

Letter from Rev Sister Josie Midwinter:

WELCOME

The church of St Peter is a welcoming place and we are committed to keeping the church open every day so that people can come in and have a time of quiet and prayer. We want to extend that welcome by drawing people into the drama of the Easter story with a series of interactive displays in church. These will be available



on the Monday and Tuesday of Holy Week - 29 & 30 March. There will be six stations and each will have a bible reading, a meditation and some action related to that theme. Once again our procession will be led by Tracey the donkey from the Island Farm Donkey Sanctuary and the music will be supplied by members of



the Abingdon Brass Band. This is an ecumenical event, which means everyone is welcome to come and join us. After the procession there will be coffee/tea and hot cross buns in the church.

WORSHIP

Easter is the central festival of the Christian faith as it puts everything else into context. At Easter we celebrate the wonder of Jesus rising from the dead for the forgiveness of **all** our sins. There are a number of opportunities over the Easter weekend to enter into a time of worship,



thanking God for the love that he has shown us through his son Jesus. The dawn service at 5:30am on Easter morning is perhaps the most moving. There is something very special about entering a totally dark church, lighting the Pascal candle, and then watching the dawn breaking. The whole idea of light overcoming the darkness summarizes the gospel message. The darkness of hurt and wrongdoing and brokenness is overcome by the bright light of God's love for each and everyone of us.



The battle is going well and we have made good progress, but we need your membership to demonstrate local backing. Do not imagine the reservoir threat has gone away, it has merely been delayed. We aim to kill it off at the Public Inquiry in June. Unless you want recreational facilities 25 years hence, huge disruption over 10 years as the reservoir, pipelines and treatment works are built, and much more traffic throughout - all at enormous cost to water consumers - then please join GARD. We really need your support.

GARD originated as a local group opposed the reservoir. We realized that the local objections; traffic, noise, flood risks, nature, conservation, blight, etc would not kill the project. These are best addressed by politicians and CPRE. So GARD chose to analyse the technical arguments and expose the many flaws in Thames Water's arguments and figures. Their case is weak and it is clearly motivated by commercial gain at the expense of consumers. The reservoir is their most expensive option and GARD submitted a range of alternatives which were not properly assessed. GARD has made a major impact, and the Environment Agency has just published continuing serious reservations about the plan. GARD can show that the proposed reservoir is NOT needed.



PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Richard Williams

Meeting held on Mon 1st February 2010



Progress was reported on several issues which, in one way or another, involve transport. Thames Valley Police recently stated in their 'Outer Abingdon' neighbourhood report that traffic speeding through local villages has been high on the list of local concerns, and has therefore been identified as a priority for further investigation. As part of this, TVP carried out a traffic survey over three days (January 21st - 23rd) on the Steventon Road in Drayton, just south

of the A34 bridge and within the 30 mph zone. The figures indicate that about 8 out of 10 drivers were exceeding the posted speed limit, with about 5 out of 10 travelling above the enforcement threshold level (in this case, 35 mph). Approximately 15% of drivers were logged at speeds in excess of 41 mph. The police comment that these figures appear to be on the high side, and have therefore arranged for the road to be assessed for potential mobile speed camera enforcement. There are no guarantees as to the outcome of the assessment, but the survey data will certainly be used to inform any decisions made.

Oxfordshire County Council has sent us plans for proposed improvements to bus stops in Drayton and Steventon along the X2 and 35 bus routes. These include the upgrade of bus information at each stop, the relocation or replacement of existing bus stop poles, and the provision of bus stop clearway markings on the carriageway to discourage vehicles from parking indiscriminately on, or in close proximity to, the stop. The overall aim of the project is to facilitate bus access for all bus users, and the plans do appear to offer more waiting room and greater safety, especially at some stops along the Steventon Road, where conditions are at present very inadequate. A note of caution is necessary as these are still only proposals, but the Public Transport Development Team have indicated that the work should commence later this year and continue into 2011.

A subject of relevance to both the above items is the number of potholes that seem to have sprung up everywhere as a result of frost damage following last month's cold snap. Repair of these is the responsibility of the Highways Dept of the County Council, and not the Parish Council, but it is pleasing to note that alert parishioners have been on the case and reported some of the more serious cases of damage. Several of the larger potholes in and around the village have already been mended, although obviously patience is in order here as the task is huge and resources limited. The Thames Valley Police neighbourhood team have also reminded us that, as an alternative to contacting the relevant authority direct, it is also possible to report local problems such as potholes, but also graffiti, fly tipping, broken street lights etc, to the website www.fixmystreet.com.

Mention was made last month of the information sheet regarding fees and charges for the Parish burial ground. This is sent to all local stonemasons, and a copy is also posted in the porch of St. Peter's Church. A lack of clarity in the wording of this suggested that it would be possible for relatives to have more than one monument erected on a grave. This was never the case, but the document has been revised to indicate more clearly that the right to place a monument on a grave is limited to the provision of a single headstone or tablet. It would be wrong to think of this stipulation as a restriction, as it evidently meets the needs of the great majority of relatives, but the PC feel that it is the best way to preserve the simplicity and dignity appropriate to a parish burial ground.

Progress on Speeding

After nearly three years of trying to get something done about the speed of traffic on the Steventon Road (beyond the A34 bridge), I am delighted to report definite progress. Thanks to the Parish Council, we paid for an independent survey using a Thames Valley Safer Roads Partnership Black Box survey. This counts the number of vehicles over two days and an average speed per vehicle. (Don't worry, no individual vehicles are picked out!). The survey has established what many



of us have thought for some time, that the average speed is in excess of 37mph and 15% of vehicles are doing more than 42mph. People who have to back out onto that road find it increasingly dangerous. Armed with this hard evidence that there is indeed a problem, the police will be using speed cameras there on many occasions in the coming months. I am told that the majority of speeding cases in Oxfordshire involve drivers speeding in their own towns and villages. I'd love to be able to show hat that is also untrue for Drayton. Please drive carefully!

Community Day 2010

We have a provisional date for Community Day 2010 of Saturday July 3rd. The Parish Council will certainly wish the event to go ahead and will lend its support. The problem is we need some people to take over the organisation of the day. There are also practical considerations, in that the PC remains responsible for the upkeep of graves long after immediate relatives may have ceased to maintain them, and in these days of topple testing and possible future health and safety requirements, as yet unforeseen, this could also represent a substantial financial commitment.

WESTMINSTER LETTER

It's relatively quiet in Parliament at the moment. The Government has a relatively light legislative programme. I am responsible for the Digital Economy Bill, which is the Bill which would introduce sanctions against people who illegally download music or films, but it is still in the House of Lords. We expect it to come to the Commons in March, but there is a lot of doubt about whether there will be time to pass it in time for the election. One piece of legislation that we did pass

very quickly was the Video Recordings Bill. This was a unique piece of legislation, for fairly unique reasons. It was actually passed in 1984, and outlawed what were then known as 'video nasties'. i.e. pornographic or extremely violent videos. Technically, this was a restriction on trade, and so it had to be notified to the European Commission under something called the Technical Standards Directive. Unfortunately successive Governments failed to notify the European Commission so the Act was technically unenforceable. This mistake was only discovered last year, and in the intervening period many people have exploited the loophole. So when Parliament returned, we repealed the Act and then enacted it in a day, or more accurately three hours. Extraordinary! I like to think it was a fine piece of eurosceptic legislation that held out over the increasing tide of euro legislation for a creditable 25 years!

The other issue exercising politicians is whether, on election day, votes should be counted over night, or the next day. Some people have started a campaign called "Save General Election Night". Our own local council has decided to count the votes the next morning. The local paper rang me up and expected me to be outraged. In fact, I could not be more relaxed. With such a squeeze on public finances, why on earth should local taxpayers be expected to fork out the additional expense of counting votes overnight? The votes for county and district elections are counted the next day and no one seems to mind. At the 2005 election, the result in Wantage did not come through until 6am - so council officers were kept up all night, and then presumably took the day off the next day (or more accurately that day) anyway. Much better to have them count the votes on a Friday when they are wide awake, and the candidates have had a good night's sleep.

Locally, I continue to be worried about local services. Thankfully, the cuts to the youth services budget have not been severe as expected, and the Sweatbox in Wantage is fine. But we have lost our local services point, and the civic hall's hours have been reduced. As I said at our Future of Wantage meeting, we need real leadership to get Wantage and Grove moving again. I am also disappointed that, with the 2500 houses in Grove now back on the agenda, it has been decided to site another 1,500 houses in Wantage. I continue to campaign for the railway station, and I have set up meetings with Network Rail tot ake the project forward.

In Parliament, I called a debate on the pernicious effects of the Criminal Records Bureau, and how it is affecting my constituents. The CRB takes so long to carry out checks that often people lose the jobs which they have been offered. Also, too many people are subject to multiple CRB checks which is time consuming and expensive.
