

NORMAN STIMPSON By Richard Webber

I first met Norman on the Village Hall stage - he was either Bubble or Squeak (I can't remember which) and I was the Giant. When I suggested to him that the Drayton Players should be more ambitious than merely producing pantomimes each year, he told me, in no uncertain terms, that he had been here long enough to know what the village wanted in the way of entertainment. I still think he was wrong on that issue, but Norman knew this village inside out and had worked tirelessly for it for many years as Chairman of the Parish Council, fund raiser and prime mover and shaker. Stimpson's, the Greengrocers in Ock St (now Domino's Pizza) was relied upon by most of Abingdon's shoppers before anyone had ever heard of Tescos. You could get any food you wanted. The prices seemed reasonable and the personal service was second to none. How Norman found time to organise and galvanise this village the way he did, whilst running the store, still mystifies me, but without Norman, I doubt we would have a Village Hall or a Drayton Chronicle - let alone a thriving Parish Council. I last met Norman at his home by Sandford Brook in Abingdon about eighteen months ago. I had been summoned to be given a video of the fundraising events held in the 1960s and early 1970s for the proposed new Village Hall. It was obvious that he still loved this village deeply, and we all owe him an enormous debt of gratitude. On behalf of everyone, I would like to send our sympathy and affection to Daria and her family.

SPRING

At the time of writing, it looks as if Spring is here. The life that's beginning to show outside now is extraordinary. Plants that you were sure were dead, especially after this cold hard winter, have survived against the odds and are bringing themselves back to life. This is such an exciting time of year in the garden. The potential is amazing. What will be achieved this year? It's time to get cracking! All the planning over winter, deciding what to grow and how to change your garden can now start to be put into place.

Finally, we can see the end to the cold miserable winter. At least, in so much as plants are starting to grow again giving us the hope of a new growing year and warmth to come. The many bulbs, planted in autumn last year, are poking their green leaves up through the soil ready to give us the longed for spring display of daffodils and crocus.

Last month was clearing up time and now that's all finished we can start to plant. Onions and shallots can go outside, still protected from the pigeons. Sow your annual flowers for filling your beds with gorgeous colour for the least amount of money and the largest amount of satisfaction. Make sure they're kept warm and covered with either a clear lid, cling film or clear bag until you see the first leaves poking through. Then it's time to take the cover off and watch them grow away.

Go out into your garden and look at those perennials starting to emerge. Are they crying out for more space? Do you need to split them up and make more plants to fill gaps in other places? You can do it now. Forsythia, winter jasmine, mahonia are either finishing up or going full bloom. In fact, Spring is the time for yellow to shine. Bringing the sunshine that we all need to be cheerful. The perfect Easter colours!

The Magnolia, a signature plant of this time of year, really can be the showpieces of the garden. Most species of Magnolia produce flowers in spring, often before the leaves appear, and are usually followed by attractive cone-shaped and colourful fruits.

Seasonal highlights: Animals and birds are waking up now. Birds getting ready to lay and mammals that are soon to give birth will be on the look out for any extra food they can get - help them out if you can.

March/early April is the ideal time for pruning. Prune shrub and climbing roses, heathers and mahonias. This time of year is also perfect for planting and replanting. Pick out which perennials flowered less last season - these can be divided and separated to give them a new lease of life. Nutrients are also very important for a healthy garden so definitely don't forget to fertilise now.

DRAYTON HALL DAMAGE

In recent weeks there have been several incidents of damage to the Hall occurring at weekends, and on Friday last (March 12th), five windows were smashed incurring a cost of £350.

These attacks seem to be after the consumption of alcohol and are pointless, distressing and costly.

Sandra Syphas, one of our Police Community Support Officers has given a brief outline of how the police are responding.

The plans of action put in place so far are as follows:

The Drayton Hall patrol has now been made a "tasking". This means that it will be included on the briefing site for all shift officers. There are three shifts per day, and a tasking must be attended - this means the area will be patrolled during each shift i.e early, day & late, also, whenever we PCSO's are on duty, we will be patrolling the area as well. (The early and late shifts will be during dark hours where possible). This means four patrols per day at least. Obviously, the PCSO's will spend most of our shift in the area during our late turns at the weekend, which is what we've been doing of late and this has resulted in several large amounts of alcohol being confiscated in recent weeks.

The crime reduction advisor will be talking to Ann Webb later this week, to discuss further preventative measures.

Our Neighbourhood Inspector - Inspector Ian Money has been made aware of the situation and is very keen to see an end to these problems.

The police would welcome any information or suggestions that would help resolve this sort of vandalism. They can be contacted on: 0845 8 505 505 (999 for emergencies).

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LETTER FROM REVD JOSIE MIDWINTER

Dear Friends

I stood in the corner of the garden by the wall. As I looked to the left I saw a lovely wild garden, with a stream bubbling through the trees and with snowdrops and aconites scattered here and there. As I looked to the right, over the wall, I saw a busy main road, with a stream of cars, the post office, a bus stop and signs of busy life.

As I listened to the left I heard the caw of rooks building their nests high in the trees, the cascading of the water over a small waterfall and the crackle of wood burning on a nearby bonfire. As I listen to the right, I heard the roar of the traffic, the hum of light aircraft flying overhead, the sound of the bus pulling away from the bus stop.

Looking and listening to the left I felt safe and secure. I was in the garden of Begbrooke Priory on a Quiet Day so in a very peaceful and loving place. I felt how good it would be to stay in such a place forever and just be comforted and protected by its tranquillity. But it is not the way things are. The busy world on the right also has its place in my life just as it does in all our lives.

St Paul when he wrote to the early Christians, he told them they should be IN THE WORLD, not, OF THE WORLD. As Christians, as followers of Jesus, we are not called to take the easy option of cutting ourselves off from the unpleasant and distracting things of life, but to engage in them and work through them. But in doing that we have to protect ourselves from the destructive values of worldly ways. Jesus in his ministry gave us a very hard path to follow - he called it the narrow way. Not narrow in the sense of being small minded and petty, but narrow in the sense of taking care where we walk so that we maintain the path of truth, and justice and peace. That really is a hard path to follow.

As I approach retirement I have quite a few dreams in my head of peaceful days doing all those things I have not had time to do before . even as I write this I can hear a hollow laugh coming from many retired people who say they are busier than ever! But there are things I will have time to do, and enjoy doing them. The peaceful garden is very attractive.

However the busy road is just over the wall, it is the responsibility of all Christians to engage with that world. At the moment I do not know what that might mean. I feel the seeds of ideas in my mind, but I do not want to rush their growth, but wait for God to show me what he wants me to do. I have very much enjoyed five years in Drayton - engaging with the church, engaging with the community and getting to know so many wonderful people. It is a privilege to be a church minister because you meet people in all circumstances of life and share with them at a deep level. It is a way of life rather than a job. But in all that activity I have sometimes felt I am not giving enough time to my relationship with God. That has to be my first priority - both in the garden and on the road.

I shall be staying locally so I know there will still be opportunities to meet people, but as I leave, I must allow St Peter's to move on in its own way. As I think of the clergy and lay people who have served St Peter's over many generations I realise it is the contributions of so many which make the life of the church the rich and warm environment it is for now and for generations to come. I will miss that warmth, but there is the promise of finding it again wherever I meet with other Christians.

WOODEN SPOON RECIPE No. 34

Butternut Squash and Thyme Soup (serves 4)

(from November 2000)

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb butternut squash (peeled and cut into chunks), 1 onion (finely chopped), $\frac{1}{2}$ oz butter, 1 bay leaf, $1\frac{1}{2}$ pints chicken or vegetable stock, salt and freshly ground black pepper, $\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoon chopped fresh thyme, 4 tablespoons double cream.


Put the squash and onion into a large, heavy saucepan with the butter. Cook gently for ten minutes or until beginning to soften. Add the bay leaf, stock and a little pepper (salt will not be needed if you use stock cubes for the stock).

Bring to the boil, then simmer as slowly as possible for 25 minutes, or until the squash is soft.

Carefully liquidise the soup in a food processor or blender. Return to the rinsed-out saucepan. Stir in the thyme and cream and check the consistency. If too thin, reduce by rapidly boiling. If too thick add extra stock or water.

Taste and adjust seasoning.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Richard Williams

Meeting held on Monday 1st March 2010

Inevitably, some of the issues that have the greatest potential effect on local parishes involve decisions taken at a far from local level, and in such cases, the decision-making process is almost bound to be contentious. The proposed new high-speed rail link through the Chilterns promises battles ahead for many years to come. What though of the proposed Abingdon reservoir, which, if not in quite the same cost league as the railway, is another project on a similarly massive scale? If it is ever approved, the reservoir will undoubtedly have a profound effect on Drayton, Steventon and the surrounding villages.

Having updated us on the latest progress in last month's Chronicle, Nick Thompson, the Chairman of GARD (Group Against Reservoir Development) returned to the fray by addressing this month's PC meeting. Part of Nick's concern was precisely the fact that although a considerable amount of interest in the reservoir (and opposition to it) has been evident in Steventon, Marcham and the Hanneys, the response of Drayton residents so far seems to be largely one of indifference. The Chairman of the PC confirmed that to date only one parishioner had petitioned the Parish Council on the reservoir issue, and Mr Thompson wondered if some people in Drayton were simply unaware of the full impact that the reservoir would have on the village. Possible impacts on the Drayton side included a pipeline and a water channel; a treatment works; and recreational facilities such as canoeing, boating and fishing that would generate large amounts of additional traffic.

In fairness, it is quite possible that not all residents of Drayton regard the reservoir as an unmitigated disaster, and for some, the prospect of increased leisure and recreational facilities such as those mentioned may well seem a positive advantage. Certainly, a range of opinions was expressed in the meeting, although all were agreed that, regardless of other pros and cons, the only justification for building the reservoir in the first place would be proven need that could not be met in any other way.

Nick's article last month expressed the hope that matters may be resolved by the Public Inquiry that is to be held in June. However, the Parish Council remains sceptical, and has already written (three times) to DEFRA asking how the Inquiry can make a decision on the reservoir part of the Water Resources Management Plan in the summer of 2010 when the National Policy Statement on water resources is not due out until December 2010. So far, no reply has been received, but Daniel Scharf and Richard Webber will be attending the Inquiry meetings in other capacities, and will be monitoring proceedings for us.

Also attending the meeting were four members of the public who made representations about the makeup of Eastway and the bridle path. The County Council had repaired the road surface recently, although the edges were not adequate. It appeared that OCC Highways saw themselves as responsible for the tarmac, but not the bridle path which was repaired by Countryside Services: it is still unclear who is responsible for the surface repairs up to Steventon Road. It is understood that utility pipes may lie under the surface of the bridleway. The residents were asked to contact their County Councillor, Mr Mike Badcock, to bring pressure to bear on OCC to sort out the issue, and meanwhile, Jenny Pooley has approached Countryside Services on behalf of the Parish Council. This is a good example of how what appears on the surface (no pun intended) to be a reasonably straightforward matter, can quickly become complicated by having to deal with multiple agencies whose respective areas of responsibility are not always easy to distinguish. Suffice to say that the PC will continue to investigate.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Monday 12th April (due to the Bank Holiday the previous week). This meeting is also the occasion of the Annual Parish Assembly, so do please come along to the Caudwell Day Centre and meet your councillors and find out what the Parish Council does. The Assembly starts at 7pm, followed by the Parish Council meeting at the usual time of 7.30pm.

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DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

Unsung Heroes - Josie, Sheila and Ann were three of many across the Vale who were being singled out for long service to their communities. Our three heroes were rightly applauded, appreciated and certificated in front of an audience of nearly 200 at the Guildhall. We all agreed that it was a wonderful event – and (much to my relief), it was agreed that the Guildhall caterers had really come up trumps with the food and the quick, polite service. I passed this message back to the staff at the Guildhall and it was very much appreciated.

Problems One of the frustrations of doing this job is the length of time it takes to get things done. As fast as one problem seems to be solved, three new problems have arrived. Please, when something needs to be done, could I appeal to all those who are responsible – be they Police, Primary Care Trust, Parish, District, County Councils, Highways or even Westminster – to get on with it and not use red tape as a means of delaying action.

In Drayton, we have a number of problems which have been rumbling on for far too long. There is the East Way surface – still only partially fixed. There is speeding through the village – in Abingdon Road, Steventon Road and the High Street. There is the dangerous corner at the end of High Street – a danger to pedestrians, traffic and residents. There is the problem of underage drinking. There is the issue of hedge clippings on the bicycle path to Abingdon. All these issues could have been addressed, if not solved, by now but for different Authorities blocking progress with red tape. Before I am accused of Party Politicking, my own authority is not blameless.

But, as with my golf, I try to remember the good bits – the Authority Partnerships – where one helps the other to find speedy, effective solutions - and that's what keeps me going.

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WESTMINSTER LETTER

I recently had a chance to catch up about our County Regiment, the Rifles. I suspect not many people realise that we have a County Regiment. If we think of the local military presence, we tend to think naturally of the Royal Logistics Corp at Abingdon, or the bomb disposal experts, 11 EOD at Didcot. But the Rifles are our County Regiment, formed over many years from regiments such as the Ox and Bucks Light Infantry and the Royal Berkshires. The regimental historian, Gary Sheffield, lives locally in Wantage, and he is keen to strengthen the connection between the Rifles and local towns and villages.

The Rifles are the most successful recruiting regiment in the British Army. One in four cadets wear their cap badge (the bugle). They march at 140 paces a minute, compared to 120 for the rest of the Army. Every day for the last four years, a batallion from the Rifles has been serving in Afghanistan. They have suffered significant loss of life, and severely wounded.

The Rifles currently enjoy the freedom of Wallingford. I hope that we can do something in other towns and villages to celebrate their achievements, and recognise the strong and historic connection the regiment has with our area.

On local matters, the reservoir enquiry is drawing closer, with submissions going in in mid-March with a view to the enquiry being held in June/July. As I have always said, Thames Water's proposals need to be tested in an open forum, and I hope local people and their concerns will get a fair hearing.

This is a short update before the final sprint to the Public Inquiry. GARD has submitted its Statement of Case to the Inquiry Inspector ready for the 15 June start date. The Environment Agency case has much in common with GARD's and we are very hopeful that our arguments will swing the Inquiry outcome against any mention of the proposed reservoir in Thames Water's final plan for the next 25 years. We have recently obtained several vital documents which had been withheld until now, and most of these strengthen the case for our alternatives. We still maintain that all the evidence points to the fact that no need exists to justify the reservoir in the next 25 years, and that in the event of demand rising there are better, quicker to construct, more environmentally appropriate alternatives which we believe are also substantially cheaper.

Next month we will be making a public relations push. We would be very grateful for your support. Do visit our website www.abingdonreservoir.org.uk and back up our efforts to eliminate this unnecessary threat to the future of our villages.



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
