

Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends,

God will teach us his ways

so that we may walk in his paths ...

They will beat their swords into ploughshares

and their spears into pruning hooks

Nation shall not take up sword against nation

nor will they train for war any more. (Micah 4: 2 & 3)

Private Charles Chainey was only 18 when he died in 1918, Lieutenant John Hobson was aged 23 when he died in Belgium in 1917. Both men where fatalities of the First World War along with 27 others from Drayton who gave their life in that conflict - and 10 in WWII and one in the Korean War. It is important that we never forget their sacrifice along with those who were injured, widowed, orphaned or otherwise affected. War always takes a heavy toll and the work of the Royal British Legion (celebrating 80 years this year) is there to help such people.

Sometimes I look at the list and wonder who they all were. What were their dreams and aspirations, which were cut short by an untimely death? And what about those left behind? Back in June we held a History Weekend in the church. As we were gathering information for the event I was handed a bundle of papers relating to one of those names. William J. Pointer had been just an anonymous name on the list. But as I looked through the papers he became Will Pointer a married man who wrote letters of devotion back to his wife. I then looked at the church records and was able to research some background. I found that Will and his wife Elsie's families had both been in Drayton for at least 3 generations. In an evening of research a name became a person - a person with a life lived here in this village.

As time goes on there will be less and less people who know the background to those on the War Memorial in the church and at the lych gate. I would like to put together an album which at least gives a summary of their life - and where they died. If you have any information please contact me and I will endeavour to put all the information together so that future generations will know the Drayton men who gave their lives for their country.

The annual **Remembrance Service** is at **6pm on Sunday 11 November** in **St Peter's church**.

This is a joint service with Drayton Baptist Church and the Royal British Legion. The preacher is Gareth Wild, a Baptist Minister, who has worked in various conflict zones. The names of all those on the War memorial will be read out and the wreaths placed in their memory. There will also be an opportunity to remember those known especially to you.

As we remember, let us also dedicate ourselves to work for peace and harmony in our community, in our country and in our world.

Let the word of God teach us his ways so that we may walk in the paths of peace.

PARISH COUNCIL (Oct 1st)

Community policing

Attending this month's PC meeting was Mark Miller, our newly appointed Police Community Support Officer (PCSO). He hopes to arrange surgeries in each of the three villages for which he is responsible and these will be advertised, so those who wish to discuss matters affecting Drayton will be able to. Mark said there had been some success in reducing the amount of speeding through the village and in making offenders aware of the dangers. On the matter of speed it was noted that the speed limit between Drayton and Preston Road is about to be **officially set at 50 mph**.

The Playground

The playground is regularly inspected by ROSPA and the recent inspection showed that in general the area is in good repair. There were one or two recommendations for minor repairs, and also some upgrading of the surrounding surfaces. These are all being dealt with by our village caretaker, Steve Sharpe.

Footpaths

An encouraging development affects those who like to walk in the surrounding countryside. Thanks to Mr. Paul Caudwell there are big improvements to the footpaths crossing the fields from east of the Burial ground to Gypsy Lane, and from Gypsy Lane to Sutton Wick. Paths that for a long while have been impassable are now wide and flat, unfortunately perhaps less good for wildlife but certainly less difficult for walkers. We shall ensure that the paths remain obvious and are kept free of crops.

Hanging holly, leaning lavender

Reiterating a request that was made in the July Chronicle, the Parish Council would ask that all residents take a look at the boundary of their gardens to **check whether trees, hedges and climbers are overgrown**. There have recently been complaints about branches hitting passers-by on the head, hedges protruding and plants intruding onto footpaths. The need for a little more **pruning** than usual is the result of our very wet summer.

Vandalism

There have been a number of incidents of damage to parish property recently, all now either made good or in the process of being so; the bench in the playground, the bollards on the B4107 by Village Green and the destruction of the letter box and bench in Sutton Wick.

Welcome pack

The PC is working to produce a 'welcome pack' for newcomers, and is also considering the possibility of finding someone to create a village website.

I am led to believe the DYCC Committee consists of Graham Bird, Ann Webb, Claire Soper and Karen Tinson. Since the above meeting, I am reliably informed that neither Claire Soper or Karen Tinson had any involvement in any discussions relating to the allocation of funds.

I was totally dumbfounded as to why Melanie Parker and Gary Hibbins were asked by Graham Bird and Ann Webb to stand up and almost grovel for financial aid towards the various youth projects they involve themselves with.

Why give £300 of DRAYTON'S money to a Basketball Club in ABINGDON (you may not know they got £500 last year!) ?

Even though Drayton Under 8s are listed as receiving $\pounds 150$, we have not received a penny from the DYCC, as I was asked to go away and provide quotes, which I have to say I found almost insulting.

I am sorry if any of this offends, but I feel the residents of Drayton Village are entitled to know how, and why, these funds are distributed.

I am very concerned at reports which are circulating regarding the way, both in choice of beneficiaries, and the manner in which distributions have recently been made, from the monies made available to the local youth by the Drayton Youth Centre Charity, set up by a trust deed in 1954 and registered as a Charity (1962).

The legal trustees are currently Paul Caudwell and I. The legal trustees have no part in the day to day running of the charity or make any decisions regarding distribution, but I would like to assure all concerned that I fully intend to do whatever is within my power to preserve the integrity of the charity and the proper use of these funds, which have been for so many years, presently are, and will in the future be, of such wonderful benefit to our local youth. I will also be looking into allegations regarding the manner in which funds are currently distributed.

This trust was set up with the following object:-

'For the religious, social, moral and physical well-being of the young people resident in the beneficial area by provision of facilities for social and physical training and recreation, and for such other charitable purposes for their benefit as shall from time to time be agreed upon', and the area of benefit is described as 'The Parish of Drayton and the Surrounding District'.

I will be asking for copies of the minutes of the recent meetings and lists of beneficiaries and once all is to hand I will call for an inquest to which all interested parties will be free to attend. The date of this inquest will be announced in a subsequent issue of the Drayton Chronicle.

Funds from the sale of the old youth hut in Marcham Rd were invested in 1982 and only the yearly interest earned (approx £2000 - £2500) is used for grants. The Capital remains fixed.

The Charity usually meets once a year and places an advert in the Chronicle for grant requests. It is not a closed shop and meetings generally last for an hour. The present committee (4 persons) was re-elected last year and **would welcome any Drayton Villagers who wish to participate** in its running.

The Standing Committee will meet should an application for funding be received in between the yearly meetings.

Melanie Parker represented the community day event which had already received funding from the Parish Council. The application was for a non-specific amount re the young peoples' activities that day - a donation was made to cover the cost of the bouncy castle.

The Damascus Project submitted 2 applications (Gary Hibbins represented them). They requested funding for a professional counsellor to carry out one to one counselling work for a few vulnerable youngsters, projected costs to be approx £600 over a 3 month period. The Charity awarded a grant of £200. At the same time the charity awarded £150 to cover the Village Hall hire costs for the next 12 months for the Youth Zone project.

The basketball club has a number of boys from the village in the club and since there are no sports hall facilities in the village, they play and train in Abingdon. This satisfies the criteria in the above mentioned mission statement.

At the 2006 meeting there were 5 applications requesting similar amounts so each applicant received $\pounds 500$

Since a number of youth organisations apply every year, (eg the Brownies, the School, Pre School playgroup, Drayton Toddlers), it is clear to the committee what their function is and a request is always made for a specific item requiring funding.

At no point is any youth group representative made to 'grovel'; if the committee are unsure of the workings of a particular group, for instance Damascus, then surely by asking questions the committee will become more knowledgeable.

Why GARD is wrong

Yes, I thought that might get you going. And while we are at it, why COG (A very well meaning group interested in maintaining Community use of the Old Gaol) and 'Save Radley Lakes' (A well meaning group concerned with npower's plans to fill a lake with fly ash from Didcot Power Station) are also wrong.

The problem is not that their objectives are wrong but that the media find their activities and their approach sells so much better than democracy. To some extent they are outside the law, they represent the people more directly than elected authority, their activities being so focussed on single issues, their ideas are immediately comprehensible, of course direct action sells more newspapers. And the whole process is self sustaining. More newspapers means more noise, more noise in itself makes an end so much easier to achieve. So pressure groups become things to admire, fighting for the common man, against injustice and authority. Pressure Groups good, elected authorities bad.

Since I took on this job, I have become increasingly aware of the general disillusionment with politics and politicians be they local, regional or national. Election turnouts of 40% and less underline the problem. As I write, there is the very real prospect of a General Election in which about a third of the country will reluctantly decide which political party will run the country for the next 4 or 5 years. Most of us will not know the difference and most of us will not care. (To be fair, while the parties are offering very similar things, most of us may be right.)

 \rightarrow >> But even if GARD, COG and Save Radley Lakes are unelected, unrepresentative and wield far too much pressure via a media too ready to glorify and stimulate their activities, surely they still have an important function.

Just as I would not wish to abolish 'The Sun' (even if it were possible), I would not wish to limit the activities of pressure groups. The problem is that however well-meaning the media and the pressure groups may be, their activities are at least in part responsible for the growing disillusionment with elected authorities. They help to feed the idea that 'The only people who will give you the truth and who will speak without a hidden agenda are those who are not tainted by politics.'

As your elected District Councillor, I am not allowed to get too political (quite rightly), but GARD (bless 'em) were given a sizeable space ** to say almost what they chose in last month's issue of the Chronicle (and that is, of course what got me going).

(** Ed's note:- looking back at the last issue, I'd estimate that Richard's text this time is about twice the size of that 'Water Demand and Supply' piece!).

What then should a well meaning pressure group be doing that it is not now doing in order to push its cause? Well first I suggest that 'pressure groups' should never forget that that is what they are. Unelected bodies who should be very careful not to claim that they represent anyone but themselves. Of course they are welcome to express their views and should be encouraged to do so. As with GARD, pressure groups often have levels of knowledge and expertise that would be of great use to elected authorities in making decisions on behalf of those that elected them, but so often by acting as 'anti-authority' they make it harder than ever for elected authorities to come to rational decisions.

Over the past year, I have spent many hours talking and listening to Thames Water, the Environment Agency, OFWAT, the District and the County Council. Much of what I have learnt has to be confidential (people would not talk to me if it wasn't!). The trouble with confidentiality is that the media and others can so easily claim that it is hiding skulduggery and secret dealing. As your elected Councillor, I can assure you that I have seen absolutely no evidence of it. On the contrary, I have witnessed a large number of people, of all political persuasions wrestling with the distinction between what is fact and what is merely opinion, and if you don't believe me, you can remove me at the ballot box. – which is more than can be said for GARD, COG and the rest.

No-one knows how a Compulsory Works Order will operate in practice, but we can be sure that Thames Water will find it much easier to rule us if we insist on being divided. Our best hope for a well thought-out conclusion to the issue must be for us all to work together *through* our elected authorities. We must trust them. The alternative is to let the pressure groups and Rupert Murdoch rule the world. **Richard Webber**
