Bob Mathews recently lent me a copy of the last 'Drayton



Parish Magazine' to be published in WWII, in December 1940. We all know that the change in our world since then has been breath-taking, but some of the differences might still surprise you.

Despite the rise and rise of the car since WWII, there are now twice as many buses each day from Drayton to Abingdon as there were then! Then telephones were rare but you could make your calls from 'Drayton 24' at Nye's

and take tea and light refreshments at the same time! And your family could leave messages for you there. That magazine contained 22 pages; this Chronicle has only 14! Not much of that magazine was about Drayton or by

Drayton people though, which may explain the fall in circulation mentioned in the reasons given for ceasing publication.

'War-time inevitably brings with it many and varied changes in our national and private life. One such change is the practice of economy both nationally and individually. No waste of food or any other essential commodity; no extravagance or unnecessary purchasing of anything but the necessities of life. Among many other things we are asked to save is paper, which in peace time is plentiful and cheap but now is scarce and dear. Accordingly, in common with many other Parishes, we have decided to discontinue our Parish Magazine, at least for the duration of the war. the monthly circulation has of late fallen away; also our list of advertisements would become smaller and as we chiefly rely on this for paying our way...... Hence the Drayton Parish Magazine, started in 1932, must, for the time being, be in 'abeyance,' which means, according to the King's English Dictionary, 'a state of suspension with the expectation of revival.'

Revival did come, though it wasn't until January 1978 that the first 'Chronicle' appeared, the simpler 'Hall News' preceding it from July 1970. And I doubt that anyone in 1940 foresaw a day when village communications would be virtual, not on paper at all but in cyber-space! Now read opposite: ⇒

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LETTER FROM ST PETER'S

Dear Friends,

St Peter's Church is a Grade 2* listed building and a focal point of the village, not only for the people who worship there but also for the wider community. The maintenance and running costs of the Church are solely the responsibility of the Parochial Church Council. We get no regular outside help unless we



make a specific appeal such as the Gift Day which was held during Rev Josie Midwinter's time with us.

Parishes are asked to pay a "Parish Share" each year to the Diocese, which for St Peter's amounts to over £20,000. The Parish Share goes towards the cost of clergy stipends (i.e. salaries), national insurance, pensions, housing, training, etc. So far we have always managed to pay the Parish Share but it is becoming increasingly difficult, particularly as it increases each year. In addition to the Parish Share there are the Church running costs. For example; our insurance is over £3,000 each year; gas and electricity bills; routine maintenance of the bells, central heating, organ, fire extinguishers and clock. We have recently upgraded our kitchen and provided facilities for the disabled which were only possible due to two generous bequests. We hold our breath that no major work needs to be done in the future.

Where do we get our money? Most of our income comes from pledged weekly or monthly donations from our regular congregation. The rest comes from fund raising such as the summer and Christmas fetes, plant sales and recently jazz concerts held in Church. It is a huge and never ending task. If you can help or contribute in any way we would be glad to hear from you.

WOODEN SPOON RECIPE

Recipe No. 40 (from July 2003)

Chicken with creamy mushrooms and mustard sauce (serves four -six):

2 tablespoons olive oil

- 500g chicken breast cut into strips
- 1 clove garlic (crushed)
- 1 bunch salad onions (diagonally sliced)
- 8 ozs button mushrooms (sliced)
- ¹/₂ pint chicken stock

8 tablespoons half fat crème fraiche 2 teaspoons wholegrain mustard - and finally

2 teaspoons cornflour (blended with a little water), salt and ground black pepper.

Heat the oil in a large frying pan and cook the chicken over a moderate heat for 4-5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Add the garlic, salad onions and mushrooms and cook for a further 3 - 4 minutes.

Stir in the stock, bring to the boil, then stir in the crème fraiche, mustard and blended cornflour. Bring back to the boil and simmer gently for 1 - 2 minutes until thickened and smooth.

THE DIGITAL SWITCHOVER

In September the analogue TV transmissions from the mast at Beckley, from which most of us in Drayton receive our television signals, will be switched off. Analogue BBC2 will be lost on 14 September and the other analogue channels on 28

September. The digital TV signals already broadcast from Beckley will be moved to new frequencies once the analogue signals have gone

If you are one of the few people still using an old analogue-only TV set, one which can receive only the 5 stations BBC1, BBC2, ITV1, C4 and C5, then you **must** get either a new TV set or a 'set-top box' to receive digital transmissions after September. But you will then be able to receive 50+ TV channels instead of 5, including 4 in high definition, 24 digital radio stations and 5 text channels, all free once you have a TV license!

You are more likely to be one of the many people who already watch Freeview digital television, in which case you will already be able to see BBC3 and BBC4, ITV2, ITV3 etc. You won't need any new equipment in September but you will have to re-tune your TV, along with any hard-disc or DVD equipment you use to record programmes.

If you watch satellite TV, from Sky or Freesat, or internet television, the switchover won't affect you at all.

In no case will you **have** to get a new aerial. Fortunately, the aerials used in Drayton to pick up the old analogue TV transmissions from Beckley should work perfectly for the **new** digital signals, though they don't work very well for **existing** digital signals. The new digital signals will allow these more-efficient aerials to be used and will also be more powerful, making in-the-loft aerials a much better prospect in Drayton than before.

Oxfordshire Rural Community Council (ORCC) is working with Digital UK to assist Oxfordshire consumers in the conversion. ORCC will be publicising the Switchover Help Scheme, run by the BBC, which has been set up to make it easier for older and disabled people to switch to digital TV. People are eligible for the scheme if they are aged 75 years or more, have lived in a care home for six months or more, get (or could get) certain disability benefits, or are registered blind or partially sighted.

The Help Scheme run by the BBC can provide:

- Easy to use digital TV equipment
- A security-checked installer
- A 12 month aftercare service.

It will cost $\pounds 40$ but is free to people who are on benefits. Everyone who is eligible for the Help Scheme should have received a letter telling them all about it but not everyone may have read it or understood what is on offer and how to get help.

ORCC is urging local organisations and volunteers to check that vulnerable people they know who are eligible for the Help Scheme have understood what is available and are accessing the Scheme if they need to.

THE FLOWER OF LOVE

Agapanthus is an outstandingly architectural plant, more commonly known as the Lily of the Nile although its native habitat is nowhere near this majestic piece of water. It actually hails from South Africa where they grow in abundance; in domestic gardens, in municipal parks, on windy mountainsides, even on the edges of dusty roads. In warmer climes, the rhizomatous root systems of Agapanthus are used to combat soil erosion in mountainous areas (think of Madeira) and swathes of Agapanthus planted as hedging in Australia apparently deter snakes. Agapanthus does however have a more romantic connotation: derived from Greek, *agape* means love and *anthos* means flower. On a more practical note, Agapanthus have been in cultivation in the UK since the late 1600s which contradicts the myth that they are difficult plants to grow and care for.

Agapanthus, botanically speaking, falls into two groups. Evergreen *Agapanthus africanus* (previously *A. umbellatus*) have broad, strappy and fleshy leaves. They produce tall, robust flower stems on top of which sit croquet ball-sized umbels (rounded clusters of flowers) of trumpet-shaped blue or white flowers. *A africanus*, not fully hardy, are generally grown in pots making it extremely convenient to wheel them into the greenhouse or conservatory as winter approaches then wheeled out again as spring gets underway. The plant's fleshy root system likes to be constrained in pots and this results, by and large, in a more spectacular flower display. Divide the plant every few years to ensure continued flowering (although the plant may be a little shy in producing blooms immediately after division) and a healthy root system.

Deciduous *Agapanthus campanulatus* produce narrower yet still strappy leaves and the flower heads are smaller albeit no less showy than *A. africanus*. They grow at higher altitudes making them hardier than their lowland cousins. They can be grown in pots (which can be left in the garden during the winter) or in garden borders. Both evergreen and deciduous Agapanthus require plenty of sun and fertile soil; provided you oblige, they will reward you with fat, large clumps that can be divided in the spring. Although hardier than their evergreen counterparts, it's good practice to give *A. campanulatus* some winter protection; cover the crowns with a thick layer of home-made garden compost or good quality bark mulch.

All Agapanthus like plenty of water in the summer months as well as regular doses of a high potash plant food. Tomato food does the trick here. Mid-season, use a balanced liquid plant food to ensure that the plants receive all the trace elements that tomato food can't otherwise provide. In no time at all, flower spikes will appear followed by juicy-looking buds that will explode into show-stopping globes of flowers. Plants that associate well with Agapanthus are Crocosmia and Kniphofia, either the red or yellow varieties. Other associations include ornamental grasses such as Miscanthus or Pennisetum, small bamboos such as Pleioblastus (plant these only in pots as they 'run') or the airy Gaura 'Whirling Butterflies' and Verbena bonariensis.

TAB concentrates on youngsters who lack good family support, often suffer from social and educational disadvantages, and tries to make sure they do successfully make the-often-difficult transition from adolescence to adulthood and become happy adults and good citizens. Gary has taken TAB's work to the Abingdon secondary schools, into partnership with local police and, not surprisingly to those of us who know him, into cooperation with the DAMASCUS youth project. ➡

The next generation of Drayton reporters are set to produce their own community newspaper, thanks to Trinity Learning News. Six pupils from Drayton Community Primary School have been chosen to take part in this lottery-funded mentoring project. From content to format and distribution, the children will make all the decisions and do all the work- in just six two-hour sessions. In the course of this, they will practise their literacy and IT skills and use life-skills like team-work, responsibility and working to deadlines, as well as learning a lot about their community.

The group have chosen to focus their investigations on facilities for the youth of the village, centring their attention on the Millennium Green. By the time you read this, they will have interviewed Parish Councillor Jenny Pooley. Preparation is the key to good reporting, and the interviewers had to think about what made good questions- testing out their journalistic skills on each other before turning them to the task in hand.

The newspaper project is organised by Trinity Learning, an initiative of Trinity Church in Abingdon, and is the latest in a series of events aimed at helping to improve the quality of life in our area's schools. Drayton Community Primary is the fifth school to take up their offer of free mentoring. Each term in the current school year, the resulting newsletter has been distributed free to around 500 homes in the local community, concentrating on a group chosen by the children themselves.


Well done to all the children."

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
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
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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting on Monday 6 June 2011

In addition to the Parish Councillors, 5 members of the public attended and Marilyn Badcock, one of our County Councillors, was also present. Tim Atkins and Stan Hignell, Allotment Wardens, reported on last year's operations. Five new tenants had been leased plots and there was now no waiting list. The use of email where tenants had email accounts



has been a great help in the collection of rents. Several issues were raised, among them the provision of water troughs and the cutting back of hedges, which the PC agreed to look into. On a similar subject, Mr Alan Stimpson said that a hedge set back from the grassy area along the Steventon Road was overgrown and that, despite numerous attempts to contact OCC to get them to deal with it, going back to last autumn, no action had been taken. Marilyn Badcock undertook to chase this up with the County Council.

It is pleasing to note that the Drayton Village website is now up and running. We have in particular to thank Alastair Grundy, who has put in a tremendous amount of work to design and set up the site. Everything is still in its early stages, but content will be added as we go along, and it is hoped this will become a valuable community resource in the weeks and months to come.

Progress has also been made in other areas. Drayton residents will be well aware that there is, in general, a lack of recreational facilities in the village, especially for young people. This has been a problem for many years, and the stumbling block has not been a lack of will on the part of the PC or other bodies, but more to do with a lack of land available for the purpose. A number of people have asked why the Millennium Green could not be used, but the whole Millennium Greens project, not just in Drayton, was designed to give villages an area of public open space which would be available to the community in perpetuity, and which could never be built on or developed. While our Green may be used for occasional one-off events, the terms of its creation do not allow for any permanent facilities to be provided on it.

One asset the village does possess is the children's playground at Lockway, and the PC has decided to refurbish part of this. There are not the funds to refurbish or replace the whole playground, and in any case, the PC did not feel that all the items should be replaced. For example, the playground professionals consulted all felt that the swings were in good shape, and would always be popular, so should be retained. However, some new equipment will be installed, and the existing climbing frame removed. The PC consulted with a wide range of 'interested parties', among them the Pre-School group at Drayton School, the Mums and Toddlers' group, and the Brownies, and generally received a very positive response to their proposals. Obviously, a number of comments and suggestions were made as to what people would like to see in the playground, but, whilst accepting that we will not be able to please everybody, at least this time around, we hope that the 'Phase 1' refurbishment will be well received. We have listened carefully to the other suggestions made, and may be able to incorporate them in further reconstruction next year.

Meanwhile, the PC has met with representatives of the Earl of Plymouth estate in connection with the Manor Farm development, and continues to explore its objective of obtaining more land on which recreational facilities could be established. Nothing is yet decided, and there is a long way to go, but all present felt that the meeting was positive and offered pointers to a direction in which we might make progress.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 4th July 2011, at 7.30pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre, Gravel Lane. As ever, all are welcome to attend.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Like many of us, I believe in devolving power downwards and I am in good company. Both Coalition parties support the idea, as did Margaret Thatcher. Giving local people the power to carry out what they think should be done in their local area, with a minimum of interference from above, seems a great idea. But there are problems. You have to trust all people to be sensible, and because you can't, you have to lay down laws that will control and

restrain the irresponsible. So time and again, politicians who believed in the devolution of power have found themselves rowing back on the whole idea.

The Localism Bill has already come in for plenty of stick. 'Halfbaked', 'Too many gaps', 'Leads to planning by appeal (where Developers decide where developments will happen)', are just some of the complaints. There is very little Government money to support it – but then there is very little Government money.

Eric Pickles, Greg Clarke and Andrew Stunell (The three ministers in charge of the Localism Bill) are all passionate about Localism and ensuring that, modified or not, the Bill will go through. The Bill, they say is written in such a way that changes can be made as the effects of it unfold. If they had attempted to tie up all possible loose ends (assuming they could be anticipated), then any changes would have had to go through endless parliamentary procedure. This way, they say, Localism can be more reactive and more evolutionary.

At meetings I have attended in the past few months, I heard Greg Clarke and Andrew Stunell both making the same points – Localism was a central plank of the Coalition Agreement – everyone should engage with the idea, because it was going to happen. By everyone, they meant all local people needed to believe that they were indeed going to have more power than ever before to determine their own futures, but they also meant that all layers of Government had to learn to give up some of their powers. The impression from both was that 'giving up power' would turn out to be the harder lesson – from Government departments, down to District Councils, all must embrace Localism.

Ten days ago I was invited to a meeting in London called by the big man himself – Eric Pickles. Having only witnessed the heavyweight, heavy handed Eric in the House of Commons and Question Time, I was fascinated to know why he would wish to speak to a bunch of Liberal Democrats – many of whom had been fierce critics. The Minister arrived in trademark shirtsleeves and beamed at us. He talked openly and freely and, to my surprise, displayed a deal of charm. He gave it to us straight – whether we liked it or not, but in such a way that invited rather than demanded co-operation. Localism was going to happen – Greg and Andrew supported it, Eric, in the nicest way, demanded it.

If I am right, those communities that formulate Parish Plans first are going to be at an enormous advantage. If Drayton is to have a Parish Plan, we all have to will it - Landowners, developers, residents and councillors. For the first time in the past six years, there are signs in this village of some real movement and talking between people who really can make things happen. I am signed up to the Clarke/Stunell school of persuasion and encouragement as a general way of trying to make things happen, but maybe a little touch of Pickles would help. 'Look folks, Localism is going to happen, whether you like it or not, so get on board because the ship is about to leave harbour!'

WESTMINSTER LETTER


Recently I've received a huge number of letters and emails about all kinds of issues, including some about the introduction of cooking lessons in schools. This campaign was sparked by an Early Day Motion, tabled by Zac Goldsmith MP, which supports adding cooking to the National Curriculum. While I, as a Minister, cannot sign EDMs, I do broadly agree with the spirit of this one. It is vital that our children



should be taught how to make healthy food choices - better nutrition means better health and it's as simple as that. I have been very supportive of recent efforts in the media, like those by Jamie Oliver, that have tried to introduce children to the preparation and enjoyment of good food. Without the confidence to try cooking in the kitchen we can easily be tempted to the realms of fast food and unhealthy eating. The Department for Education is currently undertaking a review which aims to slim down the national curriculum allowing greater flexibility for schools to include subjects that they think are in the best interests of their pupil's education. Practical lessons like cooking are likely to be included in this part of the review and I am eager to see the outcomes.

Another serious issue that I am often contacted about is wild animals being used in circuses. The Government has estimated that this practice is now so unpopular that only 3 circuses still use wild animals in England. Unfortunately, DEFRA has received clear legal advice that any ban on this practice would be illegal under current UK and EU law. However, I am pleased that DEFRA have wasted no time on this issue and have introduced a licensing regime where circuses must prove to official government vets that they are meeting the new VERY high welfare standards. If circuses cannot meet these welfare standards then they will not be allowed to use wild animals in their performances at all.


