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BLUE PLAQUE PROGRESS Laurence Zipson

Following last month's request for Blue Plaque nominations the Parish Council was contacted by Colin Arnold, a Church Warden at St Peters suggesting the **Reverend F.E. Robinson MA (Oxon).** F.E. Robinson seems to tick all the boxes required of the scheme as he is widely recognized for a significant contribution to bell ringing in the UK and around the world, which was established during 30 years of service as Vicar of St Peters Church here in Drayton between 1878 and 1908.

An Oxfordshire man, he was born in Begbroke in 1833, and as an undergraduate at Exeter College, Oxford, he discovered the joys of bell ringing. He was ordained as a minister in 1868 and in 1878 was presented to Drayton by the then Lord Wantage.

In 1881 he was a founding member of the Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers (ODG) and became its First Master, a post he held until his death in 1910. He did a great deal to reform bell ringing and set new standards which reach around the world to this day. Robinson was also an extremely capable and prolific ringer and to fulfill his ambition to become the first cleric to ring a peal in his own parish church he donated a treble and a tenor to augment the existing six bells at the Church. He was also the first person to ring 1,000 peals, which he did at the Church on the 9th of August 1905, aged 72.

In 1908 he retired to Wokingham due to ill health, where he remained until his death in February 1910. His funeral was held at Wokingham All Saints and was attended by hundreds of people; he is buried in the churchyard there. His legacy has continued to the present and he is still remembered and acknowledged. In 1913, Ringers from around the UK subscribed to this memorial tablet

which is located in cloisters Oxford Cathedral. Peters gets regular visits from ringers from around the UK and further afield (see the visitors book). Photographs of Robinson still hang many ringing



towers in the Oxford Diocese, including the ringing chamber at All Saints Wokingham where on the 9th August 2005, the Ringers rang a quarter peal in honour of the centenary of his 1,000 peals.

On the 16th of February 2010 the ODG marked the centenary of his death with tribute peals in many Churches across the county. The Ringing World (the bell ringer's weekly journal) ran a feature about him on the front page of its 16th April 2010 edition (a copy of the article can be seen in the Church's book of Ministers).

Numerous plaques marking milestone peals are set in the walls of the bell tower at St Peters; most notable, the original plaque commemorating his 1,000 peals and another erected on the 9th of August 2005 by the Ancient Society of College Youths (London's Bell Ringing Society) also commemorating the achievement.

As well as his passion for Ringing, he was a proficient wood carver, and while at St Peters he carved the organ case, the choir stalls and bench ends. He was also part way through carving a chancel screen when he died.

WOODEN SPOON RECIPE

Recipe No. 42 (from November 2003) Sausage and Red Wine Casserole

1 tablespoon oil, 1 lb pork sausages, 1 onion (thinly sliced), ½ teaspoon dried thyme, 3 carrots (sliced), 3 sticks celery (sliced), 1 tablespoon plain flour, ¼ pint red wine, ¾ pint chicken or pork stock (made from a stock cube).

- Heat the oil in a large frying pan and cook the sausages for 5
 10 minutes, turning frequently until they are evenly browned. Remove from the pan and set aside.
- Stir in the onions and the thyme and cook until browned.
 Add the carrots and celery, lower the heat and cook covered for a further 10 minutes.
- Sprinkle the flour into the pan and cook for 2 3 minutes, stirring frequently, until browned. Pour in the wine and cook, stirring continuously, until smooth. Add the stock and bring to the boil stirring until slightly thickened. Return the sausages to the pan, season and return to the boil.
- Transfer to a casserole and cook in a low oven for about 45 minutes.
- · Serve with rice or mashed potatoes.

PLAY AREA FACELIFT

The Lockway playground is regularly inspected by RoSPA, and the Parish Council knew it to be in safe and generally in good condition, but some of the equipment was looking a little tired and perhaps in need of a facelift. Funds were not available to rebuild the entire playground, and in the event, it was felt there was no need to do so. Some items, such as the swings, have been retained because they continue to be popular and are very well used.

In the spring of this year, four separate firms specialising on playground construction were approached. All four met with the Parish Council on site and were invited to submit plans to improve the play facilities within a limited budget of around £16,000. Three of the four companies responded and produced high quality submissions which met the PC's requirements. I and Naomi Broomfield then took the plans along to a number of meetings for consultation with the most important partners in this particular project – the children who would be, hopefully, the 'end-users'.

Naomi and I met with several groups of children in the approximate target age-groups, and received many comments, both approving and critical, on the proposals. Eventually, and in conjunction with the full Parish Council, it was decided that the best combination of new equipment and value for money was to be



found in the submission by Wicksteed, and the contract was duly offered to this company and accepted.

Whilst it was impossible to incorporate all the ideas and suggestions made in the consultation, it was felt that if the present project proves successful, a further 'Phase 2' upgrade could be made, possibly next year.

GARDENING PAGE

GRASS FACTS Anne Hendry

Pennisetum grasses, along with all other grass species, are incredibly valuable plants in any garden. Like hardy plants, the Chinese Fountain Grass provides the necessary form and structure needed in the border. It also gives texture and the same seasonal interest as herbaceous perennials, the 'fireworks' of the garden.

From the bottlebrush-like flower spikes of the *P. alopecuroides* cultivars to the billowing *P. orientale* types, the seeding flowers of this genus waft around in the gentlest of breezes, generating both movement and sound. The subtle ebbing and flowing of grass is at its best and most visible when the plants are used *en masse*, as in the wild, but they also work in harmony with other plants when used in the smaller garden.

Pennisetum grasses also look magnificently architectural when planted in contemporary containers such as zinc or steel which in turn can be sited in front of a modern or light-coloured building. Otherwise, the larger cultivars make good, stand-alone specimens in borders whilst the smaller varieties are more effective when planted as a group or used in drift planting. A grouping of a single cultivar looks more natural than an assortment of different varieties.

Pennisetum species come into their own in late summer when flowering really starts to get going. Combine these grasses with other late-blooming perennials such as *Crocosmia*, *Echinacea* and *Rudbeckia*, for example, to create maximum interest and colour in the early autumn garden. *Pennisetum* species should be grown in well-drained soil and in full sun although they will tolerate dappled shade in southern parts of the UK.

The best time for planting grasses is late spring but plants can be added to beds, borders and containers throughout the growing season. Once established, most grasses are drought-tolerant. However, an eye will need to be kept on the watering during the first year of planting especially if the spring, summer and autumn months are unusually dry.

Foliage and flower spikes are best left in situ throughout the winter so as to help protect the roots and new spring growth. Better though is the interest provided by the foliage and spent flower heads in an otherwise barren winter garden. The seed heads attract birds in search of winter food and the foliage offers a safe haven for small mammals.

Once the threat of frost has passed, the plants can be cut down to ground level. Make sure you don't leave it too late though as pruning may harm new growth. Although the plants...... a

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
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a Although the plants can look a little untidy by the end of winter, early-flowering herbaceous plants in the near vicinity will provide a foil for this. *Pennisetum* species are generally pest and disease-free plants. Of equal importance is their low maintenance, perfect if this is a priority in any garden scheme.



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PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting held on 5th September

Readers of the Chronicle will know that the Earl of Plymouth Estates has asked the Parish Council whether it would be interested in having ownership of a field between Lockway and the A34, in preference to about half of the open land between Manor Farmhouse and Henleys Lane (part of the terms of the existing planning permission for 16 houses in that area). A number of Lockway residents had expressed their



concerns at the PC in August but the next meeting with the EoP will not be until October. Moreover, a Steventon Road resident has now offered an opinion that any more intensive use (eg tennis courts, multi-use play area) of the existing recreation ground that would be made physically possible were pitches provided to the rear of Lockway, would be undesirable. There will be opportunities for all village residents to air their views about the potential to acquire land and use it for recreational purposes when we know more about what the EoP intends.

The remainder of the public session was devoted to the illegal use of Kiln Lane. As everybody should know, this is a bridleway over which the driving of cars and vans is illegal. The PC is keen to place obstructions in Kiln Lane which will limit the use to walkers, cyclists and horses only, but first clearer signs will be erected and there will be monitoring of the use and possibly action taken by the police. All this would be unnecessary if drivers stuck to the roads and stopped causing this nuisance and danger.

The PC also discussed and responded to a letter written by the Director of Education, Children and Families to Ed Vaizey MP as it seemed that Oxfordshire County Council did not properly understand how to implement a change to their policy on providing home-to-school transport. The PC remains very keen to see all families in the village treated equally as has been the longstanding policy of the County Council. If any change is proposed it should be properly reasoned and made the subject of a proper consultation.

The PC agreed to write to the Highways Agency asking whether the slip road onto the A34 could be opened to allow traffic back onto the trunk road when it was blocked to the south of Drayton. It has been pointed out that on a daily basis Drayton residents were also driving through Steventon when wanting to travel north on the A34, looking for the reasoning behind the closure of the slip. The Highways Agency is also being asked to take steps to quieten the A34 by the use of a better surface and acoustic barriers.

Despite a good number of residents coming to express their views at the last few meetings of the PC, with one notable exception, none were attracted by the idea of taking one of the vacancies on the Council.

A further opportunity will arise at the next meeting on 3 October at 7.30pm at the Caudwell Day Centre.

On Fairness:

OCC, like all County Councils, is short of cash and, to be fair, it is certainly not all their fault. They have to save money, even from their frontline service budgets. That means Roads and Education. To be fair, OCC is keen to limit the impact of any cuts on the people of Oxfordshire. Again, to be fair, there are not too many places they can turn to make the savings they need to make within the schools and

education budget. One such place, which would not affect the quality of the education they provide, is the transport to schools' budget. It must cost a packet to pay for every child to get to and from his or her nearest secondary school, and hence there is a '3 mile rule'. If you live further than 3 miles from the nearest school, the law says the council must pay - under 3 miles and they do not have to pay so long as there is a safe walking route. There is an argument going on as to whether it is safe or not for a child to walk unaccompanied to school. The difficulty here is that 'safety' is very difficult to quantify while people on both sides of the argument could be said to have vested interests. Important though safety is, this article is simply about fairness.

The 3-miles rule throws up a major problem for Drayton. Only some of the village lies outside the line. Families outside the line have no need to worry - OCC will pay for their children as they always have done. For the first time, however, those within the 3 miles limit are being faced with the prospect of having to pay for school transport for children, who are starting secondary school. Older brothers and sisters at present will still be paid for. So it is proposed that children within the same family are to be treated differently, and families from the same village or parish are to be treated differently – that strikes me as divisive and very unfair.

Our County Councillors are doing their best to fight this, and as a mere District Councillor, I have refrained from commenting. However, I now believe that, party politics aside, we should all get in behind our County Councillors and call for a *fair* solution to the County Council's problems rather than the solution OCC is currently proposing.

Of course I am speaking for those families directly affected, but I also hope that I am speaking for an overwhelming majority of Drayton residents and the residents of all other villages affected.

Waste Collection Service:

It has come to my attention that there are a number of problems that have arisen with this service. It would help me enormously if anyone who has had or is having a problem would let me know directly either by telephone or email. At the end of the month, I am sending in a report summarising these problems to the waste services team at VWHDC. I want to make sure that everything they need to know is covered.

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WESTMINSTER

Much has happened recently:

We've had riots and looting, the downgrading of US debt, the euro crises and the new youth unemployment figures - but it's not all news is bad for our area.

The Chancellor, George Osborne, announced 11 new Enterprise Zones throughout the UK, one in Oxfordshire, covering the Harwell and Milton science and business parks, in an area now branded as Science Vale UK. I have



been supporting Science Vale UK for many years: it will help Oxfordshire become one of the economic dynamos of the UK by raising the profile of the many hi-tech companies based in our area, attracting further investment and jobs. I'm delighted that the Government has recognised us but that is far from the only thing this announcement brings.

This Enterprise Zone is designed to attract businesses by providing 100% relief on rates, simplified planning and super-fast broadband. Also the businesses that are already here (some of the best in the world) will be able to invest these savings (~£30m next year) into local growth, creating up to 10,000 new jobs. They will recruit from our universities, pushing down youth unemployment and paving the way for an innovation-led path to recovery.

I was also delighted, as the Minister responsible for getting broadband to rural areas, that we have announced a grant of almost £4 million for Oxfordshire, to help the County Council to roll out broadband to areas where the speeds are very low.

And finally, I wanted to let you know some good news on pubs. Ministers have already announced a range of policies to support pubs, including a ban on supermarkets selling alcohol below cost, fairer taxation on alcohol and a reform of licensing rules, not to mention the small business rate relief scheme. But also, the Government has launched a review into restrictive covenants - an absurd legal clause which sometimes prevents community pubs reopening following a sale - a policy that has caused over 570 pubs to be permanently lost over the last 5 years.
