



Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends.

Christmas finishes today (I am writing this on January 6 - Epiphany) and many of us are probably sighing with relief that it is now behind us - the choosing of presents, decorating the house, the cooking of all the meals, writing and posting all the cards, the tidying up. It is too easy for Christmas - the real Christmas - to be submerged.

We have to remind ourselves, amid all the commercialism, that this is the time when Jesus was born for us. Jesus is THE gift of Christmas and, because He is a gift, it means that we have somehow been chosen to receive Him.

Most of the year, the Church tends to focus on the adult Jesus, His teaching, His stories, His example. It is only at Christmas that the Church concentrates on Jesus the infant. (Is this why we say that Christmas is about children?). Like all newborn children, He is helpless. And like all newborn babies, it is this helplessness that appeals to us, makes us love them and makes us joyful.

Then on Boxing Day, we awoke to the news of the Tsunami disaster. The scale of the devastation is impossible to take in, despite the TV and newspaper coverage. We all know from our own limited experience how powerful and destructive water can be. The Bible tells of the Flood, Noah's Ark and the parting of the Red Sea.

Our joy seemed shortlived and yet, out of all the suffering and hardship, hope and concern for others appeared almost immediately. The response of people worldwide has been staggering. They may not understand but they want to help, to comfort, to send healing and to aid those who have lost everything. Irrespective of religion or race, people have come together. Warring sides in civil wars have set aside their differences and are co-operating.

At the moment, the world seems intent on following the Second Commandment - 'Love your neighbour as yourself'. And the story of the Good Samaritan clearly tells us that everyone is our neighbour and we must be concerned about their wellbeing. Isn't it a tragedy that it has taken a tragedy to bring the world to its senses and, as it were, to make it realise its true responsibilities. Let us pray that once things begin to improve, this global caring will continue.

When the song of the angels is stilled when the star in the sky has gone when the kings and princes are home when the shepherds are back in their fields the work of Christmas begins:

to find the lost to heal the broken to feed the hungry to release the prisoner.







PARISH COUNCIL (meeting Dec 6)

In the public speaking session, concern was expressed about the state of Sutton Wick Lane. The County Council are being asked to investigate the damage that is being done to the verges, and the rights of the vehicles at Sherwood Farm that are responsible for causing the overrunning.

David Hudson, the PC representative on the school governors, described the restructuring of the school to address the reduced number of children that promises to become a permanent state of affairs. Staff and pupil numbers are down and hopefully the reuse of some of the space will mean that the facilities will be improved including a room for the Head and a disabled toilet. **There are currently vacancies for governors** and anybody interested in this very important part of the village community should **contact Pauline Higgs** at the school.

The **Boundary Commissioners have not accepted** either the objections or the counter proposal made by the Council to the incorporation of Drayton into an Abingdon ward for County Council elections. The Council will have 3 months to consider whether there are grounds to legally challenge this decision.

The Council noted the intention of **Thames Water** to invest about £25 million in feasibility studies into the reservoir to the west of the village and A34.

Together with the housing pressures in the Didcot area, traffic calming measures, and the possibility of through ticketing on the bus services, there is no shortage of issues in which the Parish Council will be involved over the next few years. It is likely that each or all of these issues will be of very great interest to the village when they 'hit the street' and it would be very helpful to have a **full complement of Parish Councillors to represent** the views of the village.

Anybody interested should come to the next meeting at the Caudwell Day Centre on **7 February** at 7.45 pm to bring an issue for discussion or just to watch.

Also, we would like to give plenty of advance notice of the next **Parish Annual Meeting**, which will be held on **4 April**; all those living in the parish are invited to hear what has happened in the last 12 months and to say what they think about it.
