

DAMASCUS YOUTH PROJECT

My name is <u>Gary Hibbins</u> and I am a youth worker for the DAMASCUS Youth Project. I am also studying at Ruskin College, Oxford for a foundation degree in Youth and Community Work.

Many people are not aware of what DAMASCUS Youth Project is about. We provide a service to young people in the five villages:- Drayton, Appleford, Milton, Sutton Courtenay and Steventon.



My job is to help, support and enable young people according to their need so that they can realise their full potential. My job is not to stop anti-social behavior by trouble shooting but to engage with young people to help them to feel valued and motivate them to become active members of their community. We work closely with young people to organize activities such as football and netball. We also arrange drugand alcohol-awareness sessions, we advocate on behalf of young people and support them in making contact with agencies that can give them specialist advice on job opportunities etc.

Recently young people from the villages played Didcot young people in a friendly football match at Drayton. It went really well and everybody worked together and behaved fantastically. And just to top it we beat Didcot 14-2 (easy, easy, easy!). Because of the success we will be looking to organise more games like this in the future. The DAMASCUS bus visits Drayton on a Monday night (7.15pm to 9pm), on a Tuesday it visits Milton Heights (5pm to 7pm) followed by Steventon (7.15pm to 9pm where it complements a youth club). From the end of June (starting 29th) it will visit Sutton Courtenay every other Thursday from 7pm to 8.30pm. There is also a fortnightly youth club in Sutton Courtenay. We are working with a group of volunteers in Appleford to support youth provision there.

Please do come and see what we are about. If you feel maybe **YOU can spare a couple of hours a week** working with young people in our villages that would be fantastic. **Young people need your support** and the project relies heavily on volunteers – without them we could not deliver the work of the project – so a **big thank you** to all of them.

I have tried to describe some of the activities of the project. However, this does not give you a full feel of what goes on because a lot of the work that is at the heart of the project happens in those encounters at bus stops, shops, parks, street corners etc where young people, eager to be heard, stop for a chat.

During the summer holidays I will be out and about; **do join us** when you see me chatting with young people.

The project is a registered charity managed by a voluntary management committee; members are people who live in the DAMASCUS villages. It is funded mainly by a grant from the Big Lottery Fund, which is used to run the mobile drop-in bus and employ two part-time youth workers.

Far more manpower is required to provide continuous youth provision. It is also a community project, which requires the community to engage with its young people for its success.



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
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The ROYAL BRITISH LEGION Pearl Stanbridge


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Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends,

The Blackbird Leys Estate and classical music do not immediately seem to go together. That was very obvious at the start of 'The Singing Estate', a new Channel 5 TV series.

Ivor Setterfield, a world-class conductor, was sent to Blackbird Leys to recruit a choir of 40 people and train them well enough to perform in the Albert Hall – and he only had 12 weeks to do it in! At the first audition few people turned up and those who did had truly dreadful voices! Setterfield even went out onto the street to try and stimulate interest. Then a few people did begin to trickle in and gradually some with a bit of musical ability began to emerge. The fascinating thing is people came from such a variety of backgrounds: Ruth from the supermarket checkout; Mackenzie a bingo caller; Eric a 71 year old pensioner; Bob a light bulb salesman and Julie a night club bouncer. What a mixed bag ... and their voices were equally mixed and at the end of the first rehearsal Setterfield described the result as a truly ugly sound!

That was Setterfield's greatest problem, blending together 40 individual people with 40 individual voices. Choirs have to sing together and in harmony. At various points tempers got frayed and emotions ran high as it seemed like an impossible task. But Setterfield is a determined man and he brought all his musical and organisational skills into play – so for the Blackbird Leys Choir it was "Look out Albert Hall, here we come!"

When Jesus chose his followers they were just such a crosssection of people. Four of them were rough, uneducated fisherman. One was a former freedom fighter (the Romans would have called him a terrorist). Another was a tax collector who cheated his neighbours in order to grow rich. One of his female followers had a very shadowy past. A real mixed bunch but over the three years they were with Jesus they began to learn that it is not where you come from which is important, but where you are going.

Even so things did not always go smoothly. James and John pushed themselves forward and wanted to be seen as the greatest. Peter jumped in with his two big feet and often got it wrong. It was a hard job keeping that lot walking on the way of love and forgiveness.

But then love and forgiveness do show the way to go, from getting it wrong, to putting it right, and then continuing the journey. A lot of that took place in the three years they were with Jesus. Then at the end of it, when Jesus was arrested, one betrayed him, another denied him and the rest deserted him. Humanly speaking a bit of a mess. But something of the right message had got through – Jesus had brought about a huge change in their lives – deep in their hearts they knew they were forgiven people and that gave them the courage to go out and preach the message of God's love to everyone.

The story of the Blackbird Leys choir is like the story of Jesus and his disciples and gives hope to us all. God is able to take anyone – everyone – with all their thoughts and ideas, with all their problems and shortcomings, with all their hopes and dreams and fulfil their deepest longings with his love.

The church is not a 'holy huddle' of goody-goodies, but a mixed bunch of people who want, with God's help, to love and be loved and make the community they live in a better place for all concerned.

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ED VAIZEY - Your Local MP

The main issue that has dominated local headlines has been the future of local health services. Representatives from all the three main parties have been campaigning on this issue. In particular, we all want to keep our community hospitals, but we also want to prevent cuts to other services. The case is pretty unarguable. Oxfordshire receives the **lowest funding per head in the country**, and the John Radcliffe is the most efficient hospital for its size in the country. I have been reassured that the cuts will not effect the quality of service, but it will certainly lead to delays in operations, which is a matter of great concern. The mayors of all our towns have collected petitions, as have most of the MPs in the County. By the time you read this, we will have presented petitions to the local Primary Care Trust, the Prime Minister and Parliament.

A lack of an effective transport system is an issue that could have a huge impact on the future of our local economy. I receive many letters from businesses who are concerned about the huge pressure they face from a creaking road network. I also attended a public meeting to look at ways of re-opening Wantage Road station, which faces some pretty difficult obstacles. I managed to speak in the final debate before the Commons rose from the Whitsun recess to draw these problems to the Government's attention. The point I wanted to get across was that, as we are one of the most economically important areas of the country, the Government cannot simply leave us on our own to sort these issues out. It must have a strategy and buy in to it.

On the wider front, I have just come back from a fascinating trip to Iran. I am planning to write about it, and will include a link to the article in my next article.

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Marcham Road Hospital

Thank you to all those who responded to our Save the Hospital campaign, particularly to those who sent in contributions to the cost of the campaign. We are making as much noise as possible and I will keep you regularly informed.

One of the things I have been learning very rapidly over the past months, is that there is no such thing as a simple issue. National government funding restraints oblige the PCT to make savings somewhere. Our local hospital has been struggling to fulfil its function as an 'intermediate' form of health care for some years now. 'Intermediate' is the jargon for something between health care supplied by major hospitals (in our case the JR) and GP surgeries. Too much of Marcham Road Hospital's space has been taken up with overspill from the JR. By spending more money on the JR, and reducing capacity at Marcham Road, the PCT feel that our local Hospital would be able to fulfil its primary role better albeit at a lower level. From a local point of view we want as many beds offering respite care at Marcham Road as possible, and it is local interests that I am trying to represent here. As I see it at present, it is a problem of Central Government/ National Health funding - we do not help our cause by demonising the PCT or anyone else. I would be pleased to here the opinions of anyone with anything to add to the above, in particular any of the medics in the village.

Another rather depressing statistic that caught my eye is that the Abingdon Caldecott ward is measured as having a lower than average UK life expectancy and the highest level of 'health deprivation' in the Vale by some way. In Drayton, we have a <u>higher than average</u> UK life expectancy and we are deemed to be in the 25% least health deprived in the UK.

Youth

We are still desperately in need of more voluntary help to get a Youth Club in Drayton on a firm footing. If <u>YOU</u> would be prepared to give up an hour or so a week to this excellent cause – please let me know.

Sorry Ed

PARISH COUNCIL (June 5)

The meeting began with a very interesting presentation by Ian Bacon from Thames Valley Energy on the potential of energy conservation and renewables. He explained the value of energy audits and the various ways in which energy could be saved or produced without dependence on fossil fuels. Ian not only explained the role of his company but had examples of his own village (Blewbury) where some of the measures had started to be put into effect. This could form a central theme were the village to organise itself to produce a village plan. The Council would be **pleased to hear from anyone** with this particular <u>interest</u>.

The Council was faced with a second report confirming that the horse chestnut tree at the bus stop in the centre of the village may be past its sell-by-date. The **loss of this tree would be so serious** that we are seeking yet another opinion on the minimum works necessary to make the tree safe.

We then had a discussion about the alterations to The Green that might be necessary were the development of houses at Manor Farm to proceed. The Council has contracted to assist the developer to achieving a suitable access (in return for £100,000). However, there may be some prospect of less radical changes to the current road layout. It was agreed that our solicitor should be asked to approach the landowner's solicitor to see whether they would be prepared to look again at the detail of the access proposals.

Our clerk and chairman of finance produced the annual accounts to show how the Council had spent its (your) money (and some modest income) over the last financial year. We are very grateful for their hard work in this complicated area.

Finally it was agreed that the Council should support the Community Day (Saturday 8 July in the Village Hall) with a modest grant towards the entertainment and also to run a stall so that those residents who have never been to a parish council meeting could find out more about what is involved. If this results in more interest in the Council or even the recruitment of the few members required to make up the full complement, then this will be money well spent.

Next meeting of the Council to which you are **all welcome** to attend to speak or just to listen will be 3 July at 7.45pm at the Caudwell Day centre (at the end of Gravel Lane). *Daniel Scharf*


