VILLAGE COHESION

A few issues ago, I asked everyone to get behind our County Councillors and their efforts to persuade the County Education department to reconsider their position on 'Charging half the village for taking children to school'. It has become clear that all local politicians and even our MP are fighting a problem that exists right across the country.

Because it is not my District Council's problem, I have kept away from the issue up until now. However, despite their best efforts, there seems to be little or no progress, and a great injustice is about to be done in my village as a result. What is more, this injustice is about to be inflicted on us by a government of which my party is a part. This is now my issue as much as anyone else's.

We all accept that Councils must make their budgets balance and that cuts must be made. We can accept that, wherever possible, frontline education services should be protected, and that transport to school is not the main function of our education service. It may well be that this country can no longer afford to offer completely free school transport to everyone.

If that is the case, let's face it. Provided there are proper safety nets in place for those genuinely unable to afford to pay a small amount for their children to get to/from school, most fair-minded people would surely much rather pay a small amount towards the cost, than suffer a postcode lottery whereby a victimised small minority pay the whole cost, whilst others pay nothing. That is what is about to happen in Drayton and many other places.

A few people, living in the wrong end of the village are being sent 3 figure bills per child each term, whilst those living only a few yards away are paying nothing. It is particularly disappointing that the authorities responsible are trying to hide behind pre-war laws. When the legislation was put in place it was deemed reasonable for parents and children to spend 2 hours or more a day walking to and from school, and roads were deemed safe which now carry heavy, fast-moving traffic. At the very least, the laws around school transport are badly in need of revision.

Asking *all* people who can afford it to pay, say £30 a term towards transport to school would take some political bottle, but would certainly be much fairer than asking a minority to pay hundreds of pounds. The present position of both County and central government is, quite simply, the result of the need to save money. Despite the best protestations of the OCC Education department, it has little to do with safety or child health.

Whatever is wrong with Drayton, it has always seemed to me to have some cohesion. We all feel pleased to be part of something. This issue is a serious threat to that cohesion. I do hope our county, other counties and central government will get together and think again.

SCHOOL BUS - Just In

An update from Karen Sharman & Jacquie Cook

We went to the **Appeal Hearing** on 9th February at County Hall Oxford, armed with strong arguments, awkward questions, a video of the route being walked on a dark December morning in the rain, and enough knowledge of the Home to School Transport policy and surrounding issues to hold our own against any onslaught.

We left the appeal feeling we had presented our case well, and had instilled enough doubt in the Appeal Panel's mind for them to seriously question the OCC decision.

We have now had communication from the Appeal Clerk about their decision:- Having considered the evidence we had produced, the <u>Appeal Panel have agreed to an adjournment</u> in order for a review of the safety assessment to take place.

This time the assessment must take into account the concerns and comments made by us at the appeal, such as visibility, the shared pedestrian/cycle usage of the path on such a narrow stretch, also the lack of lighting.

They are also seeking clarity from their legal department to look at and confirm what constitutes <u>a 'safe' walking route</u>. They will have to answer to the Appeal Panel and to the parents.

This outcome was not top of our list, but is acceptable, and far better than a straight no. Should the assessment prove to be 'safe' once more, we will be invited back for a meeting to hear their justifications, and we will again challenge their decisions.

So, the old saying – "we have won the battle, but not the war" would describe our position at the moment.

We feel this is a positive step, and feel a sense of achievement for getting this far. We look forward to hearing from them soon ...

Make Room for 101

If you need to call Thames Valley Police, but the call is less urgent than a 999 call, you now need to use the new national non-emergency number 101. **It replaces** the 0845 8 505 505 number.

When would somebody call 101? To report less urgent crime or disorder and for general police enquiries. For example:- if your car has been stolen; if your property has been damaged; when you suspect drug use or dealing; to report a minor traffic collision; to give the police information about crime in your area; if you'd like to speak to your local police officer.

How does it work? The service is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. For more information, visit www.police.uk/101

What will it cost to call? Calls from landlines and mobile networks will cost 15 pence per call.

NB If somebody is deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired they can textphone 18001 101.

Remember, in a REAL emergency, always call 999.



Whilst in the forest, Ben showed us photos of the B&B accommodation provided, self-assembled hammock-cum-tent slung from overhead branches. 

ED VAIZEY - Your Local MP

Not many of us would think that scrap metal would have a big impact on our lives. But in recent years the theft of metal to be sold for scrap has reached epidemic proportions. Most often, it involves thieves digging up copper cables, which means disrupting telephone services and railway signals. So I was delighted when the Government announced that it will bring in new laws to help curb the problem. Scrap metal dealers who are linked to metal theft of any kind will have their licences torn up, and also anyone caught transporting stolen metal will have their vehicle registrations confiscated. The Government has also announced a £5m fund that will be used to establish a specialised metal theft task force. I hope that this will make a difference to many people's lives in the constituency and throughout Britain.

I was also pleased to hear that the Government will spend £2.17bn to fund flood defences over the next three years. We all remember the devastating impact of the floods in this constituency in 2007, and I hope that this spending will make us safer from a repeat. The Government says that 145,000 homes will be better protected by 2015.

The continuing rise in unemployment is concerning. But in this context it's worth remembering that we live in one of the most economically dynamic parts of the country. Out of 650 UK constituencies we rank 609th for unemployment with only 1,206 people seeking work. While I by no means wish to overlook the tough times these job-seekers are facing, it means that the unemployment rate locally is 2.3%, and has only risen by 50 in the past year.

I was contacted recently by a local charity that gives grants to worthy causes in the Wantage area; amounts are up to £1000, and are for individuals who are in need of items and equipment that would make an important difference to their day-to-day lives. **Applicants must live in Wantage or within 5 miles** of the town centre. **If you know of vulnerable people** in that area needing cookers, TVs, fridges etc., then please feel free to let me know and I will contact the charity.

I have also been recently contacted by Robert Stiles Almshouse, located just off Newbury Road in Wantage. Although Robert Stiles died in 1680, his legacy has lived on for over three centuries, as these almshouses still provide a home for the elderly today and **they are inviting new applications**. If you or someone you know are interested in applying then please contact them.

Neighbourhood Action Group - Speeding

Residents in Drayton may have noticed the yellow, green and blue SpeedWatch signs that have appeared at various strategic points. They have been put up as part of the OCC Community SpeedWatch scheme by members of the Neighbourhood Action Group 5 (covering Drayton, Appleford and Sutton Courtenay), supported by PC Keith Morton and PCSO Sandra Syphas.

At a recent NAG5 meeting held in Sutton Courtenay it was agreed that these signs are beginning to have some effect in Appleford where a 30mph limit had been largely ignored along a straight stretch of road through the village. It would be great if the signs in Drayton and Sutton Courtenay had a similar effect.

As recommended by OCC, the posters are taken down and the display rotated round the village periodically. In his article (see p12) Richard Webber has outlined some of the other initiatives being considered by NAG5 to raise awareness and educate about dangers of speeding.

Having witnessed a mother with a child in her vehicle tearing down Lockway at an estimated speed of 35-40 mph, it would be good if all drivers could adopt a self-imposed rule of 20mph in all built-up areas of the villages. Apart from the obvious safety aspect it keeps the noise down too.

And talking of noise – yes no one likes that 'airport' sound coming from the A34, but if it was refurbished between Abingdon and the Milton interchange, and a 50mph limit introduced as on the Botley bypass stretch of the A34, it would be a lot safer and quieter for all of us. One lives in hope!

PARISH COUNCIL (Feb 6th)

To begin with, a quick update on OCC's change of policy regarding charging for school transport, there was a Parents' Appeal Hearing last week in Oxford. The PC submitted a detailed written statement to the hearing in support of the parents, and was also represented in person by Daniel Scharf, our Chairman. At the time of writing, the outcome is not known, although there have been concerns that, whatever the merits of the parents' case, if those councillors making up the panel were members of the ruling party, they would be unlikely to find in favour of the parents, when this would go against the changes that OCC has made. More information should be available by the time of the next Parish Council meeting (& please see, if not already, the page 1 update).

Another ongoing controversial issue is the Vale's Interim Housing Supply Policy. Our District Councillor, Richard Webber, reported that there have been something like 150 applications by developers to build houses on a variety of Vale sites in order to fill the gap left by the supposed shortfall in housing supply. The situation is confused however, not least because one of the declared reasons for the shortfall was that large sites, eg Grove Airfield & Great Western Park at Didcot, were said to be behind schedule on house completions. Conflicting reports suggest that this may not in fact be the case. The pot is further stirred by the knowledge that other nearby authorities are experiencing similar problems, including Cherwell District Council.

For example, we have learned that Tony Baldry, the MP for Banbury, has asked Planning Ministers in central government for clarification on the situation. He writes that "because of the present economic climate, on a number of these sites (i.e. in CDC, but see below), construction work has yet to start" – this despite the fact that the necessary planning permissions have already been granted. He adds, "it is not [the local authority's] fault that house builders have not yet started building houses where planning permissions have been granted, but what it has led to is a number of developers putting forward opportunistic planning applications for not insignificant housing developments almost always in villages in the area, hoping that such...applications will be granted on appeal irrespective of the wishes of local people". Mr Baldry's comments may be found on his website, but although not made in connection with the Vale, they apply equally to it. \rightarrow >>>

>>> Remaining on the subject of housing, the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council (ORCC) has kindly agreed to put together a Housing Needs Survey for Drayton. A questionnaire will be distributed to all Drayton residents, probably around late March, for return by the end of April. The questions it contains are aimed at establishing whether there is a need within the village for affordable housing. Of necessity therefore, some of the information required is fairly detailed, but no more so than the recent census form, and along some of the same lines. There may well be further information about the survey included elsewhere in the Chronicle, but it is intended that the Annual Parish Meeting. which this year is on 2nd April, will be held not in the usual venue, but in the Village Hall instead. The distribution of the Survey has been timed to coincide with the meeting, and it is hoped that people will come along to hear more about the purpose of the survey, its relationship to current Vale housing policy, and the concept of neighbourhood planning, recently introduced by the Localism Act, which is very relevant to villages like Drayton.

Finally, although the recent cold spell appears to be over (fingers crossed), there are no guarantees it won't be repeated; so Drayton residents might like to know that the village now has **two** bins filled with **rock salt** (supplied by the Highways Dept) which may be used to put on pavements, driveways, or wherever is helpful to make it easier for people to get around in icy conditions. An existing bin is located in **Lyford Close**, and a second has now been placed at the entrance to **Gravel Lane**, behind the bus shelter on The Green. There are no formal arrangements to spread the salt, and it is more a case of 'help yourself, sensibly, but as required'.

The next (ordinary) Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 5th March, at 7.30pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre in Gravel Lane. **As always, all are invited to attend**. *Richard Williams*

GARDENING TIME

Cornus for all seasons

Cornus, or Dogwood, can be divided into two forms: shrubby and flowering. The shrubby varieties are grown for their dramatic winter stem colours and the flowering types are grown for their colourful summer bracts and autumn colour.

Cornus was apparently called Dog Tree in the mid 1500s, then Dogwood in the early 1600s, when it was also called Hound Tree and the fruits were known as Dog or Hound Berries. It is thought that Dogwood is a corruption of 'dagwood' as the slender, hardwood stems were used to make 'dags' (daggers), and skewers.

The best dogwoods for winter colour are Cornus alba 'Sibirica' (red stems), C. alba 'Kesselringii' (almost black stems), C. sericea 'Flaviramea' (lime green stems) and C. sanguinea 'Midwinter Fire' (red, orange and yellow stems). For more summer interest, C. alba 'Elegantissima' provides variegated foliage. For effect, plant red or black stemmed varieties with lime green varieties. To obtain good winter colour, cut back the stems each spring to allow the production of vibrantly-coloured shoots for the ensuing winter.

Shrubby Dogwoods can tolerate any soils, including damp, but do plant in full sun so as to promote the brightest of colours.

Flowering Dogwoods are noted for their showy spring/summer bracts and beautiful autumn shades. C. florida 'Cherokee Chief' produces striking, dark pink bracts & 'Rubra' produces dusky pink bracts. C. kousa 'China Girl' produces white bracts in early summer and C. 'Norman Hadden', a semi-evergreen, produces masses of bracts in shades of cream. All produce pendent strawberry/raspberry-like fruits. All get to a height and spread of some 6 and 8 metres.

In autumn, the green summer foliage turns into hues of red, purple, orange, bronze and gold. The flowering types prefer to be planted in dappled shade. Cornus florida prefers neutral to acid soil conditions whereas Cornus kousa is more tolerant of neutral to alkaline soils.

To prune, cut out dead wood as required and prune lower branches to create a clear trunk. Do this between late autumn and early spring whilst the tree is dormant.

Two other interesting Dogwoods are Cornus mas (Cornelian Cherry) and Cornus controversa (The Wedding Cake Tree). The former has almost year-round interest – yellow blossom late winter followed by edible, bright red fruits in late summer. Do check you have space though - it gets to a height and spread of 5 metres!

The latter has a rather unusual growing habit in that it forms an interesting tiered effect. The tree is covered in a mass of white, star-shaped flowers in early summer followed by small black berries in autumn. Both are easy trees, produce good autumn colours, are tolerant of sandy, loamy or clay conditions, alkaline, neutral or acid soil, and full sun or light shade. But C. controversa can reach a height and spread of some 15 metres. *Anne Hendry*

NOTICES

From NHS in Oxfordshire - YOUR Data

In April 2012 NHS Oxfordshire will be telling everyone in the county about Summary Care Records (electronic health records).

These will be available for everyone in Oxfordshire from late Spring 2012 as part of the national scheme, and we need to raise awareness of the benefits this could bring to patient care, in emergency situations especially, or out-of-hours, as well as informing people of the decision each individual needs to make.

Anyone aged 15 3/4yrs and over will have to decide whether they want a Summary Care Record in April 2012, and will receive a freepost mailing that enables them to opt-out of this if they prefer. We need to reach as many people as possible to make them aware of the change in health records.

There will be two records created. A summary care record (a national record), containing 3 pieces of information only (current medication, allergies and adverse reactions), this record will be viewable on a national scale, so if a patient had an accident anywhere in England the clinician treating that patient will be able to view their summary care record with the patient's consent.

The second record is a local record called the Oxfordshire care summary. This will be a summary of your health record and will only be able to be viewed locally in the Oxfordshire area.

Both records are designed to give better, faster and more efficient care in an emergency situation whether a patient is in a local location or elsewhere else, and patients can feel safe in the knowledge that wherever they may need medical care their record For more info, please see :- http://www. will be visible. oxfordshirepct.nhs.uk/gp-services/healthrecords/default.aspx
