

DAMASCUS – The Big Interviews

Each month young reporters from the **DAMASCUS Youth Project** are interviewing Drayton residents involved in their community. This week **Christian Milton and Harry Latimer** talk to **Claire Soper and Glenn Woolley**.

Claire Soper (questions from Christian Milton)

Q:- In what way are you involved in the village and why do you get involved?

CS: I help run Youth Zone, the village youth club, on a Monday evening. Aside from this I have delivered the Drayton Chronicle for 20 years and have also been a Drayton school governor for 10 years. I find getting involved in the community to be a good way of meeting people.

Q:- Do you think there are enough facilities in the village? Can you think of any facilities to improve the community?

CS: There are definitely not enough facilities in the village, especially for 5 years and above. Toby (Claire's Son) went to the parish council to ask for more play equipment.

CS: Donkey, they're really gentle, and symbolic of Christianity.

Q:- In what ways could other people get involved in their community?

CS: By volunteering, Youth Zone desperately needs Volunteers.



Well it's nice to be back to normal after the busy Christmas period and to see all of our friends again.



For those residents looking for a resolution for the New Year, I have a couple of ideas for you. By now everybody will have heard of Mr Cameron's 'Big Society' and many will have voted for his colleague Ed Vaizey at the last election. In the next year there will be a national debate about the Localism Bill, the government's recent attempt to put these ideas into action.

In May the current Parish Council will come to the end of its term and the village will be looking to elect 11 people to take on this role at a time when its powers and responsibilities might be significantly increased. Everybody should also be aware that a start has been made on working up a Community Plan. However, further progress will depend on whether there are people interested in such matters as expanding the recreational opportunities in the village, looking at opportunities to build affordable housing, protecting or improving public transport, maintaining biodiversity, looking at food supply (agriculture, horticulture and allotments) or exploring opportunities for local employment (and many other matters of importance to the future of the village).

A meaningful Plan cannot be produced without large number of people contributing their knowledge, expertise and enthusiasm. Given the range of opportunities on the Parish Council and on the Community Plan working groups there would seem to be a New Year resolution for everyone. Those with **an interest in the Parish Council** can see it in operation at the Caudwell Day Centre at 7.30pm on the first Monday of the month. The total raised in Drayton was £1,798.62 - an increase of 15.44% over the 2009 total. This was £1,332.91 in house-to-house collections, collections of £378.74 in the pubs, shops & Golf Club and £86.97 collected at the RBL Remembrance Service at St.Peter's.

PARISH COUNCIL (Dec & Jan)

At the time of writing, and following the very severe cold snap, we appear to be having a welcome spell of relatively mild weather. However, with a couple of months of winter to go, it's entirely possible that by the time you read this, the temperatures will have plummeted once again. It therefore seems appropriate to mention a couple of schemes which have recently been brought to the attention of the Parish Council, both of them very relevant to this subject.

The Oxfordshire Rural Community Council, which is a registered local charity, has set up a new **bulk-buying scheme for domestic heating oil**, having created a trading arm (ORCC Trading Ltd) specifically for this purpose. Clearly, the scheme is aimed only at people using this particular form of heating, but if, as some reports have suggested, the cost of heating oil has risen even more steeply than gas and electricity, it would seem a timely and potentially very helpful initiative.

The idea is that members will pay an annual fee of £20 to join the scheme. ORCC will continuously shop around between the various oil companies that supply premises in Oxfordshire and get the best price. Once a month, local community-based coordinators will be asked to let ORCC know which of the local members want to order oil, and how much. ORCC will tell the coordinator when the delivery will be and how much it will cost.

As ORCC will be buying for large numbers of customers, it believes that, unless members are only using a tiny amount of oil, the savings they make should be substantially greater than the annual membership fee. It is intended that the scheme be very community-based, and ORCC are looking for local coordinators who will be willing to put in an hour or two each month to help get things off the ground and keep them ticking over. No special skills are required, but co-ordinators must be reliable and well-organised, and they will need access to a home computer and the internet. Local co-ordinators will get free membership of the scheme, thereby enjoying savings without any upfront cost. 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>>> The Parish Council also received a letter from Nicola Blackwood, the MP for Oxford West and Abingdon, concerning a local campaign called the Oxfordshire Surviving Winter Appeal. The appeal highlights the fact that every winter, many vulnerable people in Oxfordshire, mainly elderly, live in fuel poverty which leaves them often having to choose between heating their homes and buying food or medicine. While all eligible older people receive a Winter Fuel Payment to help keep them warm, it may still be a struggle to make ends meet, with all the recent increases not just in fuel prices, but in the cost of many basic foods as well.

At the same time, many people are fortunate enough to be financially secure and do not need this annual benefit as much. In response, Oxfordshire Community Foundation and Oxfordshire Age UK have teamed up to offer a way for those who do not need their Winter Fuel Payment to donate all, or part of it to those who do. The money raised will go to those local charities and community organisations who can reach those most in need of support. If anyone is minded to donate their own allowance to the Oxfordshire Community Foundation, donation forms are available at Oxford Town Hall, County Hall, public libraries, many doctors' surgeries, and so on. Alternatively, people can donate online or download a donation form by going to www.oxfordshire.org where they will find more information about the Appeal.

All of which information leaves little space for recounting the recent activities of the Parish Council. Needless to say, there are plenty of issues to cover, and hopefully I will catch up on some of these in next month's report.

As ever, people are invited to attend any Parish Council meeting to see what goes on. **The next meeting** will be on Monday 7th February, at 7.30pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre, Gravel Lane.

Breaking the rules

Since I took on the job of representing you on the District Council, I've tried to avoid using this column to gain what might be seen as political advantage. Please forgive me for breaking my own rules on two issues, both of which really get to me.

However annoying and inconvenient heavy traffic may be, I am sure that we would all agree that safety on our roads should have top priority. At the Sutton Courtenay end of the High Street we have a persistent problem of traffic entering a 30mph area on a dangerous bend where people have to reverse on to the main road to exit their properties and pedestrians have to take on a steep, muddy crossing. So far, we have been lucky - some would say very lucky, in not having had a serious accident in this part of the village. All that is preventing a solution is the inability of the County Council Highways Dept and Pathways Dept to talk to each other. The Parish Council is prepared to pay its share. All those who agree could help the cause by asking the OCC Highways department to undertake a safety audit on this bend.

A few years ago now, village organisations were being ordered by my own Council to remove notices advertising their events on the grounds that they were adding to 'street clutter'. Thankfully, things have relaxed a little since then. However, the presence of a very large mobile hoarding on the lay-by on the main road into Abingdon – advertising a business at Milton Park - seems to many of us to be an abuse of Advertising regulations. Much more importantly, the siting of the hoarding effectively makes parking in, and exiting from the lay-by highly unsafe. If you agree, please let OCC Highways department know how you feel.

Waste collection, Bank Holidays, Patience & Good Sense

I'd like to thank everyone for their patience and understanding over the Christmas period on this issue. Heavy snow in the run up to Christmas dislocated an already complex collection timetable due to the Christmas and New Year Holidays falling on weekends.

We should be back on track with the Christmas timetable as I write, and fully back to normal collection dates by January 24th. To date I have not received a single complaint from anyone in this village. Elsewhere in the country, there has been a deluge of complaints partly fuelled by some incendiary press reporting. Everything I have seen of our new waste collection contract convinces me that people understand that we are on the verge of posting some of the most impressive figures on recycling rates in the country. **>>>>**

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Student Debt

It seems to me that the most depressing aspect of the recent protests over student fees has been the general level at which the debate has been conducted. We have been subjected to an overdose of emotion and poor press reporting. We face a simple choice:- should we close half the new universities because we cannot afford them, or should we find some way to fund them. In the present financial climate, funding in the old way was simply not possible, in which case, asking the beneficiaries to pay a larger contribution was the only option. I wonder how many of those protesting in the recent riots actually understood the following:-

- 1) No-one under the new system will pay anything up front only after they graduate, and only after they are deemed to be able to afford it. Parents do not have to pay anything.
- 2) Repayments will only kick in when the graduate is earning £21K per year+. At which point, the monthly repayments will be scaled. If people lose their job, or drop back below the £21K threshold, repayments will cease.
 - 3) Any outstanding debt will be written off after 30 years.
- 4) Maintenance grants will be increased from £2906pa to £3250pa
- 5) Graduates earn, on average, at least £100,000 more over their lifetimes than non-graduates.

I simply cannot see the unfairness in any of that, and if it's the only way we can ensure that more people benefit from a university education, then surely it is worth it. Whatever your view, I hope that you will agree with me that nothing, absolutely nothing justifies some of the violence, damage and intimidation we witnessed in London before Christmas. We ended the term with a Christmas Carol concert at St Peter's Church.


Around the School

GARDENING TIME

Winter Performer

The short days of winter may not be prime gardening time but there's one plant that will catch the eye, the **Skimmia**, one of the finest winter-flowering evergreens for the garden, providing spot colour in otherwise dreary parts of the winter border. Because of its compact habit, it's also perfect for containers and jardinières.

The Skimmia's native habitat is the Himalayas, Asia and Japan and this gives some indication as to the plant's hardiness, something to bear in mind in view of the recent cold winters we've had. Skimmias tolerate temperatures of down to -20°C and are not easily damaged by the weight of snow.

Their dark green, leathery leaves are the perfect foil for their showy flowers and berries. Throughout the winter, Skimmia plants are covered in large clusters of red or white flower buds which open into strongly-scented flowers in spring. The flowers will eventually form bright red berries. In fact, all parts of the plant are aromatic when crushed

Individual Skimmia cultivars are either male or female so if you want berries, one of each needs to be planted together to ensure pollination. A nice female plant is *S. japonica 'Nymans'* and this can be planted alongside the male *S. japonica 'Rubella'*. '*Nymans'* produces tiny white flowers which are followed by masses of red berries in late spring. '*Rubella'* provides very dark, red-margined, green leaves and cherry-red flower buds.

However, if space is at a premium in the border or you want to plant in pots, go for the hermaphrodite *S. japonica reevesiana*. This lovely low-growing plant produces clusters of fragrant white flowers, often tinged pink or red, in spring. Flowers are followed by deep crimson berries that last into the autumn, even the winter.

Because Skimmias are slow-growing and mound-forming, they are the perfect container plant, only reaching an eventual height of around a metre. If you are going to plant in a pot, make sure it's at least 35 - 40cm in width and height. Once planted into a good-sized pot, they won't need to be moved on which is a bonus. Make sure you plant in ericaceous compost however and provide an ericaceous liquid or soluble feed during the growing season.

If you want to plant in a border instead, Skimmias combine really well with ferns and hostas. They can also be planted with the acid-loving Pieris, Azalea and Rhododendron (their preferred soil conditions are neutral to acid). They don't like chalky soil so if that's your garden environment, either plant in a pot or incorporate lots of acid-rich matter into the soil. Skimmias are tolerant of both shady and sunny conditions alike.

Another plus-point is that they require minimal pruning, if any. In fact, it's best not to prune at all but simply remove any dead wood. There are some 50 year old Skimmias in the National Trust's Bodnant Gardens in Wales which are still only just over a metre in height yet have never been pruned.

GARD NEWS UPDATE

There have been several enquiries from local people but to date there is no new hard information to report. It is assumed that following the Public Inquiry the Inspector's Report (due to have been submitted to Defra by the end of Nov) is now undergoing 'quality assurance'- whatever that involves!

The Minister responsible for water, Mr Richard Benyon, MP for Newbury is undoubtedly aware of GARD's concerns, and those of the many others opposed to the proposed Thames Water Upper Thames Reservoir (UTR). For understandable reasons of probity Mr Benyon cannot meet GARD or any other interested parties until the Report is officially submitted to him. Meanwhile there has been encouraging interest in the outcome by several MPs, with positive help from Ed Vaizey MP and Nicola Blackwood MP, to whom we are very grateful.

A National Policy Statement (NPS) for Water is due to be issued by the Government in July 2011 and it is our aim that the UTR should not be allowed to feature in it, at least until the alternatives have been properly and thoroughly investigated. GARD will continue to try to educate those who have influence in political circles in the NPS drafting, and we will also make an input to several other policy papers, including those on treatment of wastewater and the £2.8Bn Thames Tideway Tunnel, to reinforce our reputation founded on the expert advice given to us for the Public Inquiry by our distinguished water resources consultants.

Wooden Spoon Recipe No. 37 (from Feb 2003) by LOIS RENNELLS Hot Spiced Beef (serves 4)

2 tablespoons oil or dripping, 1 ½ lb good stewing steak (trimmed and cut into 1" cubes), 3 large onions (peeled), 1 x 200 gram can unsweetened pineapple rings, 2 teaspoons curry powder, 1 tablespoon tomato purée, 1 x 425 gram can peeled tomatoes, 1 tablespoon wine vinegar, 2 tablespoons apricot jam, ¼ pint beef stock, salt and freshly ground black pepper, chopped parsley to garnish.

Pre-heat oven to 160C (adjust for fan ovens)/Gas mark 3.

Heat the oil in a pan and fry the beef (in batches) until evenly browned. Transfer to a casserole.

Chop the onions and pineapple very finely, then add to the pan with all the other ingredients, including pineapple juice, and bring to the boil. Pour this mixture over the beef in the casserole, mix well and cover the casserole tightly.

Cook for $2 - 2\frac{1}{2}$ hours or until the meat is tender. Taste and adjust the seasoning.

Garnish with plenty of chopped fresh parsley.

Serve with plain boiled rice or creamed potatoes. Alternatively this dish is also good served with boiled rice mixed with peppers, chopped toasted nuts, raisins and peas.

ED VAIZEY - Your Local MP

In the constituency the main issue of concern remains housing, with vigorous debates taking place in Wantage, Grove, Didcot and the surrounding villages, and Wallingford, about the amount of housing and where it should be built.

In the coming months, Parliament may pass a Bill to give villages and towns the right to apply for additional housing where they want it, which may change the nature of the debate.

The war is never far away, and in Didcot a plaque has been dedicated at the war memorial for the bomb disposal regiment based there, as well as an express train run by First Great Western. It was a privilege for me to visit one of our injured local soldiers in the Birmingham hospital recently.

Recently, I have received many letters and emails re a campaign to change the time zone of the UK – basically to get rid of daylight saving (DST). It's an issue that has often come before Parliament but has not been properly considered for many years. Daylight Saving Time was introduced in Britain during WW1.

Between 1968 and 1971, year-round DST was adopted for a trial period but later abandoned. Current campaigns are proposing trying this again, or simply moving both summer and winter forward by one hour. It is said that it would reduce road accidents preventing up to 80 deaths and 200 serious injuries every year.

However, I am not convinced that the change would benefit everyone. Apart from the massive costs caused by making the change, early-risers & schoolchildren would have to walk through darker mornings, we would no longer wake to find the sun streaming through our windows and also Greenwich itself would no longer ever observe Greenwich Mean Time. I know that my fellow Ministers continue to hear from both sides of this argument and are currently considering what effects a change would have.

An upcoming issue which Parliament and voters will have to contend with is the referendum on the Alternative Vote system (AV). On the one hand we have a tried and tested method called 'First Past the Post', which I favour, where simply the candidate with the most votes is elected. Despite its simplicity and the comfort to voters who know exactly how their vote will be used, critics say this system is unfair on smaller parties who gain less Commons seats than their percentage of the vote suggests.

AV asks voters to rank the candidates in order of preference, and then eliminates the weakest candidates in rounds, reassigning their votes, until one candidate receives over 50%. I would be interested to know your views.
