SETTLING IN Ed Vaizey MP

It's been almost three months since I was elected as the Member of Parliament for the Wantage constituency, which includes Drayton. Thank you very much for giving me the opportunity to serve you as your MP.

It's been an eventful few weeks. The House authorities do all they can to make you feel welcome, but it is still a disorientating process. For example, it takes several weeks to be allocated an office.

The first task of a new Member is to make their maiden speech. This is a unique occasion, as the speech is meant to be noncontroversial, and you are listened to without interruption by the other members of the House. It is a chance to extol the wonders of your constituency, which in my case was not difficult. I won't reproduce the speech here, but you can find it on-line at http://www.parliament.uk in the Hansard for 8th June if you want to read it

Since my maiden speech, I have sat on the Standing Committee to scrutinise the Consumer Credit Bill, which is designed to up-date our thirty year old consumer credit laws and combat loan sharks, and appointed to the Modernisation Select Committee, which recommends changes to parliamentary procedure.

3. A good, **black typescript** on white A4 paper or smaller and at least 10 point font. The scanner can read in typescripts but only imperfectly so very careful editing is needed. Even so, this is still much easier than re-typing.

4. Finally, **hand–written items** are typed up by a willing team of typists. Thanks to the many contributors who spell out names of people and places in capitals. This does save a lot of pencil sucking and mistakes.



Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends

Have you ever stopped to consider that the church and churchyard are two of the busiest places in the community? It may surprise you to know the variety of activities which go on there on a daily basis. The main function of the church is to provide a place to worship God. This is done every Sunday at 8am and 10am, but the church is open every day for both formal and informal worship and prayer. In the Lady Chapel there is a Prayer Board where people can add their requests - this is well used and we as a church pray regularly for them. Then there are the weddings, baptisms and funerals which occur throughout the year. Visitors also come into the church, to look around, to see the history or do family tree research. From time to time we have school parties and other groups like bell ringing teams.

The churchyard is no less busy. Early in the morning when I go to Morning Prayer I often meet a dog walker or two as they make use of the church path. During the day many people come into the churchyard to tend graves and spend time in thought and prayer for their departed loved ones. Some just sit on the bench and enjoy the view. Across the road from the church is an extra churchyard which we are especially focusing on as a nature reserve. Some grass is allowed to grow longer for insects, butterflies and birds.

All this is maintained by a committed group of volunteers who are frequently in and out of the church: clock winders, bell ringers, flag flyer, cleaners, flower arrangers, lock/unlockers, choir/organist those who care for the shrub beds and general maintenance. All of these people give of their time freely to keep the church and churchyard up to a high standard of care. But there is always room for more volunteers if you would like to help with any of the above tasks.

With all this activity it sounds like the church is rather like the A34 on a Friday afternoon! This, of course, is not the case. Everyone goes about their task quietly and unobtrusively. The church and the churchyard are both there to provide the quiet and reflective environment for people to think and pray. Sometimes people come with a heavy heart. The church is there as a haven for them. If people need to talk, then my role as parish priest is to meet them and to share, and especially to pray.

People value the church for a variety of reasons but the main one is because of its peaceful and prayerful atmosphere. This has been built up over some 800 years of Christians meeting regularly there to worship God. The Church Council is committed to keeping it open and accessible to people. Please help us to keep the church and its environment not just for ourselves, but for generations to come. Josie Midwinter

WOODEN SPOON RECIPE No 12

Lois Rennells

Salmon Kebabs

makes 8 skewers (from August 1978)

4 salmon fillets (approx. 4 oz each)

- 6 8 tablespoons olive oil10 shallots3 tablespoons lemon juice40 baby tomatoes6 oz finely chopped onions20 bay leaves brok
- 4 tablespoons chopped parsley

20 bay leaves broken in half, salt and pepper

Skin the salmon. Make sure there are no bones and then cut each fillet into 10 similar-sized pieces. Mix oil, lemon juice, onion, parsley, salt and pepper to form a marinade.

Marinade the salmon for at least 2 hours.

Pour boiling water onto the shallots and leave for about 2 minutes (this will make peeling them a lot easier). When peeled cut them into quarters.

Thread pieces of shallot, bay leaf, salmon and tomato onto a skewer in that sequence until you have five pieces of each. Grill until the salmon is cooked through, turning and basting with marinade.

Serve kebabs on a bed of cooked rice with a little lemon butter sauce poured over each.

For the **lemon butter sauce** melt 8 oz unsalted butter over a low heat and then mix in 1 dessertspoon of chopped parsley, 1 dessertspoon chopped chives and the juice of 1 large lemon.

Accompany with a cucumber and radish salad in soured cream.

RESERVOIR PLANS 'IRRESPONSIBLE'

On Tuesday 19 July, 2005 at 8pm and repeated on Sunday 24 July, 2005 at 5pm, BBC Radio 4 'File on 4' broadcast a item on the proposed reservoir near Drayton. The following is based on a transcript of that broadcast on the BBC Radio4 website.

Thames Water is reviving its plans to build a huge reservoir, despite repeatedly failing to hit leakage reduction targets. The company, currently losing a third of its water daily, 915 million litres, is buying up land in South Oxfordshire.

Residents object to the scale of the reservoir which could cover up to four square miles.

Thames says the project is needed to meet growing water demand and planning permission may be sought in two years.

Long-term benefits

Last week the firm was publicly admonished by the water regulator OFWAT for missing its targets for cutting leaks for the third year running. It said 'Thames loses enough water daily to fill 366 Olympic-sized swimming pools.'

But the company, which says it is working hard to improve leakage repairs, believes the new reservoir is necessary to supply water to customers in London and the South-East. It says the scheme, earmarked for an area southwest of Abingdon in the Vale of the White Horse, would increase its resources for supplying water to the capital by 10%.

The plans to massively increase its water storage capacity dates back to 1990. Chief Operating Officer Gerry England told the File On 4 programme: "It's not something that is going to improve the situation in the next few years.

"It's probably going to be a 15 to 20 year project before we can realise the benefits."

Local views

Local residents, alarmed at the prospect of the 80 ft high earth banks which would surround the reservoir, told File On 4 that neighbouring land was steadily being bought up by Thames.

They fear the plans have made it impossible to sell their homes to any buyer other than Thames Water. Some feel they have been left in the dark over the future of the land since Thames first began promoting the idea over a decade ago.

"At the beginning we were horrified about the reservoir," said Vera Woodley, a semi-retired farmer from Steventon.

"But then it all quietened down and we forgot about it a bit. Now it's all come back, we're horrified all over again.

"I don't think a reservoir is necessary. They should put more meters in people's houses and repair a lot more leaks."

'Irresponsible'

The Chairman of the London Assembly's Environment Committee, Darren Johnson, agrees. "I think it's totally irresponsible to be looking at putting in new reservoirs when you have got a leakage rate of over 30%." \bigcirc

 \bigcirc He added that if Thames cut its leakage rate by one third it would achieve its aim for a 10% improvement in water storage "without flooding half of the countryside."

Mr England conceded to File On 4 that Thames was buying up land in South Oxfordshire but insisted there no official strategy to buy up plots as soon as they became available.

"It's better for the landowners if we can arrange by mutual agreement to purchase the land rather than going through compulsory purchase orders at some time in the future."

Vale in No 1 Spot

Last year the Vale was joint first in Council Tax collection, managing to collect 99.5% of the levy charged. This achievement helps to keep everyone's charge low by collecting money on time. The Vale collects Council Tax payments for Oxfordshire County Council, Thames Valley Police Authority and Town and Parish Councils across the district. The Vale retains less than 10% of the money collected for its own services, currently £92.60 for a band D property and is the tenth lowest district council tax in the country.

Closure of Hospital Beds

The government tells us that one of the responsibilities of the Primary Care Trusts (PCTs) is to consult with the people. The boards of the South West and South East (Oxfordshire) PCTs agreed to close 37 beds in community hospitals at their meeting on the 26th May. They claim that the decision was taken on the basis of clinical risk and claim it is only temporary (minimum 12 month period) and then the issues surrounding the clinical risk and resources will be reviewed. Needless to say there has been no public consultation about this decision. I think this is absolutely disgraceful. You have a government organisation just doing what it wants to do without any consideration for the public. One of my fellow district councillors was fighting the PCT some while ago, over proposed reduction in beds at the Wantage hospital. The PCT were, I understand, claiming they were unable to fill the staff vacancies, but were not advertising to get any replacements! Can you imagine this happening in an effectively managed organisation? Fed up with the latest PCTs "devil-may-care" attitude, the Lib Dem controlled Vale has joined forces with the Conservative administrations of the West Oxfordshire and South Oxfordshire councils to fight this closure and are prepared to take out a high court injunction to stop the closures happening. The hospitals due to lose beds include Abingdon, Didcot and Wantage hospitals. The major concern is that a temporary (12 months) closure will result in the beds never being made available. This view is based not so much on the clinical risks put forward by the PCTS, but that the Thames Valley Health Authority, which incorporates the PCTs, is the worst funded (per capita) in the UK.

Grants determined at the Area Committee Meeting

The committee members were reminded that the approved budget for grants for the Abingdon area, incorporating Drayton, Sutton Courtenay and Appleford had been set at just above £30,000 for the year 2005/6; this excluded some £8k "reserved" for a major claim made last year which was under further review.

There was considerable discussion on the merits and size of the claims lodged. Local beneficiaries are:

- The Drayton Twinning Society for £500 (approved by the Executive Committee on 6th August 2004 and ratified by the Area Committee). This is subject to a service level agreement, which applies to all Vale Twinning societies.
- Mr Bax for a historic building grant of £640 towards the rethatching of Pusey Cottage, a 17th century, grade II listed building.
- The Parish Council for a cleaning grant of £402 for 2005/6

More Statistics

The government is intending to introduce harder tests for councils. Local councils are already subject to CPA, the comprehensive performance assessment (a form of council audit.) Now there is going to be a new way of measuring performance. Again the government is putting more onerous administration tasks on councils, without more funding, (and you know what that means) just so that new CPA audit boxes can be ticked. The government is saying that more freedom is being given to local councils to run their operations. This opinion is not shared by most councils, including the Vale.

Fly-tipping and Litter Offences

It shouldn't really affect Drayton, as we have a Refuse Centre, but I thought you might like to know that the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 has recently been introduced. This makes fly-tipping an arrestable offence with a maximum £50,000 fine or even five years imprisonment for the most serious cases. This Act will also apply to land-owners who allow people to dump rubbish on their land without the land being designated for that purpose.

Litter offences have now been extended to cover all open spaces and private land.

More Houses for Drayton? – An Update

The Inspector is now considering the public hearing held last month regarding the application by the Earl of Plymouth's Estates to include 144 (approx) dwellings on land at Manor Farm for incorporation in the Vale's Local Plan. The Inspector agreed to accept a written application, instead of a public hearing, on the other application for developing the western edge of the village. The decision by the Inspector on whether or not to allow these developments is expected just before Christmas.

And Finally.....

Open discussion – from car boot sales to the reservoir

An unusually long discussion in public session, ranging from the car boot (do we really want replica and ball bearing guns to be sold?) to the reservoir (is this cut and dried?). The reservoir was also on the main agenda with a list compiled of the benefits that the village should be seeking to balance against the various impacts of this massive engineering work – assuming it goes ahead. The suggestions ranged from a full time youth/community worker, to land based and water based play areas and everything possible to mitigate the traffic both during construction and when any leisure is in full swing. The Parish Council has not formed an opinion yet on whether to support or oppose the development in principle and would welcome views on the possible pros and cons from the village.

David Coates, the Environmental Warden for the Vale of White Horse District came to speak about his role. David explained that it was irresponsible dogs and irresponsible owners that were keeping him most busy.


Amenity Tip to close for a refit

Annual Reports Citizen's Advice Bureau and Damascus Project

The Council received a report about the AGM of the Abingdon CAB. The bureau is in serious financial straits and is very stretched with 2.31 full time staff and 40 trained volunteers working on a wide range of issues on a professional basis. They deal with problems arising from employment, housing and an increasing number of debt related issues. The Council provides a grant every year and it seems that we are getting value for money from this well run and important organisation.

The annual report on the Damascus Project indicated that this was becoming well established although still requiring help, from Drayton in particular.



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Allotments

The problem and opportunity of the unused allotment was discussed again. The Council agreed that they should do what was required to help people take on one of the vacant plots. Anybody interested should go and have a look and use their imagination to picture the plot when after a year it looks like one of the productive plots next door. Subject to demand the Council will put these plots into a ready usable state in the autumn. Contact me to talk about allotment gardening or the parish clerk to register your interest (who will put you in touch with Tom – our allotment warden).
