PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Jennifer Pooley

Meeting held on Monday 1st September 2008

Five members of the Council met this month and were joined briefly by our County Councillor Mike Badcock, and also by two members of the public who wished to discuss a controversial planning matter. The meeting had been preceded by a meeting of the Finance Committee.

Resolution of a number of matters that have been under discussion for some time is beginning to look more hopeful:-

Mr. Badcock has arranged a meeting with a representative from the Highways department to discuss the problem of vehicles using bridleways, especially Kiln Lane. He is also trying to get a speed signal installed at the entrance to Drayton on the road from Sutton Courtenay, so there would be one on each village approach road. Mr. Badcock also said that 20 mph signs are probably to be installed outside Abingdon schools although not at Drayton primary school where it is felt unnecessary; this safety measure will of course benefit all those Drayton pupils who attend Abingdon schools.

Blocked drains in Sutton Wick are still under investigation, utilities officials having recently made further inspections which hopefully will lead to positive action.

An issue that has been much discussed by the Council has been the topple testing of headstones in the burial ground. In the light of a number of serious & even fatal accidents occurring in burial grounds in recent years this is something the Council is strongly urged to do to avoid damage and claims of negligence. The Council has found it difficult to obtain guidance on the matter but has at last felt in a position to accept the generous offer of topple testing from a suitably qualified Drayton resident, Mr. Peter Cline. Notice will be given when the testing is about to happen and owners notified of any unsafe headstones, although the Council will take any temporary steps to ensure their immediate safety.

Another public safety issue is the damaged surface of the Village Hall car-park. The Council has obtained quotes for different types of repair and has decided to have the surface patched wherever there are potholes and uneven sections. At a later date, parking spaces will be clearly marked and probably an extra parking area created.

Maintenance of village property and rights of way is ongoing throughout the year and since the last Council meeting our village caretaker has stained some of the public benches and the OCC Countryside Services team have, at our request, cut back the very overgrown Gypsy Lane and adjoining bridleway.

It is several years since Drayton was approached by the Earl of Plymouth Estates and asked to make a 'land swap', enabling the Earl of Plymouth Estates to reroute roads across the village green so houses could be built at Manor Farm. That agreement has now been formally ratified although whether the houses will actually be built and the access roads altered is a matter for the future.

The Parish Council is regularly approached for donations for various causes. There are strict guidelines about how much and to whom the Council is allowed to give. There has in recent weeks been an approach from the Millennium Green Trust for a donation towards the renovation of the sundial on the Millennium Green. Councillors could not come to a satisfactory agreement so the matter has been carried forward to the next meeting when it is hoped that a full complement of Councillors will be present to consider the question. For those who receive their October copy of the Chronicle as soon as it is available may I remind you that there is a public meeting on Monday 29th September at 7.30pm in the Caudwell Day Centre when a representative from RAF Benson will explain the reason for helicopters flying directly over Drayton.

Prior to the next PC meeting in the Caudwell Day Centre on Monday October 6th there will be a public half hour meeting at 7.00pm when Malcolm Peters from the Environment Agency will give a briefing on the proposed reservoir.

The Council meeting will follow at 7.30pm. All are welcome to attend to ask questions, discuss problems or just to listen.

You may have noticed in the last few months, Police Community Support Officers cycling and walking about the villages of Sutton Courtenay, Drayton and Appleford. They are the long awaited, full time, PCSOs posted to the three villages.

PCSO Chris Linzey and PCSO Sandra Syphas, who are part of the South Abingdon Neighbourhood Team, have been spending time getting to know the area and the residents. Chris and Sandra are keen to hear from residents and to facilitate this there will be an open Police Surgery for Drayton on the 3rd October 2008 between 6pm and 8pm in the village hall.

Ann Hutchings kindly arranged a visit to Didcot Power Station on 3rd September which nine members and six husbands/partners found very interesting.




We hope to provide good levels of coaching and are pleased that a couple of our better players have volunteered their services. This will be of great benefit especially to the young players.

LETTER FROM REVD JOSIE MIDWINTER

Dear Friends

One of the best known saints of the Christian church is St Francis of Assisi, and indeed his story is an inspirational one. He was born in 1182 into a wealthy merchant family in Italy. He could have lived in comfort, but after a period of military service he felt disillusioned with life. One day he went to a semi-deserted church outside Assisi and began to pray. Deep in prayer before the altar he heard a compassionate voice speaking to him: 'Francis, do you not see that my house is falling into ruin? Go and repair it for me.' At first Francis took the call literally and began to spend his time rebuilding the old church, but soon he came to realise that God wanted him to build up the ruined lives of men and women. So Francis renounced his wealth and privilege and became a friar (a type of monk who travels around doing pastoral work). Francis was only forty-four when he died but in his short life he had touched the lives of countless men and women and turned them towards God's love through Jesus. Francis had a particular love for the isolated and marginalised in society. In his day people with leprosy were particularly shunned and unable to mix with ordinary people. He went out of his way to minister to them and give them a sense of worth and dignity. Francis also had a great love of nature and all of God's creation.

Francis had a great belief in spreading his faith by example, one day a student came and asked Francis to teach him how to preach. Francis said he would, and then invited the student to accompany him to the market. So he and the student went into the town and Francis took his time talking to people and sharing with him. As time went on and Francis seemed to be in no hurry to return to the monastery the student got impatient and asked Francis when the lesson was going to begin. Very simply Francis told him they had been 'preaching' the whole day in the way they interacted with the people. It was obvious that Francis' method met the needs of ordinary people because many came to hear his simple, but very spiritual wisdom. Others came to join him and also became humble friars travelling and talking about their faith. The Franciscan order still exists today and it is the one order which covers all denominations of Christians. Some men and women become full time Franciscans and others take a simpler vow and endeavour to live the rule of Francis in their daily lives.

On Saturday 11 October we will be having a Children's Workshop in the church room in order to make a banner celebrating the life of Francis. This will then be used on Sunday in our 10am Family Service. (see advert elsewhere in the Chronicle).

Eight hundred years after he lived Francis is still inspiring people today to take seriously the love that God pours out to us through his son Jesus - and then share that love with others. Why not come and join us for the workshop and/or for the service and see how he can inspire you!



If anyone has an old computer they keep tripping over and would be happy to donate to Preschool, we would be very grateful. Any sort would be great as it is for the children to play their games on.



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DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT **Richard Webber**

'I want to ride my bicycle' F.Mercury C 1980

So, Britain is a nation of cyclists. It's official. Nearly half our gold medals were won in the velodrome. It's tremendous news in many ways. Not least that, without cycling, we would not have been in the top 20 countries, never mind the top four. I reckon that any of our Olympic cyclists could get from Drayton to the centre of Abingdon faster on almost any day of the year than any of us can currently do the journey in a car. Come to think of it, on most days, even I can get to the centre of Abingdon faster on a bicycle than in a car.

As our friends know, Catherine and I invested in two reasonably solid hybrid bikes plus kit (ridiculous looking helmets, locks to challenge even Goldfinger, and panniers (2 per bike) to take the shopping.) Wobbling our way at first down the cycle path to Abingdon, and surviving one episode with a high kerb, (when I learnt the hard way that jumping up onto a kerb, BMX-style, is a good deal harder than it looks (I won't try that again)), we now travel confidently by bike into Abingdon at least 3 or 4 times a week and don't even notice the ridiculous helmets anymore. We draw the line at lycra, but otherwise we see ourselves as hardened, experienced bikers, able to wave at others without falling off. We are told that like swimming, it is one of the best forms of exercise at our, or any age. And last, but not least, we are saving ourselves a conservative £500 a year. We are lucky enough to live close to a large town with most of the amenities we need, and in an area where there is an increasingly attractive network of cycle paths through rivers, fields, streams and woods. When we are cycling, we are one less car to clog up the centre of Abingdon and the good news is that more money is about to be spent on developing safe cycle routes in and around Abingdon. The one sadness is that the cycle path from Drayton to Abingdon is underused at present.

At the risk of offending my most liberal friends, I wonder whether the time has come to reconsider the idea of the 'Rights of the Driver?' Driving is a luxury and a privilege that we and the environment are struggling to afford, and things are only going to get worse. Should we be considering racking up taxation even higher on extra cars, and on any but the most environmentally friendly cars. In this crowded little island, should the rights of the pedestrian and cyclist come first, particularly when it comes to designing town centres?

Several towns, in the US perhaps surprisingly, have come up with a system of bicycle banks - centrally stored and maintained bikes, hired out when required for very low fees. Similar systems for cars are used in several parts of the world. I wonder if it would work in a place like Drayton? Do we have any budding entrepreneur bicyclists?

Twinning.

Thanks to the energy and enthusiasm of a small group of Drayton residents, our village became 'twinned' with the French town of Lesparre Medoc in 2000. Every other year, a group of 12 - 20 people of all ages from Drayton travel to Lesparre for a long weekend to be hosted and entertained by French families, and vice versa in the intervening years. This year it was Drayton's turn to go to France and we decided to join them to see what went on. In the past, I have had difficulty in persuading a French petrol pump attendant, in admittedly modest French, that I wanted him to put petrol in my car (I think he was being deliberately difficult), so it was with much trepidation that we arrived in Lesparre - having negotiated the speeding traffic around Calais (mostly with GB numberplates!)

I have seen pictures of large groups of French people eating picnic lunches at long tables, in fields, in woods, by roads anywhere they fancy. Every day we had one of these - picnics that could go on for hours - wonderful fresh food - plenty of wonderful wine - and plenty of conversation - yes, conversation. Many of the French had even less English than I have French, and

after a couple of glasses of wine, we were all exchanging gestures, jokes and laughter. The language barrier had just floated away. Some of our party were returning to Lesparre for the third and fourth time. Many of the French had been to Drayton more than once. Any reservations I might have had that Twinning was an activity for an exclusive little group of fluent French speakers was firmly laid to rest. The new mayor of Lesparre was keen to point out that Twinning has plenty to offer people of all ages and stages, businesses, families, Europhiles and Europhobes alike. At least, I think that is what he said!

In 2007, the Poppy Collection in Drayton raised £1,701.56, including £115.30 taken at the Service of Remembrance in St.Peter's. This increase of nearly 30% continues the upward trend in Drayton collections over several years.

GARD REPORT

The GARD comments in response to the Thames Water consultation were largely in line with the replies from the County Council, the Vale and CPRE. We were pleased that the Environment Agency was equally critical of many of Thames Water's arguments, omissions and data. Thames Water will now have to respond in November and we hope that in the meantime Defra looks critically at the proposals and that Parliament decides a public Inquiry is needed. We would expect Thames Water to mount a media effort to allay the public suspicion and distrust they have generated, and we hope that there will be balanced coverage if that occurs! GARD is still convinced and can demonstrate that a reservoir is not needed and there are many more suitable alternatives in the event of increased demand after 2029.

Thames Water have not planned any significant waste water reuse despite the fact that some 2,000 million litres a day of treated waste water from London is discharged into the saline Thames estuary to waste. Further treatment could make this water useable for domestic supplies, and this is over six times the planned output of the Abingdon reservoir proposal.


It is also becoming increasingly clear that there was a deliberate decision to exclude any consideration of a previously well thought out scheme to boost the flow in the Thames when needed by transfer of Severn water via a new but much smaller reservoir at Longdon Marsh as was planned by the old Water Resources Board in the 1970s before privatisation. This would be less than half the cost and far more sustainable, as the Severn has ample surplus flow. This reflects on the motives, integrity and judgement of those concerned.

An Abingdon reservoir is not the answer and GARD favours increased reuse which can be brought into play as required and moderately quickly and economically. *NH Thompson*

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LETTERBOX BURGLARY- WEST BERKSHIRE

Police are reminding residents of security measures that they should follow to prevent them from becoming a victim of a letterbox burglary.

Around one in five burglaries in West Berkshire involves 'hooking' items which can be reached through the letterbox or by using the letterbox to gain entry to a property.

There have been sixteen over-night letterbox burglaries in the past few weeks across West Berkshire, some of which have resulted in burglaries where the car keys have been stolen from the property and the car has been taken off the drive, known as 'vamoose' burglaries.

Between 5.30am and 6.20am on Monday (8/9), burglars gained entry to a house in Cairngorm Road, Thatcham. The victims woke to find their front door wide open, and that thieves had stolen a handbag including credit cards, cash and car keys.

Overnight on the same day thieves entered a property in Longleat Drive, Tilehurst. The victims woke to find their cupboards and draws downstairs open and a handbag, mobile phone, credit cards, cash, keys and a digital camera taken. They had also taken the victim's car off the drive.

These are opportunist burglaries which can be prevented by householders taking the appropriate measures.

Romy Freiburghaus, the West Berkshire Crime Reduction Advisor said: "Around, 50 per cent of burglaries could be prevented by residents double looking their front doors.

"Occupants either leave keys, wallets, purses or handbags and mobile phones close enough to the front door enabling criminals to fish through the letterbox. Likewise, if the door isn't deadlocked (in other words it can be opened from the inside by just pressing down on the handle), the burglars put an implement through the letterbox to press the handle, and the door opens."

Following some simple steps can reduce your chances of becoming a victim of burglary:

- 1. Double lock your front door with a key.
- 2. Never leave your keys;
- in locks
- on a window ledge
- on the kitchen table
- on a hook behind the door

3. Keep your keys safe and away from the front door, but easily accessible in case of a fire, and make sure your keys are always in the same place at night-time.

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
