## THE SYMBOLIC DONKEY

Donkeys have had a long association with the Christian story. A donkey carried Mary to Bethlehem with Joseph walking beside her. And surely there was a donkey in the stable watching the birth of Jesus; even if none are mentioned in the Bible at this point we have come to imagine that there must have been one there. Donkeys after all were the mode of transport for many poorer people. Mary could easily have ridden one on that Bethlehem road. We do know that Jesus rode on a donkey into Jerusalem, or rather a colt, a young donkey. Donkeys symbolise humbleness and gentleness. Someone riding on a donkey must be coming in peace and love. These characteristics are clear in both the Christmas and Palm Sunday stories.



Here in Drayton we had a donkey (Tracey) on Good Friday to lead our procession from the Baptist Church to St Peter's Church. Although there is no donkey mentioned on the road from Pilate's house to Golgotha, where Jesus was crucified, it is not out of place in this situation. In our procession we were remembering Jesus's journey from Palm Sunday to Good Friday, and also his and the donkey's humbleness, gentleness, peace and love.

But perhaps the strongest link to the donkey comes on its back; in the cross marked across its shoulders and down its back. Our Good-Friday donkey carried our faith's best-known symbol.

## NATURAL DRAYTON TIME

Thanks to a generous donation from Drayton's 'Charity of Robert Corneville', the Millennium Green Trust, set up to create and care for our beautiful Millennium Green, has begun a major refurbishment of the MG sundial.

Both the previous sets of clock-face numbers just failed to cope with the twin onslaughts of British weather and Drayton vandalism. The new ones are granite and set into the side of the sundial wall rather than its top. We hope they will resist rain, frost and wilful damage more successfully than the others, though the gold letters will need maintenance every now and again. You will see that two of the numbers, the early morning VI and VII, are not yet there. Please be patient!



Nor is there, nor ever has been, anything to cast the sun's shadow on the numbers in the sundial wall. A sundial's shadow-casting device is called a 'gnomon', from the Greek 'the man who knows', and to cast the shadow correctly it must be placed in the centre of the circle of numbers and lean to the north at an angle to the horizontal of the latitude of the site ( $51.6^{\circ}$  for Drayton). Until we have a gnomon you can try casting the shadow yourself. Facing north from the centre is easy enough; just stand on the central mosaic and face the number XII. Defying gravity by leaning at  $51.6^{\circ}$  is more difficult and unless you are a capable gymnast it might be better to wait for the gnomon that the Trust will install when it has enough money to do so.

You can hasten that day by making a donation to the MG Trust or, better still, becoming a 'Friend of the Millennium Green' and giving regularly to help maintain it. In either case please contact the Trust chairman, Nick Hamilton, on 559291!

Oh! And even if you can lean at  $51.6^{\circ}$ , you must remember that sundials tell us the 'natural solar time' where they are positioned. In any place's solar time the sun is (on average) at its highest point in the sky at mid-day. Drayton's 'natural solar time' is just 5 minutes later than Greenwich Mean Time, which means you have to add an hour and 5 minutes to the sundial's reading of Drayton Time to get the British Summer Time we use in summer!





#### LETTER FROM REV JOSIE MIDWINTER

Dear Friends,

In Ghana they say: 'One stick can be easily broken. But many, bound together, are strong'.

Life is tough in Ghana, on your own you can easily be 'broken' by poverty, lack of education, disability. Idrissu had all that and more because he was born deaf. On his own he probably would have lived a 'broken' life begging on the



streets. But he was not entirely on his own because Idrissu became linked by Christian Aid to an organisation which could help him. It was still not easy, but bound together with others he had strength. So against all odds he overcome his poverty and physical disability to train to be a teacher. Then with incredible determination he also taught himself sign language and now works alongside others with disabilities to access debt relief money. By joining together, Idrissu and his community have gained access to free healthcare and the resource centre, to which they are entitled. His story proves the truth of the Ghana proverb. Many people joined together can make a difference. Christian Aid does not want to give people 'hand outs' but work with communities to help them achieve that corporate strength then they make the changes themselves. It has worked well in Ghana and a number of other countries too.

This story of Idrissu also illustrates the story of Pentecost (or Whit Sunday). When Jesus was arrested and taken away for crucifixion the disciples were afraid and they ran away. At that point they could easily have been 'broken' and scattered and there would have been no Christian church. However after his resurrection Jesus appeared to the disciples and promised them that he would send the Holy Spirit to strengthen and guide them. On the first Pentecost the Holy Spirit came to the disciples and they were completely changed. They were no longer individual 'sticks' which could easily be broken, but were bound together by the Holy Spirit. They became bold and strong and began to proclaim the Christian message. One of the things that was characteristic of that first band of Christians was there willingness to help others in need. So it seems very appropriate that this year Christian Aid week begins on Pentecost Sunday.

**Sunday 11th May is Pentecost Sunday** and at our 10am service we will have Chris Ward of Christian Aid to tell us more about the work they do. During the week there will be a house-to-house envelope collection. Last year the people of Drayton gave over £1200 (see Victoria's letter on page 3) and across the country £14.7 million was raised. So we are counting on your support yet again. Your single donation may seem like only a small 'stick' but joined together with others it makes a mighty 'bundle' which can help so many people like Idrissu fulfil their dreams.




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## **BRIDGING the AGE GAP**

In March, young leaders from the DAMASCUS Youth Project welcomed 35 adults and young people for Drayton's first ever inter-generational workshop, in Drayton Village Hall.

Groups of adults and young people worked together to discuss the questions:

- Why is it important to know other age groups in our village?
- What are the barriers between age groups in our village?
- How can we get to know other age groups in our village?

The feedback from young people was fantastic. "It was nice to see that we can all get along" "I enjoyed meeting the adults" "I think we should do this again". These quotes are from young people who previously felt that the adults in the village didn't care about them and just thought they were all trouble-makers.

We need to build on this day and work really hard to bring the community together more. The young people are extremely keen to be more involved with their village and what a shame that we overlook so much talent.

#### Summary of Feedback:

#### Why is it important to know other age groups in our village?

• Helps us to understand people and their problems, to share ideas and opinions.

• Encourages respect and reduces stereotypes (which can cause barriers)

 Improves communication and brings people together, e.g. Community Day

• Helps us to get to know each other as individuals and therefore reduces fear of each other and bad vibes

Helps us not to label people, we are all equal

## What are the barriers to getting to know other age groups in our village?

• We don't attend the same events, there is lack of integration, as we tend to stay with our own age groups, and don't think we share the same interests

• Young people feel misunderstood 'we are not the thugs of the village' 'people need to get to know us'

• Appearance plays a part in this and different 'language' spoken by young people

• Adults feel a sense of fear and intimidation by 'gangs'; national media stirs these fears up

Young people would like to get to know older people

• Young people don't say 'hello' to older people as they feel they might be rude back

All age groups feel threatened when not knowing each other

Older people have less time

• It can be intimidating for young people to meet new people and attend an older persons group, there is a lack of confidence for some young people

• Feeling that sometimes promises /expectations made are not adhered to

#### What can we do to get to know each other?

- More Community Days!
- Mixed Group Activites ie football/cricket matches;
- Saying 'hello' and making eye contact with each other;
- Different age groups organising events together;
- More days like today to improve integration;

• Better information for young people about various organisations and things to do in Drayton;

- Free tasters for young people to try out new group/activites;
- Exchanges with different age groups attending each others activities e.g. young people could attend Bingo!
- Improve facilities for young people i.e. teen shelter;
- Involve young people in volunteering opportunities within the community

Make sure we revisit suggestions and report back on actions.

#### **RECREATION FACILITIES**

#### **Melanie Parker**

At the Annual Parish Assembly last week, the point was raised that there hadn't been a recent update on the situation regarding improved recreation facilities. As some of you may know I have been looking at ways we might improve the recreation facilities in the village and in particular those for the young people.

The area in Lyford Close was surveyed as a possible site for more play equipment but the rules on play areas and their proximity to houses rendered it impossible to develop this land. However, it is an attractive open space with natural ramps that is used by bike riders and youngsters for unstructured play.

The area of land by the village hall is available to all and is well maintained by the football club and the village hall management but there is no free space for play equipment. No other land is currently available. Although there are other possibilities and they are being explored, they are long term as they involve complicated planning applications and must be integrated with much larger planning objectives which are out of our hands.

So, for now, we are concentrating our efforts on the Drayton Youth Zone and the Monday Drayton Drop In evenings for young people at the village hall (see advert on page 12). We are looking for more volunteers to take part in these evenings. Please contact me (07799 850974) or Gary Hibbins (07912 142334) if you would like more information.

#### GARD

The excellent attendance of well over 100 at the public meeting in the Village Hall on 8th February was rewarding for the GARD Committee. This battle is not just for our villages, but to prevent the water company constructing a massively expensive structure which is not required.

Since the public meeting, and with the help of our water consultant, Professor Chris Binnie, we have produced more data which further erodes Thames Water's case. We have presented this to OFWAT and the EA. Our MP, Ed Vaizey has tackled DEFRA and we are now awaiting the publication of the Thames Water Resources Plan which we expect will be made public on 2 April. There will then be a six-week consultation period during which we can challenge Thames Water's latest figures.

In the late 1970s a massive reservoir (Keilder) was built to serve Northumbria's predicted water needs. The final cost of £400M was ten times the original estimate. Since then it has hardly been used for its original purpose and is still costing millions of pounds a year to maintain and for the debt to be serviced. As this took place before water privatisation the taxpayer is still footing that bill. The estimated cost of the proposed Upper Thames Reservoir is £1,000M and this will almost certainly escalate. The trouble is that it is Thames Water's customers who would have to pay for this structure, and McQuarrie, the Australian owners of Thames Water, would reap a handsome profit by lending its subsidiary Thames Water the cash with interest. This project would cost every Thames Water customer at least £20 per annum.

Thames Water's reservoir proposal is a project for commercial gain. It is not the best nor the most economic nor an environmentally satisfactory solution, and it is certainly not in the best interests of customers.

Management meeting; the meeting on march 17th was largely taken up by a discussion on the hall and its usage. The outcome was that while we try to organise all users to live with each other, sometimes we get in each others way. With any community building we all have to give and take, and consider each other. So when you enter the hall please remember that your group is not the only patron and respect other users. Think before you complain, or write notes, or gather together to send a letter to the offending group. If its something you can deal with, do it. If it involves moving something, try and put it back when you have finished or leave it in a safe place and go. Anything that is in the hall is there for us all to use. If that means something you use regularly has been moved, go look for it, and put it back where you find it. If you don't want any one to use property that your group has purchased, either keep it locked in your cupboard( if you have one) or take it away with you. A lot of these issues, if they are big enough, may require a phone call to the group concerned, but use this as a last resort. Your representative can bring your concerns to our meetings if you think there is a problem you have not been able to resolve.

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## PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Jennifer Pooley

In addition to six councillors, eighteen members of the public attended the annual Parish Assembly on 7th April. The Council Chairman, Daniel Scarf, the chairmen of the various working groups, and Richard Webber, who is both our District & a Parish Councillor, reported on the past year's activities. For the most part the reports were very encouraging.



Amongst a host of other things they highlighted what has been achieved

with regard to young people's activities provided by the Youth Zone, the Village of the Year award made to the DAMASCUS group, the Community Day and newly formed Community Choir, the updating of lease terms for the now fully tenanted allotments, upgrading of footpaths and resolution of certain parking difficulties. Reporting on Drayton School's past year Clare Soper told of outstanding progress made at key stage two, the special energy day and close cooperation between the school and St. Peter's church. Gary Hibbins, the Damascus youth leader, spoke about the recent morning of conversation between adults and young people in which ideas were exchanged for reaching good understanding and cooperation between age groups (see page 6). The very successful few days with visitors from Lesparre, Drayton's twinning partner, were described by Margaret Jones, with a suggestion that a group of Drayton's young people might join a future visit to Lesparre.

Not everything was as positive of course. Members of the public raised the subject of nuisance noise from the A34 and from low-flying helicopters over the village, the latter a problem that the Parish Council had attempted to resolve with the relevant air bases only quite recently; perhaps the Council needs to address both again. The problem of vandalism (most recently to the bus shelters) and graffiti is another troublesome issue. The youngest member of the audience, Toby Soper, was disappointed that 18 months after his first asking for better play facilities for older children nothing has materialised; unfortunately it isn't always possible to deliver what is requested and in this case it is because no suitable land is currently available (see page 7). The Neighbourhood Action Group (a joint police and parish endeavour) isn't always as effective as it might be because of lack of finance and manpower. Uncertainty as to whether the reservoir will be built still hangs over the local community and there isn't likely to be a definite decision on that for some time to come.


Richard Webber struck a very positive note with his comments, emphasising how well cared for the village is looking, the sense of community spirit and how many good and interesting things go on in Drayton. It is a village fortunate to have viable shops, active churches, good pubs, and clubs and societies catering for many interests. The Parish Council constantly tries to maintain and improve facilities, and where it can, rectify problems. That is not always easy because of the Council's limited powers, but it always takes seriously suggestions or difficulties that are brought to its attention and acts when possible.

Finally, once again the need for new blood for the Parish Council was emphasised by the Chairman. We are entitled to eleven Councillors but at present have only seven. More Councillors would mean more ideas, more expertise and the possibility of accomplishing so much more for the village. Next month's meeting is the AGM, and for anyone interested in the possibility of serving on the Council, a very good time to come along and find out more: Monday 12th May 2008 at 7pm in the Caudwell Day Centre.


#### Village Youth Forum:

chance to work with the forces close up, and needless to say I have been very impressed. I cannot imagine a better career or experience for any one, what ever their background. So I wrote to all our local schools and asked them what they thought of this idea. I am delighted to say that every single secondary school in my constituency wrote back to say that they received visits from the armed services, and would continue to do so. I am absolutely delighted!

While on the subject of young people, could I use this opportunity to praise the actions of young Carl McKenna, Drayton resident, who saved a man from a burning car. Carl was a true hero, and his actions remind us that the vast majority of young people are absolutely fantastic and a credit to our community.

Parliament remains quiet at the moment. We debated the Government's anti-terrorism legislation. I remain opposed to the proposal to allow terrorist suspects to be detained for 42 days, but we will not have a vote for this for a while. The Finance Act is being debated at the end of April, but there is no date yet for the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Bill, which concerns a lot of people. Finally, there is a private members' bill to ban the advertising of fatty foods, which I will be opposing. We won't make people healthy by banning adverts, only by ensuring that everyone, particularly our children, have access to sporting facilities.




