## **DRAYTON PLAYERS - WHEN WE ARE MARRIED** Lois Rennells

Let me ask you a question. Do you remember having a good laugh on the evening of Saturday October 15 or the Wednesday, Thursday or Friday of that week? If the answer is 'not that I recall' then you didn't go to one of the Drayton Players performances of 'When We are Married'.

This farcical comedy by J B Priestley is set in 1908 and was first

performed in 1938. I saw it in the early 1950s; I loved it then and 50 years later I love it still, so a personal thank you to Deirdre Jones, the director, for reviving it and creating such a sparkling production.

The plot revolves around three Yorkshire couples who were all married on the same day by the same minister and meet to celebrate their silver wedding. The Yorkshire Argus and professional а photographer have been summoned and an enormous spread has been assembled.

They consider themselves to be the backbone of decent respectable life and are prominent members of the chapel. On the same

evening, the men plan to sack the chapel organist. They give the excuse that he has been seen in dalliance with young women but their real reason is that he is a lah di dah southerner. They are appalled when he reveals that he has met the minister who married them and has since received a letter from the minister confessing that due to an oversight, he was not at the time of their nuptials, authorised to officiate at weddings. After many hilarious twists and turns of the plot, it is the drunken photographer who saves the day. He too, was married on the same day by the same minister and has been trying to disentangle himself

from his estranged wife. He has failed because at the time of these marriages no chapel minister could officiate at weddings without the presence of a registrar who had to sign the marriage certificate. They have all been married for 25 years, after all.

While their official marital status is in doubt, the three couples have to face up to some home truths. The hen-pecked husband

stands up at last to his nagging wife, the downtrodden wife tells her husband just how pompous, vain and boring he really is and the hypocritical philandering husband has to beg forgiveness.

Jon Crowley and Georgia Alston, Peter Jackson and Jayne Henderson and Adam Blake (a valuable new recruit for Drayton) and Mirja Boyd gave assured performances as the three couples. Mirja Boyd certainly came into her own as the nagging wife!

The first person on stage was Ruby, the young, artless maid played by Lindsay Dale. Her every appearance lit up the stage and she stole the show with her wide-eyed and splendid exuberance. Her timing was perfect.

Paul Martin, as the organist from 'down south', was an appealing casual contrast to the stiff northerners. Veteran Jean Hager can always be relied on to command the stage with her eccentric 'characters' and certainly didn't disappoint with her gleeful performance as the aggressive charwoman given to listening at keyholes and smashing crockery.

John Freeman had the extremely hard task of the drunken photographer. He managed this to hilarious effect apart from occasional speech that was so slurred it was difficult to understand.

All the supporting cast: Felicity Jackson, the niece of one of the couples and also the organist's 'young lady', Stephen Hosking, the reporter, Kerry Chaundy, a flighty young woman,

Anton King, a rather creepy clergyman and Steve Clarke, the Mayor, were all a pleasure to watch.

All the cast managed to keep their Yorkshire accents going pretty well but the prize for the best goes to Peter Jackson. So convincing was he that I had to ask him to speak to me in his normal voice after the show to make sure that he wasn't a born and bred Yorkshireman.

Words of praise too for the set, the costumes and the props, all of which had obviously been given a great deal of thought and attention.

I am told that after the performance on Friday one member of the audience was heard to say that he could have paid many times the price of his ticket to see a show in the West End and not had a better night's entertainment. He's right, you know.

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

Remember, remember the fifth of November Gunpowder, treason and plot

Each year in November we have bonfires and fireworks to remember Guy Fawks Day. When I lived in Didcot we had a very good town fireworks display which was fun to attend. But why do we still remember this 400 years after the actual events? I expect most people know it is something to do with an attempt to blow up Parliament, but few could say why the attempt was made and what the consequences were. We are very good at remembering the fun bits, but not so good at remembering the history bits.

November is a month of remembering – some of it is fun, but most of it is serious stuff.

We begin the month with two linked remembrances – All Saints Day and All Souls Day. All Saints on  $1^{st}$  of the month reminds us of the very many men and women through the ages who have stood up for the Christian faith and passed on to us in our day the message of Jesus Christ. Their names are mostly forgotten, but the effects of what they did are still with us today. All Souls is a more personal type of remembrance – when we can come to church to remember our own loved ones who have died. Every year at St Peter's we have a service at 7:30pm on  $2^{nd}$  November when anyone is welcome to church and participate in the service – to light a candle and remember a name.

The second Sunday in November is Remembrance Sunday. This was instituted after the First World War to commemorate the signing of the Armistice at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. This is our opportunity to give thanks for all the men and women, military and civilian who have given their lives for the liberty and freedom of this country. It is especially relevant this year as we remember the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ending of the Second World War. But our remembrance also encompasses others who have been involved in subsequent conflicts including the present war in Iraq. Our service at St Peter's at 6pm on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> November will include all these points.

"Remember" is the key word of November. Often remembrance can become a sentimental look back at the past, which goes nowhere. But remembrance in the Christian context is not a nostalgic daydream. It is a realistic look at what has gone before, in order plan for today and give hope for the future.

Jesus died on the cross - that is remembrance

Jesus rose from the dead – that is hope for the future.

The remembrance of All Souls Day and Remembrance Sunday may at first seem sombre, but with the knowledge of God's love for us through Jesus it brings the joy of hope for all God's people.



Part of the problem is the cutting of the grass, since money allocated for this is limited.


Other problems are of people's own making, such as litter. There are volunteer wardens doing litter duty but I can never understand why people don't take home their own litter.

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#### **COUNCIL REPORTS** DISTRICT COUNCIL **Richard Webber**

As your newly elected District Councillor, I would like to thank everyone who voted in the by-election, whether for me or for my opponents, for taking part in the process. I am very aware that it is all of the Residents of Drayton that I represent, and I promise to do this to the best of my ability.

I am afraid that this article will not be as detailed or as informative as the Grahame Ash articles we have all become used to reading each month in the Chronicle. Indeed, Grahame is not an easy act to follow in so many ways. It has become guite clear to me on your doorsteps over the last few weeks that he was very highly respected and appreciated by all of us. On behalf of the residents of Drayton, we will miss his wisdom, his care and his hard work over the past six years and we all wish Grahame and his wife a long and happy retirement in Cyprus. Grahame has asked to be kept in touch with a regular copy of the Chronicle - for which he has such a high regard.

Unlike Grahame, I am very much a new boy, (in experience not so much in age!) desperately trying to learn the ropes so that I can represent all the people of Drayton on the Vale Council. I have been a keen but inactive observer and commentator on elections of all types all my voting life but it has been fascinating to see the whole process from within. I thought readers might find the following observations of interest:

I am told that a 35% turnout at a local by election is a little above average. By my calculations, about one person in five in Drayton made the positive choice to vote for me - a sobering thought. But if I am to act for you and argue for you, I need to know your opinions on current issues.

If a political party (and this applies to my own as to any other) is unable to find a local candidate (i.e. one on the electoral roll) to represent them, then should it not be barred from fielding a candidate in local elections? Politicians can hardly complain of low turnouts and low levels of interest in local politics if they cannot find local candidates!

In the first 10 days of holding this office, I will have attended more than 18 hours of meetings alone. I, for one will never again accuse a local politician of any party of not working hard enough!

Some of the more entertaining conversations I have had in the last few weeks include:

"Well, if I vote for anyone, I will probably vote for you....but I probably won't vote for anyone.'

"No, I won't be voting for you – but it's very nice to see you."

"Look, I was going to vote for you, but if you disturb me again today, I won't!"

"I really wanted to vote for the Monster Raving Loony Party, but they haven't got a candidate. So I've voted for the Liberal Democrats as the next best thing."

"As a District Councillor, you cannot actually do anything, but you can be a complete pain in the neck to those who can do things"

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My family would say that when it comes to being a pain in the neck, I should be able to do an extremely good job. Indeed, the process has begun with some of the issues discussed on doorsteps over past weeks - viz. Traffic speed control, traffic noise on the A34, Bus services, Pavement repair, and vandalism at the Village Hall. I will give an update on these in the next issue.

In the meantime, I would be pleased to hear of any opinions on the biggest issue of all - The proposed Reservoir. - I understand that if I am seen to take a position on this, I would automatically bar myself from the planning application process. It seems to me we have to choose between the following options:

- I listen to all opinions, but remain part of the Planning 1 Application process by remaining neutral on the issue.
- I remain outside the process, but represent the majority 2. view - whatever it is.

The Reservoir – if it happens – is still many years away, but the sooner we prepare our position, the stronger it will be. Even if the plan was to go ahead without our consent, there will still be many issues over which we will be allowed our say.

The owners of the site at Barton Garage have indicated that they will be starting on work early next year.


The Council does not have anything to report on the helicopters and are waiting for a reply from either or both RAF Abingdon and RAF Benson.

## TIME FOR CHANGE AT THE CHRONICLE Geoffrey Long

In January 2006 it will be ten years since Harry Bisby died and I took over the running of the *Drayton Chronicle*. Harry, founder of the *Chronicle*, had acted as its Organiser for 18 years.

With an all-absorbing interest in the running of the *Chronicle*, Harry treated it as a mini-business and, to the great benefit of the organisation and to Drayton, was prepared to give a lot of time and effort each month to ensure its continuing success. This involved doing several jobs which could well be done by other volunteers – Advertising Manager, Distribution Manager, author of regular articles and Paste-up artist, as well as Organiser and occasional Editor

It became quite clear, however, that it was impossible to find a replacement to take on the role of Organiser as performed by Harry. To continue at all meant devolving some of the tasks he undertook around a greater number of volunteers. The change in title - to *Co-ordinator* – was intended to reflect the new role of drawing together a team rather than running the show and it sought to give the message that the *Chronicle* could no longer rely on any one person to carry it forward whatever the circumstances. Against this background the job of Coordinator evolved.

#### Ten years on

Much has happened in these ten years: in the way the *Chronicle* is set up, published and distributed worldwide by e-mail and also to the people involved, not least that we are all ten years older! That, along with health problems, has led me to decide that it is now time, early in the New Year, for me to hand over the reins to a younger person, male or female, to keep the *Chronicle* moving forward. As it happens, both Harry and I took our turns at the time-consuming job of editing, since we both enjoyed the challenge and stimulus that it brings, and I hope to continue with that. Editing, however, is certainly not inevitably part of the manager's job.

I feel sure that in the village there are many people who would want see the *Chronicle*, now in its 28th year, continue for another 28 years and equally sure that among them there are those who would be prepared to take a lead in its organisation. There are challenges ahead but none has to be faced immediately. Is a single manager the best way of running things? Would a small management group sharing responsibilities be a better way? When will home computers be so widespread that we stop printing and delivering (and paying for) a paper copy and send out each issue by e-mail or even publish it as a web site? This may well come sooner than one might think. There is plenty of food for thought.

Please do ring me if you are interested in finding out more about what this job entails. It is very satisfying and pleasurable in so many ways and the Team hope that the *Chronicle* really does mean enough to the village to ensure that we do not risk losing it.


