





Your cards you must design

That is rich and really good;






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A LETTER FROM REV JOSIE MIDWINTER

Dear Friends

When Charles Dickens wrote his book, A Christmas Carol, he had a particular message to put across to the people of his time. There were many people who could enjoy Christmas with food, wine and presents and much celebration. But there were many people who lived poor and mean lives, without enough to keep them warm and fed and sheltered. The divide between the rich and the poor in Victorian England was as wide as it has ever been.



The true meaning of Christmas had become obscured by selfishness.

Dickens wanted to expose this double standard and he created the character Ebenezer Scrooge to do just that. Scrooge had plenty of money, but he was a miser who was too mean even to give his clerk, Bob Cratchit, enough coal for the fire. Dickens used the character Scrooge to demonstrate how easy it is to become selfish and tied up with our own affairs. However, Scrooge meets the 'Ghost of Christmas Past', who makes him face up to the things that happened to him in the past which have made him so mean. Then the 'Ghost of Christmas to Come' to show him the bitter end he faced if he continues along that selfish path.

At the end of the story Scrooge learns the error of his ways and shares a happy, loving Christmas with Bob Cratchit and his family. Dickens' portrayal of Christmas in that story has done much to influence our own understanding of Christmas today - a time of loving and sharing, and enjoying the spirit of Christmas.

It takes a time like Christmas to expose selfishness and meanness for what they are, because Christmas is about the supreme act of giving and sharing. God giving his Son, Jesus, to the world, which then encourages us to share with others that love which is so much needed in our world today.

Therefore, we need to be careful that we don't become Ebenezer Scrooges in our own day. The poor and needy may not be on our doorstep as they were in Victorian times. But they are still there in the world around us. By all means enjoy your Christmas, but remember that there are others in the world who need our help and love and

Jesus came to bring the message of love and joy to all people, not just a few – so celebrate Christmas by spreading his love throughout the world.

DRAYTON RESEARCHERS QUESTION ATKIN'S DIET

Some people in Drayton may have seen Pallab Ghosh, the BBC

Science correspondent, filming recently on the Millenium Green. He was interviewing Draytonian Dr about Freestone, Nick his participation in a scientific trial conducted Oxford being at University by his wife, JR cardiologist Dr Michaela Scheuermann-Freestone MD. Nick was one of the guinea pigs in Michaela's study, which looked at the effects of Atkin's Diet on the heart.





The study found that using Atkin's Diet has profound effects on the energy available to the heart as well as to other muscles, effects similar to those seen in the obese, in diabetics and in heart-failure patients. Additionally, levels of cholesterol and free fatty acids were significantly increased after 2 weeks on this diet.

Michaela has recently returned from the US where she presented this research

to the American Heart Association meeting in Dallas. Further work is being conducted on other diets to see if these are also potentially harmful, though it is currently thought that the high fat content of Atkin's diet is to blame.

Or wrapped up on New Years Day at Mudeford Sandspit with her daughter Victoria and son-in-law in a beach hut, having a little tipple of wine. She was always game for a trip or expedition! Her skill at whist was second to none and indeed only a few years ago she went next door, with Martin to escort her, who was shocked when she cleaned the board!

She lived for her children and grandchildren and will be sadly missed by all. Her Memorial Service was held in Drayton Church on 15 November, attended by almost ninety friends and family. A fitting tribute to a great lady!

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WOODEN SPOON RECIPE

Recipe No. 14 (from December 1980): Christmas Slice

8 oz shortcrust pastry, 12 oz mincemeat, 1 can apricots, 1 egg white, granulated sugar.

Preheat oven to 190° (adjust for fan oven)/gas mark 5. Use 3/4

of the pastry to line a baking tin. Mix the mincemeat with 1 tablespoon of juice from the apricots and spread into the pastry case. Arrange the drained apricots on top. Use remaining pastry to make a lattice top. Brush the lattice top with egg white and sprinkle with sugar.



Bake in centre of oven for 20 minutes then lower the heat to 180°/gas mark 4 and cook for another 20 minutes. Serve hot or cold.

As I write, I am about to host my first "surgery" at Drayton Hall. Grahame Ashe was particularly keen that this tradition should be continued by his successor. It is an opportunity for any Drayton resident to meet me to voice their concerns, complaints and requests face to face. These surgeries will happen every 3rd Saturday of the month between 9 and 10am in the Lounge at the Village Hall.



Drayton Youth

Following up a phone call from Gary Gibbins of Hilliat Fields, who is working with the Youth of the area, the two of us met in the Red Lion. Gary explained some of the needs and aspirations of the young of our village. At his suggestion, I visited the Damascus project "Bus", which visits the Village Hall Car Park every Monday evening. On the night I went, more than a dozen youngsters aged 11-18 were enjoying the relaxed and caring atmosphere the bus provides. I would strongly recommend this to any village teenagers who would like to meet others on a Monday evening. They could do with a more substantial generator to heat the bus on cold winter evenings and I am hoping to persuade the relevant Parish Councils to help here. Again at Gary's suggestion, we are holding a Youth Forum at the Village Hall next Saturday – but more of this next month.

Parish, District and County Councils

I attended the Drayton Parish Council meeting at the beginning of November and promptly found myself being co-opted onto it. Now, I can be blamed for everything that is the responsibility of the P.C. as well as the District Council. Oh happy days. Thankfully, traffic is the responsibility of the County Council and whilst I have been agitating strongly on these issues, so far the wheels seem to move painfully slowly. The more help I can get over traffic issues - speed, volume and noise - the better. Residents who have a point to make on these issues can help me to maintain the pressure by contacting our County Councillor – Mike Badcock (01235 201810). As for traffic speed reduction, residents will be aware that the current score is "one up" (the sign on the Steventon approach to the village) and "one down" (the much approved of sign in Abingdon Road). The one down was vandalised and is being repaired - it will be reinstated "shortly"! A third sign at the end of the High Street is planned.

Speeding Commercial Vehicles

Many of the speeding vehicles through the village are heavy commercial lorries which disturb not only the residents, but also the foundations of their houses. Since many of the older houses in the High Street do not have foundations, this is potentially very bad news. I have prepared a letter which can be sent to the MD of any company whose vehicle is reported to me as having been speeding through the village pointing out that their company's name is being brought into disrepute.

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⇒ All we can do is name and shame, but it must be worth a try. If you see such a vehicle, please ring me (534001). All I need is a Company Name, a time and a date.

Swimming Pool.

News of a reprieve of the open air swimming pool in Abingdon has come as excellent news for many. Open air pools are very expensive to run and very little of the cost is being borne by Drayton residents, but if it is to justify itself, it will need the support of young families all around Abingdon next summer.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Parish Meeting 7 November 2005:

The Parish Council has lost one of its hardest working members with the resignation of John Cross. As Chair of the Leisure and General purposes Working Group, John made sure that the village both looked good and that the equipment owned by the Council was safe and fit for its purpose. John has made friends with more officers of the County Council than he can remember, in suggesting how they might see to the needs of the village. He has also been a stalwart member keeping tabs on the Didcot Integrated Transport Strategy. He will be missed, particularly by me, who steps into his shoes as Working Group chair.

In fact the Council was returned to its original number by the recruitment of Richard Webber who will be known to some villagers as our new District Councillor and chief glutton for punishment. With County Councillor Mike Badcock also in attendance the Council has short cuts to the seats of power in both Abingdon and Oxford.

We have had a reply from RAF Benson on the helicopter problem but this warrants a proper article for next chronicle. Another issue that would justify an article is how to manage an allotment to inspire people to take up the vacant plots and enter their parsnips in the Grow Cook and Sew Show.

There is still no sign of anybody admitting responsibility for the damage to the bus shelter that has cost over £500 to repair and on the same sour note there are signs of a turf war between young people from different villages. The speed message sign has also been retired from Abingdon Road, where it seemed to be having an effect on general speeds before it was vandalised.

Those interested in the reservoir should be aware that a group has been formed with the objective of coordinating the contribution of the affected parishes so that we understand each other's concerns and seek benefits for the general area if the development is to go ahead.

On 14 December there will be a meeting to discuss the subsidised buses serving the Abingdon/Drayton Area. This primarily means the 44, that runs between Abingdon and Oxford during the day but extends to Drayton in the morning (7.25am) and evening (6.35pm). A very useful service, particularly for those working in West Oxford as it comes into Oxford along Botley Road. The Oxford Times reports an idea to have multi storey park & ride car parks. This would not be necessary if more people bussed all the way into the City instead of driving to the outskirts.

Anybody with views on any of these matters will be welcome to attend the next meeting of the Council on 5 December at 7.45pm at the Caudwell Day Centre. In particular, any views on how the leisure facilities in the village might be improved would be of interest to the new chair of the leisure working party (is that a contradiction in terms?).

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WESTMINSTER LETTER

Ed Vaizey

I know that many people in the Drayton area are worried about the proposal from Thames Water to build a new reservoir nearby. I share your concerns. As you know, I am opposed to the new reservoir for a number of reasons. I think it is too big. And I also think Thames Water could do more to prevent leaks and encourage people to use less water. However, I do recognise that Thames Water will continue to



press ahead, and for that reason I welcome the new campaign group set up, called Fluvius. I met them recently to discuss the issue, and I think it is sensible to look now at what benefits the local community should demand, should Thames succeed in their campaign. If you have any thoughts on this issue, please get in touch.

Since I last wrote in this space it has become increasingly clear that the NHS in Oxfordshire is facing budgetary difficulties. The county's health services receive 15% below the national average each year which, coupled with the high costs of operating in an area like ours, means that there will have to be ward closures across Oxfordshire unless the government intervene now. Oxfordshire's MPs, who come from all parties, are calling on the government to intervene now to stop the cuts, and I also pressed the Prime Minister on this issue in the House of Commons.

My upcoming surgeries are on Saturday 10 December at 9.30-11 am in the King Alfred Drive Community Centre in Didcot and also on 23 December at 5.30-7 in the Corn Exchange, Faringdon.
