- 2. A recording device such as Floppy disk, CD or DVD; *please include hard copy* for checking the formatting and *your address* so that it can be easily returned. This is still a good way to receive copy since it removes much of the work necessary in 3 & 4 below, AND should help to eliminate misprints/errors from scanner problems or dodgy handwriting.
- 3. A good, **black typescript** on white A4 paper or smaller. The scanner can read in typescripts and this is still much easier than retyping. IF you prepare text on a PC to print the output and send it to us, thanks, BUT PLEASE SEE 2 above we do return disks, honest!
- 4. Finally, hand-written items. It helps if all names of people and places are spelt out in <u>CAPITALS</u> (thanks to those who do), thus saving mistakes and possible embarrassment. You KNOW who you're writing about, but please don't assume we do too!





### **Letter from St Peter's Church**

Dear Friends,

In early July, the BBC series 'Saving Planet Earth' showed how changing climate and pressure from expanding human communities is making it difficult for certain groups of animals to survive. One programme found Graham Norton roughing it in the highland region of Ethiopia to see the plight of mountain wolves. In another Nick Knowles travelled to Borneo to observe the Orang-utans whose habitat is disappearing so fast they will probably be extinct in the next decade. I was glad however that the programme also included British wildlife as well as choosing the more exotic locations. So we went to Salisbury Plain to see the reintroduction of bustards ..... to some spooky caves to track bats and ... would you believe it the river bank to catch eels!

As the human population grows, and as we continue to face up to the challenges of climate change, we are increasingly aware of our need to change our lifestyle in order to preserve our planet for future generations. Sometimes the need to do this seems overwhelming and we feel that there is little we can do to alter the situation. It is true that global issues do have to be dealt with by Governments, but there is **much we can do as individuals** even here in our village.

For some time now St Peter's church has been promoting **Fair Trade Goods** by holding regular stalls in the church. **Purchasing these products helps whole communities** to develop a sustainable way of life and not need to call on aid or other global resources to support them.

In June the school held an Energy Day, giving useful information about how we can reduce the energy we use. They have introduced a question list to help people assess how much they are doing to bring down their energy consumption. Those who filled in the list were given a sticker - my front window now has one saying 'Green Cred: Level One'. No doubt I will have to do more to progress to Level Two.

It is good to see that so many more people in Drayton are using their Green Boxes for recyclable items - and the number of Brown Bins for cardboard and garden waste have more than doubled.

I often feel that we could do more to make the churchyard a haven for wildlife. The West churchyard is quiet and so very suitable for this purpose. In the spring we leave a section of the grass uncut so that wild flowers can seed. We have also introduced wood piles to make habitats for insects like woodlice. There is however a lot more we could do. I wonder if there are some people in the community who would like to form a conservation group to develop the churchyard in this way? We may not be able to travel to Ethiopia or Borneo ... or even Salisbury Plain. But the churchyard is just down the road and could be another piece in the jigsaw to combat the effects of global warming and endangered species.

In the book of Genesis we read that the first human beings were charged with the responsibility to care for all creation - that responsibility is still ours today.







Steventon was seething, Drayton was packed, even little Appleford was thronged, and I had to queue just to get in to Sutton Courtenay. Milton was little better. Our common history was displayed in our churches for everyone to see: our neighbours, our friends and our communities were sharing their lives with us in all their range and richness.


When I looked at my watch I found I'd spent hours in our church, and not much less in the others. How could I take so long reading about a ditch? Or looking at Victorian parish newsletters? Time flew. It was hard to know what to see next. The great fire in Drayton two hundred years ago, the horrifying Beverley plane crash at Sutton Wick in 1957, the traction-engines filmed in Appleford in the early fifties, the glories of the lace and embroidery on the christening-gowns, the meticulously-researched and sometimes chastening histories of long-gone village men who died in wars. There was the painstaking work of those who survey and record our churchyards and their memorials, the village societies, our schools then and now with the contributions of our children, the careful accounts of our parish benefactors, the ancient bequests and generosity of our predecessors, the aged maps, the strange yet familiar scenes from the postcards, the stiff figures staring at us from the photos. These long-gone people are surely just us at a remove - and we shared, and we enjoyed, and we were overwhelmed by it all.

The strawberries, coffee, cakes and tea were wonderfully restorative, but perhaps best of all was the friendliness, neighbourliness and eagerness to share. It was such a drawing-together, such a celebration of our shared pride in our communities, such an opportunity to meet, to talk, to wonder, to impart. How many hundreds of hours went into preparing this magnificent accrual of our mutual heritage? Thanks to all for the glimpses of private worlds of families, homes and lives. And thanks to everyone who made it happen.

## PARISH COUNCIL (July 2)

The most encouraging thing for the existing Parish Councillors this month was to be able to welcome yet another new co-opted member, Sarah Seaman. Now we are eight out of our permitted eleven members.

There are so many people in the village who are willing to give their time to organising events. Recently we have had the inauguration of the popular Youth Zone, the School/Church fete, the DAMASCUS villages' history weekend, and on 7th July the Community Day. There is so much to be involved in and yet there are still those who spend their time vandalising the playground. The bench has recently had its planks sawn off, and since the PC meeting the nearby lamp-post has been painted with what appears to be tar. All of this damage gives work to the village caretaker and costs the Parish Council a great deal of money – altogether dispiriting.

On a brighter note, some of the play equipment in the playground is looking rather drab and so our caretaker, Steve Sharpe, is going to give it a coat of paint along with the surrounding fence.

Because it has been such a wet summer there has been a spurt in growth and the Council has received one or two complaints about overgrown hedges and trees. We would ask residents please to take a look at their boundary hedges and cut them back if they are beginning to intrude onto the public footpath.

For those who enjoy walking Drayton's footpaths there is the good news that two new kissing gates have been installed on the path south of Eastway heading towards the golf course. This makes accessing the path easier especially for dog owners. It is hoped that by the end of the year two further gates will be in place and then all four difficult stiles will be eliminated. However, experience tells us that the OCC's timetable isn't always reliable!

Our County Councillor, Mike Badcock, told the Parish Council that in the near future he will be publishing dates of surgeries at which residents can air their views on the traffic situation in Abingdon since Abingdon Integrated Transport Scheme (ABITS) came into operation (Ed:- it's absolutely useless - next question?!).

The Council has been asked to consider putting a memorial in Sutton Wick to commemorate the aeroplane crash in 1959, which killed one resident and caused considerable damage. ### **RESERVOIR NEWS**

Public to have new opportunity for consultation on proposed reservoir - Extended consultation period made possible by amended legislation

**As you may have heard**, recent changes to government legislation have resulted in a **further period of consultation** on the proposed reservoir near Abingdon.

All water companies must now undertake full public consultations to create draft Water Resources Management Plans (WRMPs), which are submitted to the Government. The proposed reservoir near Abingdon, as a major part of our water resources plan, will become part of this broader consultation period. The move means that the period available for public consultation will be **extended by two years**, allowing more people to have their say on the proposals. It also means that any applications for work to begin will not be lodged until 2009 at the earliest. Public consultation is highly important to us and we will ensure that the comments you made during the first two stages of the consultation will be fed directly into the new consultation.

As agreed in February, a local panel will be established to ensure an ongoing dialogue with the community is maintained. The membership of the panel is being decided independently, to ensure a balanced representation of the local area and interests. ### **MEMORIES STIRRED**

As a former Beverley pilot at RAF Abingdon, I found Judy Henman's account of the Sutton Wick crash published in the June Chronicle (received via Mike Neil) most interesting. I was a 12 year old pupil at Abingdon School when the accident occurred on 5 March 1957 and I can still remember that day very clearly. It was Shrove Tuesday, and the weather was overcast with a cloud base of 300 feet and 1 mile visibility. I heard about the crash when I arrived home at lunchtime, as the scale of the disaster was becoming apparent to the outside world. The following day, most of the national newspapers published that iconic image of the Beverley's massive tail embedded in the roof of Wick Farm. One of the victims was the aircraft captain, Flight Lieutenant Gilbert, who lived with his family in East Hendred.

Out of youthful curiosity, I cycled to Drayton after school on Sat 9 March to visit the crash site. Sutton Wick Lane was very muddy, particularly the area around the village pond, and most of the large pieces of wreckage had been removed. The recovery work was still in progress, but a schoolboy in their midst was completely ignored by the salvage personnel. Amazingly, there was no police cordon in place as one would expect today.

In the weeks following the accident, questions were asked about the future of Abingdon airfield. Lord Lucas of Chilworth, who owned a house in Cothill on the airfield boundary, raised the issue in the House of Lords. He stated that the accident had created consternation and a terror stricken atmosphere in the local area and demanded that flying from the aerodrome should cease forthwith; in reply, Lord Mancroft fully sympathised with the very personal interest of Lord Lucas, but the Air Ministry had no intention of closing the airfield after the crash.

Drayton Parish Council discussed the dangers caused by aircraft flying from RAF Abingdon. The Council Chairman was Mr W Evans, whose bedroom had been wrecked by the tail of the Beverley. Mrs Binnington, who was killed when the aircraft demolished her bungalow in Sutton Wick Lane, had 3 sons and a daughter. One of her sons was an air cadet with No 2121 (Abingdon) ATC Squadron and when I joined in 1958, I met Cadet Sergeant Binnington. I have always thought that he demonstrated a tremendous strength of character and fortitude by continuing to wear an Air Force blue uniform after such a tragic personal loss.

Earlier this year, I wrote an article about the crash for the Beverley Association newsletter and in preparation I paid a visit to Sutton Wick on a pleasant spring afternoon. As I stood next to the pond, the tranquility of the scene was in stark contrast to the awful desolation I remember from 1957. I met 2 residents, Mrs Eato and Mrs Beryl Dawson, both of whom lived in Drayton at the time of the accident. They said that, even after 50 years, residents were still digging up pieces of wreckage in their gardens. Much to their regret, no monument or commemorative placque has ever been erected in the village to the memory of the 17 unfortunate people who died in the crash.

After joining the RAF in 1962, I achieved an ambition when I was posted to a Beverley squadron and I flew the aircraft without incident for 3 enjoyable years. On reflection, there is no doubt that the Drayton crash left an indelible impression on me. Every year since 1957, on 5 March at exactly 11.02 am, whatever the circumstances, I have always found a moment to reflect silently on that tragic accident which brought so much death and destruction to Sutton Wick.

### **MEMORIES FROM AFAR**

This letter was received from former Drayton resident, Dorothy Davies – now living on the Isle of Man. Ref: the 'Living History' piece recently featured, and in particular, the copy of a photograph showing Miss Ethel Russell with a horse and cart outside Forge Cottage, High Street, Drayton.

My husband, Harry Davies, and I, Dorothy Davies, owned Forge Cottage where we spent many happy years and got very involved in village affairs. Mrs Daria Stimpson and I gathered a number of Drayton residents together and started the Drayton History Group. Daria and I looked at census records and traced the names of previous owners of Forge Cottage and the blacksmiths who worked at the forge.

I met Miss Russell several times, also Mrs Winter who ran the shop at the corner of Church Lane. Walnut Tree Cottage was occupied by Mrs Darter in the 1970s. As a boy, Norman Stimpson worked in the bottom of the sawpit at the sawmill and got covered by sawdust when the trees were being cut up.

The big fireplaces inside Forge Cottage were built of bricks made at the clay pits in Drayton. The bricks were soft and rosy red in colour. We were told not to wash these bricks with modern detergents which attack the mortar between the bricks.

In past times, all the cottages in the High Street were thatched. A maid cleaning the hearth at The Wheatsheaf pub accidentally started a fire which attacked the thatched roof. It was a very windy day and the fire spread rapidly down the street, setting many rooves alight including Forge Cottage. The fire was stopped just before it reached Ann Taylor's cottage which remains the only cottage in the High Street with a thatched roof (also unique because it is a 'cruck' cottage).

There were still people living in the old almshouses when Harry Davies' family moved into Forge Cottage. Mr and Mrs Falkener lived in the first house. It was just a one up and one down cottage with no heating, water, or sanitation. The old folk got water from the tap by the road and used the one toilet at the top end of the row of almshouses.

The Drayton History Group discovered that mosaic tiles discovered at 'Dropshort' at the bottom of the High Street suggested that it may have been the site of a Roman villa.

The fields on the Culham side of this road revealed broken swords, so that may have been the site of a battle between Cavaliers and Roundheads during the Civil War.

He used to drive up London every morning for his vegetable stock, while the Midwinter fruit farms provided the apples, pears and soft fruits sold in the shop.

Harry Poulton and friends were members of the Home Guard during World War II. A group were on duty at Culham Bridge one night when they spotted white flying objects in the sky. They immediately thought that they were paratroopers and a man on a bicycle was dispatched to Abingdon to warn the constabulary of an invasion in prospect. Imagine their chagrin when the 'enemy objects' turned out to be a flock of swans flying up river in the moonlight. Harry used to tell this story with a great laugh.

I will be following the findings of 'Living History' with great interest. *Dorothy Davies*.
