### DRAYTON (PC) NEEDS ... YOU !!

The idea of a representative democracy is that the people sitting on the parish council are elected by the residents of Drayton to carry out the various tasks which, for good or bad, are to be decided at this level of government. I understand that of the eleven people which are thought necessary to carry out this work, **only 6 have agreed to stand for 'election'**.

I feel very uncomfortable with the situation where these six people are **effectively appointed rather than chosen** by the residents. Are these councillors to interpret the lack of interest in the parish council as a 'vote of no confidence' in them and the system and a signal to hand the job over to the District Council? Or are they to continue as before in a way which seems to have left the 2000 plus residents either disinterested or happy with the way in which things have been run over the last 4 years?

It may be that the bureaucracy involved in election process puts people off? Whatever the reason, I think that the six remaining representatives need to be told. Of course the best possible reaction to the 'news' that so many parts of the village and so many shared interests will be unrepresented, would be for at least 5 people to attend the next few meetings (see page 9) and to offer their services to be co-opted onto the Council.

The May elections should **represent an opportunity to take a turn**. The Council meet on the first Monday of the month in the Caudwell Day Centre at 7.45pm. This is the minimum commitment to which a range of responsibilities can be added; commenting on planning applications and issues, supervising the caretaking of the village, liaising with the police (the Neighbourhood Action Group), and with District and County Councillors and officers on matters of wider importance (such as transport), responsibilities for the improvement and maintenance of rights of way, and the village playgrounds and bus stops and the burial ground.

We have a very capable Clerk and village caretaker who, hopefully, should be there whatever the results of the elections, to keep the Council on an even keel and the village looking good. I can see some **very important issues** arising during the next 4 years during which it would be very unfortunate not to have a full Council to **represent all parts of the village**.

But, **without more support** it is difficult to see that the matters of housing development, the reservoir, improved recreation facilities, energy conservation (let alone a village plan) can be properly dealt with, together with the day to day matters of maintenance, grants and working with District and County Councillors.

If you need some more encouragement to join, DO **speak to me, or one of the existing councillors**. YOU COULD MAKE A DIFFERENCE. *Daniel Scharf (531107)*

### Letter from St Peter's Church

#### Dear Friends,

The Abolition of the Slave Trade Act, passed on 25<sup>th</sup> March 1807, outlawed the slave trade in the British colonies. Thomas Clarkson was one of the leading fighters in the long struggle to abolish the Transatlantic Slave Trade and slavery. His life changed when he won a Cambridge University essay prize in 1785 with the paper 'Is it legal to make slaves of others against their will?' His research on the topic convinced him that it was not only illegal but also immoral. He teamed up with William Wilberforce, a Christian Member of Parliament, and together they formed a committee that began a twenty year fight to get the law changed. It then took another 18 years to abolish slavery throughout the British held territories. It is right and proper to commemorate such events in our history, but it is often hard to know how to do it appropriately. Churches Together in England have produced some very good material which I think helps us to do that. They have given three headings which enable us to work through the issues involved :-

**Remember**: It is important to remember the past even those things which are shameful and difficult. People in the 18<sup>th</sup> century defended slavery as a valid form of labour and others made vast profits from the slaves and from their labour.

**Reflect:** People today are still profiting from others, sweat-shop owners, sex traffickers and gang masters. When you buy a cheap toy or bargain item of clothing do you stop to think who produced it and what they were paid for doing the job? It could well have been produced by slave-type labour.

**Respond:** There are many ways we can respond, but one way would be to support Christian Aid Week and their 2007 project in Senegal.

Senegal is a West African country which was a centre of the slave trade in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. French colonial control was established during the suppression of the slave trade and the country became independent in 1960. It is a very arid country with no natural resources. To add to its problems global warming is increasing the desert area. The Christian Aid project this year is to plant mango trees. These help to stabilise the soil and stop erosion, they also produce a very nutritious fruit. Ten mango trees cost £6.50 so it is both cheap and effective.

10am 'Set all Free' Service on Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> May to remember, reflect and respond to the bi-centenary of the slave trade.

10am Christian Aid Family Service on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> May to focus on the current projects of this year. Speaker David Bowman from Christian Aid.

Last year we raised over £1000 from the street collection in the village. So far we have managed to cover every street in Drayton, but many of our regular collector are getting older and would love someone to come and replace them. It is **an opportunity for someone** to give up an evening **to go round and collect**. <u>If YOU can help</u> please contact Victoria Griffiths (the Christian Aid Coordinator) on 531463.

### Wooden Spoon Recipe No. 25 (from June 1992)

<u>Apricot Pork (serves 4)</u> ingredients :-  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lb boneless lean pork (cubed), 1 tbspn veg oil, 1 onion (chopped), 15 oz can apricot halves in natural juice, 1 tbspn tomato puree, 2 tbspn wine vinegar, 3 tbspn demerera sugar, 2 tbspn Worcester sauce, 2 teaspn powdered mustard, salt & pepper to taste, 1 green pepper (seeded and finely sliced),  $1\frac{1}{2}$  tbspn cornflour, 5 tbspn water.

a. Sauté the meat in the oil in a flameproof casserole until lightly browned. <u>Do this in batches</u> or the meat will 'stew' rather than brown. Add the onion and cook until softened.

b. Drain the juice from the apricots into a bowl. Add the tomato puree, vinegar, sugar, mustard and Worcester sauce, mix and season to taste.

c. Add the tomato & spice mixture to the casserole and stir well. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for 30 minutes or until the meat is tender.

d. Add the pepper to the meat and cook for a further few minutes. Mix the cornflour with the water until smooth and stir into the casserole, add the drained apricots and cook gently until the sauce has thickened.

#### **Proposed Green Layout – Danger Awaits**

If you have not recently been reminded of, and formally responded to, the **proposed road changes on the Green** which threaten irreversible damage to the very heart of your village, **this is your last chance** to be informed and to make your views known.

As a condition of planning permission granted for 16 new houses on the Manor Farm site (10 years ago), and despite the no more than minor increase in traffic across the Green which will result, County Highways dictated that there should be just one road across the Green to join the B4017, to comply with a single planning guideline (almost certainly irrelevant in this context), supposedly in the interests of safety.

It is fully obvious to most that the lay out of the roads on the Green works extremely well and efficiently to serve the needs of cars and pedestrians using the facilities (Bus Stops, Post Office, Vickery's, Pub and Chapel). Most important of all it has an outstandingly good record of safety, as has been acknowledged through scrutiny at not one, but two Public Enquiries! It was also the view of a County's Highway's Officer who advises on safety that the additional houses would not necessitate a change.

Despite the fact that this would seem to be **the last opportunity to object** to the proposals, the plans on display on the Village notice board and in the Public Library are <u>inaccurate in detail</u> and not necessarily finalised, and could become distinctly worse, as clearly identified by the Inspector who conducted the 2002 Inquiry.

You need to envisage a road junction which, as advertised, would be equivalent to that of Hilliat Fields with the main road, and this will virtually run into the bus stop, such that buses and vehicles which park there will obscure the view of both drivers and pedestrians, and the latter will find it both intimidating and potentially dangerous to cross. It is very likely that parking on the main road will increase, with the very real likelihood of creating substantial obstruction to traffic flows at peak times, all of this adding to the potential for accidents.

On the West side of the road it is proposed that a substantial piece of pavement will be sliced off to the South of the Post Office, the extraordinary planning behind this being to encourage North moving vehicles to drive through the hard standing of the bus stop so as to 'undertake' North facing cars stationary on the crown of the road while waiting to turn right onto the Green.

If you have not as yet been offered the opportunity to formally express your views on paper, you can visit Vickery's, Geoff Dix's shop or either of the pubs to find paperwork which will give you the opportunity to do so. # YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

### MORE ON THAT WRETCHED RESERVOIR

We have just returned from three days at Rutland Water, until now Europe's largest reservoir, owned and run by Anglia Water – the UKs second largest water company.

Built in the early 1970s to supply the growing towns/cities of Peterborough, Leicester and Corby, in the face of fierce opposition from local landowners, politicians and environmentalists, Rutland Water today is a **beautiful place** <u>enjoyed by</u> conservationists, ornithologists, fishermen, cyclists and families of all ages. The locals are now delighted with it. The people of the growing towns have plenty of water and Anglia Water has slowly realised the wonderful PR opportunity it provides for them. So what are we so worried about? Why are we making life so difficult for poor Thames Water?

Well, first of all we'd like a **level playing field** on which to decide whether or not we need a reservoir. We all have to lobby our local MPs to press parliament to provide money for some truly impartial evidence.

Secondly, having gathered evidence that has been properly scrutinised, we would like a genuinely open debate on the needs – not another selling exercise from Thames Water. Thirdly, (if we get that far) we would like the opportunity to consider the <u>alternatives</u>. Rutland Water is a <u>flooded valley</u> with an intricate outline, only for about 1/2km of its 23km perimeter is there a dam with the type of building materials that TW want to use all round their reservoir. There has to be a very powerful argument that spending more on a below ground/valley reservoir would be money very well spent. It is hard to believe that such a site does not exist anywhere in the TW catchment area.

What Rutland Water teaches us is that reservoirs properly designed can be things of great beauty. What it taught Anglia Water was that mighty private monopolies are much more successful when they understand the need for very good public relations. Thames Water seem a long way from learning that lesson.  $\rightarrow$

# PARISH COUNCIL (April 2)

Apart from the Parish Councillors and County Councillors, Mr. & Mrs. Badcock, just ten members of the public attended the Annual Parish Assembly. Reports were received from the Council working groups and also from Drayton School and the Police/Council NAG (Neighbourhood Action Group).

Melanie Parker (General Purposes Working Group Chair) spoke of the encouraging progress made towards provision of leisure activities for the 11 - 15 year olds, but she also said the Damascus bus visits were suspended temporarily because of the lack of a qualified driver. She mentioned that all of the allotment plots had been let and also that a group of Councillors and others had recently inspected the village hedgerows and noted any needing attention.

Clare Soper, as Drayton School representative to the Council, said there were currently about 100 children on the roll and that the school is making an effort to forge links with the local community. To this end a joint school/church fete is being held in June. Also an environmental awareness day is arranged for June 20<sup>th</sup> and it is hoped the public will support that. The children are working towards the highest award, a Green Flag, for their environmental work. The school has also recently had a good inspection report on its provision for children with special needs.

Richard Webber spoke of the work of NAG which in Drayton is concentrated on deterring speeding drivers, the largest percentage of whom, sadly, are residents of Drayton. The next priority for the NAG team will probably be anti-social behaviour.  $\rightarrow$


