PLAN AREA CONSULTATION

Drayton Parish Council has submitted a request to develop a neighbourhood plan in Drayton. A neighbourhood plan is a way that the parish council and the community it represents can play a key role in shaping the way Drayton develops and grows in the future. It is a new tool created by government to help empower local communities in the planning process.

The first formal stage of the neighbourhood planning procedure, once an application has been submitted to undertake one, is that the local planning authority, here the Vale of White Horse District Council, must carry out a consultation to see if the neighbourhood planning area that the parish council want to use for the neighbourhood plan is appropriate. The area that the parish

council has submitted follows the parish boundary for Drayton.

We are therefore conducting a six week consultation, seeking views on whether or not the area chosen for the Neighbourhood Plan for Drayton is



suitable. You can obtain further information by visiting www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/neighbourhoodplans.

The consultation runs from 17 October – 28 November 2012. Anyone with comments on the proposal can send them through to planning.policy@whitehorsedc.gov.uk

DRAYTON 2020 UPDATE

Following the successful launch at the Village Hall Curry night in September, Drayton 2020 is now properly up and running with a Steering Group of 8 volunteers. The Group includes 2 members of the Parish Council and 2 members of the Drayton Community Trust (a local body which was responsible for the creation of the Millennium Green, and is also a registered charity). Those who were able to attend the launch evening will recall that, amongst other activities, four tables were set up on the village hall floor, each displaying a large map of the village, and each representing one of four main themes:

Look and Feel (covering all aspects of the appearance of the village)

Transport (traffic management, bus routes, cycle routes etc) **Work and Play** (employment opportunities and recreation facilities)

Sustainability (Including the additional resources that new



development might need, e.g. more school places, and how to make the village more self sufficient and less just another suburb of Abingdon).



ALL AROUND

DRAYTON SCHOOL

All the school children enjoyed yet another excellent visit from travelling theatre group M&M productions. This time they put on 'Beauty and the Beast'. Our Year 6 children learnt a lot of useful information about resuscitation and first aid during an IMPS (Injury Minimization Programme for Schools) visit to Abingdon Hospital Minor Injuries Unit.

• Robins Class (Reception) with Ms Spencer

Robins Class topic is 'All about me!' The children are learning all about themselves and each other. They are learning about babies and what they need to grow, and thinking about things they can do now that they couldn't do when they were babies.

• Puffins Class (Year 1) with Miss Bowerman

Puffins are continuing with their topic which is 'Is it a bird? Is it a plane?... No it's Superpuffin!

• Ravens (Year 2) with Mrs Raven

The Ravens topic is Huff & Puff - They have now decorated their three giant cardboard houses and are making a collage wall display. They have been thinking about homes, what would be silly and sensible building materials for a house, and looking at our own homes and thinking about how modern ones compare to Victorian ones.

Kingfishers topic is still the adventurer Bear Grylls and as part of this they have enjoyed orienteering. The last one was against the clock and was hard. It was a star exercise, where the children ran from a central point to a series of markers. On the back of each marker was a letter. The children collected each letter and then unscrambled them to make the word In science the children have carried out an investigation to see which pair could keep hot water warmest for longest. The three winning pairs had used lots of layers of different materials to keep their water warm. This then lead on to thinking about how this could help Bear Grylls stay warm on some of his very cold expeditions.

• Eagles (Year 5 & 6) Mrs Duffy

Eagles are currently studying World War Two and are busy showing off their creativity with some fantastic displays of air raid shelters, war poetry, postcards and propaganda posters.

As the oldest class in school, Eagles are developing their position as role models of good behaviour, consideration and as independent thinkers.

NOVEMBER GARDEN

November is the month of bonfires and fireworks with explosions of colour lighting up the night skies. For those of us who prefer our colour explosions without the bang, Pyracantha and Cotoneaster fit the bill. They're bright and beautiful plants, bursting into flower in spring with a profusion of tiny pink and white flowers, followed by an abundance of shiny berries in

The plants at first glance look similar and are in fact distantly related. Pyracantha is commonly known as Firethorn for obvious reasons. It's viciously prickly but this adds to the plant's versatility. It's thorny habit makes it an ideal intruder deterrent for unwanted visitors (animals and humans alike) to the garden. Plant close together and within a couple of years the plants will be almost completely impenetrable. Cotoneaster is the gentler sister of Pyracantha. It's thornless and therefore sometimes chosen over Pyracantha by those who want the beauty without the bite.

They're also ideal plants for a wildlife garden, providing dense cover for roosting and nesting birds, nectar for bees mid-summer when the pickings are slim and ample fruit for birds, particularly blackbirds and thrushes, in autumn. Pyracantha berries are not poisonous as commonly thought and despite being bitter in taste, they can be made into jellies. The magnificent fiery orange and ruby red berries are set on a backdrop of dark, evergreen, glossy foliage that can brighten up the gloomiest November day.

Pyracantha 'Navajo' and Pyracantha 'Orange Charmer' are good choices for the garden. 'Orange Charmer' is an evergreen, bushy, arching shrub producing white flowers from April and large spherical orange fruits in autumn. 'Navajo' sports vibrant orange-red berries nestled against shiny green leaves and can be resistant to fireblight.

Cotoneaster horizontalis has superb colour late in the year with deep red berries and glossy green foliage. The herringbonepatterned stems develop into a decorative weave across the ground or on a wall according to how it is trained. It works well in the shade but the delicate pink flowers and jewel-like red berries really thrive in full sun.

Both plants can be grown as hedges, as groundcover plants or against walls and fences to provide natural screening. They look equally good as freestanding shrubs when space in the garden permits. They're easy to grow in sun or partial shade and are not too fussy about soil, often growing in dry and shady positions. They're fully hardy and tolerate most weather conditions although they're not appreciative of cold, easterly winds. They require little pruning, but if they do grow out of their space, just cut them back hard without fear of damaging the plant.

⇒ and less just another suburb of Abingdon).

Drayton residents were invited to write their comments on these four themes on post-it stickers, which they then attached to the relevant map. These comments have been collected and recorded, and will be taken into account by four Working Groups, which have been set up to consider the four themes and come up with ideas to be incorporated in Drayton's Neighbourhood Plan.

Each working group has on it two members of the steering group, one of whom will act as the convener of the working group. Hopefully this overlapping arrangement will ensure that everyone's efforts are effectively co-ordinated. The four conveners, who all signed up at the launch evening, are Janet Manning - Look and Feel; Christine West -Transport; Oenone Grant - Work and Play; and Diane Dunsdon – Sustainability.

At present, the four working groups are small. We would like to expand them, and make them as representative of the village as possible. In particular we would welcome volunteers from the west (A34) side of the village and from younger age groups. If you would like to join one of the Working Groups, or have any views you wish to pass on to them, then please email draytontwentytwenty@gmail.com with your contact details (including telephone number) and the convener will be in touch to let you know where and when that group is meeting.

Missing in the account so far is the subject of housing —where does it feature in all this? To answer, it was felt that housing was so important, and so much at the heart of any Neighbourhood Plan, that everyone would have an interest in it, and that therefore all four groups would consider housing in addition to their core topic. All the topics are in any case interconnected in many ways. As the Steering Group as a whole will make housing a priority, it is hoped that, via the working groups, anyone who is interested can have an input on housing, but that the Steering Group can provide the impetus to get this aspect of the Plan in place as soon as possible.

To those that question why we should be thinking about building houses in Drayton at all, this is not the place to discuss the merits, or otherwise, of house-building, but it would be foolish to ignore the messages coming from central government. David Cameron very recently asserted - just last week in the speech to his party conference - that everyone knows this country has a chronic housing shortage, but no one wants a solution that might affect them, or involve building in their back yard. His words, and the pronouncements of other ministers along similar lines, indicate that this government is resolved to press ahead with housing development and is prepared to override local authorities if it believes that they are dragging their feet on granting planning permission for new homes. The point is, that development probably will come to Drayton, and fairly soon. We can either let it happen, possibly in a place that none of us approve of, or we can aim to have some control over it, and look to gain some positives out of it, instead of assuming that all development must be negative. This is only the beginning of the discussion in Drayton, of course, but it is the reality of where we are now, and the situation that Drayton 2020 seeks to address.

Meetings of the Steering Group are held fortnightly on Friday nights at 7pm in the Caudwell Centre, at the far end of Gravel Lane. These are public meetings, which anyone may attend, so if you would like to come along to listen or give your views, you would be very welcome. The next meeting dates are: Friday 2nd November, Friday 16th November, and Friday 30th November.

In the interests of keeping the village up to date with what is happening with Drayton 2020, this column will now be a monthly feature in the Chronicle. It is intended soon to upload Steering Group minutes and other information to the village website. The minutes will also be posted on the village notice boards – on the Village Green bus stop; outside the Mace shop, and in St. Peter's

Church porch. Regular email bulletins will be sent to those on the Drayton 2020 emailing list. Please keep yourself informed and let the Steering Group and Working Group members have your views

PARISH COUNCIL

Report meeting held on Monday 1st October 2012.



Six members of the public attended the meeting as well as the Parish Councillors. Fay Nugent outlined some of the problems that schoolchildren travelling to and from Didcot have experienced since the X2 bus service was taken over from the Oxford Bus Company by Thames Travel. Whilst OBC put on double-decker buses in the early morning and evening to accommodate rush-hour passengers, Thames Travel have

substituted single-deckers. The lack of space means that schoolchildren and others getting on the bus in Drayton and Steventon cannot get a seat and have to stand all the way to Didcot. Although this was the predictable outcome of the new policy, Thames Travel appear not to have the vehicle capacity to put things right: the company do run double-decker buses, but say they have none to spare for this route. The circumstances are particularly irritating for those families who have paid for season tickets for their children in advance.

Fay said that Oxfordshire County Council operates a school coach and minibus service, which could be an alternative, except that it costs twice the price of the X2. In addition, the OCC service leaves immediately after school, which rules out the children attending any after-school clubs, whereas Thames Travel has services leaving at 4pm and 4.15pm. Several parents have written to the management of Thames Travel, as has the Parish Council, and Mr Hammond, the MD of Thames Travel, has undertaken to review the provision of services. It is hoped to arrange a meeting with him in the near future, and the meeting noted that the Oxford Mail and the Abingdon Herald have also been taking an interest in the issue.

Two parishioners enquired what was happening with Drayton 2020 and were critical of the lack of communication with those who signed up to the website. It was apparent that, among some residents, the perception exists that unlimited housing development is to be foisted on the village, against its wishes, and without proper consultation. It was explained that this perception is incorrect, that no decisions on number or location of houses have yet been made, and that every effort has been and will be made, not just to consult with Drayton residents, but so far as possible to get them involved in the decision-making. However, it was acknowledged that on the launch night on Sept 7th, this message had not been put across as clearly as it might have been, and that some misunderstanding has been the result, as demonstrated, for example, by the letter on the subject printed in last month's Chronicle.

It is accepted that communication updates have been lacking so far, but this is mainly because the Drayton 2020 steering group needed to do the groundwork and get some structures in place before we could actually make progress on the Neighbourhood Plan. At the time of writing this, everyone who registered with the website should have received at least a preliminary update on where we are and what we are doing. As a further means of stepping up communication, a separate column devoted solely to Drayton 2020 (the first, it is hoped, of a regular feature) will be found elsewhere in this issue. Although the background to Drayton 2020 has been covered before in the Chronicle, this first column will again set out why the Parish Council feels a Neighbourhood Plan is necessary, and what it hopes to achieve.

To contact any members of the Parish Council, all enquiries should be directed to the Parish Clerk, David Perrow, in the first instance. David may be contacted via E-mail at draytonclerk@yahoo.co.uk or by telephone on 07909 176061, and he will ensure that any messages are passed on. Any Drayton

resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents. In addition, all Parish Council minutes are now archived on the village website: www.drayton-near-abingdon.org. The latter also carries back copies of the Drayton Chronicle and details of other events in the village.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 5th November, at 7.30pm in the Caudwell Centre, Gravel Lane. As always, all are welcome.

As winter approaches, some people may worry about their energy bills. I would urge anyone worried about their bills to contact their local Age UK or Citizens Advice to find out if they can claim free help from the Warm Front scheme to help them be warm, well and wealthier this winter. The eligibility criteria for help under the Warm Front scheme has widened from September, so even if you



have been turned down before you may be able to get help this year. The heating and insulation improvements Warm Front offers could help many households locally to stay warm.

You can find out if you can get free help from Warm Front by calling 0800 316 2805. Further information and an online application form is available on www.direct.gov.uk/warmfront.

Over the summer, the government introduced new rules on the disclosure of interests and other standards for local councillors. These set out a much more straightforward regime which will be clearer and easier to follow, making sure councillors are open and above board about what needs to be declared, but are not tied up in bureaucracy in the process. You can get more details from the South and Vale Democratic Services Manager, telephone 01491 823049 or email democratic.services@southandvale.gov.uk. know lots of people think about becoming parish councillors, but are put off because they think they have to disclose their financial details and those of their family. The rules have now been simplified, so do take a look if you are thinking of serving in some way. There will be elections for some councils next May, and there is always a need for local people to represent their communities. Do talk to a current councillor to find out what is involved – it may not be as bad as you think!

One of the most visible things in the constituency is Didcot Power Station. We've recently heard that after 42 years of service Didcot A Power Station will stop generating electricity on 31st March 2013. Closing a major power station is a complex task so the decommissioning and demolition of the plant is expected to take several years, and Didcot B will continue in operation. In just a few years time, however, the view will be changing.
