Mike has just graduated from Nottingham, works Opportunity International and, when not running through pools of mud, is usually seen waiting tables at Le **Bistro** Celte Abingdon.



Opportunity International is a charity which provides people in developing countries with small loans (98% of which are repaid) and business training, enabling them to build sustainable businesses and work their way out of poverty. By raising over £800 so far, Mike will enable Opportunity International to provide 10 additional loans to poor entrepreneurs, which will have the

LETTER FROM REV JOSIE MIDWINTER

Dear Friends

"I'm dreaming of a white Christmas." crooned Bing Crosby back in the 1950s, "..just like the ones we used to know." But things have changed, and in the 21st century, such a song might cause offence and perhaps the words need to be changed. 'Christmas' is out because it only favours one religious group and that might exclude others. Perhaps 'white' might also be



misunderstood and it needs to be replaced. So we could end up singing: "I'm dreaming of a colourless Winterval."

Some how I don't think it will catch on! Because it would be just that - colourless - and therefore valueless. If we just celebrated a 'Winterval' then we would feel justified in eating and drinking and spending and giving lavish presents without a second thought for anyone else. The whole point of Christmas is that we celebrate a real event that happened in human history. That event is the birth of the most important baby that has ever been born -God's own son - Jesus. This is not an event just of food, and expensive presents, and overspending. It is an event when we look to the values of our society and use the opportunity to give and share with one another. Food and gifts may play a part in that but only in so far as they contribute to the building up of our family life and help us to be generous and unselfish towards those around

This year the St Peter's Christmas card will feature the central panel of the triptych behind the main altar in the church. (editor's note: see the rear page of this Chronicle) This shows Joseph and Mary with the baby Jesus on her lap. The three wise men are kneeling before the baby to offer their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. It is this sense of giving which encapsulates the Christmas Story. God so loved the world that he made that he gave his only son - Jesus - to come and live amongst us so that he might show God's love in human form. The shepherds came with their humble gifts to show that Jesus would himself be humble and a servant to all. The wise men came with their gifts to show that the rich, the wise and the powerful all owe their homage to Jesus.

It is this challenge to sacrificial giving which distinguishes Christmas from some anonymous 'Winterval' type of event. Over the Christmas period there will be a number of services at St Peter's and also at the Baptist Church, when we have the opportunity to celebrate and also pay homage to the King of Kings; the baby Jesus. You are welcome at any of these services which are listed elsewhere in the Chronicle. Christmas cards from both churches will be delivered to every house in the parish - to wish you a 'Happy Christmas' (NOT Winterval) and invite you to come and join us at our services.

An explanation was given for the weekend's events of the 21st October, when the bar alarm went off three times in 24 hours and Chubb's actions resulted in a large bill and no power to several We are protesting to them about the bill and the inconvenience to users that followed.

We had a wonderful response from the village with Christmas decorations for which we thank-you all, it was very kind of you and we will use all we can. We have suffered 2 bad weekends of broken glass in the vicinity of the building; again I say to parents of youngsters in the village, please be aware of where your youngsters are and what they are doing. Large quantities of lager and other alcopop-type bottles and cans have been cleared from all round the building, full and empty, smashed and whole. Alcohol in these young people is not doing them any good at their young age; also broken glass is lethal to children playing in the area. DRAYTON HISTORY

Drayton's history goes back at least 6000 years. Next time you are anywhere near Drayton Mill, you are about 5,700 years away from a major prehistoric monument, a Neolithic cursus, an earthwork of two parallel ditches running for many yards. The ditches are no longer visible because the land has been ploughed on and off since Saxon times, but the cursus started not far from Mill Brook and ran towards Abingdon. Two sections of it show up in crop marks that can be seen from the air.

Because there is a large bit missing in the middle, it may even be two separate cursuses. Without archaeological investigation, we can't be sure. Stone age cursuses remain a bit of a mystery. The first to be recognised was one near Stonehenge and it was the early antiquarians who called it a cursus, wondering if it was some kind of racecourse. We still don't know what they are for, but if Neolithic man spent hours digging ditches with only antler picks as spades, they must have been very important ceremonial or sacred earthworks.

Not far from the cursus is a long barrow, (SU 4828 9495) at the back of Sutton Wick. This too is invisible on the ground and we only know it is there because it shows up in photography from the air. The two ditches either side of an elongated hump are visible from the air as is the traditional long barrow shape with one end wider than the other. Long barrows, like cursuses, must have taken time and energy to dig. The barrows have been called monuments of death. Yet even the really big ones found in the Cotswolds often only have a small area inside devoted to burials. Nevertheless the makers felt it was necessary to make a really huge earth or stone covering of the burial chambers. Sometimes they waited till the flesh had rotted off the bones before putting the bodies into the burial chamber. Sometimes they buried them whole, so to speak, with the flesh still on the bones. And occasionally long barrows don't contain any dead bodies at all; they are just empty tombs.

What were the Neolithic villagers of Drayton doing as they slaved with their antler picks? Was the cursus the equivalent of our church, a ceremonial area for processions? Were they burying their chieftains in their long barrow? Or were they heaping up the earth and stones partly to mark their territorial boundary? These mysteries are part of local history and the Drayton History Group believes local history is your history. ST PETER'S CHURCHYARD

The churchyard is a living place. This may seem like a contradiction in terms when we know that the churchyard is the place where we bury the dead. But Christianity is all about new life springing out of that which seems to be dead and gone. The churchyard is a good example of this.

Recently St Peter's **PCC** needed authorise some work in the churchyard on some of the trees. This involved removing a dead tree completely larger and lopping with dead trees branches. One of the near the trees almshouse wall has been leaning at a dangerous angle for sometime. It has now been cut down, but it has not been lost to life of the the churchyard. The wood from the tree has been



cut into logs and piled up in a quiet corner of the churchyard. Here, as it rots down, it will become a habitat for a multitude of insects, woodlice and beetles. It may even make a winter home for a hedgehog or two. The yew tree behind the church is an ancient tree estimated to be about 350 years old. It is quite common to find old yew trees in churchyards. They can live for over a thousand years and there are examples of such trees in Steventon and Didcot churchyards. So by lopping and thinning this tree we are giving it space to continue its growth. If you should happen to be around in the year 2650 why not pop into the churchyard and see if our tree has made its 1000th birthday!

Such a prospect reminds us that in the management of both church and churchyard we are not thinking in terms of years or decades, but centuries and even millennia. With that in mind we at St Peter's would like to do even more to manage the churchyard as a conservation area for the future. There is a great deal of information available to guide groups in how to protect trees, encourage wild flowers, preserve lichen and provide habitat for small creatures and insects. But it requires a group of dedicated people to make it happen. This is something that might catch the imagination of one or two people in the village who could set things going. If you are interested in doing something along those lines please contact me and we can see how to follow it up.

Stilton and onion soup (a delicious way to use up left-over Christmas Stilton)

2 large onions, 2 oz butter, 2 heaped tablespoons cornflour, 1 pint milk, 1½ pints chicken stock (using 2 stock cubes), 8 oz crumbled Stilton, pepper (no salt as the stock cubes and Stilton provide enough).

As Youth Leader of the Damascus Youth project, Gary was invited to speak at the Leader of the White Horse District Council's Gala evening in October. This was a daunting task in front of an audience of nearly 200. As a son of Drayton we can all be proud that Gary us thoroughly gave a entertaining summary of the excellent work carried out by the project and as a result helped to secure donations in excess of £3000 towards the project's running costs.



An awesome responsibility

In 50 years time it is perfectly possible that the area we now know as the Vale of the White Horse will be dominated by the largest stretch of man-made water in Europe. Will our grandchildren thank us for our foresight, our readiness to face problems, our willingness to provide them with a recreational facility that stimulated the economy of the area, that solved the water shortage in the south east of England and enhanced what a was a dull, flat piece of land. Or will they curse us for allowing the development of an eyesore, which not only was not necessary, but did not solve anything and reduced the area from partial to total gridlock.

I wish I knew, I wish the District Council knew, but most of all I wish Thames Water knew!

Stage 1 of the Upper Thames Major Resource Project proposed by Thames Water is entitled 'Needs and alternatives'. We have been given, under their consultation process, a mere few weeks to consider this – surely by far the most important issue in the whole process. Of course it matters what sort of boating facilities we would like to have on the proposed reservoir, and what price the current landowners might get for their land, and how high the banks will be (will they really be 80 feet+?) and what size the nature reserves will be – but surely, none of these issues carries the same weight or the same responsibility for the decision makers as the issue – Do we really **need** a Reservoir?

⇒ Based on Thames Water's own figures, the following questions and answers occur to me. Real water shortages are due to kick in the early 2020s. How long will the proposed reservoir solve the problem? - 9 or 10 years apparently. Then what? Another reservoir? Another £1 billion?

On worst case figures, what is the rate of annual water shortage in London and the South East? Approx 40 megalitres per day each year from 2020 to 2030.

If the £1 billion due to be spent on the reservoir were to be spent on leakage fixing (currently 800+ megalitres/day in London alone), what effect would this have on the shortfall? If we were to reduce our per capita consumption of water in the TW area to the European average PCC, what effect would this have on the shortfall figures? TW's 8 million customers all reducing their daily consumption by 50 litres per day is an awful lot of water saved.

My other major concern is that the playing field is so uneven. Under present regulations, the capital assets of TW gained by building the reservoir would oblige OFWAT to allow TW to increase its annual profits considerably. There is nothing wrong with this, but it does give TW an overriding profit motive. And whatever the outcome of the planning request, the project costs will fall on TW customers and general tax payers.

The two organisations charged with regulating TW (OFWAT and the Environment Agency) are arguably both overstretched, under resourced government QUANGOS each with only a fraction of the financial resources of Thames Water. When it comes to it, an enquiry may come down to which side can afford the best consultants and which side can afford the best QCs.

The Environment Agency states that it accepts that there is going to be a shortfall by the year 2020 and that this shortfall will be alleviated only in part by reduced leakage and water consumption. Should it not look at this again? Using the Stage 1 Report figures the savings that could be made by compelling TW to reduce leakage and by making/encouraging us all to reduce our daily water consumption would seem to be able to more than fix the problem - at least for 30 years or more. It may be that the EA has access to figures not in TW's Stage 1 Report and not available to the rest of us. If so, might we please see them? In this area, we are not short of academics capable of understanding complex figures.



Certainly, we owe it to our descendents to have scrutinised the case as thoroughly as we possibly can. It is an awesome responsibility for all of us. I have no desire to be party to a process which resulted in a horrific waste of public

money simply because we had not scrutinised the project thoroughly enough. Water is as precious a commodity as any energy source. In this country, we are not used to treating it as a rare commodity. The time has surely come when we should.

A PARISH PLAN?

I am writing this note because I have been asked to look into something which is thought to be 'a good thing' for rural communities, the development of a 'Parish Plan'.

The general aim might perhaps be summarised as a way of encouraging greater interest and involvement in all aspects of the fabric and function of the local community, in this case Drayton. The process of stimulating, exploring and perhaps implementing both useful and imaginative ideas would be intended to involve, and take account of, the views of as many as possible. Ideally, this interaction would enhance the natural good neighbourliness and constructive social commitment that exists across the village. A cynical view could be that it is a good way to divert frustrated attention from the results of bad decisions outside our control.

The experience of other communities suggests that they may have seen associated benefits in the way of new projects: these could, however, perhaps have been achieved without the process of a village plan. At worst the process may be little more than a time and effort-wasting exercise at taxpayers' expense.

You may think that I should perhaps stop there and sign off, but my own thought is that, while potential benefits of such an idea are undoubtedly questionable, the concept could perhaps be developed to create a framework within the parish to achieve as sound a process as possible for decision making in the longer-term, both for conservation and development. This could, at a local level, greatly enhance the quality of an informed democratic process which would sadly seem to have been progressively eroded by 'the establishment' (i.e. machinery of State).

This may sound a somewhat grandiose idea and, while others will no doubt take a very different view of the matter, it is perhaps worthy of discussion to discover if our community has the will and the stomach to attempt to develop such a 'Parish process' in the hope of an improved 'Drayton democracy'.

Casual conversation has already thrown up a number of ideas, but if anyone out there is interested in becoming involved in initial informal discussion (without any commitment), they might perhaps like to give their contact details to our excellent Parish clerk, Marie Sellwood (mariesellwood@hotmail.com or 200042).

I should close now and apologise if, having read this, you have found it less than inspiring. I do, however, think it possible that there could be something really worthwhile in this for Drayton in the long-term were it to be developed in the best way.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

As last month, play facilities for youngsters was one of the main issues discussed by a rather depleted number of Councillors at the meeting held on Monday 6th November. Three members of the public attended including Toby Soper who first raised the issue. Since October much research has been done by our new Councillor, Melanie Parker (see page 6), and by Clare Soper, revealing sources of

funding and types of equipment. The next step is for the Parish Council's General Purposes Working Group to meet with Melanie and Clare to decide how to proceed.

It is possible that improved play facilities could be part of a much larger 'Parish Plan' which might incorporate a number of ways to enhance village life. Two Councillors have attended a workshop about how to implement a Parish Plan and already a small number of villagers have met for further discussion. This idea is still in its very early stages and a lot more thought and work needs to be done before it is decided whether this idea is worth pursuing further.

We were impressed to hear from Clare Soper, who is a Drayton School Governor, that the school is taking very seriously the need to use less energy and has appointed monitors to keep an eye on each class's use of electricity and gas, turning off lights and monitoring temperature. Energy use throughout the village, both in public and private space is an item that could be included in a village plan.

Once again the reservoir was a hot topic for discussion. Following a recent presentation to councils explaining the need for a reservoir, Thames Water requested a response by November 9th. Drayton PC feels the need for more time and for the aid of an independent body to help us interpret the technical data and assess situation; this is what we have asked for, although it may not be forthcoming.

The Council owns a large number of assets including the play

equipment at Lockway, some of which is about to be overhauled. All assets have to be insured and recently our treasurer, Robin Butler, has been very busy searching the village to ascertain whether all the seats, notice boards, rubbish bins, bus stops etc. etc. are where they are supposed to be. It's amazing how elusive a public seat can become!



The next meeting of the Council will be on Monday 4th December at 7.45 pm in the Caudwell Day Centre. If you have any concerns that you wish to bring to the Council or if you would just like to see how the Council operates, you would be very welcome.



WESTMINSTER LETTER

By the time you read this, the Queen will have opened Parliament (November 15th), delivered what is known as the Queen's Speech and a new session of Parliament will have begun.

The parliamentary year runs from November until the following October, and it is during this period (with the odd exception) that the Government must pass its legislation.



The Queen's Speech sets out the pieces of legislation the Government hopes to pass.

Because of publishing deadlines, I am writing this a couple of days before the Queen's speech, so this is informed speculation about what the speech will contain, with a few lines giving you my views, and an invitation to all of you to write to me with any concerns you have about it. After all, the main bit of an MP's job description is to scrutinise and vote on legislation on your behalf, so I do need to hear from you!

It looks like there will be three or four main Bills. Firstly, a Pensions Bill will establish a National Saving Scheme to support the state pension. It will also make it automatic for individuals and companies to put money into a pension, unless they specifically opt out. I like this idea, as I think it will increase saving, though I am aware of the burden it could place on business. Secondly, a Mental Health Bill has been trailed. This is an interest of mine and an area where action is badly needed. As I found when campaigning to save the Park Hospital in Oxford, for which Young Minds have nominated me for a Charity Champion Award, adolescents are too often forgotten, and I will be campaigning to ensure they are included in this Bill. Thirdly, I do, of course, welcome a Climate Change Bill but will be looking closely to make sure it is not used as an excuse to raise tax on people in rural areas who rely on their cars. Finally, there will be some more terrorism legislation and the government may well try and increase the time people can be held without charge. As most of you will know I voted against the 90-day limit last session. Many of you expressed anger at my decision, and many of you supported it - it was certainly the most controversial issue this year. I will vote against 90 days again as I believe this would be a huge and unjustifiable incursion into our civil liberties.

Let me know what you think of the Queen's speech by using the address below.


