With something less of the media and party speculation that has attached to the change from Blair to Brown, the chair of the parish council was transferred from Paul Knight to Daniel Scharf, giving me 'ample' time to learn the ropes before the next election. In fact, if I fulfil one of my ambitions, that is to see all the places on the Council filled by May next year, there could be a contest for seats and my time as chairman could be the shortest on

record. Another of my ambitions is to reinforce the links with the District and County Councillors, where perhaps greater power and influence lie, and where I'm sure I/we would be assisted by the enthusiasm of the present incumbents. I believe that the Parish Council should have an eye on the great progress being made by the school in establishing green credentials, and on the prospect of improving the recreational opportunities within the village.

Without intending to diminish in any way the contributions being made by your very able current councillors, I can point out that I am not untypical in being middle aged, in not running a business in the village (or at all) and in living to the east of Abingdon/Steventon Road. If there are people who feel that they might see the village from a different point of view, then they would be very welcome on the Council or in the public gallery. No very great commitment is required, more than coming to one or more meetings (normally the first Monday of the month) to see how we spend what was your money (before collected as Council Tax) and how, within our very limited powers, life in Drayton can be improved for all village residents.

DRAYTON'S YOUTH

The District Councillor (Richard Webber) has asked me on several occasions to write something for the Chronicle but so far I have avoided it by saying that I am a youth leader not William Shakespeare! Until now, that is.

I know that many Drayton residents find the behaviour and attitude of the young very annoying and ask why we can't do more to control them. But that is not my role. I am here to represent and encourage the young to behave responsibly by making them feel



they are wanted and that the community is concerned for their welfare. Everything I have learned about youth leadership tells me that I must start by winning the trust of the large majority of young people who have never, and will never, cause any difficulties.

I am working with the youth of Steventon, Sutton Courtenay and Appleford as well as Drayton, and I can honestly say that I have seen good in all of them. They are open to reason and are worth spending time on. The Chair-person of the Village Hall has said that, although there is a long way still to go, things are better there. We are making headway with a weekly youth evening in the Hall to add to the Monday evening visits of the Damascus Bus (but we do need more offers of help here). We have had a talk on the subject of Drug and alcohol abuse where the young asked many good questions. We are arranging a Football Match with Thames Valley Police.

Anti-social behaviour is not going to go away overnight and we need time before the results are judged. But we are making progress. It is easy to say the young are all a bad lot and should be shut out, but it has been proved that that attitude just makes things worse. Please help us by being patient or offering some time if you

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LETTER FROM REV JOSIE MIDWINTER

Recently I visited my niece with her two small children, one aged two and a half and the other six months. I played endless games of repetition. Dad –dad-dad-dad I repeated over and over again to the littlest one – what a joy when he began to mouth something similar back to me, with a big sloppy grin on his face as if he was teasing me. He seemed to be saying I know it really I just want to make you work for it! Then the older boy



hid in the cupboard – he wanted me to find him. Is he in the fridge? – is he in the oven? – is he under the table? Oh! there he is in the cupboard! Followed by a quick cuddle before we did it all over again. Anyone who has anything to do with small children will recognise these simple games that have been played for generations by mums & dads, grandparents and others with the children they care for. This is how small children learn and there is no substitute for intimate interaction between adult and child.

Now very small children have been 'discovered' as a commercial market by DVD companies. One DVD by the 'Baby Einstein' brand claims to "foster the development of your toddler's speech and language skills" in babies over one year old. Another DVD by the company 'Brainy Baby' says it will "inspire logical thinking" in babies over six months old. These and other such products have generated sales of \$1 billion (£540 million) in the USA since they were launched in the mid-1990.

When children wanted to come to Jesus some of his disciples tried to stop them. They lived in an age when children were considered to be of little importance until they could contribute to the household in some way. Jesus' response cut right across that type of thinking by saying: 'Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these'. Then Jesus took the children in his arms, put his hands on them and blessed them (Mark 10:13-16). One of my great privileges as a vicar is to pass on that God-given blessing through baptism and welcoming children into the church family. Every Wednesday morning from 10:30am to 11:30am we have a Pebbles Group in the church room for mothers/carers and their very young children, which also helps us as a church to pass on the care that Jesus showed. We have songs and stories and craft and a time for play – much better than a DVD to stimulate and interact with the children. And it is completely free and open to everyone.

I have no idea if 'Baby Einstein' or 'Brainy Baby' have anything to contribute to the development of a baby because I have not seen the DVDs. But my basic reaction is to say there is no substitute for the intimate, face-to-face, interaction of adult with child. In the home, at the Toddler Group, or at Wednesday Pebbles, interaction is free of charge. The only cost is commitment to the child – this is what Jesus taught and this is what most parents instinctively know to be right.



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

WESTMINSTER LETTER

This column is always a bit behind the times, as I am usually up-dating you on what I have been up to in the last month. But I hope it still makes interesting reading...

I have spent a lot of time with some of our most successful businesses of late. I dropped in to see Taylor & Francis, a 200 year old publishing business, which is responsible for numerous learned journals. This is all part of my extensive education in publishing, as I have participated in a

debate on the subject in the House of Commons; launched Blackwell's carbon neutral HQ, and I am now doing "work Experience" with Reed Elsevier. This last link is under the auspices of the Industry and Parliament Trust, who quite rightly take the view that MPs know nothing about business, so ensure that they are embedded with a company for some three weeks over the course of a year.

I also took David Johnson, the Deputy Chief of Mission from the US Embassy, to visit Harwell, and also Milton Park. This was a great opportunity to introduce a senior US diplomat to our part of the world, and the visit went very well until David was cross-examined by Didcot Sixth Formers. They were all very polite, but did not hide their views that they thought the USA was a significant cause of instability in the world. David seemed to enjoy himself though. You may have seen him recently in the papers, as the Embassy is refusing to pay the London Congestion Charge. That may be something on which we might all agree.

I have also met Wallingford campaigners who are calling for more Police – I get about 2 letters a week complaining about the lack of Police from all over the country; and been involved in helping to set up Didcot First, a campaign group for Didcot. All the towns in my constituency have something similar, but I certainly think Didcot needs a strong voice as it grows bigger.

Parliament has been quiet – at least in terms of legislation, if not in terms of politics! The most contentious piece of legislation, on which I have received correspondence, has been Lord Joffe's assisted dying bill. I oppose the Bill, but as you may have seen the Lords has voted it down so it won't come to the Commons.

Thank you to everyone who has said kind words following the news breaking that my wife is expecting our first child.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

At the AGM of the Parish Council on Monday 8th May Daniel Scharf was elected Chairman, replacing Paul Knight who, after five years, decided it was time to stand down. Daniel thanked Paul for the work he has done in so ably guiding the Council. The council has several subcommittees/working groups and membership and chairmen of each were also agreed: Finance to be chaired by Robin



Butler, Planning by Heather Morrison, General Purposes by Paul Knight and Rights of Way and Conservation by Jenny Pooley.

Two members of the public attended the meeting, both concerned about future housing development at Manor Farm and the effect that may have on the village Green and traffic flow via Gravel Lane. Few members of the Parish Council were serving on the Council when this issue was first raised so those who were initially involved agreed to provide information to newer Council members.

The Council has the task of ensuring things work well in the village, both for the safety and the convenience of residents. To this end the near future should see a new dog bin installed in the Hilliatt Fields area, and work will be done to the entrance to the village hall car park. Tree roots will be trimmed and tarmac renewed.

Paul Knight had been to a Neighbourhood Policing meeting organised by Thames Valley Police. He was encouraged by plans to have greater police presence (Constables and Police Community Support Officers) in local communities, including Drayton, and the opportunity for better partnership between police and the community. Neighbourhood Action Groups (NAGs) will be set up, but initially there is to be a public Neighbourhood Policing meeting in Drayton Village Hall at 7.00 pm on 22nd June.

There are now several groups considering the issue of the proposed reservoir, Fluvius, RAP and GARD. Daniel Scharf represents the Parish Council at the RAP (Reservoir Affected Parishes) meetings each month. This group keeps up to date with Thames Water's plans and will be seeking benefits for local communities if the reservoir is eventually built.

(Paul and I recently went on an organised tour for many councillors of Farmoor reservoir. Thames Water representatives answered questions about water supply and the need for a new reservoir. We saw the extensive treatment works and many leisure/conservation facilities provided by the reservoir. Daily provision of 109 million litres of clean water, which we tend to take for granted, is an impressively complex operation.)

Once again Drayton entered the 'Best Kept Village' competition and judging has recently taken place. Our village caretaker, Steve Sharpe, and his family certainly work hard at litter picking and keeping green areas and footpaths in excellent condition. Sadly, as fast as they litter pick more is dropped to replace it.

All are welcome to attend Parish Council meetings. Next month a representative of TV Energy (the support team of the Berks/Bucks/Oxon Countryside Agency's Community Renewables Initiative) will be talking about renewable energy technologies that might be used by community groups in their premises. If this interests you, or if you have any other concern, do come along to the Caudwell Day Centre on Monday 5th June at 7.45 pm.
