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

A LETTER FROM ST PETER'S

Recently I was given a copy of the current bestseller 'The Da Vinci Code' by Dan Brown to read. I was intrigued because I had heard something about the book and wanted to find out more. As a mystery thriller, The Da Vinci Code scores very highly. It contains all the cliff-hanging suspense and last minute escapes that one would expect from such a novel.





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
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 \Rightarrow The villain is not uncovered until the last and it ends with a neat little twist, which leaves you still guessing. But as a book purporting to include historical data it comes out very poorly. So much of what is stated as evidence of the central plot has little or no factual basis and can easily be made to look very foolish in the face of dispassionate historical evidence.



In the book it is asserted that documents exist to prove that Jesus married Mary Magdalene, that they had a child and that the bloodline of that child still exists today. It is alleged that from the earliest times the church has conspired to suppress these 'facts' in order to promote the idea that Jesus is the Son of God. If only these documents can be found and published then the whole foundation of Christianity will crumble and thus the power of the church will be lost. No wonder there is a chase on to find these documents and either destroy them or publish them depending on which angle you are coming from.

The whole plot of the book is built on a foundation of sand. No such documents exist nor is there any evidence in the book that they exist. Even if documents could be produced, how could they prove that Jesus married Mary Magdalene (or indeed any other person) or that they had a child? All historical manuscripts have to be scrutinised and measured up against documents from other sources. Dan Brown knows that very well so he makes sure the documents never appear so they can never be tested! They are more powerful as a 'will o' the wisp' than as real documents.

The New Testament (which the book tries hard to discredit) is written on the solid rock of contemporary testimony of people who knew and lived with Jesus. They were prepared to risk their lives to preach the message of Jesus as the Son of God who had risen from the dead for forgiveness of sins. Their testimony may have had some bias, but in terms of the factual evidence about Jesus much of it is corroborated by Roman and Jewish writers of the day who were in other ways hostile to Christianity.

If you have read the book or are planning to read it then enjoy the thrill of the chase.. but do not place any reliance on the socalled historical evidence. Several books have been written which give a systematic and balanced analysis of the historical data and I can recommend: 'The DaVinci Code on Trial: Filtering Fact from Fiction' by Stephen Clark. (Bryntirion Press price £4.50.)

I would also be very happy to discuss issues from the book with anyone who is interested as it raises some very interesting questions relating to Christianity. *Josie Midwinter*

By the time we had obtained formal permission from the Church authorities to proceed with the work, it was decided best to wait for the better weather of this summer rather than undertaking the work during the winter months of 2004.

The work started on Tuesday 2nd August when Nathan Coffin, a clock specialist from J B Joyce Ltd. arrived complete with a selection of ropes and abseiling gear. He quickly set to work rigging up his gear and abseiled down to each clock face in turn from the top of the tower. Nathan fixed his main ropes to secure points on the tower and lowered himself down over the parapet until he was level with the clock faces.

Nathan, who is 40 and has been abseiling professionally for many years, hangs in a harness suspended on one rope but is also clipped onto a second rope which he calls 'the hand of God' just in case it is needed! The ropes Nathan uses are incredibly strong and will take four tons safely. As Nathan put it 'There's no chance of my weight breaking the rope as it could quite safely support the weight of my van!

On the first day, Nathan cleaned and painted all three faces black, on the second he picked out all the numerals in gold leaf and on the third day, he painted and replaced the hands and oiled

and greased the clock mechanism and left it all working smoothly.

Nathan came back on the Friday to ensure that everything was running to time then left for his home in Bristol. Thanks to his workmanship and to the generous legacy, we now have three beautifully painted clock faces that are clear to read and should remain that way for many years to come.

VILLAGE COMPETITION

Drayton entered the Oxfordshire Best Kept Village Competition in 2005 but did not win! The Parish Council has asked the Chronicle to print in full the judges' report on Drayton, the bad as well as the good. Please read it and see if there are things you could do to improve our chances next year! The judges said:

'Drayton is generally a well-kept village, almost litter-free, but there were exceptions in sharp contrast to the rest of the village. Verges were well tended, except at the entrance to East Way, where there were large weeds and brambles. A neglected piece of land between Manor Close and the backs of houses in Hilliat Fields was rampant with weeds, and another near the old telephone exchange in High Street had been used as a dumping ground. Although some of the allotments were unused, the overall appearance was not one of neglect.

The burial ground and various extensions to the churchyard were well tended with grass cut close to the headstones. The warmemorial lych-gate into the churchyard was in good condition – the woodwork in good repair and the inscriptions on brass tablets legible. The gutters were mainly free of weeds, one exception being Binning Close.

The many paths around the village were well looked after.



New housing developments off Abingdon Road were an attractive feature, but on the older estate of Whitehorns Way broken front walls presented a shabby appearance. Shops and the two industrial premises were tidy. The warnings against dog fouling were noted but a few more dog litter bins might have served a better purpose. The litter and untidiness around Drayton Hall and the general shabbiness of the sports pavilion were eyesores. It is a pity that an otherwise fairly attractive village hall has to be spoilt by obtrusive precautions against vandalism.

The Millennium Green is an ambitious project with great promise, and should protect a large green area that might otherwise be a target for housing developments.'



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WOODEN SPOON RECIPE

Recipe No. 13 - from October 1978

UNCOOKED DATE CHUTNEY

 $1\ pound$ each of stoneless dates, apples, sultanas, onions and soft brown sugar. $1\ pint\ malt\ vinegar.$

Mince the dates, apples, sultanas and onions and stir together

with the sugar and vinegar. Add one teaspoon salt, a sprinkling of pepper and a dash of cayenne, a little muslin bag of pickling spice and a small piece of whole ginger. Stir mixture occasionally and leave for 24 hours. Remove the bag of spice and ginger and transfer to jars.

NOW WE ARE 10

Or are we really only 8?

You may have heard that American astronomers recently claimed to have found a 10th planet, beyond Pluto but probably bigger than our hitherto most distant neighbour.

We live on planet 3. Our earth is the third planet from the sun in our solar system, a medium-sized rocky planet with a diameter of 12,756 km, orbiting some 150 million km from the sun. The others we can see with our naked eyes are Mercury (planet 1), Venus (2), Mars (4), Jupiter (5) and Saturn (6). It is because there are five of them and we also see the sun and moon very easily that we have seven days in our week! Sunday is for the sun, Monday for the moon - and so on - if you happen to speak French.

To see the more distant planets you need a telescope. Uranus (7) and Neptune (8) are easy to find with a modest telescope but Pluto (9) is very difficult. Hence it wasn't until 1930 that it was first discovered, with a powerful telescope. The new 'planet' (currently snappily called 2003 UB313) needed today's even more powerful telescopes to find it, because it is so much further away – nearly 100 times as far from the sun as we are.

Now there is debate as to whether the newly discovered object, or for that matter Pluto, should really be counted as a planet at all or simply seen as part of the so-called Kuiper Belt of objects known to be orbiting our sun out beyond the '**true**' planets.

Astonomers will decide, hopefully soon. It will be strange if they conclude that neither Pluto nor 2003 UB313 should really be called planets at all, because the new discovery will then have taken the planet count from 9 to 8.


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WHEN THEY ARE MARRIED


The Schools Main Strengths are:

Grahame Ash

AbITS Construction Phase 1

AbITS, the Abingdon Integrated Transport Strategy, has now agreed a timetable for the work to be carried out under phase 1 in Abingdon Town Centre. The major roadworks are as follows:

The widening of the north east corner of Stratton Way October – Nov 2005

Changes to Stratton Way/ Stert Street junction January - Feb 2006

Changes to Ock Street/ Stratton Way junction Feb - Mar 2006

Changes to Bridge Street

March - Apr 2006

Changes to Stratton Way bus waiting facility April - June 2006

There are also likely to be some Public Utilities work in advance of the above timetable, beginning in September 2005. Some holdups are expected during this work.

Abingdon Open Air Pool

The good news is that Abingdon Town Council (ATC) has just come up with a funding proposal that makes the re-opening of the Open Air pool seem quite hopeful. ATC has offered a financial deal for a minimum of five years. At the time of writing, further detail needs to be worked out between the Vale of White Horse District Council and the ATC. The even better news for Drayton council-tax payers is that this additional cost will not fall on their shoulders (or pockets!). The ATC was prepared to step in at the last moment to try to save the Pool having listened to and acted upon the recent feedback of their local "Town Crier" (their Chronicle equivalent) survey.

A34 Noise

The Highways Agency (HA) has recently responded to my regular letter of concern about the traffic noise on the A34. Drayton does not qualify for immediate reprieve for, although as the 1998 noise level immediately adjacent to the road is higher than the permitted level, not all the other conditions are met. In any event, the annual £5 million for "noise mitigation purposes" for all major roads in the UK does seem small. There is some good news however. The HA is planning to re-surface one lane in both directions in 2006/7 using lower noise materials. Hopefully this will reduce some of the noise from the A34 traffic, but the HA is careful to mention this work cannot be guaranteed and is subject to funding availability.

Waste - Minimising Waste

The Vale is bucking the trend! Over the last few years, strong promotion has helped to achieve year-on-year **reductions** of between 1% and 3% on the total waste collected. This can be contrasted to the national trend which is **increasing** by 3%! The Council produces a Waste Management leaflet each year for inclusion with the Council Tax demands, and together with articles in Vale Views has dealt with many aspects of improving waste management including waste minimisation. The Council's website

is regularly updated with items on Waste Minimisation, and occasional articles and advertisements have been carried by local newspapers.

Green Waste and Cardboard - Vale pilot scheme

A new scheme for garden waste and cardboard collection will soon be on offer to householders in the Vale of White Horse. Up

to 4000 wheelie bins will be available, with those areas with the highest demand initially being included in the scheme. The new service offers a brown 240 litre wheeled bin for the convenient storage of garden waste and cardboard all year round. The will be bins emptied fortnightly and will carry an annual rental charge of £29.00. The Council believes that using the new scheme increases choice and is a convenient way to reduce the



waste going to landfill and increase recycling. It is hoped that the scheme will result in a major contribution to the Council's recycling target of 29%. The Council is collating details of all those interested in the scheme and collection routes will initially cover areas that have shown the greatest demand. It is expected that collections will start later this summer. Anyone interested please contact the Waste team at the Vale of White Horse DC, phone 01235 520202.

Reservoir Update

It came as no surprise to me that Thames Water's (TW) was one of the two (out of 23) water companies who failed to meet the leakage target. This is despite their protestations that they are spending considerable amounts of money to reduce the leakage. Due to the high levels of leakage, neither the Environment Agency nor the Vale are supportive of any proposal by TW to install a reservoir in the locality. TW on the other hand, still insists a reservoir is required by 2020. They are looking to submit a planning application by 2010, after the on-going detailed examination is completed in the next couple of years.

Air Quality

You may be interested to learn that the air quality in the Vale of White Horse is generally very good. There are however some concerns relating to the concentration of nitrogen dioxide and particulate material in Stert Street and High Street, Abingdon. Further monitoring is being made. Improvements to both streets are expected with the implementation of the Abingdon Integrated Transport Strategy, (ABITS).

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Jennifer Pooley

One member of the public attended the meeting held on Monday 1st August 2005, representing the residents of Caudwell Close.

Village Problems

• Complaints had been received that the cars (and jet-ski) now being parked for sale on the Village Green spoiled the centre of the village and the Council agreed. It will contact VWHDC planning and also Mr Coates, Environmental Warden for help in preventing this practice.

• The Caudwell Close residents had again been suffering the problems of anti-social behaviour by local youths, whilst wheelchair users in the Close were bothered by pot-holes in the road. The Council will ask the Police Community Support Officers, the Vale Environmental Warden and OCC Highways for help.

• Following a suggestion at the Annual Parish Assembly that the Parish Council should pass a bye-law to ban drinking in public, the Clerk had received a reply from Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils who advised that the next step would be to contact the District Council.

• Mr Hamilton, chair of the Drayton Millennium Green Trust, had recently been contacted about people riding their horses on the Millennium Green, which damaged the paths. He had said that signs would be put up in due course to ask people not to do this.

• It was mentioned that the grass on the wide verge, on the south side of the High Street, doesn't get cut very often by OCC. Discussion followed about whether this land could be adopted by the Parish Council and looked after on a more regular basis. Mr Knight will mention this to OCC Highways.

• The Council was still awaiting a reply from VWHDC concerning several items raised by councillors and members of the public at the previous meeting; these included the car-boot sale, parked car-transporters outside Hartwells Garage and the derelict state of the development site on the Steventon Road

Planning Issues

• The Earl of Plymouth Estate's objection to the Local Plan was raised. The Clerk had already contacted VWHDC reaffirming the Council's position, that it is strongly opposed to changes to the present Local Plan that would lead to development









• The Council returned to the issue of mitigating benefits for Drayton if the proposed new reservoir is eventually built. Mr Badcock mentioned better roads and another river crossing; Dr Fursdon Davis also pressed for better roads and better baffling of noise from the A34.

Waste Recycling Centre

Dr Fursdon Davis had spoken again with Mr Cherry of VWHDC with concerns about the proposed autumn redevelopment of the Drayton waste recycling centre, but it was agreed also to send the whole Parish Council's views and request urgent feedback and more consultation.

Best-kept village competition

The judges' comments on Drayton were a mixture of the good and the bad, as in previous years. The Council decided to ask the Chronicle to publish the comments in full.

Finance

• Councillors had received copies of the internal auditor's report. The Annual Return, Statement of Accounts and Statement of Assurance were consequently accepted. In addition:

• Mr Hamilton had requested funds to help repair the sundial on the Millennium Green. A grant application form would be sent with a request that Mr Hamilton attends the next PC meeting to discuss how the repaired feature will look.

• Mrs Pooley had obtained two informal quotations for the proposed new village footpath signs. OCC's was the lowest and it was agreed Mrs Pooley should send full details of the signs to OCC for a formal quote.


