





Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends,

Drayton is no longer a rural village in the sense that the main occupation is farming. Most of the working population have jobs outside the village, although we do still have one or two working farms here. We also have several small industrial and retail units which employ local people. Because of this change in the village focus we have largely lost touch with our roots in the farming economy and working of the land. So this year we have decided to focus our Harvest Festival on Drayton and link in with the local farms, allotments and even those who grow fruit and veg in their gardens.

British Farm has gone through a huge period of change since the end of WWII. The biggest change has been the mechanisation of farming which means fewer workers are needed. Also much of our food is imported from around the world. For example 30 years ago this was a fruit growing area, but now 95% of fruit sold in our shops is imported.

In a recent article in the 'Church Times' the Bishop of Ely The Rt. Revd Dr Anthony Russell made some interesting points about modern farming. He thinks there are three main issues and I summarise them below:- FOOD AS A WORLD COMMODITY: The policy on British food is driven not by the government but by the major supermarkets. They decide what food is required, what standard it should reach and where it should be grown. They are purely concerned with profit and therefore do not particularly consider the consequences of where they place their orders. For us as consumers this may seem like good news as we get a wide variety of food, at a low price from all over the world. Across the world, however, this means the poor growers get poorer and our farmers cannot easily compete with the low prices.

CHANGES IN WORLD DIET: Most of the worlds population are still vegetarian but the 'American Diet' of manufactured food is fast catching up. These manufactured foods which rely heavily on wheat, maize, beef and chicken require three or four times more land than the traditional vegetarian diet. To meet this need large tracts of land are being cleared and more intensive farming methods are being used. We are all well aware of the environmental issues this raises.

DEVELOPMENT OF BIO-FUELS: In the past this has not been taken too seriously because oil-based fuels have been relatively cheap, but now things have changed it is being researched commercially. For example bio-diesel can be produced in this country from wheat or sugar beet. It yields 93% more energy than the energy consumed in its production and it produces 41% lower emissions. This sounds like good news for the environment and the farming industry.

Dr Russell thinks:- "For a generation, farmers have found themselves at the margins of British life, but there is no doubt that the harvest this year marks a considerable change. Farming is now at the centre of the strategic and environmental debate that is becoming of such significance in this country."

On **Sunday 8th October** we will celebrate **Harvest Festival** at St Peter's- **you are welcome to come and join us** and celebrate the rural aspect of our village and the importance of the farming and foodgrowing community in our midst.





An APPEAL - Can YOU Help?

My name is Matthew Smaldon, I am a locally-based volunteer recorder for The <u>Second World War Experience Centre</u>, which is in Leeds, and I wonder if **you can help me**?

I am currently trying to locate people who would like to **share their recollections of the war**, for inclusion in The Centre's archive. We aren't looking for dramatic tales of glory – **stories from all walks of life**, including servicemen and women, but also from civilians, children, factory workers, or anyone who has memories from that time.

I meet with people, and record their recollections informally. It's an opportunity for the interviewee to recount their stories and experiences - my questions are minimal. If the subject (or relations) requests a copy of the tape, it's always made available.

The recording is sent to the Centre for transcribing and inclusion in the archive, accessible by authors working on Second World War books, by veterans groups, historical societies, and various researchers. It is currently developing educational modules for use by schools, and has recently provided source material for the Scottish Holocaust Memorial Exhibition in Edinburgh.

The Centre is a registered museum and charity, more than seven thousand people have their younger years covered in the Centre by original documents, memorabilia and recorded memories. ED VAIZEY - Your Local MP

Thames Water has started its roadshow on the Abingdon reservoir, which will obviously affect Drayton residents. I continue to work closely with RAP, who send me their minutes and correspondence with Thames Water. I remain sceptical about the reservoir - its size and the need for it all. Of much more immediate importance, it is vital that the Government **gives some assistance** to the local council in dealing with this application. At the moment it is David versus Goliath, and I think the **Vale should have some specific funds** to help it consider the application properly.

I am coming to the end of the parliamentary recess. I spent a week visiting the Falkland Islands, as part of my role in the Armed Forces Parliamentary Scheme. I spent two days on board HMS Chatham, and two days at the base (which has the longest corridor in the world). Just in case you think this was a jolly, I would remind you that August is the Falklands' winter! I also spent a week **working at a night shelter** in Bedford, which was very illuminating. It gave me a better insight into the problems faced by the homeless. If I learned one thing, it is that homelessness is a symptom of much deeper problems with an individual, not a cause of those symptoms. So even if everyone had access to accommodation that would not simply solve their problems. They need a great deal of hands-on support.

I am now preparing for fatherhood, and also trying to lose weight for my Arctic Challenge for charity. I will be riding a husky dog sled across the arctic wastes in February, and **raising money** for Crimestoppers and the Oxfordshire Community Foundation, which gives money to local charities. Please join me in thinking very carefully before removing old trees and looking after and appreciating our paths and bridleways. If trees have to go, let's try to plant others to replace them wherever possible.

ENERGY AND THE ENVIRONMENT

I would love to see Drayton regarded as a village that takes such issues very seriously, and shows others what we can all do to address the problems of energy supply and conservation. I propose to devote next month's article to this issue alone - if anyone has original and workable ideas that I could include, please let me know.

THE RESERVOIR

This issue is taking up much of my time at the moment, but given the mere 4 months that Thames Water have allowed for Stage One – An assessment of Needs and Alternatives, it is right that it is top of my agenda. It seems quite clear to me, that until December, we should not be talking about any other issues at all than these two:-

- 1) Do we <u>need</u> a reservoir? Will it solve the problem?
- 2) Is a reservoir the best of the alternative solutions?

All other considerations – building issues, recreational issues, planning issues and so on, should be argued about after December if and when TW have convinced us all over issues number 1 and 2.

Whatever I may feel personally about the proposals, it is perfectly fair and right that I urge everyone to ensure that TW is given as tough a time as we can all manage in the next few months. This is to be Europe's largest stretch of man-made water and TW must be made to justify it. We can only do this if we stick to the issues in hand. At present, I am concerned that the planning and reflective stages are being bulldozed through; 4 months is a very short time indeed. There will be more than enough bulldozers if and when the building stage Richard Webber begins!

PARISH COUNCIL (Sept 4)

It is not only the press that has a summer silly season, but also it seems so does the Parish Council. There were no large issues for deliberation this month, which was fortunate since there were very few Councillors present to consider them.

The item that caused most discussion was a letter from a tenyear-old Drayton boy asking that the Council give thought to providing more play activities for his age group. The Councillors agree that there is a need, but it is quite a challenge as both money and space are necessary if anything worthwhile is to be achieved. However, the matter is being looked into and there are one or two possibilities being explored. Meanwhile we have thrown the ball back into the youngster's court by asking him to say what he would like to see happening and to get his friends to suggest things too – with the proviso, of course, that they must not be over ambitious.

Again on the leisure front, there is good news for horse riders and walkers. The bridleway that used to run from the southern end of Sutton Wick Lane to join Gypsy Lane was officially rerouted alongside the breaker's yard several years ago, but in fact has not been accessible because of flooding and thick undergrowth, trees and bushes. The County Council has worked all year on clearing the path and draining the ground. The bridleway (officially BW 29) is now open and very pleasant. It has yet to be sign-posted, but it is approached through the breaker's yard gate (possible even when the gate is closed), or from Gypsy lane.






Wooden Spoon Recipe No 21 (from Oct 1990)

Salmon with cucumber (serves 4) - by LOIS RENNELLS

4 salmon fillets (skinned), 2 tablespoons sunflower oil, 1 teaspoon crushed mixed peppercorns, 4 tablespoons dry white wine, about a quarter of a cucumber (diced), 1 tablespoon chopped fresh dill, juice of ½ a lemon, ¼ pint single cream, knob of butter, seasoning.

Brush the salmon with half of the oil and sprinkle over the peppercorns. Grill for 5 minutes, turning once and brushing with the remaining oil during cooking.

Meanwhile make the sauce:- boil the wine until reduced by half, add the remaining ingredients except the butter and cook until the cream bubbles and thickens. Stir in the butter until it has melted.

Spoon the sauce over the salmon and serve.
