GEOFFREY LONG

Dr Geoffrey Long died peacefully on Saturday, 8 April 2006, at the Churchill Hospital, finally losing his battle with cancer. His wife, Margaret and their two daughters were with him.

Throughout his nearly 77 years, Geoff had a genius for being in at the beginning of important things. In the record of the first formal meeting of the people who founded All Saints Church in

north Abingdon back in 1959, the third of the many names recorded are Dr and Mrs Long. Geoff missed the second meeting, which will have taught him a hard lesson about the Methodist Church because in his absence he was elected one of the three first leaders of the new church. Characteristically, he graciously accepted the job - and All Saints still thrives!

Even earlier he had helped start the Abingdon Operatic Society in 1957. He had a fine voice, was the society's chairman for several of its early years and his contribution was later recognised by his becoming President. The operatic Society became and still is a blinding success.

In his first job with the UK Atomic Energy Authority Geoff was again in at the beginning, this time on so-called molten salt reactors. They were later put on one side but Geoff may still be proved prescient, since molten salt reactors are back on the agenda in the major

international reactor development programme now underway called Generation IV. His boss at that time, Keith Dawson, said of Geoff, 'all that he does is carefully thought out. I trust his judgement and have never had any reason to doubt it'.

But the enterprise Geoff started which has had most impact in Britain is the renewable energy programme. He was selected at the time of the first oil crisis in 1974 to be the first leader of the government's programme to support renewables. The work he started then steadily grew and still goes on as 'Future Energy

Solutions' in what is now AEA Technology. Moreover, renewable energy has become a main plank of our government's energy policy.

In his retirement years Geoff gained much pleasure from running the Drayton Chronicle He was its overall 'coordinator' and an editor until January, when his illness forced him to hand over these jobs to Jean Barton and David Lee.

With the Chronicle, he wasn't in at the original birth but, when he took over at the very sudden death of Harry Bisby, the Chronicle was born again, as a truly village paper using increasingly up-to-date technology. In the words of Linda

> Semmens, who is our advertising manager and was involved at the time, 'without Geoff there probably wouldn't be a Chronicle today. He took on the responsibility of sorting things out after Harry's death - no mean feat given that Harry was a one-man band. He worked out all that Harry had done, parcelled it into smaller jobs and recruited volunteers for them - me included! It was difficult not to want to help Geoff.' Just how much Drayton values the Chronicle that Geoff sustained and developed for 10 years was demonstrated last summer when he reluctantly decided we would have to increase the price of the advertisements and lottery tickets that fund it. Despite the higher prices, when people in the village realised that the Chronicle needed more money they actually increased the number of tickets and adverts they bought.

> Ironically, the thing Geoff sometimes seemed proudest of was something for which he could claim no credit at all, that

he was a Yorkshireman. He was born in Bradford and went to university in Leeds, where he gained a first class honours in Chemistry and a PhD before coming to Harwell. Most importantly, in Yorkshire, in Bradford, he found the real love of his life, Margaret.

I think Linda's phrase 'it was difficult not to want to help Geoff' captures his character very well. He was a true gentle man, a somewhat diffident person who nevertheless achieved much through his ability, application and charm. Drayton, the Chronicle, his family and all his friends will miss him sorely.

LETTER FROM REVD JOSIE MIDWINTER

MAYTIME WALK: For many centuries the church has observed a time of walking round the boundaries of the parish to bless the fields in spring. In the days before ordinary people could read a map it also helped to teach everyone where the boundaries of the parish lay. This custom was known as Rogation or more commonly 'beating the bounds'. This year we are going to revive the custom and have a walk round the parish boundaries as far as the footpaths will allow us to do so. The total length of the boundaries is about 10 to 12 miles, which is a good long walk. So to make it more accessible to people we have split it into two sections. This will take place on Saturday 20th May. The morning walk(s) will begin at 9:45am and we will assemble at the field gate next to the Manor House in High Street, (by kind permission of Mr and Mrs W F Caudwell). If you are not sure where this is come to the church and someone will guide you round to the start point. There will be two walks on offer one of 5+ miles and the other of 4 miles. These will go round the south and western boundaries of the parish coming back to the church. From 12noon to 2pm a soup and bread roll lunch will be available for walkers and for anyone who would like to drop in the church, at a cost of £3 per head. Then in the afternoon there will be two shorter walks which will be especially suitable for children and families, which will go round the northern and eastern boundaries. These will start at 2pm from the church and lead back to the church where tea and cakes will be served from 3pm onwards. Again these will be for walkers and for anyone else who drops in. Children are very welcome to join in the walks but they must be accompanied by a responsible adult.

We would ask people to register before the day so that we can plan well for the walks. Registration forms will be available from the church or from me from the end of April. However it is still perfectly all right to turn up on the day. Each walk costs £2 (or £3.50 for one person doing morning and afternoon) and children under 16 are free. At the beginning of the walk you will be given a route telling you which paths to take. All money raised will go to upkeep of St Peter's church.

There will be an envelope collection to every house in the village. Volunteers are required to help with the collection. Please let me know if you can help.

Thank you to those who responded to last month's article. If I am to represent your opinions to the Council I need as much feedback as possible. Just to remind everyone, on the third Saturday of every month between 9.00 and 10.00am I have a "surgery" at the Village Hall. If you would like me to call on you to discuss any issue, please ring me on 534001.

I would like to devote this article to two issues only this month. The first is becoming a growing source of irritation for the village, and this is the issue of Cars for sale. Everyone has the right to advertise their car for sale in their own driveway of course, and also if legally parked, taxed and MOT'd on the road outside. However, there is a growing problem in the area and in Drayton in particular, of people parking in the centre of the village with a for sale notice in a window. The car then stays there all day using up space that could be used by customers to our pubs and shops and making the centre of the village look like a second hand car lot. I am trying to persuade people not to do this with varying success. If anyone spots cars with the same contact details advertised, please let me know.

The second issue is one that is particularly near to my heart — that of recreational facilities in the Village. On Saturday July 8th between 4.00pm and 9.00pm we are holding a Drayton Activities Day at the Village Hall. PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Annual Meeting and Parish Council Meeting 3 April 2006.

There being too much to report for one issue of the Chronicle I must apologise if justice is not done to some important issues.

At the Annual meeting, a healthy interest was shown in the new neighbourhood policing arrangements. The idea is that the local force will respond to local demands. If any villager has some specific ideas as to what the police can do for us then let the Council know. At the Annual meeting proper, Paul Knight gave his final report from the chair (it is a shame that not more of village residents are aware of the many years Paul has dedicated to this role). Paul thanked the councillors who are no longer serving (Richard Wade, John Cross and Craig Dewar) and ex-county councillor Margaret Mackenzie. He produced statistics to show that the planning committee under the charge of Helen Morrison had not always been able to persuade the District Council to share the Council's view of what should be approved or refused. I reported on what John Cross had achieved as Chair of the Leisure and General Purposes Working Group. As his replacement I may have made a lasting contribution by recommending that upright headstones should not be used in the burial ground as these leave a liability for testing and repair. Jenny Pooley has been a vigorous Chair of the Rights of Way and Conservation Working Group. Most of the improvements to the paths, signing and stiles achieved over the last year or two have been down to her.

Claire Soper gave what seemed to be an encouraging overview of the state of the village school (Ofsted report 'satisfactory' now aiming for 'good'). One of the continuing issues seems to be the congestion at the school gate. An imaginative scheme has been devised with the cooperation of the Woolley's who have kindly agreed to allow parents to leave their cars at the Red Lion while walking the 4 minutes to school. This is part of an environmental offensive including Eco awards, Green Flags, an energy team and travel plan.

The only motion put to the meeting from the public was from Brenda Malin, frustrated by seeing her efforts at energy conservation being overwhelmed by waste by large organisations in the public and private sector. This generated a short discussion ranging from personal responsibilities to nuclear power before the meeting passed her proposal that the Parish Council seek a role in the consumption of energy within the village; promoting energy conservation and encouraging the District and County Councils to do likewise. It is not easy to see how the PC will respond to this resolution and all suggestions would be welcome. Perhaps the PC should start by speaking to the eco-enthusiasts at the school?

By comparison the Parish Council meeting was less eventful. There was a short discussion about the developments at Manor Farm and the exclusion of the two housing sites being promoted (behind Lockway and on the corner of Henleys Lane and Abingdon Road) from the Local Plan. But like buses, plans come in pairs and there is already a Local Development Document under way that can involve both new and old arguments about the merits of development in the village.

On Monday 8 May (7.45pm at the Caudwell Day centre at the end of Gravel Lane) your Parish Council starts the last of its 4 year term in office. This is the ideal time for residents to come and see what local democracy is about and to possibly put their 'foot in the water' before possibly standing for election next year for a full term in office.

For those interested in attending, an agenda item for the 8th May Parish Council meeting will be a re-evaluation of the proposed changes to the road system on the village green.


