DISCOVERING THE PAST

FIFTY YEARS FROM THE CRASH Judy Henman

50 years ago a plane carrying Alsatian sniffer dogs and their handlers, flying from R.A.F. Abingdon to Malta and Cyprus, crashed on Sutton Wick. Shortly after take-off between 10.00 am and 11.00 am on March 5th 1957 the plane was found to be losing fuel and the pilot was trying to get back to Abingdon.

Maurice Hutt lived in one of the terraced cottages next to the Millennium Green (Sutton Wick entrance) in Drayton. The then 17-year-old Maurice worked for T.H. Tombs (general builders and plumbers). He had a one-hour dinner break - he could cycle home for lunch in 10 minutes. As he cycled past Gainsborough Green his uncle waved him down, he told him that a plane had crashed at Sutton Wick.



By the time he got half way to Drayton he could see black smoke and smell aviation fuel. With his heart beating fast he cycled through the wreckage area to his cottage. The front window was smashed and a large piece of wing was leaning against the house. This was about 100 yards from the crash site. His mother was in a state of shock. She'd been standing by the front window ironing when she heard a very loud unrecognisable noise. Using her knowledge of wartime procedures she moved to stand in the centre doorway of the cottage which is the strongest part of the cottage. The window where she had been standing ironing at the front of the house was shattered. She was shocked but unhurt.



THIRTY YEARS OF CHANGE Daria Stimpson

Within the 30+ years from 1780 to 1811 important events took place that changed the face of Drayton forever.

THE GREAT FIRE OF 1780

Have you ever wondered why there are not many thatched houses in Drayton? Fire was quite a common occurrence in those days but in April 1780 Drayton suffered a "disastrous" fire which started when a householder near the Wheatsheaf put out some hot ashes on a very windy day which resulted in the whole of the High Street right down to Elms Close Cottage, being destroyed. Everything - houses, barns and equipment - was lost. It was such a disastrous fire that a National Appeal was launched to help rebuild the lost houses. We have research in the shape of an old edition of the Drayton Chronicle which makes very interesting reading. Two houses still have charred beams. Pink stones maybe seen in the grey stones walls of the High Street which indicate the intensity of the fire on those walls.

THE ENCLOSURE ACT OF 1811

Drayton is one of the few parishes which still possesses its Act. Here we see how strips were taken away and fields were created by surrounding them with hedges, as we see them today. There were winners but many losers!!

With maps and schedules of the time it is possible to see exactly who lived where and who farmed what. If you would like to study the maps and other documents relating to the above events then come along to St Peter's church during the History Weekend to see them and many other historical documents.

The plane was heading for the aerodrome going low over the fields at the back of Webb's farm when one of its wings clipped some elm trees. (It was running low on fuel; it was alleged at a later date that mechanics had fitted a valve back to front and it wasn't letting fuel through). The jolt turned the plane at right angles on a collision course to the bungalows and farm. First in line was a caravan owned by Mr. James (now of Marcham Road), he and his wife were out at work. Next in line was a pre-fab where the Binnington family lived. Mrs Binnington was at home, dealing with the electric-meter reader and both of them were killed outright. The house was demolished completely. Next to the pre-fab was a cottage where Mr. & Mrs. Stanton lived. Mrs. Stanton was injured but not seriously. The plane cartwheeled and ended up with its tail on the roof of the farmhouse.

The pilot was badly burnt and lost an ear. Seventeen people were killed, 15 R.A.F. and two civilians. Many of the dogs were killed, others were shot, one lady kept one as a pet. (The others were mad with fear) There were rumours that the pilot was thrown into a cow trough to put out the flames on him. The co-pilot was found to be dead on the veranda at the farm.

Maurice's pet cat disappeared that day never to return. Nobody enquired about the part of the wing in Maurice's garden. The pilot was often seen in Drayton with terrible facial scars. He was befriended by Mrs. Beverley Smith (not her real name but named because she claimed to be first on the scene after the crash and being W.V.S. she was a great help). She was later awarded The Oak Leaf for her services.

Mr Eric Webb saved three of the crew by pulling them from the wreckage. He and Phil Richards threw Vic Hurring, the pilot, into a horse trough to put out the flames on him.

Mr Webb was later awarded The British Empire Medal and The Industrial Heroism Medal for his bravery.

SCHOOL REPORT Anita Hedditch

School welcomes two new starters to the lower unit, Arun Parkin and Laurie Gill. The lower unit also welcomes Teaching Student Louise Stewart for her placement. She has already had the children producing some wonderful art pieces in pastels and felt collage. One of their learning topics is making sandwiches, growing their own beans and making fruit salad - healthy eating options. They are also learning some country dancing, no doubt to be demonstrated in the parents' assembly.

Years 1 and 2 in Science are exploring plants by drawing what they found and documenting where they found them. Their studies have now extended to mini-beasts, examining them under a magnifier, drawing them and then letting them go. After the exams the children will be delving into sports activities including Cricket and athletics. Year 6 will join in a Junior Citizen event at Upper Heyford at the end of the month.





Report of the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 14th May

The May meeting is usually the Parish Council's AGM, when the Council Chairman is elected for the coming year and membership of the various committees and working groups and who shall chair them is decided. However, in the absence of one member of the already depleted Council and also of the holidaying Parish Clerk it was



decided to postpone these formalities until next meeting.

Several members of the public were at the meeting, some of whom have shown interest in being co-opted onto the Council. There is a serious lack of Council members and we should really appreciate more volunteers coming forward to serve the village.

The future of the Village Green was the most important matter under discussion, and in the light of some recent changes in highway planning regulations a meeting is planned between an OCC Highways' engineer and current Council Chairman, Daniel Scharf and Dr. Chris Fursdon Davis. Unfortunately the DAMASCUS bus is not touring the villages at the moment as there is nobody to drive it. This is a great loss to all the villages as the work being done by those involved with the young people has been greatly valued.

By the time you read this the Beating of the Parish Bounds walk will be in the past. But walkers may like to know that one path included in the walk has recently been made usable through our Vicar's efforts. Josie Midwinter successfully persuaded the OCC's Environment Dept. to clear the hitherto impassable footpath between the B4016 (opposite the turn to Milton) and Oday Hill. The Parish Council has been trying for two years to get the work done, but apparently Vicars have clout that Councils lack!

WESTMINSTER LETTER

It's a bit ironic, but at one of the busiest times in politics, Parliament is quite quiet. As Tony Blair departs, and Gordon Brown prepares to take over, there is not much going on in the House of Commons. Of course, the reason is obvious. There is no point in putting forward new legislation while we are waiting for a new Prime Minister. Also, with the long summer recess looming, most of the business is focused on the final

stages of Bills that started going through Parliament last autumn.

One big issue that will affect most people reading this column is the introduction of Home Information Packs on June 1st. They have caused a great deal of alarm amongst members of the public and those involved in the industry. Although the scheme is well intentioned, it simply has not been well thought through in my view. Key components such as the Home Condition Report, effectively an old fashioned survey of the building, will not be mandatory. As a result all we are left with is an ineffective shell of bureaucratic legislation, making the process of buying and selling houses more complicated and expensive than it already is. Added to this is the inadequate number of trained 'Home Inspectors' and the fact that the Government is rushing this legislation through, this could all lead to unnecessary chaos hitting our housing market this summer.

One of the most vocal groups in my constituency is cyclists. Since I started cycling to Westminster when I am in London, I have huge sympathy for their complaints. Parliament is being lobbied to make sure rail and cycling is more integrated, and I agree - there are very few facilities for bikes on trains, and almost nowhere to keep them at a station. I was shocked to learn the other day that Parliament has no cycle storage facilities - none at all - for people who visit Parliament. My visitor was told to park at St Thomas's hospital across Westminster Bridge!

I have been told that Thames Water's application for a reservoir has been delayed. This is because they must first go through a procedure required by Ofwat to consult on water needs for the future. This happens every five years. It is not all good news though. Having gone through this procedure, it means their application for a reservoir (if they proceed with it) will be heard more quickly.

The Election – for the last time!

First, I must thank 503 residents of Drayton for voting for me. I also want to thank the 250 or so who supported other candidates. With a 43% turnout, we were well above average for the Vale. The fact remains, however, that rather less than one elector in three actually voted for me and I would very much like to persuade/ cajole/encourage many more to



become engaged with local issues in the future. Whilst canvassing, I was struck by the number of households with children no longer living at home but on the electoral role in Drayton. Young people move around and are busy; it takes some organisation and forethought to arrange postal or proxy votes for them. It is possible to apply for a permanent postal vote, which lasts for as many elections as you wish, until the elector wishes to cancel it. If we are to engage young people in the electoral process, we need to make it as accessible as possible. The website www.aboutmyvote.co.uk gives details of all the postal and proxy options currently available. May I suggest that, while elections are in the mind, a very useful service that a parent can do for their busy adult offspring, is to ensure that they are not disenfranchised when away from home.

How to keep in contact?

'The trouble with you people is that we only see you at election time.' It is a fair point. If people don't see what you are doing, they think you are not doing it! Since first being elected in 2005, I have been visited by less than 20 people at my once-a-month Saturday surgeries. This does not seem a good use of time – so how should I keep in contact?

There are 863 front doors in Drayton. For a trial 12 months, I am proposing to visit every door. If no-one is in after three attempts, I will leave a calling card. I hope that in this way, I can hear about the concerns of everyone – there is certainly no substitute for speaking to people.

'Kid's Motorbikes'!

One issue that raised its head a number of times whilst canvassing, was the issue of 'Kid's Motorbikes'. Now on the market, there are bikes capable of 40mph+, driveable by youngsters of almost any age (off road), and costing under £200.

Every normal 10-15 year old boy would fancy one, but I would ask parents to think very carefully before permitting their sons (or daughters) to have one. We have a number of areas in the village where these things are already causing a public nuisance. Youngsters with (and without) helmets are driving them too close to houses, revving up unnecessarily, and driving them where they are not allowed. Roads and bridleways are supposed to be off limits to these vehicles. It is a national problem, and is almost unpoliceable either by the police or by parents. There are serious accidents just waiting to happen. Whilst we wait for the government to address the issue, I would be very pleased to hear opinions for and against (perhaps in the Chronicle?).
