So, the weekend of the 29th Feb, 1st & 2nd of March, everything will be taken out of the storage space and the boiler room and assessed by its owners to keep or get rid, and the space will be given a good clean and a coat of paint. The Damascus group have offered to help us and all who have anything stored in this space needs to be there or remove it before hand. The Hall needs a good tidy up; we are getting overwhelmed by equipment.

After a short discussion it was decided unanimously to NOT TAKE ANY MORE 18th BOOKINGS. We have given it a trial of 18 months, the abuse to the staff, the damage to the building inside and out and the intolerable mess inside and out is unacceptable to us so that's it. So from now on, the persons booking the hall will need to be 21 and over.

Two ideas were put to the committee by a member of the Parish Council as something for our comments. They caused quite a stir, as many thought the ideas were good for the first but the second required more thought. This was a shelter for young people to gather in, (this was discussed 35 years ago when my children were of this age group, nothing changes it just goes round and round). The second was an extension to the football club building to accommodate space for youngsters to change in and use away from the older users. We all agreed that it sounded a good idea, and would back it. We await further news on this.

Christmas is just around the corner and a small group of us will be putting up the decorations on Monday 3rd December, if you can help please do so. We aim to do it between 5 & 7pm.

Finally it is with great sadness that our treasurer gave us the news that he is leaving the village for countries new in the summer. I can't tell you how sad we all are that we are losing him, but obviously are pleased for him.



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LETTER FROM REVD JOSIE MIDWINTER

Dear Friends

An integral part of Christmas is singing Christmas carols, whether you are in church, at home or down the pub, we can all open our mouth and sing with gusto. In fact the more gusto the better - carols are there to tell a story which needs to be heard by everyone. Carols were originally songs composed to accompany traditional dances and so were intended to have catchy tunes so that everyone could join in. (The word carol is from the Italian *carola* which means 'ring dance') It is only later that they came to be particularly associated with Christmas.

One of our most popular carols was written all because the church organ broke down just before Christmas and could not be fixed in time for the Christmas Eve service. Father Joseph Mohr, was assistant priest in the church of St Nicholas high up in the Austrian alps. He was determined to have something to present at the service and so he sat down and began to compose suitable words. He took his draft to his friend Franz Gruber who was the local school teacher. Gruber was so impressed with Father Mohr's words that he immediately began to work on the music. Together they completed the whole thing by Christmas Eve. At the Mass they both sang their new carol to the accompaniment of Gruber's guitar. The carol made a deep impression upon the parishioners, as it has on succeeding generations.

The Carol they composed is the one we know as 'Silent Night' and it does indeed convey a sense of holiness and calm which fills us with anticipation of what is to come as we enter into the atmosphere of the birth of Jesus. As the baby Jesus is born then the tension builds as shepherds and angels begin to fill the skies with praise. It all points to the climax in the final verse which tells us *why* Jesus is born.

Son of God, love's pure light radiant beams from Thy holy face

with the dawn of redeeming grace -- Jesus, Lord at Thy birth.

This is what we celebrate at Christmas - Jesus, Lord of All, coming to live among us and bringing us God's love and forgiveness in a unique and special way.

There will be many opportunities over the Christmas period to sing this and many other favourite carols. There is the village Carols Service on the 9th and then Carol Services at St Peter's and the Baptist church on the 16th. Also Midnight Communion at St Peter's and a 10am service on Christmas morning which is for all the family. See adverts elsewhere in the magazine for more details.

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
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WESTMINSTER LETTER Ed Vaizey

Although I get involved in a lot of local issues, my day job is to try and represent you and your views in Parliament. The beginning of November saw the State Opening of Parliament, and the Queen's Speech, when the Government set out its programme of legislation for the next 12 months. This seems a useful opportunity to tell you what is coming up, to hear your views, and to let you know how I intend to vote on each issue. There are a lot of Bills being put forward that are likely to affect us all in the years to come. To begin with, there is the Government's flagship Bill which will raise the school leaving age from 16 to 18. This means that children will stay on either at school, or if they are working, their employers will have to ensure that they are receiving some kind of formal training. The change, described as the biggest in education for sixty years, will cost about £1 billion. I am opposed to this legislation, which I think tackles the problem from the wrong end. In my view, it would be much better if the money went into early years education, and getting the basics right, rather than being spent on keeping unwilling young adults in education. Let me know what you think, especially if you have young children who will be affected by this change. Another major Bill is the Climate Change Bill, which was supported by the Conservatives and the Liberal Democrats, so I imagine I will be voting for it! The Bill will set binding targets to reduce carbon emissions, and will force the Government to set out a plan to achieve this. The most controversial Bill is likely to be the Counter Terrorism Bill. Last year the Government tried to extend the period without detention for terrorist suspects from 14 days to 90 days. I voted against the move and eventually the Government compromised on 28 days. Now they want to try again and extend the period to 56 days. When I voted against 90 days, I got a huge amount of criticism from you - my constituents. But I am afraid that I will probably vote against 56 days as well. I don't think we should sacrifice our hard-earned liberties in this way. Other controversial Bills will be the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Bill, which will up-date regulations concerning the use of human embryos; the Planning Bill, which will make it easier to impose large-scale developments on communities; and, of course, the Bill which introduces the EU Treaty/Constitution without a referendum! I look forward to hearing your views on these or any other issues of concern.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Jennifer Pooley

Meeting on Monday 5th November 2007

The usual meeting was preceded by a three quarter hour public meeting addressed by two representatives from Thames Water. Although it had been previously publicised, only a few interested residents attended. David Cooke from TW explained that a recent statutory requirement, placed on all water companies, is for the production of Water Resources Management Plans (WRMPs). These will set the framework for demand management and new resources for the next 25 years. Whilst studies already show that a reservoir will probably be included in Thames Water's plans it may be subject to change; and it does mean that Thames Water has to take another look at its plans, feeding in all the information from Stages 1 and 2 of its previous exercise. There will be further public consultation (via public meetings and web-based consultation) before an interim WRMP report on the feedback is published in autumn 2008. The final WRMP is due to be published in July 2009. There may also be a hearing ordered by the Secretary of State for DEFRA should it be deemed necessary. All of this means of course that final decisions about whether the reservoir should be built have been delayed by another two years.

Eleanor Taylor from TW's communications department gave a provisional report on the results of the stage 2 public consultation, carried out early this year. This showed that the secondary uses for the reservoir preferred by the public, should it be built, were nature conservation, walking/cycling/bridleways and picnic, play and viewing areas.

As to the rest of the PC meeting further business was just routine. However, specially noted was the work and dedication of the members of the voluntary management committee who are responsible for the ongoing success of the DAMASCUS Youth work. Together with Gary Hibbins and his team of leaders they enable the young people in five villages to enjoy regularly meeting together. In the light of the recent Village of the Year award for the DAMASCUS project the PC sent a letter of appreciation to the Management committee.

Dear Editor,

I would like to respond to Councillor Webber's item in last months Chronicle when he wrote about pressure groups, he states that they have no power and are interfering in politics. As he surely knows these groups have always had a place in a democratic society long before the days of media hype and have made huge differences to people's lives such as the suffragette movement.

I have been a member of COG (Community in the Old Gaol) for the past year. This group represents many thousands of people who wish to see facilities and amenities for all ages in the Old Gaol when it is sold to a developer by the District Council.

Abingdon is Drayton's nearest town, the centre is now devoid of any facilities. What did local politicians do for the cinema which remained empty for eighteen years? When walking around the village with a COGs petition I didn't meet a person who refused to sign it and was thanked by many for my efforts regarding the future of the Gaol. Surely our local Councillor should be offering his support to COG and his constituents views. Yes there are and always will be people who do not trust politicians and prefer to attach themselves to a non-political group and who can blame them!

At COGs rally on the 20th October in the Market Place we were fortunate to be supported by a prominent politician. Evan Harris, Abingdon's MP, spoke words which should be a wake up call for all Vale of White Horse councillors. In his speech, he thanked COG for all their efforts and said we were doing our best to lobby people who have, after all, been elected to take a decision on the Old Gaol, not just in the interest of the Council but also in the interest of the people.

Dear Editor,

Councillor Richard Webber wrote last month to Drayton people under the heading "Why GARD is wrong". Nothing in his text suggests that GARD is wrong or inaccurate in the facts it has published recently about the reservoir proposals. CPRE is also speaking out against the project which both say is not an essential resource. Councillor Webber's complaint is that single issue pressure groups are not elected, distract from the process of decision making in local government and undermine the public's view of politicians! If the politicians are not properly informed, have limited technical background, close their doors to well researched advice and work in secret, who else will protect the public? When one-sided and incomplete information is published by Thames Water concerning the need for and effects of this proposed reservoir few can challenge them. GARD can and does do so. The reservoir proposal affects both Drayton and the whole area's future very seriously and the public should be made aware of all the information. The Vale's Reservoir Advisory Group (RAG) which meets in private and the minutes of which are confidential has to date not welcomed input from GARD which is non-political and well informed with properly researched facts. I hope this situation will be rectified in future.

Thames Water has a strong vested financial interest in the project which would be paid for by water customers, whereas there are ample cheaper and more effective water resource options. The company has spent large sums on this commercial venture already. Meanwhile the Vale, which has no responsibility for water supply, but only planning duties regarding building on flood plains, flood prevention and dealing with the effects of flooding, and appears to be as interested in the potential planning gain (meaning roads and recreation facilities that might result from the proposals) as the adverse aspects and the actual need for the project.

GARD's information has been welcomed by OFWAT and discussed in detail with the Environment Agency which has so far

reserved judgement, while Thames Water has gone away to think up new figures. Our politicians must always be accountable and GARD is keen that Councillor Webber takes advantage of its technical and factual input which it will also continue to bring to public attention. Let me explain a few things to you all. Graham Bird is our treasurer, Karen Tinson is our secretary and I am chairman of this small charity. Claire Soper is the standing committee member (this means any requests for help between the regular meetings includes Claire so that we have another person to give a view on the request). This to my knowledge has happened twice in 25 years. She has no other function over and above anyone else who attends the meeting on the day. The requests are submitted to Karen, passed to Graham, he then brings me a copy of the letters a day or so before the meeting so that I can read them. Usual practice in any group, I believe.

I have attended every meeting of this charity except one (last year). Firstly as an independent overseer (WI), then as youth club rep then back to overseer, and for a few years as a standing committee member, when I was not party to any pre meeting information either. The format of the meetings has changed very little since the days of the first meeting. Then grants were discussed in front of the recipient and if you were last you had what was left, now Graham goes through all the previous years gifts and assesses what we have against what has been asked for, also what it is to be used for. The suggested amounts are read out at the meeting following the letters from the organisations, before any cheque is signed all are given the chance to contest the amounts for any reason. It took Mr Evans three months to decide he wasn't happy with the grants.

Both Melanie and Gary were first time applicants as was Mr Evans. So, when it came to their request, they were both asked to explain a bit more about it, to us, and for the benefit of the other people. That is not grovelling, that is pure interest shown by us in what they were intending to do with the money given. This is nothing new, all the others, at some point have been asked the same question if their letter did not clearly state their request. In past times, I was asked to have a definite project in mind for the youth club, not just a request for funds. So I went and trawled the shops for prices of a stereo system, and that is what we got with the money. Perhaps I should have cried out, but I respected their position and did as I was bid.

The three letters stated why they wanted the money but no exact figures were quoted. None of the three applicants were asked to stand up and grovel, all were asked to explain what their requests were to be used for as I was not totally clear. Further explanation was needed, about what one to one counselling was and how much a football kit cost. Quite reasonable requests you would have thought, but not for Mr Evans.

If Mr Evans had attended more than one meeting he would have known that Abingdon Eagles were told when they first applied that we would help them to get established, say three gifts and that would get them up and running. All five applicants got £500 last year because only five applied, so each got a share of the total.

Mr Evans and Drayton under 8's went away with nothing from the meeting for several reasons which he has failed to mention. Firstly, when he was asked how much a kit cost, we were told about £500. When I queried that figure, I was told that was for a team, not one kit, even then he didn't know how much the kits would cost individually. He was asked to 'pop round and see me' by Graham when he had a better idea of the kit's cost. If that was grovelling, he has never grovelled. Secondly we need a definite sum to put on the cheque, about £500 is not good enough. We are custodians of this money and have to be seen to obey the charity rules. Thirdly no-one was asked to do any thing that was any different from any other year. We three give freely of our time, as he does, we don't expect medals but do expect a modicum of gratitude, as he does for running his football team.

I have been a resident of Drayton for almost 50years and worked for the PTA now FODSA, for 15 years, W.I. for 35 years, Drayton Hall for 33 years and DYCC for 25+ years. I hope during that time I have done a little good for those organisations, but Drayton is a very hard village to motivate, as Mr Webber stated recently. There are very few reasons why people cannot give a little of their time for the good of others. Perhaps they are afraid of getting letters published in the Chronicle, decrying their efforts. I know after this I have seriously considered giving it all up and retiring as I am thought so little of, what's the point.

Finally, I think I can safely say, there is not an organisation or business in this village that would survive if it wasn't for outside members coming in to keep them viable, so why should we discriminate between them. The charity states 'for individuals and groups of young people in Drayton and surrounding area'.

I have not gone out of my way to upset any one with this letter, that is not my way. I have tried to stick to all the facts, as I remember them, and the last thing I would do would be to upset any one. That's why I find it so hard to understand why this man has such a grievance against myself and Graham.


