Our talk in September was about the Air Ambulance which covers our area and is based at Benson. It was acompanied by a film showing the skill and expertise of the crew with some useful information such as:- the helicopter flies on an average of four missions a day; it can be airborne within three minutes of a call out; it can land in accessible places; it provides inter-hospital transfer when speed is of the essence; and, maybe the most important, it has a top speed of 140 miles an hour.

The trust is a charity which relies on sponsorship, donations and fund raising. Two of our members had reasons to be grateful to the air ambulance as one had a friend who was rescued after a serious horse riding accident and the other person's brother-in-law was rescued after collapsing on a high peak in Derbyshire.

It costs about £125,000 a month to run so it is a very worthwhile cause to support.

Wooden Spoon Recipe No. 43 (from Dec 2003) by LOIS RENNELLS

Celeriac in Cream (serves 4)

450g (1 lb) celeriac, salt, slice of lemon and lemon juice, 40g (1½ oz) butter, 150 ml (5 fl oz) fresh single cream, and a pinch of grated nutmeg.

Peel, wash and trim the celeriac, cover (**) with cold salted water in a pan with the lemon slice. Simmer (covered) for about 50 minutes until almost tender, then drain and cut into fairly small slices.

Melt the butter in a clean pan, add the celeriac with a little lemon juice, cover and cook for 8 - 10 minutes, shaking the pan occasionally.

Take off the heat and add the fresh cream. Simmer gently for 5 minutes and serve sprinkled with grated nutmeg.

(NB ** Celeriac discolours if not immersed in water fairly quickly. The lemon slice also helps to prevent this).



PARISH COUNCIL (Oct 3rd)

Eight members of the public attended the meeting in addition to the Parish Councillors. Several people raised the issue of apparent changes to OCC's policy on school transport, and pointed out that this will create a number of anomalies within the village. Firstly, approximately half the village lies outside the designated 3-mile limit, and these residents' children will be offered free transport on the school bus; whereas those families living in the half of the village nearer to Abingdon, within the limit, will have to pay for their children's travel.

The new system also means that within the same families, older children already receiving free transport may continue to get it, while their younger brothers and sisters newly starting secondary school may not qualify. The Parish Council has been raising this issue with OCC for some time in an ongoing correspondence, but the situation, and the county's explanations for it, still seem far from satisfactory or clear.

The county has said that a further assessment of the supposed 'safe' walking route will be carried out shortly, and a final decision on policy will be made in the light of this. In the meantime, the Parish Council intend to pursue the matter with Ed Vaizey at his next constituency surgery and will report back at the November meeting.

A couple of items regarding the A34:- the Parish Council raised two issues with the Highways Dept of OCC, concerning resurfacing of the road where it passes through Drayton so as to reduce road noise, and also the possibility of opening up the slip road in Drayton to give direct access onto the trunk road. The reply stated that noise reduction will be applied first to roads through areas of the highest population density, characterised as Important Areas or First Priority Locations.

Drayton unfortunately doesn't fit into either category, but it was indicated that the dept has a rolling programme of maintenance, and we could expect the Drayton section of the road to be resurfaced sometime within the next 4 years.

An answer on the slip road rests with the dept's investigatory team and a reply has not yet been received.

It's emphasised that this meeting is still a fact-finding mission, and whatever its outcome, there are many steps down the road of consultation with all interested parties in the village before anything can or will be decided.

The <u>next Parish Council meeting</u> will be on <u>Monday Nov 7th</u>, at 7.30pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre in Gravel Lane. As always, <u>all are invited to attend</u>. *Richard Williams*

GARDENING TIME

Heathers - Acid or Alkaline?

<u>Heathers</u> seem to confuse us. Do they like acid soil? Do they like alkaline soil? It depends on the species in fact. Some require acid soil conditions to thrive. Others will grow in neutral and alkaline soils. Flowering time also causes headaches. Again, all is dependent on the species.

Calluna vulgaris heathers are **acid-loving plants** as are *Erica cinera*, *E. x stuartii* and *E. vagans* as well as the taller-growing *E. arborea*. Callunas and *E. vagans* flower late summer to early autumn whereas *Erica cinera* and *E. x stuartii* can flower from early summer onwards.

In contrast, *Erica carnea* and *E. x darleyensis* cultivars thrive in **lime tolerant** conditions and flower from early to mid winter until early summer. In other words, these very under-rated plants provide year-round interest and colour.

With careful planning, a heather garden can give a colourful display within 3 to 4 years. It will require little maintenance and last 15 to 25 years. <u>Good value then</u>. A heather garden is also **wildlife-friendly** in addition to the flowers being very attractive to **bees** who are currently having a tough time in the British countryside.

Heathers are best planted in beds totally devoted to themselves. A few conifers or small evergreen shrubs could be added to create some contrast in height and form. Otherwise, plant heathers in containers of varying sizes and heights and position around the garden to create colour and interest during the autumn and winter months in particular. Make sure you choose the right compost for the heather cultivar.

A heather bed should be positioned in full sun, away from deciduous trees. Foliage heathers colour much better when planted in a bright and sunny position. Try and plant in groups of 3 or 5, or more, to create impact.

Plant heathers deeply with the lower foliage resting on the soil surface. Bark mulch the bed to keep weeds at bay. Pruning is done annually making heathers really low maintenance plants. In general, trimming retards the flowering by two to three weeks. Prune as follows:-

Calluna vulgaris - February or March, prune long flowering spikes back to plant. Trim off all flower heads.

Erica carnea - Every other April or May, trim flower heads with shears. Trim the more vigorous cultivars hard to stop the centre going bare.

Erica cinerea - February or March, trim off dead flowers particularly long flowering spikes.

Erica x stuartii - April or May, trim off dead flowers.

Erica arborea - After flowering, trim half of previous year's growth for the first four years to encourage bushy growth; trim off broken branches. Stake for support.

 $Erica\ x\ darleyensis\ -$ Trim each June. Do not be afraid of limiting growth.

Erica vegans - Leave flower heads on for russet colours during winter. Trim every March. Do not be afraid of limiting growth.

Buy Central Heating Oil early for Christmas

Do Drayton residents rely on oil for heating? Any that do, should be aware of this central purchase scheme to lower the price. Our nearest organiser is at Culham, apparently, so check the website in the text below. And it's anytime of year.

ORCC Trading is urging everyone with oil central heating to buy their oil early this winter so they avoid last year's huge December spike in the price. The cost per litre rocketed from around 45p per litre to more like 70p per litre in just a few short days, and early buying is essential if people are to save money.

Since it started last year, the ORCC bulk oil buying scheme has meant savings of around 4p per litre or more for its members (compared to average oil prices on the day of purchase). And if you're buying 1,000 litres this is a significant saving – twice the annual membership cost! Nearly 30 local communities have now got volunteer co-ordinators in place and the more members there are, the more negotiating power we have.

So if you haven't yet joined, and haven't yet thought about your winter oil order, DON'T DELAY! Go to www.oxonrcc.org.uk where you will find an application form and payment details, plus information about all the monthly prices and savings to date.

GARD UPDATE

Thames Water are <u>still</u> working out the revision of their <u>already</u> twice revised Water Resources Management Plan 2009! All GARD can do at present is to monitor their work for accuracy and thoroughness, which we are doing with the help of our experts.

We do not expect a Thames Water announcement until the very end of this year.

The critical study which has just started is the analysis of the future flow in the River Thames, from which there is a great deal of water abstraction. The Thames flow studies are directed towards the 2014 Plan which is the really important one as far as GARD is concerned. They also include climate change considerations, and only when the results are known will it be possible to assess which new water resource options are appropriate. These options will include a reservoir, Severn-Thames transfer and much more recycling of water.

All have to be studied by Thames Water and we will endeavour to ensure they are properly and fully researched and the <u>true costs</u> <u>identified</u>. Our experts are keeping in close touch with progress.
