PROPOSED RESERVOIR

The Parish Council met 3 representatives from Thames Water on 17th November in order to be updated on the situation regarding the **proposed reservoir development**. Whilst no firm decisions appear to have been made yet, some aspects of the proposed development are starting to become clearer.

Thames Water still has to establish that there is a need for a reservoir, and that a surface reservoir in this area is the best option. In order to do this, all the alternatives previously considered will be reexamined; it is clear, however, that the local reservoir is their preferred option at the moment.

It is now likely that Thames Water will apply direct to the Secretary of State for a Compulsory Works Order under Section 167 of the Water Industry Act 1991. This will enable them to make a single application for the entire development, rather than having to make 30 or more separate applications for all the different aspects of the development like construction of buildings, diversion of footpaths, stopping-up of roads etc. From their point of view, this obviously makes a lot of sense.

The submission to the Secretary of State is likely to be made in 2007. There will almost certainly be a public enquiry before a decision is made as to whether to approve, modify or refuse the order. If it's approved, construction is likely to start in 2009/10, with an estimated completion date of 2019.

Prior to this, however, they have promised to undertake full local consultation. (They will no doubt have to satisfy the Secretary of State that they have done so). In spring 2006 the 'needs and site selection' phase should be completed. At this stage they will keep us all in the picture via a newsletter, leaflets and local exhibitions. By the middle of next year, details of their preferred scheme, and design options should be available. There will be further local consultation at this stage.

This will also be the time when mitigation proposals, and ideas for the ancillary uses of the reservoir can be submitted and discussed. Throughout all these stages, the Thames Water website should be kept up to date, thus enabling us all to check the latest position. This is available at www.thameswater.co.uk (under Major Projects).

At present the Parish Council is not taking a position either in favour of, or against the reservoir. Before doing so it is felt that we need to see the full design proposals, consult with the other local villages affected and, most importantly, **find out the views of our local residents**. What are your views on the proposed reservoir? What facilities would you most like to see provided at the reservoir? What do you think that we can realistically obtain from Thames Water in terms of village improvements, in mitigation for all the inconvenience, particularly during the construction phase? What are your main worries and concerns regarding the siting and construction of such a large reservoir on our doorsteps?

If we are going to effectively represent the views of the village in our future discussions with Thames Water, we need to know your opinions. So come along to a Parish Council meeting, contact any Parish Councillor, or the Parish Clerk:—

Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends,

Love her or hate her Mrs Thatcher was a Prime Minister who certainly made her mark! She once famously remarked: "There is no such thing as society". Such an attitude did much to undermine the confidence of people struggling to develop their community.

Twenty years ago the Church of England challenged that assumption when it published its report: 'Faith in the City'. This report took seriously the huge decay and subsequent breakdown of community in our large inner cities. Almost every organisation and group had left the inner cities to relocate in the 'better' areas. The Church of England was about the only organisation which remained fully committed to the inner city areas however run down and disadvantaged they were.

But this in itself was not enough, so the report looked at ways in which the whole church could give support to the clergy and people of those areas and help them work together with local government and other people of goodwill to regenerate the community. The report was a very thorough investigation into the situation and came up with groundbreaking proposals. These proposals did not go down well with the Thatcher government who tried to rubbish the report by calling it 'Marxist'. However it had raised such important issues that after her victory in the 1987 General Election Mrs Thatcher committed her government to doing something about "our inner cities" and later that year she visited deprived areas to see what could be done.

Twenty years on an evaluation of the recommendations of the report show that it was very significant both in the life of the church in the communities of the inner cities and beyond. The creation of a Church Urban Fund raised 20 million pounds to be used on inner city projects – lunch clubs for the elderly, drop in centres for the lonely, play centres for children, support groups for parents and many other things. These projects were often partnerships with other faith groups, local government and organisations. Such commitment by the Church of England prompted the national government to tackle the wider issues of inner cities like providing affordable housing, creation of jobs, addressing discrimination and more resources for working with vulnerable people.

The impact of 'Faith in the City' was far-reaching. It broke new ground by popularising the term Urban Priority Areas (UPAs). The customary term 'inner cities' did not reflect the truth that much urban deprivation existed on large housing estates away from the centre of towns and cities. We now take it for granted that our government would be concerned with deprived areas as well as the more affluent. What we don't often realise is that the established church played a major part in drawing the government's attention to that need and then working with the government on both a national and local level to address that need.

The Church of England through its parish system remains committed to every area of the country from the commuter belt to the UPA, from the stately home to the farm cottage. This commitment gave birth to 'Faith in the City' and its outworking and it remains the umbrella under which the church still works today.

WOODEN SPOON RECIPE No. 15

Cidered lamb with dumplings (from January 1984)

Ingredients:- 8 middle neck lamb chops, salt and pepper, 1 tablespoon oil, 1 onion (peeled and sliced), 1 garlic clove (crushed), 1 red pepper (sliced), 1 tablespoon plain flour, ½ pint beef stock, ½ pt cider, 1 teaspoon mixed herbs, 1 aubergine (chopped), suet dumpling mix with 4 oz self-raising flour

Method:- Trim lamb and season. Fry in the oil until brown. Transfer to a casserole. Fry the onion, garlic and red pepper in the same fat for a few minutes until soft. Stir in the flour, cook for 1 minute, then gradually add stock and cider and bring to the boil for 2 minutes. Season well, add mixed herbs and aubergine and pour over the lamb. Cover casserole and cook at $180\,^\circ$ (adjust for fan ovens) or gas mark 4 for 1 hour. Make the dumplings in the usual way and shape into 8 balls. Skim off any excess fat from the casserole than add the dumplings. Replace lid and cook for $25-30\,$ minutes more. **Lois Rennells**

RESERVOIR LATEST

A meeting arranged by Cllr Ian Brown was attended by all the affected parishes and a number of District Councillors on 12 January. The outcome was that 12 parish councils will see whether they can coordinate their response to the consultation being carried out by TWA (Thames Water Authority) on the proposed reservoir, pool their resources and present a united front.

There may be a number of issues on which the parishes can agree but this will not prevent dissenting views being expressed to be considered by TWA and/or at a public inquiry. Until the proposals and supporting argument sees the light of day (probably in early March) it is not possible to identify the main issues and what should be said on residents' behalf.

It is felt that TWA should be paying to assist the parishes in a mediation exercise prior to and outside the inquiry process to see what common ground can be achieved to reduce harm, maximise potential benefits and identify issues that cannot be resolved and which may have to be left to the inspector/secretary of state to resolve.

Matters could move very quickly and it is **very important** for residents who feel strongly on this matter to attend the next meeting of the Parish Council (see page 9) if they want us to represent their views in this consultation process.

PARISH COUNCIL (meeting Dec 5)

The PC are looking very closely at the options for the tree at the entrance to the Lock Way playground. The roots are causing a hazard and lifting the tarmac. It would a shame to lose the tree but root pruning may not be a permanent solution and require regular and expensive treatment. No decision will be taken lightly.

There was a long discussion about the role of parish councils and pressure groups in response to the reservoir proposal. Residents of Steventon formed a group called Fluvious (now renamed the Vale Reservoir Group) to present views that may not be the 'official line' taken by its parish council.

The VRG was set up to try to coordinate the views of the affected parishes to reduce the chances of communities pulling in different directions. The Council decided that there would be dangers in being associated with a pressure group that may not include a key parish council and asked Councillors Badcock and Webber to see whether the District Council could organise a meeting to include all the affected parish councils.

If you have heard it once, you will hear it again, readers should get in touch with a parish councillor or better still, come to a meeting of the parish council if they want to keep up with the progress of this major development.
