

In January Josie Midwinter gave us a very interesting talk on Drayton School log books. She had done a lot of research and had the log books in good order. They went back hundreds of years including a girl's school at Lime Close. All sorts of things were included in the log books; when the child started, the names of the teachers, their absences especially at times when they were needed to help on the land.

Many of the children were very poor. Later on there was a school building in High Street and opposite there was some land where the pupils could grow vegetables. A new school was built at Hilliat Fields in the twentieth century. No detailed log books were kept later but there were lots of more recent photos of present day Drayton School. The talk created a lot of interest as most people in the audience had some connection with the school either as a one time pupil, a parent, a grandparent a teacher or a helper. We were able to see the log books and photos which created many reminiscences.

DRAYTON 2020

STEERING GROUP REPORT Richard Williams

The four original working groups: Look and Feel, Transport, Work and Play, and Sustainability, with the recently added Housing Working Group, have all generated a lot of ideas and produced working papers as a basis for further discussions. Each was asked to draft a 'vision statement', summarising what it was trying to achieve and these in turn led to an 'overarching' vision statement. These are:

Look & Feel	To create a cohesive and coherent look and feel to the overall plan for the village that helps integrate the residents and gives Drayton a real identity.
Transport	To make it easier for all residents of the village to travel in and around, and stop in the village more safely and easily and improve transport links to surrounding towns and villages.
Work and Play	To promote and enhance work and leisure facilities in Drayton to meet the needs of all ages of resident, thus making the village a place where more residents can fulfil their requirements for living, work and play.
Sustainability	To ensure the long-term sustainability of the village, its buildings and its environment for benefit of future generations
Housing	To ensure that any housing development meets the needs of Drayton's inhabitants, fits into the character of the village and ensures the viability and sustainability of the village

Leading to a draft overall vision:

'Drayton 2020's aim is for Drayton village to be home to a thriving working community that is strongly linked to its environment and to its neighbours. Drayton should be a place that has its own identity, in which any future development adds to the quality of life of all of Drayton's residents'.

Housing is expected to be the most contentious issue facing the village in the near future and some residents will have noticed surveying activity going on in a couple of sites, but it should be emphasised this is nothing to do with Drayton 2020. Moreover, no site, whether for housing or any other type of use, e.g. recreational, will be formally identified in the Plan without prior consultation with the village as a whole. However, the Steering Group feels that we now need to speak to landowners to see what sort of development, if any, they are likely to support. Some of them put up specific sites last year for 'screening' as part of the Vale's Interim Housing Supply Policy. These sites are still 'on the table' although the IHSP was abandoned, and the Steering Group wishes to investigate any other potential site which might be put forward for development in the foreseeable future. The main landowners in Drayton have all been contacted.

⇒ Although the Drayton 2020 team believes that properly planned development could bring many positive benefits to the village, there will undoubtedly be residents who are not convinced, and some who would rather not see any new development (at least not new housing) in Drayton at all.

For those who see our Neighbourhood Development Plan as unwelcome, it is worth asking what would happen if we did not have a Plan. The only thing we can be sure of is that not having an NDP would not remove the pressure to take housing. Central government is insisting that more houses be built, and rightly so; new housing starts have been woefully low under governments of all political persuasions for far too long, which is one of the reasons we have a chronic housing shortage in the UK, coupled with absurdly high house prices which push the chances of buying a house almost beyond the reach of most first-time buyers.

The Vale does not have a 5-year housing supply, which is a requirement under planning law. It also does not have a current Local Plan in place. These last two factors mean that almost any site in the Vale which is available for development, could also be vulnerable to speculative and/or predatory planning applications.

Drayton's Housing Needs Survey identified a need for some smaller properties, 1 and 2 bedroom, not to the exclusion of larger properties, but at the moment, developers' preference is often weighted in favour of 'executive' homes because these tend to be more profitable. What would seem to be needed is more balance, so that at one end of the scale, there are affordable properties for those getting onto the housing ladder; while at the other end, smaller properties are available for people whose families have grown up and left home and who are currently living in properties which are too big for them. Some of these people would like to stay in the village but downsize; yet they cannot do so because the smaller properties do not exist. We also know that family sizes are getting smaller, and more adults, whether by choice or necessity, are living on their own than ever before. This means that we have to build more houses, in effect, just to stand still. Not everyone wishes to live in large towns and cities, and although these will take the bulk of new housing, it is unrealistic to expect them to take it all. The view of the Drayton 2020 team is that it is pointless to resist all development, but that a Neighbourhood Plan will help us to resist inappropriate development and give local people - residents of Drayton - a say in what sort of housing we take and where. The housing may be necessary for its own sake, but we hope that it will bring other improvements to the village with it, and this column will say more about the other aspects of the Plan next month.

GARD

We are now approaching the time for production of the next Thames Water draft Water Resources Management Plan (WRMP14). It is only about eighteen months since the flawed 2009 Plan was finally amended and approved by Defra after our successful challenge at the 2010 Public Inquiry.

GARD's consultants have been monitoring the subsequent research and the preparations Thames Water are making for their next draft and there is no doubt that GARD has had considerable influence. We will not know whether the new plan will include the Upper Thames Reservoir (UTR) until early April 2013, after the draft has been approved by Thames Water and Defra. However, the available evidence seems to point to the conclusion that, for this next plan, the additional demand for water will be met without the need for a major additional resource. The Thames Water draft strategy, which has been released, and will shortly be available for public consultation, also points to this deduction. In the short term this seems to be good news, but it is also evident that Thames Water will be seeking to create or develop a major new source of water to meet demand in their 2019 plan. The resource will have to cater for the additional needs of much of the South East. It is clear that the UTR will be a strong contender.

The research needed for the Severn Thames Transfer schemes has not been completed, although it was forecast to be available to us last November. The continued absence of information seems to confirm that a major resource is not required for this next plan – otherwise Thames Water would have had to do a detailed analysis of this option. Further research on conventional treatments of reused water is still in progress and if positive would represents another viable and sustainable option.

PARISH COUNCIL

Report of the meeting held on Monday 4th February 2013



5 members of the public attended this meeting. Ken Oliver, who works for Wiltshire County Council as a Canal Officer, spoke about the Wilts and Berks Canal Trust and explained how the trust is committed to returning the historic waterway to a navigable state. The towpath will be restored to provide wildlife habitats, cycle ways and routes for walkers, along what could eventually become a long-distance footpath connecting three counties. The restored

canal would re-establish an important link in the national waterways network, but as most Drayton residents will be aware, Thames Water's plans to build a new reservoir west of Steventon have not gone away despite their original proposals being rejected. If the reservoir ever goes ahead it will inevitably affect the restoration of the canal, as a large section of the historic canal route passes through the proposed site. To cover that possibility, the Trust has been working with the designers of the reservoir scheme to provide an alternative route for the canal. As part of Drayton's Neighbourhood Plan, the Drayton 2020 Steering Group have been looking at the existing footpaths and cycle ways around the village and considering how they might be improved or extended, and the canal project obviously links in with this.

Simon Murray asked for the Parish Council's help in getting a street light repaired. The light is located on the junction of Marcham Road and Whitehorns Way and evidently has not been functioning for some while. The junction is very dark at night and potentially dangerous for pedestrians. There appears to be a problem with the underground power supply cable, and Oxfordshire County Council is understood to be in discussion with Scottish and Southern Energy, who claim that the cable is not theirs. The Parish Council undertook to contact OCC Street Lighting for an update on the situation.

It was noted that the Parish Clerk had arranged a meeting with the surrounding parish and town councils to discuss common issues (housing, transport, the reservoir etc) relating to neighbourhood planning. This meeting took place on 11th February and was attended by councillors from Sutton Courtenay, Marcham, Steventon, and Abingdon Town Council. There was a vigorous discussion of the issues and general concern was expressed over the Vale's present lack of a Local Plan and the problems this was creating in regard to housing development. It was further noted that the proposed development of 170 houses in South Abingdon (south of Preston Road and east of the Drayton Road), though refused planning permission by the Vale, has now gone to appeal with the Secretary of State. Should the Vale's refusal be overturned by central government this would not only have a considerable impact on Abingdon and the surrounding villages: it would, in Drayton 2020's view, render the government's commitment to the localism agenda worthless. The Vale invited comments on its website regarding the original application and these will be forwarded to the Planning Inspectorate for consideration at the appeal. If any other Drayton residents wish to comment on this development, they may still do so until 15th March 2013, either:

You should quote the appeal reference number: APP/V3120/A/13/2191911/NWF and, if you write, you will need to enclose 3 copies of your letter.

Although this may sound a lot of effort, it is well worthwhile as local views do carry weight, and probably contributed to the Vale's decision to refuse planning permission in the first place. The appeal will be heard at a public enquiry, the date of which has yet to be arranged.

A place you just drive through:

Throughout the 1950s my family made trips from Worcestershire to Sussex to visit my grandparents. For some reason, I can remember a lot about those trips, mainly that they were long, boring and I suffered from severe car sickness. I remember making faces at the grumpy looking woman in the car that had just driven into the back of us outside the 'new' Harwell



Research Station. I can remember the huge traffic jams in Abingdon. I even remember the village (Steventon) with a beautiful green. Of Drayton I can remember nothing at all. It was just one more featureless place we drove through on the way to Sussex. Even today, Drayton is a village which most people just drive through on the way to somewhere else. Its most attractive, memorable features are hidden from the passing motorist. It is a village rarely described as beautiful or memorable but it just happens to be the place where I have spent the last 38 years of my life. When we 'long term' residents are pressed, it is obvious that we have all grown to love and care for this drab little village in which we live. We would like to see it less drab and more noticeable, but above all, we would like to ensure its future for our children and grandchildren. We want the village, as far as possible, to be viable in its own right.

The modern buzz word for this is:

'Sustainability':

No village the size of ours is ever going to be fully sustainable. To achieve it, we would need our own secondary school and enough businesses within the village to employ most of the adult residents. We are always going to depend on Abingdon, Didcot, Harwell, Milton Park etc for schools, employment, power, waste disposal and so on. It is a fact, however, that if we were more sustainable, we would be less a place that people drive through and more a fully-functioning community than we are now. We have too little employment, and hence too many people driving to and from work elsewhere. We have no 'real heart' to the village, no central village green, too many under-occupied large houses and too few of the smaller houses that modern society needs.

Making the village a place where more of its residents do not just live, but work, rest, play, grow old and yes, even die, is what sustainability is about. It does not mean vast amounts of extra housing – but it does mean acknowledging that modern day Drayton is far from ideal and there is much we could do to improve it. That is why we are creating a Neighbourhood Plan.

Noticeable Drayton:

We may not be much to look at, yet. However, Drayton and its Neighbourhood Plan are becoming the centre of attention in the District. We are the first, and so far the only, village to undertake one. Steventon, Sutton Courtenay, Marcham, Shrivenham, Watchfield and Kingston Bagpuize are all watching our progress closely. Neighbourhood Plans are a new idea under the Localism Act. No-one knows how well they will work and exactly how much clout they will have but all those other villages have been subject to large scale planning applications in the past few months and cannot exert much influence. With its lack of five-year land supply, the Vale has found it difficult to refuse them. Kingston Bagpuize and Watchfield are due to grow out of all recognition. Where and how they grow is being decided by landowners and developers. To the enormous credit of Drayton's landowners, this village has not been subject to such large scale applications. It is not that the village is against development, those involved in the Neighbourhood Plan accept that growth in Drayton is as inevitable as in all the other villages. However, the Neighbourhood Plan team is encouraging all landowners to talk to and engage with

them. Those that choose not to do so, cannot be part of the plan. And remember that whatever our plan proposes has to be approved in a village referendum.



Many people across the constituency are involved in voluntary work, helping causes they value in lots of different ways. The Charity Commission recently contacted me because they are looking for more people to become charity trustees, so if you are looking for a way to help others, why not consider contacting them? Charities do a huge range of very important work and cover



just about every conceivable interest, both locally and nationally so there is bound to be something to interest everyone. You can see them all at www.charitycommission.gov.uk/ShowCharity. Many are very local; nearly 50 have 'Abingdon' in their name and about 10 have 'Drayton'. There are also charities such as Helen and Douglas House and Creation Theatre, which do great work for people in our constituency but are based just outside.

There is more general information about what is involved in being a trustee at trusteesweek.blogspot.co.uk/p/becoming-trustee. It may not be as complicated or difficult as you think, so do have a look. If you are interested, you might like to look at the trustee finder service (www.trusteenet.org.uk/jobs-search) which allows people to enter areas of interest and run a postcode search so they can find opportunities in their local area:. If becoming a trustee is more of a commitment than you want to make at the moment, then why not consider volunteering with one of your local charities?

With many constituents thinking about their summer holidays at the moment, I wanted to draw attention to two key changes which Parliament has recently agreed to the Air Travel Organisers' License (ATOL) scheme. The scheme is there to protect people against the risk of their travel company going bust; ensuring they can continue their holiday and return home safely if the company collapses whilst they are away; or providing refunds if they're yet to travel. The first change will widen protection and help people understand when they are protected. Holidays known by the industry as 'Flight-Plus' are now included in the scheme, as well as traditional package holidays. 'Flight-Plus' booking is one that includes a flight plus accommodation and/or car hire, so long as these separate parts of the holiday are booked with the same company and within a day of each other.

The second change agreed by Parliament saw the introduction of the ATOL certificate; offering consumers greater clarity on how their holiday is protected. Anyone who books an ATOL-protected trip will now receive an ATOL certificate from their travel company as soon as they make any payment. The certificate tells them what is protected, who is protecting it and what to do if something goes wrong. I hope that both of these changes will help constituents to feel more confident that they are properly protected.
