On Saturday March 21st, I found myself at a layby on the A420, with the firefighters of Faringdon, and the British Legion.

We were there to pay tribute to three fallen British soldiers, whose funeral cortege passed by on its way from RAF Lyneham to the John Radcliffe. These sad processions have been going on for about 14 months, usually about 50 people turn up (that's this location, there are quite a few others). This was my first time, and it was very moving. A Police outrider slows the traffic, and stops the traffic in the opposite direction. A busy road goes completely quiet. The cortege slows down and passes by. Flags are lowered and then raised. All returns to normal in five minutes, but a quiet and emotional tribute has been paid.

The big local news this month has been the decision by Thames Water to put back its reservoir plans for five years until 2014, and to reduce the size of any proposed reservoir by a third.

I have always been a reservoir sceptic. I have never said "never" to a reservoir, but I have always said that TW should have to prove its case overwhelmingly before such a huge change was made to our local area. I have to say the case for a reservoir looks weaker than ever. If it was essential, how could Thames Water afford to delay their plans?! Given that they seem to have easily postponed them, it is hard to see how they can now argue that a reservoir is essential for our future water supply. While the project is delayed, planning blight still affects a number of people, and I am keen to ensure that they do not suffer in the next few years.



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Letter from St Peter's Church

Dear Friends.

I cannot imagine what it must be like to be diagnosed with a terminal illness, especially not when it is something as degenerating as Motor Neurone Disease. Such a diagnosis was handed to Michael Wenham in 2002 when vicar of Stanford in the Vale. In 2008 Michael published a book about the progress of the disease and his reflections. He chose the title 'My Donkey Body: living with a body that no longer obeys you!'

It is a challenging and inspiring book which has greatly encouraged me. As he went through the weeks and months of the effects of the disease he had to depend more and more on others. For most of us that is a position that makes us feel uncomfortable, but through it Michael discovered something amazing:

"Being inexorably rendered incapable is like undergoing an enforced, prolonged and embarrassing striptease. I can contribute less and less. I cannot even help to lay the table for a meal. The astonishing effect, however, I have found, is this:- as I do less and 'just be' more, those nearest me, starting with my family, value me no less. Indeed, since my self-esteem used to depend in part on what I did, I feel that I am valued more. Their affection seems not to depend on my ability to meet their needs or to do anything".

Michael equates this understanding to God's 'agape-love'. This is the love God demonstrated by sending Jesus, stripped of all his heavenly glory, to live an ordinary life on earth with us. This is the love Jesus then utilizes in order to be stripped once again by Roman soldiers and nailed up to die on a cross. This is the love God then employs to raise him from the dead. It is not our self-evaluation which brings about God's forgiveness, but the agape-love which values us through Jesus.

Motor Neurone Disease is a ticking clock and no-one knows how long it will take to run its course. Michael found the waiting hard at times, but he was not about to let it overcome him.

"But there is waiting and waiting. It could be that we will sit, huddled and irritable, like passengers waiting in a haunted waiting room, wondering when our train will arrive to take us into the unknown darkness".

"At this point, while I'm still able to, I want to invest in a bank of good memories - days out, holidays, family celebrations, evenings coming together by the fire, revisiting former haunts, rekindling old passions, but also discovering new ones. So it's not just waiting. It is living. Life goes on".

The Easter story could well be entitled 'Life goes on'. It would be darkness indeed if our life was just waiting for that train to take us into the 'unknown darkness' of death. When we say on Easter morning "Jesus Christ is risen today!" we are saying life in all its fullness is guaranteed not just now but for eternity. That is a hard message to grasp sometimes especially when things are not going well. However as I read Michael's book I felt challenged on several levels about my willingness just to let things 'happen' without investing myself fully into the life that God has given me.

I can whole-heartedly recommend this book. It tells the story of one man's struggle with a terrible disease, but it also gives one man's story of learning his value in God's eyes.

The Christian story is not an other-worldly, pie-in-the-sky-when-you-die story, but a map of how to live you life NOW.

... Not waiting ... but living.

On GARD

Dear Sir,

via e-mail

Almost everyone will now be aware that Thames Water has decided to delay their application to build a reservoir on our doorstep for up to 5 years, and provisionally to reduce its planned size by one third. This is good news and gives us time to continue to challenge the long term need for this project and its suitability. The threat certainly has not gone away. Houses and land are still blighted and a large question mark about the future remains. Thames Water's reasoning for the change of plan is given as a revised assessment of water demand and the effects of the economic downturn on water consumption. We like to think that the fierce criticism encountered was another factor.

GARD has now studied the revised plan and had it analysed by Chris Binnie, our consultant, and we propose to ensure that the biased data and arguments provided by TW in the new plan (still favours a reservoir), are exposed to Ofwat, the Environment Agency and Defra before a decision on whether to approve it is made by the Secretary of State for the Environment in May.

As we feared Thames Water either ignored, or dismissed without proper examination, several of the most viable and cheaper alternative options we had put forward, although they did respond to others. We contend that they have not met their obligations to respond fully to the consultation, and they have hidden some of their detailed figures and calculations behind the excuse of commercial confidentiality, thus making it impossible for their calculations to be publicly scrutinized. We now hope that by drawing our technically well supported criticisms to the attention of the Regulators, Thames Water will be forced by them to examine our alternatives properly against their expensive Abingdon reservoir option before it is allowed to be incorporated as part of the plan for the next 25 years.

All will not be lost if we fail, as there is a statutory requirement for a new plan every 5 years, which would have to re-examine the proposal and justify it again. To that extent we have won a battle but not the war.

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PARISH COUNCIL (March 2nd)

As a result of the advertisement and article in the previous issue of the Chronicle several people attended this month's meeting to ask questions and listen to the PC Chairman, Daniel Scharf, describe the role of Parish Councillor. To the delight of the Councillors present all the visitors said they wished to be coopted onto the Council. Obviously the advert & article were very effective.

The job of village caretaker was also recently advertised and the Council appointed the successful candidate. In the case of both the new Councillors and the caretaker there are certain formalities to be completed first but in my next report I shall be able to give more details. The appointee was recently contracted to do just a fortnight of litter picking and in his first week collected **eight bin liners of rubbish and six in the second.** Sweet papers and wrappers etc. accumulate around the shop frontages and the Council would appreciate it if these areas could be regularly swept. Better still of course would be if the rubbish wasn't dropped in the first place.

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Once again the possibility of creating a Drayton website was discussed. Many villages now have their own websites and certainly the judges of the 'Village of the Year' competition consider that a plus when making their judgement. Finding a willing and able person not only to create a website but also to maintain it has not proved easy so far but the Council is still trying. Meanwhile we do have our excellent and informative Chronicle and Councillor Badcock assured the meeting that Drayton's Chronicle is by far the best village newspaper he sees.

The Council has received a complaint that some people walking their dogs occasionally allow their animals to wonder over cultivated plots on the allotments. The only public right of way is the narrow footpath bordering the back gardens along the east side of Church Lane, and allotment tenants would be very grateful if dog owners would ensure that they and their dogs keep to that path.

Since the last meeting the PC's planning committee has met to formulate the Parish Council's official response to the VWHDC's preferred options for its Local Development Framework Programme up to 2026. One option proposed by the VWHDC is that of building 1500 houses south of Abingdon, and the Parish Council is not in favour as such a development would increase traffic on the already congested Drayton Road and through the village. The PC in its response to the Vale urged that **before any development takes place all necessary infrastructure and relief roads must be built.** The PC asked that consideration should be given to opening more slip roads on and off the A34 at Lodge Hill and possibly even at Drayton to ease traffic flow.

No doubt most readers will already know that the building of the reservoir has been put on hold for at least five years, and its size reduced by a third. This caused some satisfaction and relief in the Council meeting!

The next meeting will be the PARISH ASSEMBLY on Monday April 6th. Please note the revised start time of 7pm (last month's advert mistakenly said 7.30pm). This is your chance to air your views or ask questions, so please come along to the Caudwell Day Centre and hear what your Parish Council and some of the village societies do.

YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Cars, Traffic and Transport

Everyone agrees that we have a major traffic problem in this area. What we do about it produces less agreement. It seems to me that in judging a particular course of action, there are 4 boxes that need to be ticked. Will such an action....

- 1. Minimise impact of traffic on the environment:— air quality / use of resources / oil etc
 - 2. Improve Road Safety
- 3. Reduce congestion / improve traffic flow in the short/mid term.
- 4. Reduce congestion and improve traffic flow in the long term.

There are many possible actions we might take - Build bridges, build by-passes, reduce traffic speed, reduce numbers of vehicles, build safer, less polluting cars etc.

Some actions may tick one box, some 2 or three, but there may be only one which ticks all four. Whenever we improve road safety, improve car design, reduce average speeds and build new roads, history has taught us that we make driving a more pleasurable experience, and as a result we generate yet more traffic.

We live on a small island and we have to face the fact that there is a limit to how many vehicles it can absorb. Traffic issues all around the country suggest that we may already be at that point.

Politicians are notoriously reluctant to face decisions based on long term planning. Trying to get elected on a platform of - 'use your car less', 'don't drive two if you can manage with one' and 'get on your bike' is probably doomed to failure - let alone a platform of 'limit numbers of cars per household', 'raise car taxes' and 'more congestion charging' etc.

The problem is one of changing our behaviour and changing it permanently. We have to educate ourselves over a long period, we did it successfully with smoking – my parents' generation were advised to take up smoking by their GPs to soothe their nerves, today we ban smoking in pubs and public places and there is no rioting in the streets.

There is no reason why a long term education programme could not succeed in getting us out of our cars and into a more healthy, sustainable lifestyle – but – and it seems a big 'but' – politicians have to be much braver and begin to change our perception of the place of cars and driving in our lives.

Owning a car and driving needs to be seen as a privilege, not a right. It is probably (as with smoking) a 50 year project, but whether it's Drayton, Abingdon or Westminster, we all need to begin work on it now.

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Housing

We are told by central government that we must build more than 10,000 extra homes in the Vale by 2025. Most of the housing is already allocated to Didcot and Grove. The District Council planning department is charged with working out possible options for where the remaining houses should go. It has suggested that South Abingdon or Wantage are the most sensible options. It may not have wanted to, and many of us feel that it is not the right thing for us to be asked to do, but those of us that do not want it to happen must produce evidence as to **why** it should not happen.

It is no good simply waving placards or accusing the planners of stupidity or, worse still, skulduggery. They are simply doing what Westminster says they must. My own view is that any development in South Abingdon without roads and bridges would do unacceptable damage to air quality and create further traffic gridlock in Abingdon, and the cost would be prohibitive.

Even with roads and bridges, there is the problem of flooding. The planners are obliged to work within the Environment Agency's (EA) advice. The EA has said that the July 2007 floods were a 1 in 200 year event and have based their assessment of which parts of Abingdon are in the flood plain on that assumption. Given that twice more since 2007 we have been within an inch or two of the same '200 year' event, the EA need to be strongly challenged on their assessment.

A tour of Oday Hill shows clearly that many of the fields between Drayton and South Abingdon have been permanently flooded since July '07. The ditches all around the Thames Water Sewage works in South Abingdon, are wider and fuller and more blocked with weeds (and worse), than I can remember in the past 30 years. All this convinces me that the EA assessment of flood risk is wildly optimistic. For these reasons, I am arguing that further building in South Abingdon, even with roads and bridges, would be bordering on reckless, at least until there has been an extensive survey by the EA and others on exactly what is happening to water and drainage in and around the area of gravel extraction to the south of Abingdon. Our local farmers are angry (and rightly so) that they are being left to cope.

If anyone has further points to raise, supported by evidence if possible, I will make sure that their points get into the melting pot.

GARDENING TIME

Rhododendrons - Large and Small

When you look closely at a Rhododendron flower, it is truly an amazing piece of work. And not only the detail of the flower itself but the way it sits amongst the foliage gives the impression of real plant perfection. Rhododendrons have been a familiar sight in this country since the middle of the nineteenth century when the Victorian collectors and plant hunters began bringing back specimens predominantly from China, Japan, and the Himalayas. Yet they retain their exotic beauty and still make a great impact wherever you come across them.

Anyone who has wandered through a spring garden bursting with Rhododendrons in flower must want to enjoy a slice of that glory on their own patch. The good news is that **anyone can**. At its simplest, dwarf Rhododendrons can be enjoyed in containers on a patio or balcony. The Yakushimanum (otherwise known as 'Yak') hybrids grow slowly and with the right feeding and watering will put on glorious displays of flowers year after year without ever out-growing their space. Container growing allows all the benefits of being able to get the soil conditions just right (acid soil is a must although the RHS has been running long-term trials on lime-tolerant varieties) and you can relocate your plants as the fancy takes you. Handy if you're moving house.

If you've got more space and the soil is right you can make them a bigger part of the garden. Combine them with ferns, perhaps in the dappled shade of mature trees. Hostas make great partners too. Try matching the sumptuous *Rhododendron* 'Blue Peter' for example with *Hosta fortunei* to get maximum value from the lilac flower heads of the Rhododendron. A worthwhile guideline to bear in mind is that the more floriferous the variety, the less suitable it will be for naturalistic settings. For this reason, the really showy examples, like *Rhododendron* 'Linda', with its vivid cerise flowers, are best nearer the house. Even 'Linda' however can be moderated by planting in combination with cooler flowers, for example bluebells.

Bigger Rhododendrons have the potential to provide useful screening against eyesores or for protection from a busy road. Hardy hybrid or 'iron-clad' evergreen Rhododendrons are perfect for these situations. *Rhododendron* 'Cynthia' is one such variety, reaching a height and spread of 20m in ideal circumstances and would be effective in this situation. However, also there are dwarf alpine varieties that are perfect in rock gardens, for example 'Dora Amateis' which bears lovely white flowers in spring and achieves a maximum height and spread of only 60cm.

The wonderful world of Rhododendrons brings colour and interest for much of the year but it is in **spring** that the greatest glories occur. Make your selection for your situation and as long as you give them a helping hand as they become established, they will bring you joy for many years to come.

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The Seasonal Gardener

Has Spring finally Sprung? Maybe we'll get 4 seasons this year instead of one long rainy season! Well as I write it feels more like summer! I personally will not be missing the long murky grey days and cold weather of winter. I'm revelling in the sunshine, the longer evenings of light that mean we can be out in our gardens more often and for longer. The spring bulbs are doing their job of cheering us up and helping us look forward to the next delights of our gardens. My flowering cherry tree is in full bloom and the fluffy catkins of my weeping willow bring a smile to my face.

However, while walking around enjoying this beautiful time, I see much is to be done if we're going to get the best out of the garden this year. **April is a busy time** of year. The planning is over and now we can actually start to do constructive things.

It's the last chance to plant bare root hedges and plants before they burst into growth. All the established shrubs and trees need feeding and mulching for the summer. Last minute tidy ups of dead growth and pruning of overgrown plants can be done now. Very important is to get the supports in for all the perennial plants that have a tendency to flop in the summer. Done now, the plants grow through and over the supports and hide them. And it's much easier than feeding long fragile growth through the little holes of the supports! The veg plot is de-weeded, manured and fertilized ready to plant seedlings, and the soil is covered to warm quicker as I'm on heavy clay! The seeds in the greenhouse for both vegetables and pretty annuals are coming on a treat.

I'm staggering the sowing of my seeds in the hope that I won't have to prick out all the seeds in one go like I did last year! My garlic and onion sets are in the ground now with more in pots waiting to go out when they're a bit bigger. My potatoes are chitting nicely, although I can't say it made a huge difference when I planted out unchitted seed potatoes last year! This weekend I went over my lawn with a dethatcher to remove the moss and will be aerating it this week before giving it a spring treat of feed and weed killer. Hopefully it will be better placed to stand up to the wear and tear of the kids.

Ah, so much to do and I can't wait to get stuck in. So I'll leave you with this thought. The soothsayers believe that after a hard cold winter there will be a long hot summer. Fingers crossed, I say and get those water butts cleaned and ready for the hosepipe ban!
