MANOR FARM in the 1950s Celia Haddon

In 1951 my father Darby Haddon bought Manor Farm, Drayton, near Abingdon, in what was then Berkshire. It was 800 acres of mixed arable and milking, stretching from the village of Drayton to the village of Marcham.

He kept a mixed herd of cows with everything from shorthorns to Friesians. On these he put a Hereford bull. There used to be two bulls, kept up near Marcham Mill when they were not running with the cows. One was safe. The other was so dangerous that it wore a wooden head shield, that meant its head was permanently weighed down to near grass level. That way it was unlikely to get its head up to charge.

He milked his cows with a mechanical milker which could do half a dozen cows at once. This was moved with the cows into the fields in summer then back into the yards with them in winter. Charlie Mugford and Wilfred Bond were his cowmen.

By this stage he was using tractors and combine harvesters, not horses. He was bailing straw, not stooking it -- though he occasionally stooked some oats for feed. A couple of cart horses, a Suffolk punch called Blossom and a grey roan of indeterminate breed called Ballroughboyne (from the Irish area where she had been bought) drew a milk float.

On the farm he employed a foreman, a full-time mechanic, two cattle men for milking, and probably about four or five more workers. Inside the house were two daily women and a daily cook who did lunch and made cakes for tea. There was also a pensioner who shined the shoes and did odd jobs.

He bought seven terraced houses in the village (with sitting tenants) for £200 as tied houses. He was one of the first farmers to use silage. He grew several fields of lucerne, a kind of blue clover of greater height than ordinary clover. The first year he stacked the grass in heaps using molasses on it to ferment it.

The smell was awful and people in the village complained. They got up a petition.

The cattle overwintered in the farm yard eating the silage and also some hay, which was stacked in the large barn opposite the village green, now made into houses.

Shopping was done on account. Goods were ordered, delivered, and paid for at the end of the month. There was an account with the grocer's shop in Drayton and one with the butcher in Steventon. Bread was delivered. Fruit and vegetables came weekly from Sutton Courtenay. The only shop where we paid cash was Colletts, the sweet shop that also sold children's toys, and Winters post office which also sold sweets.

The occasional Sikh came round with a pedlar's pack trying to sell material. Female gypsies came selling clothes pegs made of two pieces of wood spliced together. A tramp came for two or three years and slept in the barn in return for work.

It was in the field next to the farm we held the fete which celebrated the end of rationing – with a ration book in fireworks that burned up. Earlier I remember a special tea for children held in the village hall with lots of substantial fishpaste and jam sandwiches, small jellies and far less cake than there would be nowadays. Rationing meant that the sandwiches had to be made with margarine! The fete to celebrate the coronation of our current Queen was also held in the farm field. There were rather simple sports – ducking for apples, three legged races, sack races.

Now houses are going to cover the field nearest to the farm. I hope they leave just a little green space for people to enjoy.



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MISSED OUT ON YOUR CHRONICLE?

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

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Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends,

I have just come back from a three week holiday in Uganda. During my time there I visited a project I have been involved with for about 15 years. The Bungokho Rural Development Centre (BRDC) offers vocational training in a variety of subjects:- carpentry, tailoring, masonry (house building) and more recently plumbing.

But the Centre does have a large piece of land so it was felt that this could be used for agricultural training. Uganda has a good supply of rich fertile land, but as the population grows this has to be used more productively to provide for all the people.

Animals like cows, goats, pigs and chickens have traditionally scratched for their own living in the fields and farmyard. This is no longer adequate, good livestock need better habitats and feeding, so they can produce enough to feed the family and give a surplus to sell.

The BRDC has now introduced improved goats for better milk and meat production. Well designed beehives give good honey yields and enhanced chickens produce more eggs. They have also added a duck and fish pond, which provide a microenvironment for both ducks and fish to feed on with very little food needing to be added. These are the kinds of small scale projects which can help the people of Uganda, who are mainly subsistence farmers, to get the best out of their land.

This year St Peter's Church is supporting **Farm Africa** for our Harvest Festival. They do the same type of work as BRDC but on a much bigger scale. This year they are focusing on giving goats to needy families. These goats cost £27 each.

Our Harvest Festival Family Service is 10am on Sunday 9th October. Please feel welcome to come along and support the work of **Farm Africa**. If you would like to **buy a goat or contribute** towards one then there are envelopes at the back of the church. These can be returned at the service or put in the wall safe inside the church door.

But most of all we want to pray for the people of Africa that through improved farming methods they can provide adequately for their families. Giving a goat is not aid in the traditional sense of the word, but an **investment in the future**. Our future as well as the future of the people who receive this improved livestock.

Waste - Swap Shop

So many useful items end up in our rubbish sacks every year, often because we no longer use them and don't know who to pass them on to, and consequently our landfill sites are filling up fast. Abingdon Earthcare, a local group that promotes sustainable living, wanted to make a difference by reducing the amount of waste that is landfilled. So with the help of the Vale of White Horse District Council and Oxfordshire Community Action Group, they organised a 'SwapShop'.

On Saturday 18th June, several hundred visitors flocked into the Guildhall, Abingdon bringing a variety of unwanted items including videos, toys and other household equipment. Although the items had no further use to their present owners there was still life in them, and people poured over the items and took what was useful home. This SwapShop was a tremendous success in waste reduction.

Sales of Waste

I made enquiries to see if the re-sale of recovered items from the Drayton 'tip' could be re-started. I regret to say it is unlikely in the short term. The sales seemed very popular with many of you I know. The decision to stop was made by the contractors to the Oxfordshire County Council - I was told officially for Health and Safety reasons.

High Hedges

In my July article I mentioned that the fee for processing a complaint over neighbour's high hedges was set at £600 by the Development Control Committee of the Vale. The Executive committee reduced this cost to £450.

Possible Threat to Smaller Newsagents

Did you know Tesco is taking over distribution of Newspapers and Periodicals in the area? The government was dissatisfied with the long established monopolistic method of distribution, although this actually meant that the distributors had to deliver, I understand, to a very high percentage of businesses that wanted to sell these items. I have learnt that Tesco's will be increasing the delivery cost for periodicals significantly. It could well mean that shortly only the very popular periodicals will be available from your local newsagent. The good news is that the price of distributing newspapers is expected to remain much the same. I do question however, how long it will be before Tesco decides it is not viable for them to deliver to the smaller newsagents. Will this be another threat to village businesses?

Planning Changes

The majority of Planning applications are decided upon by the Officers who have delegated powers of authority. The rest go before the Planning Committee. The local Councillor has the right to ask for an application to be heard by this Committee, as does the Parish/Town council. It is the latter who in some cases is giving inadequate, sometimes specious reasons for the case to be brought before the committee and this causes a waste of time and (your) money.

Parish and town councils are now being asked, when supporting or objecting to a Planning application, to set out their reasons in a more business-like manner, stating the local planning policy, design guidance or government planning policy in their support or objection. The clerk should have such details available. This will help make their views more meaningful, particularly if there is an appeal to the gov't inspectorate. This does not however prevent an exception to policy being recommended, but then exceptional reasons must be stated.

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And Finally.....

It is with regret that I have resigned as your district councillor with effect from the end of August. Many of you will know that my wife has for some years been suffering from ME. Her health improves when the weather is warmer and where the air is cleaner, so we have decided to retire to the Mediterranean coast.

I would like to thank you all for having me as your councillor on the Vale of White Horse District Council for some six and a half years. I would like to say a final thank you to the Editors for allowing me the opportunity of contributing to the Chronicle and for their cooperation and patience in ensuring I was not too political in my comments! A thank you also to the keen band of helpers in ensuring the Chronicle gets to your door each month. (By the way, I do believe the Chronicle is by far the best local town/village publication in the Vale and trust it will continue to be successful.)

May I also add a final farewell and thank you to my readers. A byelection will follow shortly. In the meantime Cllr. Richard Farrell can be contacted on 01235 850275 in my absence.

PARISH COUNCIL (meeting Sept 5)

A member of the public raised the issue of helicopters becoming more frequent and flying lower on their shuttling between Abingdon and Benson. The Council will ask whether this is really necessary to defend the Realm.

Nick Hamilton of the Millennium Green Trust persuaded the Council that it should make a commitment to the upkeep of the Green that seems to be a very popular facility enjoyed by many in the village. He will be seeking funds from 'friends' of the Millennium Green to make up the difference.

The Council had been trying to persuade the County Council to amend the plans for the redevelopment of the amenity tip to allow pedestrian access, to have a quick escape for those who do not need the main bins and to make it easier to manoeuvre. However, the site is very restricted and the rearrangement may go ahead as planned, during a closure of a few months.

The repair bill for damage done to the bus shelter is £450, that could have been spent on something more useful for the village. The last time a shelter was damaged, the parents of those who footed the shelter actually footed the bill. Contributions would be gratefully received if anybody knows who was responsible.

Mike Badcock, one of our County Councillors, asked when it would be most **convenient for the 35A to run through the village**. It now runs at 7 mins past the hour to Didcot and 10 mins to the hour in the Abingdon/Oxford direction. It is quite possible that the bus company would be prepared to change the running times (not frequency) if there was a strong case. **Any opinions from existing or potential bus users**?

Allotments - Now is the time to **contact the parish clerk** as we are getting a number of plots ready for cultivation next year.

It seems that our regular 'member of the public' has been inspired to fill one of the vacancies on the Council, leaving a space in the public gallery that YOU would be welcome to fill.

If you would like to discuss any village matter, from the grow cook and sew show to the reservoir, the Parish Council would be interested to hear your views at the next meeting of the Council on Oct 3rd (7.45pm) at the Caudwell Day Centre. See you there.

A visit to The Oxford Story was followed by a shopping spree.

Sunday was spent at Blenheim Palace, where Churchill's birth room attracted a lot of interest, and grounds for the Living Heritage Oxfordshire Craft Fair. Our French speaking guide added much to their enjoyment of the house tour.
