Dear Friends,

This year St Peter's Festival was a delightful opportunity to invite back to Drayton Revd Dorothy Derrick and her husband John. They both had a very fruitful ministry in the six and half years they spent in the village and many people have cause to be grateful for the love, support and care they gave in so many ways. One of the very positive things that Dorothy was able to do was to set up the Ministry Team which involves the lay people in contributing to life of the church through, worship, healing, care, discipleship and prayer. The foundation that Dorothy built has been of enormous benefit to me as the present priest in charge and to the whole ministry of the church throughout the village. One of the very encouraging results of such developments is that lay people are able to develop their talents and skills in the ministry that Jesus passed on to us all.

Rosie Bruce has been a member of St Peter's for over 20 years and she has contributed to both the healing and worship teams. 

WESTMINSTER LETTER

Ed Vaizey



By the time you read this, Parliament will have risen for its long summer recess. Parliament broke up on July 25th and will not sit again until October 9th, leaving MPs to find something to do with their time in August and September. During the last summer recess, I worked as normal in my office in the House of Commons and in the constituency. I intend to do the same again this summer - it's a chance to get to grips with some of my more difficult

constituency cases, to review all my files to see what more needs to be done on a variety of issues, and to get out and about in the constituency. Of course, the pace of work is not as frantic, and so I also have the opportunity to read many of the reports that have piled up on my desk. In particular, I will be doing a lot of work on global poverty, which is the policy area that I have been asked to work on by David Cameron.

Most recently in the Commons, I have participated in two debates on the future of the BBC. I canvassed the opinion of my constituents via an excellent website called hearfromyourmp.com, which allows constituents to sign up and see what I am doing in the House of Commons. Everyone I heard from was a huge fan of the BBC, and many said they would be happy to pay more for their licence fee! The debate on the BBC is a very important one. The licence fee is set to rise to £180, and many people now watch a huge range of channels because of the advent of digital television. Indeed, a lot of young people don't watch telly at all any more, spending most of their free time on the computer. Within a generation, I expect the idea of a television - a box delivering TV programmes – will be redundant, and we will have to look at how we fund the service differently. My particular concern with the BBC is the huge range of activities it now undertakes. There are a number of local employers, such as RM, Harcourt Education and OUP, who now have to compete, on unfair terms, with the BBC in the area of educational software, and this affects many of my constituents. I am hoping to meet the Director General of the BBC to discuss this in the near future.

I will be taking my holidays early this year, as my wife is expecting our first child, so I apologise for missing my surgery in Shrivenham - cllr Peter Saunders will be there to answer any queries. Surgeries resume in September, starting on 1st September at Didcot. All surgery dates can be found on my website. vaizey.com, or on parish notice boards.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Trees

In my garden, I am lucky enough to have a Willow Tree. It was 10 foot high when we moved here in 1993 and is now nearly 50 foot tall. We have heard all the dire warnings of what Willows can do to house foundations and drains in the search for water and there might come a Willow time when our becomes dangerous or damaging to the house. At present, we are firmly of the opinion that it's benefits (not just to us but also to the



Millennium Green) far outweigh its drawbacks, so it is going to stay there, growing and drinking for as long as possible.

On my desk, at present there are three separate applications for planning permission to remove trees on private property in Drayton. Most are entirely sensible propositions based on the diseased and unsafe condition of the trees.

A County Council expert has reported recently to the Parish Council that at least one of the mature chestnut trees in the centre of Drayton is unsafe and should be felled. This would cost the PC nearly £2000. A second opinion from the County Council pronounced that the tree in question was in fact perfectly safe for the time being.

Drayton is not lucky enough to have a central, ancient and beautiful pond or green. The character of the centre of the village depends to a great extent on the size, position and maturity of its trees. It is so easy to cut them down, yet it takes so long to replace them

Village Hall

We are trying to get a Committee together to consider the future provision of facilities - sporting and cultural in and around the Village Hall. If anyone has strong feelings on the subject or has expertise that could be useful, please let me know.

The monthly surgery at the Hall on the 3rd Saturday of the month 9.00am-10.00am does not seem to be a particularly popular event. I am always happy to be contacted by any of the means below, and am happy to visit people at home if they would prefer - but is the monthly surgery a worthwhile use of time - your comments would be appreciated.

'Despairing'

At the Community Day, a very caring and concerned friend asked me if I was enjoying life as a Councillor. She told me that my piece in the last Chronicle sounded a little despairing. I did not mean it to sound like that at all. One of the advantages of arriving in local politics at my age is that one cannot be accused of career-building. I have no interest in giving people what they want simply to win votes. I had intended last months comments to be a little angry - angry at the state of Community Life in this country as I saw it – angry at the argument that because people are busy, hardworking and important they should not be expected to contribute to community life – angry, but certainly not despairing. There are enough 'nice' Liberal Democrats about these days what we need is some angry ones!

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Parish Council meeting Monday 3rd July 2006

On an uncomfortably hot evening, with fewer than the usual number of Councillors able to be present, the last meeting dealt only with small matters, which nonetheless affect Drayton and its residents. Inspired by last month's report of the visit from Thames Valley Energy, one member of the public attended and he may possibly seek likeminded people to discuss future action.



The Council is responsible for ensuring the safety of public areas in the village. To this end our Treasurer has worked long and hard to complete a risk assessment document. Trees are a potential hazard, as are gravestones and footpaths.

Two trees are of current concern, one being at the entrance to the Village Hall and the other at the bus stop on the west side of the village green. The roots of the first have been disturbing the pavement and when all quotes have been obtained work will begin on trimming the roots and resurfacing the pavement. The second is rather more controversial as experts have said that the large horse-chestnut at the bus-stop is potentially unsafe, so the Council is seeking further advice before taking any drastic action.

There is now a legal requirement for headstones to be 'topple tested' on a regular basis. Because this is expensive the Council has reluctantly decided that from now on only tablets placed at an angle will be permitted in the burial ground.

For a long time we have been trying to have the surface of Gravel Lane Path and Sutton Wick Path levelled and upgraded, but they are low on the County Council's list of priorities. However, there is a new potential source of revenue that we will investigate to see whether the path can at least be made free of mud in very wet weather.

The Council often receives requests for donations to worthy causes, mostly local ones. (e.g. The DAMASCUS Bus, Citizens' Advice Bureau, Drayton Twinning Association). We take this seriously as we are responsible for public money, and have decided that only local, as opposed to national, charities will be considered in future.

We were pleased to see that Drayton School got a mention and photograph in OCC's 'Home 2 School' magazine for its efforts to reduce congestion at the school entrance by using the Red Lion car park, kindly offered by the pub owners.

Important meetings were discussed, some past, one still to come. The joint Police/ Neighbourhood (NAG) meetings proved useful in forming closer links between police and community and highlighting the main concerns of Drayton residents: these were speeding, anti-social behaviour and under-age drinking. The Police plan to tackle one matter at a time and report back regularly to the Community. (See the police item on this topic below, Ed.)

Our District Councillor, Richard Webber has worked immensely hard to plan the Drayton Community Day on Saturday 7th July, and he urged the Council to give it strong support. By the time you read this it will be in the past but hopefully will have been a great success in helping to make Drayton an even closer community than many of us think it already is.

The next Council meeting will be in the Caudwell Day centre on Monday August 7th at 7.45pm. All are welcome to attend, and, who knows, maybe the Community Day will have persuaded some to join the Parish Council themselves.

THE FOLLOWING IS A PRESS RELEASE ISSUED BY THAMES VALLEY POLICE AFTER LOCAL MEETINGS

Residents from South Abingdon, Drayton, Sutton Courtenay and Appleford have attended three public meetings to have their say on how their neighbourhood is policed.

Meetings were held in Abingdon, Sutton Courtenay, and Drayton on 15, 19, and 22 June.

Sgt Andy Cranidge, leading the neighbourhood teams, said: "There was a good mix of residents with a varied age range at all three meetings and we had some lively debate about what issues affect people the most. We even received a round of applause after the meeting in Drayton!

We have been encouraging people to have their say in lots of ways so that those who couldn't attend the meetings could still have an input into what will become the top three priorities for the neighbourhood action group (NAG).

We have organized an awareness day in Abingdon town centre where we took questionnaires around the shoppers and we have visited local care homes to find out the views of our senior residents. We have also put a questionnaire into the local parish magazines and put ballot boxes in local shops to give as many people as possible a say."

The top priority from each of the three neighbourhoods was taken as the first three priorities for the NAG to address. The NAG group includes representatives from the police, councils, education and, most importantly, the community.

The three priorities are speeding in Drayton, Speeding in Sutton Courtenay, and antisocial behavior in South Abingdon.

The NAG will begin at once to decide how these issues will be addressed. They will gather information about the issues, decide a strategy and put this into action in order to reduce speeding and antisocial behaviour in the target areas.

Sgt Cranidge explained: "We will draw on the expertise of the NAG members in order to tackle the issues the public have identified. We will make sure that residents are kept informed of progress so that they can see that their issues are really being addressed."

Bill Jones, Community Safety Manager for the Vale of White Horse District Council, said: "Speeding and antisocial behaviour are already priorities for community safety so these meetings have confirmed that we are focusing on the right things to try and make people feel safer in the Vale. We have already started work in partnership to tackle these issues and with the support of the NAG and the communities we should make even further progress."





Wooden Spoon Recipe

Recipe No. 19 (from October 1987) Bramble Meringue Torte (serves 6 – 8)

For the base: 6 oz plain flour, 2 oz caster sugar, 1 oz ground rice, large pinch ground ginger, 4 oz butter.

For the filling: 1lb blackberries, 5 oz caster sugar, 2 level tablespoons cornflour, 2 eggs separated plus 2 egg whites.

Set oven to gas mark 5, 190° (adjust for fan ovens). To make the base: mix all the dry ingredients together, then rub in the butter. Knead the mixture together to make a shortbread dough, then press into the base of a 9" loose-based cake tin. Bake for 25 minutes until golden, then unmould.

To make the filling: add 2 oz sugar to the blackberries in a pan. Cook with the lid on, shaking the pan occasionally, until softened. Mix the cornflour to a smooth paste with a little of the juice from the blackberries, add to the fruit and stir over the heat until the mixture boils and thickens. Remove from heat and beat in the egg yolks. Allow the mixture to cool completely, then spread over the shortbread base.

Whisk the four egg whites until thick then beat in the remaining sugar to make a meringue. Pile on top of the blackberry filling. Pop the torte into the oven for 8 minutes until the meringue is well browned
