# DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

#### **Community Day**

It's been a hard decision. After four Community Days – one a year since 2006 – all based at the Village Hall – all organised by different groups of hard-working volunteers – each with an attendance in excess of 600 people of all ages – could we manage it one more year? We had lost some key people. People who had given hours and hours of time, effort and sometimes money to helping make the Community Day a success – but people who had already given more than anyone could possibly expect. It was proving very difficult to get replacements. Was attendance falling? Had the whole idea of a free entry event, heavily supported by the Parish Council and other generous donors based in and around the Village Hall, reached its sell-by date? There seemed to be a feeling that it might need a re-think.

Whatever we did, someone or some willing organisation had to be prepared to take over the organisation of the event.

Drayton Twinning Society have a proven track record of organising events over the past 10 years and have expressed an interest in running a Community Day with a difference. A Community Day on The Millennium Green - but under the title:-

> The First Drayton Village Apple and Walnutfest - Fun and games for the whole family -

September/October this year.

#### Vale of White Horse District Council

Editorial board permitting, I have been asked to say something about some of the issues involving my own Council, VWHDC. So here goes:

Waste Collection

Unless you have been fast asleep or living on another planet, you will be aware of the new joint Waste Contract with South Oxon District Council, due to kick in in October. We have the considerable advantage that their half of the contract began a year earlier and hence, we are almost certain to suffer a much reduced settling down period.

Whenever a new contract begins, there are inevitable difficulties, hic-cups and questions.

Does everyone understand what they are supposed to be doing? (If not, please let me know)

Have appropriate arrangements been made for collecting rubbish and recyclables from every kind of property? (If I am to believe the feedback forms received by VWHDC from you so far, it would seem that they have – let me know if I am wrong).

Will kitchen waste be collected weekly? – Yes.

What will be recycled? – most things – including plastics – nearly all types.

Do I have to sort the different recyclables? – No, machines do that.

And what's the point of it all? Believe me, I have tested and questioned this contract in every way I can think of and I can find little to fault it. SODC have already increased their recycling rates to over 80% - we should be able to do the same – this will drastically reduce the chances of EU fines for failing to meet targets (targets which we signed up to many years ago) The vehicles will push out 60% less CO2 than the present lot.

And, finally, because it is a shared contract, there have been considerable savings, which together with savings derived from our Shared Management arrangement with SODC, will protect us from a good deal of the pain which much local government in this country is about to have to face.

#### **Town Centre Vitality**

I would like to correct one common misconception. Abingdon, Wantage and Faringdon have, and always have had, a retail premises occupancy level well above the national average. A walk through Abingdon Town Centre (particularly a week-end walk) I believe shows a town that is steadily growing in self confidence. There is more to see and do. There are more places to eat and drink. The pavements and squares are looking better cared for. I absolutely refuse to believe the pessimists who claim that Abingdon is a dead, dying dump. Such a claim is not only wrong, it is, in itself, a major obstacle to further progress.

#### **Community Safety**

It is undeniable, the Vale is one of the safest places to live in the whole country. Thanks to the efforts of the police, our excellent PCSOs and the VWHDC Community Safety Team, the good figures are getting even better.

I am fully aware that not everything is right and that times may well get tougher before they get easier. Whilst I am happy to listen to anybody who thinks otherwise, I am proud of what my Council is achieving at present.

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
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# PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Richard Williams



Report of the Drayton Parish Council AGM and council meeting held on Monday 7th June 2010.

Five members of the Council met this month and were joined briefly by our County Councillor Mike Badcock and by a member of the public who wished to discuss an issue concerning street lighting. Following on from concerns that have been expressed recently about anti-social

behaviour around the Village Hall, and the associated vandalism to the Hall itself, Sgt Kevin Hickman of the Thames Valley Police attended the meeting to share some of the information the police have about the problem and to explain what actions they have been taking.

Sgt Hickman confirmed that the youths found around the Hall, and in the village late at night, were not all from Drayton, and that young people from both Drayton and Abingdon had been returned late at night (or in the early hours of the morning) to their parents. This reminder to parents of their responsibilities would continue.

Alcohol is a particular problem, and this was being confiscated from under-age drinkers, and from any adults accompanying them who were thought to be supplying them. Daniel Scharf felt that alcohol was certainly the catalyst for a lot of anti-social behaviour, but provided that the drink was taken away from underage young people, he did not generally favour moving them on from the vicinity of the Hall as this would probably just displace the disruptive behaviour to another, and possibly more troublesome, location in the village. In discussion, it was agreed that further alcohol awareness sessions at the local Abingdon secondary schools should be considered, and Daniel Scharf volunteered to take part in such school visits if the police organised them.

The Parish Council has been asked by the Energy Officer at the Vale to draw everyone's attention to the insulation grants which are now available to Vale residents wishing to insulate their lofts or cavity walls. The additional funding secured by the District Council enables the insulation work to be carried out for a standard price of just £99. In addition to this, those over the age of 70 and those in receipt of certain benefits may be entitled to free loft and cavity wall insulation. The Energy Officer stresses that, although this is an excellent offer, funding is limited and will be awarded on a first come, first served basis. The grant is distributed on behalf of the District Council through the insulation discount scheme Cocoon, and for more information please contact Cocoon on 0800 80 48 777, or visit their website: www.cocoonyourhome.co.uk

Another scheme intended to benefit the environment is also in the pipeline. Most people will be aware that a new waste collection scheme starts in the Vale this autumn, with the aim of boosting the amount of waste which is recycled and at the same time, drastically reducing the amount which goes to landfill. Figures supplied by Oxfordshire County Council state that, within the Vale, 64% of household waste is currently sent to landfill. This percentage, plus the fact that the total quantity of waste is increasing, places great pressure on existing landfill sites, and is becoming unsustainable, given the limited space for new sites, and their unattractive impact on surrounding localities. A similar scheme introduced in South Oxfordshire last summer has increased the recycling rate from 42% to 65% in a single year. The new service in the Vale will actually be on a joint contract with South Oxfordshire, which it is hoped will reduce costs as well as produce long term benefits for the community. As a huge number of new bins have to be delivered to households, the distribution operation starts early and is spread over the summer months. The estimated delivery dates for Drayton are 23rd August – 6th September. ➡

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### ST PETER'S LETTER

Dear Drayton,

It's my turn to write the "church-y" letter this month, so let me introduce myself. Though I live in Milton, Peter and I have worshipped at St.Peter's for 18 years. I've been on the PCC since 1993 (most of that time as Secretary) and also for many years as



St.Peter's lay representative on Abingdon Deanery Synod. I have been elected to Oxford Diocesan Synod for the past 12 years. In other words, a bit of a busy-body! I thoroughly enjoy all I do at St.Peter's and in the Diocese, the people I meet, the services I attend, and all the activities which are offered.

For many years I have been involved in the St.Peter's Prayer Hub, which puts in place a framework for prayer to underpin everything which happens in St.Peter's. Many of you will know of the Prayer Board in the Lady Chapel, where anyone can come and write a card of prayer for someone who is ill or in trouble, or perhaps a thank-you for something good which has happened. At Morning Prayer each day, we bring these prayers to God, and at the end of each month, the cards are blessed on the altar at the Eucharist. We also have a Prayer Chain where emergency prayers are sent round by phone and by e-mail to those in a praying circle. Anyone can ask for this kind of prayer support – there are little explanatory leaflets near the big entry door into Church giving contact details. *"You Stay, We Pray"* is operated by the Prayer Hub.

I am a Diocesan Member of Mothers' Union, and have recently been elected a Diocesan Trustee which I am finding very interesting. One of the MU things I do is Welcoming at Christ Church Cathedral once a month – I usually meet visitors from over 20 nations (Poland and China are big at present) in one day since the world comes to Oxford.

One of my passions is the strengthening of family life and as a Trustee of PACT (Parents And Children Together) I feel I can support this big-time. PACT aims to make a difference in society and increase the life-chances of children through housing and community projects, fostering and adoption, and training workers in the Care sector. At present, I serve on their Adoption Panel, and am also involved in other projects.

It would be lovely to welcome you in St.Peter's one Sunday, so give it a whirl!

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### A Historical Note by Lois Rennels

I found a reference to Drayton in *The Diary of a Country Parson* 1758 – 1802 that I thought might be of interest to *Chronicle* readers. The diarist is James Woodforde who was a scholar at New College Oxford and was ordained Deacon in May 1763.

September 3 1763: 'Went this morning to Draton [sic] (two little miles beyond Abingdon) and talked with Mrs Bacon about serving that Church tomorrow. She says that she will give me half a guinea, a dinner and stabling for my horse, therefore I promised her that I would serve it tomorrow and the next Sunday. Mrs Bacon behaved very handsome to me; she has a school of twentytwo young ladies. After drinking a glass of Mountain and eating a bit of crust of bread, I returned to Oxford and dined at New College in ye Hall. Mrs Bacon pressed me to dine with her, but I had ordered in Hall, and I could not.'

Sadly my copy of the diaries is an edited version of the original five volumes and there is no entry in it to say how he got on in Drayton. Does anyone know what Mountain was?

# WESTMINSTER LETTER **Ed Vaizey**

"As some of you may have heard, I have been made the Minister for Culture, Communications and the Creative Industries. This is a long title, possibly one of the longest in Government. It also includes in effect two jobs. One is to cover the arts, libraries, broadcasting and the creative industries over at the Department for Culture Media and Sport (known as DCMS). The other is to cover broadband roll out, telecoms, and illegal filesharing over at the Department of Business (known as BIS). Phew.

As a local MP, it is interesting to consider how these reponsibilities affect people in the constituency. The first and most obvious is broadband rollout. About ten per cent of all homes do not have broadband at all, and about one in 3 have very poor broadband, mainly in rural areas. There are some parts of the constituency that remain affected. Our aim is to get everyone to have a basic broadband service by the end of 2012, and to roll out high speed broadband over the next few years. If you have any issues with broadband do let me know.

I also cover what is known as illegal filesharing. This is a hugely controversial new law which would allow internet companies to temporarily disconnect people if it could be proved that they have been copying music or films without proper authorisation. This is something we have to act on, as every piece of music that is copied illegally takes money away from artists and creators, who provide a lot of money for the economy. We're looking to introduce the new measures next year, but no one will be cut off (and then only temporarily) without plenty of warning and a chance to change their behaviour.

Another issue that is likely to be prominent is libraries, which I also cover. Libraries are very important to local communities, but as money becomes tighter, they may suffer. I will use my position to try and ensure that we can make responsible savings so that libraries continue to provide important services for local people not just book borrowing, but also education and access to broadband and other local and national services.


One local issue has already cropped up which affects my ministerial responsibilities directly. The local television transmitter burnt down, and cannot be replaced until September (they have to build a new one from scratch). Many people have had their TV coverage affected and are understandably looking for a speedy solution and I am looking into this.  $\Rightarrow$ 

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


 $\Rightarrow$  I continue to focus on other local issues as normal. I met with those campaigning against the reservoir, ahead of the public enquiry. I am continuing to campaign for a new station at Grove. And I was delighted that the new Government threw out the housing targets which have led to plans for huge housing developments across the constituency. It may not affect those where planning permission has already been granted but it could lead to a rethink where no decision has yet been made.

Recent constituency engagements include a spot of metal detecting (I also cover archaeology!) and as a judge for Didcot's Got Talent, a great night for pupils aged 6-11 to show off their talents. I tried not to be too Simon Cowell-ish!

The next internal competition will be 'The Wally Weightman Triples' to be held on July the 25th



Dear Editor

I would like to thank the people of Drayton for buying quizzes for £1 each in aid of PACE. To date I have collected £395 and still going! The chief fundraiser for PACE is thinking of selling quizzes every three months or so, I hope that you will enjoy them. Thank you all for being so generous. Just to highlight a few, The Red Lion (Janet & Glen), those at the Post Office, Mr Sansapala at the paper shop and Margaret at the hairdressers.

I would love some of you to visit PACE. Absolute happiness radiates from all the children, who have so little, and from the staff who do so much for them and with them, with high expectations of them. The children light up and modern miracles happen. The staff, from teachers down to physiotherapists and nurses, teach them to be independent as much as possible. The whole day combines physical and mental activities.

Anyone who would like to visit PACE, please ring me and I can let you know the open days. There are walking machines, new computers that react to eye movement alone that write and speak for the children. One child, Jason, was trapped in his own body, unable to move or talk but he can use the new computers (they found that his IQ is 178!) The high number of adults, one per child, and the expensive equipment makes PACE a charity that needs a lot of money on top of the grant from Buckinghamshire County Council.

The children are mostly very disabled when they start at three years old; often Doctors have given up on them. Pace turns no one down and never gives up. One child is starting university next year! Another PACE "old boy" works in their office.

PACE means Positive Achievement in Conductive Education. The belief is that different parts of the brain can take over from the damaged parts. The children work hard and support each other in their success. Believe it or not, Natasha is a house captain this year as she moves on next year to Princes Risborough, where PACE has some classes in a special school.

As a small charity, PACE needs someone rich and famous to choose them. Do you know anyone that fits the bill?

<u>Natasha:</u> I haven't given you an update lately. She adores PACE and all the staff and children. Unfortunately, her body doesn't keep up with her bright spirit. She is now eleven and in

her short life, she has had a shunt to prevent spinal fluid leaking on to her brain, two kidney stone operations in Great Ormond Street (as a result of diuretics used when she was born at twenty four weeks), Peritonitis twice and a double hip operation. She has a feeding tube fitted and she has epilepsy. Since the hip operation her back has become more and more curved like a bow and her ribs have gone out sideways. She is in a lot of pain often but always smiles through and cheers us up. She needs a major operation on her back – it is life threatening. Clare and Jeremy are trying to give her the best quality of life possible until there is no choice but to have it done.

Please pray for her and them.
