We are now well into the Handicap Shield. Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends,

Snowdrops round the tree stump Sun glinting on frosty grass Blackthorn blossom in the hedgerows The first cuckoo

All of these are signals that Spring is already on its way and this year it seems to have come very early. I love going down to the church early in the morning to see all the new growth and the hear the bird song. The daffodils are already in bud and will soon flower. In Germany they are called 'Easter Trumpets' and that is a very apt name for them as they seem almost synonymous with the Easter season.

EASTER:- The message of Spring is very close to the message of Easter which forms the central understanding of Christianity. Spring is about new growth, new hope after a dark and cold winter. It is part of the promise of God that we will never be without the Springtime and the Harvest. Sometimes in the darkest days of winter it does seem as though it is going to go on for ever and ever. THEN Spring comes and we have a distinct lift of the spirits - there is hope for the future.

TRUMPET:- We are very used to the presence of angels in the Christmas story we tend to forget they are also there at Easter to trumpet the message that Jesus is risen from the dead. The call is then taken up by Mary Magdalene, Peter and John and the other disciples. "**Jesus Christ is risen today - Hallelujah!!!!"**.

EASTER TRUMPETS:- The hope, and peace, and love of Easter has to be repeated every year because it is not a message of history but a message of God's love for his people today and everyday. Each one of us, that calls themselves a Christian, is in a way an 'Easter trumpet' echoing the words of the disciples: "**Jesus Christ is risen today – Hallelujah**"

The world in which we live is in a sorry state and it is not difficult to find places where there is no peace, no love - therefore little or no hope.

This is why St John records these words in his gospel:-

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son,

that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal

life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. (John 3:16 & 17)

On Palm Sunday (16 March) we will have a dramatic reading of the Easter narrative at the 10am service which puts the story across very powerfully. It is an opportunity to absorb the words and see how they build up to the climax of Jesus dying on the Cross. The following Sunday, Easter Day (23rd), the triumph of resurrection can be proclaimed.

Easter Trumpet become Easter Triumph

Jesus Christ IS risen from the dead

and we can all have a share in his triumph - Hallelujah!!!!!





ED VAIZEY - Your Local MP

I am not sure how much joy we will get from the Environment Agency on flood defences, following the chaos from last year. If January was anything to go by, flooding looks like it will become increasingly common, but the EA does not seem to have the money to carry out engineering works. It has said, however, that it will oppose building on the flood plain, which is one piece of good news.

The new year came with the news of voluntary redundancies being sought at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory in Harwell. The lab is run by the Science and Technology Facilities Council, which has an £80 million deficit. It is a ludicrous position to be in, to be sacking some of the country's top scientists for what is, in Government terms, a very small amount of money. I held a debate on the subject and will be pressing the Government very hard to sort out this mess.

Parliament has been unusually lively. In January, we debated proposals to abolish the crime of blasphemy, which have been put on hold while the Government consults the Church of England. I support proposals to abolish this law, which has not been used for almost a century. We also debated changing the law to allow householders greater protection when they use force against burglars.

Neighbourhood update for Abingdon South

This is the neighbourhood update from Sgt Andy Cranidge (Thames Valley Police) for Feb '08.

At the last Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) for this area it was decided that South Abingdon would become part of Abingdon Town NAG and the villages of Drayton, Sutton Courtenay and Appleford would remain as Abingdon South NAG.

The residents of the villages will soon receive the local parish plan questionnaires and it is the intention of the NAG to review these when received, to look at re-engaging with the residents to identify if the speeding priority is still at the forefront of villagers' concerns. There has been work ongoing with the speeding priority with special constables undertaking speed enforcement in and around the villages.

It is with regret we said goodbye to Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) Mark Miller as he has now left to become a police constable. His post will be filled in the very near future.

The next process to be undertaken is an Environmental Visual Audit (EVA) where members of the NAG will go out to the neighbourhood and record areas of that are suffering from graffiti, damage, littering etc. This will then be fed back into the NAG and a series of remedies sought to fix the issues as soon as possible.

NOT A HOME OF THEIR OWN

But YOU can change that!

All round the country there are Pet Rescue centres, with thousands of stray or cruelly abandoned animals - can you give one of them a second chance?

Mostly they are cats and dogs of course, but there are plenty of other animals waiting for a home. Rabbits, gerbils, hamsters, ferrets, rats (the nice clean sort!) etc can all be found at a variety of centres, plus there are refuges for horses, and caged birds too, should you want one.

Unfortunately many people choose a puppy or a kitten if they get a new pet, I say unfortunately because although they can be a lot of fun, there are just so many older pets that get overlooked. And 'older' doesn't mean really old; all the centres have experience of relatively young animals, maybe just 3 or 4 years old, which get stuck for months in their kennels or cattery, no fault of their own. Bear in mind that a slightly older pet is less likely to whizz up and down the curtains, play skittles with your favourite ornaments, or chew vigorously through your clothes and shoes (or you!).

There are plenty of fairly local rescue sites to consider if you can help; Blue Cross and RSPCA are very well known, but very often insist that their animals are to be the only pet in the household, and are not suitable for children - hardly ideal pre-conditions with so many animals needing help?!

Here are a few suggestions if you are considering a new, or perhaps extra pet, either now (hopefully) or perhaps later in the year. \rightarrow >>>>

PARISH COUNCIL (Feb 3rd)

CAN YOU HELP?

Drayton is allowed eleven councillors in all; currently we have seven, six of whom were able to attend the recent meeting. Being so short of Councillors puts a heavy burden on the existing Council, so once again I have been asked to **emphasise the urgent need** for **more residents to offer their services**.

The Parish Council has several sub committees and working groups dealing with finance, upkeep and provision of village amenities, rights of way, conservation and planning. The new Council year starts in May, with membership of the various committees being agreed. If you have a little spare time and an interest in helping to make Drayton a good village in which to live please think seriously about volunteering to join the Council. The Chairman (contact details in the new Drayton Village leaflet) or any Council member would be delighted to hear from you.

PLEASE - Don't Leave it THERE !!

One member of the public brought to the Council's attention a problem that affects one or two roads in the village, especially the fairly new ones off the B4107 & B 4016. Some people park their cars very close to the exit of fairly narrow residential roads in which they themselves do not live. An added problem is that cars parked so close to the road entrance force recycling and emergency or large vehicles to drive over and badly damage grass verges. Improvements

Some recent improvements in the village were reported. There is a new litter bin in the children's playground, **thanks to Drayton Brownies**, who recently raised a large sum of money towards its cost. Following the vandalism to the bus shelters, better lighting is to be provided for the most vulnerable one (to help deter vandals who prefer to work in the dark!). Our caretaker, Steve Sharpe, is working on making two new notice-boards to replace the shabby ones at Eastway and outside the newsagent's shop. He is also doing a good job of improving the surface of Gravel Lane and Sutton Wick paths, which connect Sutton Wick to the centre of Drayton and are always very muddy in wet weather.

Eastway and Kiln Lane are also in poor condition. Both are officially bridleways but Eastway also being residential, which is not the case for **Kiln Lane which should not be used by vehicles**. The Parish Council is in ongoing dialogue with the County Council about ways to improve both.

Allot me one?

The Council spent some time discussing the provision of allotments for which there is now a waiting list. A new tenancy agreement is being drawn up for those renting an allotment. Also discussed was provision of opportunities for members of the public to find out about and comment on planning applications in the village. This is a little difficult as plans are submitted at frequent but irregular intervals. However, the Parish Clerk always puts agendas and minutes of Council meetings on the various notice boards, so if planning interests you that is the place on which to keep an eye.

Pointing the Way

It is well over two years since the Council decided to reinstate some of the historic footpath names in the village. For reasons beyond the Parish Council's control and too complicated to explain, it has taken until now for the work to be completed. Even now Barrow Way sign is mistakenly worded (to be corrected by the OCC some time in the future). Anyway Kiln Lane, Gypsy Lane, Rook's Nest, Frogmore Tree and Barrow Way have now all got their new finger posts.

Youth Workshop

On Saturday March 29th The Damascus Youth Project will be holding a workshop between young people and adults in Drayton as a spring board for **inter-generational community interaction**. The event will be held at Drayton Village Hall from 10.30am - 12.30pm with a buffet lunch for anyone who would like to stay on and discuss points raised. **All welcome**.






