences).

After a further 2 minutes you will receive a message informing you that you are not one of the lucky winners. The total bill will be around £260. Since the calls are originating from outside the UK, BT and other telephone companies are left relatively powerless to act

The only safe solution is to HANG UP before the message prompts you to press 9; even safer is to HANG UP on any unsolicited 'free offer' call. This appears to be a variation on a theme; warnings have been circulated previously regarding calls made by individuals claiming to be A T&T engineers conducting a test on the line and asking you to press 9 and # and similar text messages. DO NOT DIAL 9 (OR VARIANTS) FOR ANYONE!

Fred Hays, 1919 to 2004

Fred was born in New Northcourt, Abingdon and was a life-long Baptist. A full church at his funeral service was a tribute to his many interests both in the church and elsewhere. He was a grocer by trade, working at Walkers and World Stores, which used to be in the High Street, Abingdon. He later worked at MG motors in Marcham Road until its close and, with a friend, started the MG swimming club.

He retired to Drayton in 1973 where his first wife, Eileen, died. He remarried and Mavis and Fred enjoyed 24 years together.

Fred was Diarist for the Drayton Chronicle for 20 years and with Richard and Joyce Cheynie, also from Drayton founded the Drayton Sequence Dance Club which continues to prosper. One of Fred's greatest achievements and pleasures was to be one of the driving forces behind the restoration of a Compton theatre organ and its subsequent installation in the then new Abbey Hall -concerts are still held regularly.

For over 32 years he served on the committee of the Theatre Organ Preservation Society, holding every office except that of chairman. On finally stepping down from the committee he was honoured with a lifetime presidency.
