2. A recording device such as CD or DVD (even the old Floppy Disk!); *please include hard copy* for checking the formatting and *your address* so that it can be easily returned. This is still a good way to receive copy since it removes much of the work necessary in 3 & 4 below, AND should help to eliminate misprints/errors from scanner problems or dodgy handwriting.

3. A good, **black typescript** on white A4 paper or smaller. The scanner can read in typescripts and this is a bit easier than re-typing. IF you prepare text on a PC to print the output and send it to us, thanks, BUT **PLEASE SEE 2 above** - we do return things, honest!

4. Finally, hand-written items. It helps if all names of people and places are spelt out in <u>CAPITALS</u> (thanks to those who do), thus saving mistakes and possible embarrassment. You KNOW who you're writing about, but please don't assume we do too!

Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends,

THE FIRST CHRISTMAS IN NEPAL

In Charles Dickens's book 'A Christmas Carol' Scrooge is very reluctant to give his clerk Bob Cratchit a day off for Christmas. In the 1850s it was not an official holiday and Christmas was not much celebrated except perhaps with a religious service. However Dickens was aware that things were beginning to change, and Christmas under the Victorians became the festival we know and love today. Now it would be unthinkable for an employer to refuse a holiday for Christmas Day. In fact we have now turned Christmas more or less into a secular festival with only a nodding acknowledgement to Christian origins of the birth of Jesus.

It is, therefore, hard to imagine a country where Christmas is not only not celebrated, but not even recognised. Until this year Nepal was such a country. The small mountain kingdom of Nepal has been mainly Hindu, and as recently as 1990 it was illegal to practice any form of Christianity. In the last 12 months great changes have taken place. Nepal has removed its ancient monarchy, had largely peaceful elections and become a federal democratic republic. Part of the process has been to give equal recognition all the country's religious groups. As a result 25 December 2008 will be a public holiday in Nepal - schools, offices and factories will all be closed - Christians will be able to go freely and peaceably to church. For the Christians of Nepal it is a time of rejoicing to gain such freedom.

Perhaps it would be good for us to pause in the midst of the hectic dash towards secular festivities and return to the basic meaning of the season. The heart of Christmas is the birth of Jesus - the Saviour of the World – **do come and celebrate** that with us at St Peter's. There are plenty of opportunities - see our adverts with the full range of Christmas services on page 1.

PRAISE AT TEN 2009

Many services at St Peter's are communion services, but we do recognise that there are people in the community who would like to come along to the church but who feel that the services are too formal or something which they do not fully understand. Therefore in 2009, on the third Sunday of each month, we are planning a series of informal services called **'Praise at Ten'**. The launch service will be **'Songs of Praise' at 10am on Sunday 18 January.** Very much like the TV version there will be an opportunity for people to choose a favourite hymn, say why it is important to them, and then we will all sing it.(contact me if you would like to know how to do this on 01235 531374).

Later on in the year we are planning other services like:-African Praise, Gospel Praise and Youth Praise. In the summer we are going to organise a <u>pets service</u> when you can bring along your dog, cat or other pet and we can give thanks for the love and joy that pets bring. We hope **this will be an opportunity for more people to feel welcome to join in** our wide range of activities.

OPEN LETTER TO THE RESIDENTS OF DRAYTON -PROPOSED INCINERATOR AT SUTTON COURTENAY

Dear Sir,

The Pump House, SC

Oxfordshire County Council are currently considering a proposal to build a very large incinerator close to Didcot Power Station, to burn 300,000 tons of waste a year!

A campaign has been launched to oppose planning permission for such an incinerator. The VofWH District Council has agreed and raised <u>12 objections</u> with the County Council.

NB :- <u>No independent study</u> is being made into the health issues involved, nor any study planned on the cumulative impact of adding a large incinerator to the Power Station and landfill site.

Incineration can cause air pollution over a 12+ miles radius.

<u>There are less damaging alternatives</u> and County Councillors have been denied the opportunity to debate the options.

It is crucially important that all local residents understand the risks involved with incinerators. We urge you therefore to look at the web site <u>WWW.SCai.CO.Uk</u> and read the mass of other information. We all owe it to our children to be much better informed about the potential impact on the local community over the next 25 years! If you agree then please sign the on-line petition, (just follow the website links on the front page).

Please do also consider writing a letter of objection to your County Councillor and MP before January, as these can be very influential! Remember Asbestos was also once considered to be safe! We look forward to your support.

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PARISH COUNCIL (Nov 3rd)

With seven of the eight Councillors present, plus Mr.and Mrs. Badcock (our County Councillors), this month's meeting had the fullest attendance for some time. However, there were no members of the public there.

Mr. and Mrs. Badcock reported that they have requested that double yellow lines shall be painted on both sides of the stretch of road between the Caldecott and Ock Street roundabouts. When the new housing development on the former garage site is completed they fear that inadequate parking space there may lead to drivers parking on the B4017, obstructing traffic flow along that very busy stretch of road. Whilst this is not directly connected with Drayton it will doubtless be of interest to Drayton road users. Time will tell whether the request is granted. Mr. Badcock also said that he has been in touch with the County Officer at Drayton Depot in an attempt to prohibit vehicles driving and parking along Kiln Lane which is a bridleway; again he awaits the outcome.

Melanie Parker, Chair of the Council's Leisure and General Purposes Committee, agreed to draw up draft guidelines for the allotment holders' newly formed small committee. The allotment users have asked for their own notice board so that information and gardening ideas can be shared, so this may be one of the first things the committee achieves.

Other work to be undertaken in the near future will be the planting of more beech saplings in order to improve the boundary hedge between the allotments and the burial ground. It is also hoped that graffiti currently adorning the village hall outer wall will be removed. \rightarrow >>>>

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Residents will have noticed the orange protest notices widely displayed by Sutton Courtenay's incinerator protest group. So far Drayton PC has not become involved although the Council's chairman, Daniel Scharf, and I went to the VWHDC's recent planning meeting where the incinerator was on the agenda. The committee pointed out that they had not been shown crucial pieces of evidence and until their receipt, they withheld approval of WRG's planning application. Oxfordshire CC is the final arbiter, and the Vale planners can only submit their opinions for consideration. At our November meeting Parish Councillors decided to invite a representative from the Environment Agency to come and explain more about the proposed incinerator.

At the same planning meeting, representations were made by a Sutton Wick resident and by a PC Planning Committee member, objecting to the retrospective planning permission sought for two newly built houses at 35 Sutton Wick Lane, which in several ways flouted the original planning permission, resulting in a building felt by many to be inappropriate for its surroundings. Sadly, the protests were not upheld and retrospective permission was granted.

Following much controversy and a long and heated argument it was decided that the Parish Council should make a **generous contribution to the Millennium Green Trust** in order that the <u>refurbishment of the sundial</u> could be completed.

The next meeting will be on Monday 1st December at 7.30pm in the Caudwell Day Centre and as always everyone is welcome to attend. Jenny Pooley

VILLAGE SURVEY RESULTS

As promised, here are the results of the Village Survey conducted in August and September. With responses still coming in, the response rate is a little over 50%. I am told that this is unusually high for this kind of survey. Well done, Drayton!

There is far too much information in the responses to summarise it all in one edition of the Chronicle, so I propose to present the results to the formal questions asked in this issue, and further present the suggestions and added points raised in the Jan/Feb issue. Some of the points raised will be discussed at the next Parish Council Meeting on 1st December.

General

There are 935 homes in Drayton. This is about 100 more than two years ago.

The survey suggest that there are around 2325 people living in the village (2.46 per household). The average age is 46. Only 20% of our population is under 18, 48% is over 50, There are an estimated 1430 Cars in Drayton, 180 motorbikes and 1400 bicycles.

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Do we enjoy living in Drayton?

In spite of cars, reservoirs, incinerators, planning issues and even looming economic hard times, the answer to this question is a very firm YES.

Interestingly, the rating increases from 8.26 to 8.70 in homes with one or more 70+ year olds. Perhaps every home needs one, or maybe the concept of 'Grumpy' old men and women is a myth!

How much does Abingdon's traffic worry us?

Apparently far more than any of Drayton's own traffic issues. This message will be made very clear at the next meeting of the Abingdon Integrated Transport Advisory Group. The issue is one for the whole area, not just Abingdon.

The rating of 8.18 falls to 7.42 in households with 0 cars, and rises to 8.67 in households with 2+ cars and to 8.71 in households with 3+ cars. It seems that the more cars we own, the more worried we are about traffic in general! Do we need to look at ourselves?

Drayton's Traffic issues

There is no significant difference in the rankings between households with 1 car, 2+ cars and no cars. There is general agreement that speed is a greater issue than volume of traffic. As for buses, 2.95 may not seem a high ranking, but it means that about 800 people in the village use or would like to use buses. The written comments strongly support this.

VILLAGE SURVEY RESULTS (2)

Housing and Planning

Planning issues, without doubt, produce more discord in this village than any other single issue. I am no planning expert, but, for what it is worth, I have learnt the following in the past two years:-

Planning Law is based on the presumption that a man may do with his property, what he likes, unless there is good reason that he should not be allowed to.

The law allows people to build to the very edge of their property unless there is good reason why they should not.

Most serious disputes arise when properties are developed by people who have no intention of living in the altered property themselves or who move very shortly after alterations have been made.

The District Council is charged with ensuring that property planning law has been adhered to.

Too often developers are employed who are not members of the 'Considerate Developers Association' and who prefer to engage in 'verbals' with neighbours.

It would make my life much easier if all those involved in future developments in the village have absorbed the 5 points above.

A sizeable majority of people in this village would welcome more affordable housing as a means of getting more young families into the village.

Recreational facilities and the young

The overwhelming majority of people (of all ages) in the village would like there to be far more facilities for the young.

Other village facilities

The <u>Recycling Centre</u> is extremely well used.

Village Hall is badly underused.

A very small minority are members of any of Drayton's Clubs and societies.

<u>Recreation Ground</u> (otherwise known as the Football Ground) is used by less than one person in ten in the village. Is this because they think of it as The Football Ground?

Although there was no formal question on the <u>Millennium</u> <u>Green</u>, there were many comments which will be summarised in the next issue.

Given the regrettably small number of under 10s in the village, the <u>Playground</u> is well used. \rightarrow >>

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Reservoirs and Incinerators

The village is divided about 4/1 against the reservoir. I would like to remind everyone that my position is that the process for making the decision is hopelessly flawed, and hence, so far, at least, it is impossible to decide one way or the other.

Many are against the incinerator, but **an even larger number were not aware that it was a possibility**. This looks like a serious failure in public information dissemination.

Shops and Post Office

A small majority of families use the Post Office at some time, but a large majority of households with 1 or more 70+ year olds use it. Given our proximity to large shopping centres, a welcome majority use the village shops.

What happens now?

With hard facts and figures, we are much more likely to be listened to. Open letters will be sent to the various relevant authorities early in the New Year, listing the points raised above. Any replies received will be published in subsequent Chronicles.

ED VAIZEY - Your Local MP

I held a debate on the reservoir in Parliament a couple of weeks ago. MPs can apply for short debates to raise issues that are important to their constituency. I have only held one before, on the threat of the closure of mental health services in Oxfordshire. Getting an adjournment debate is always pot luck, you have to apply to the Speaker and a ballot is held. I had applied for six weeks before my ship came in, and it coincided with the evening I was meant to appear on the BBC's Question Time - so Question Time was sunk by the reservoir!

The threat of a large reservoir south of Abingdon has been hovering over us for almost two decades, but now it seems more likely than ever. Thames Water says it is needed to supply water to the growing population in the south east, as well as to cope with climate change. It seems hard to believe but we live in one of the most water-stressed area of the planet.

There used to be two well-worn arguments against the reservoir - that Thames Water should fix its leaking pipes, and people should use water meters. **These issues are now being dealt with**. <u>So we are concentrating on two other arguments</u> - first, whether Thames Water's predictions for water use are right - they predict 165 litres per person per day, whereas the Government suggest 130 litres per person, a significant difference. Also, are there alternative sources of water, such as effluent reuse, used by other water companies?

The crux of my argument, though, is that **we need a public enquiry**. All the arguments need to be tested in an open tribunal, so people know whether or not the right decision has been made. The Government wants to make the decision <u>behind closed doors</u>, using its new Planning Infrastructure Committee, and whatever one's views on the reservoir, that is not acceptable.
