Parish Council – Chairman's Letter

It would be great to see you all at the Annual Village Meeting (15th April at the village hall) but, in case you cannot make it, there are a few matters which I would draw to your attention.

The most important is the <u>Neighbourhood Development Plan</u>. Following its launch last year, we are approaching a stage where everybody will have a chance to express their views on how the village could or should develop over the next 15 years or so.

The Housing Policy Guidance adopted by the Parish Council in advance of the NDP is on the village web site. There are 15 policies designed to apply to the housing applications expected in the coming months, all designed to encourage developments to comply with National planning guidance and, specifically, to be more 'sustainable'. For example, there are policies supporting 'cohousing' (investigate through Google) and 'self-building'. If these concepts (one of the developers preparing an application as you read this has been involved in a co-housing scheme) or the future development of the village is of interest, then I, the PC or Drayton 2020 would be **pleased to hear from you**.

Although the Plan is being organised by Drayton 2020, the Parish Council is fundamental to its formal completion and adoption. **That is where you might come in**. The PC is at little more than half strength and going down. This, at a time when 'localism' means that more power is, at least in theory, being passed up to parish councils. There has never been a better time to sit on a parish council and it must be preferable if more people (there are **4 vacancies**) are responsible for the important decisions that will need to be made on behalf of the people in the village.

If you can't make April 15th we meet next on May 13th in the Caudwell Day Centre. *Daniel Scharf*

Volunteers Key to Locks

Volunteer Lock Keepers (assistants) work alongside paid lock keepers. They help boats pass through the lock safely: taking ropes, directing traffic, and operating sluices and lock gates. They help maintain the site:- painting, tidying and gardening, and also provide information to visitors, to enhance their time on the river.

The Environment Agency, (navigation authority for the Thames), is now recruiting for this season and are looking for **volunteers** who can commit to assisting at least one day a week between May and the end of September. Volunteers can agree their hours with lock keepers but need to be available at least from 11 to 5, they're especially needed between Reading and Lechlade. It's a great way to meet people and discover more about the river, its history, wildlife and management, and volunteers know they're doing **something worthwhile and really appreciated**.

All applicants are invited to a local assessment, to have the role explained and be shown what it involves. They'll also be assessed to decide which site may be most appropriate, and to ensure they have the physical capabilities required. On successful completion of the assessment, they attend an induction course which focuses on safety and preparing them for the lock side.

The volunteers follow a documented training programme before being signed off to take charge of the lock on their own. This is only for short periods, maybe while the paid keeper is at lunch. The volunteers are there to augment the service provided by paid staff rather than to replace them. Volunteers are provided with some uniform and can claim mileage for travel; they also receive a monthly newsletter which keeps them in touch with what is going on along the river and other activities of the Environment Agency.

WESTMINSTER VIEW

Ed Vaizey's column (Wantage & Didcot MP, also he's Minister of Culture, Communications and Creative Industries)

Many of you will know that water bills are going up this year. In the constituency, we are all served by Thames Water, (Editor's note – 'served'?!) and Ofwat, the water regulator, has determined that they will be allowed to increase water bills by 3.5% in April. That's an average increase of £18 per household (varies for individual homes), around £2.60 for improvements to the service and the rest to allow for inflation. Although unwelcome, the bills will help to pay for the largest ever investment programme for water and sewerage. We often take both a clean water supply and our sewage being taken away very much for granted, so it is helpful to be reminded that it doesn't all happen by accident.

I heard recently that in January, a milestone was reached – the one millionth blood stem cell transplant. This achievement was unimaginable 39 years ago, but then, Shirley Nolan had only just created the world's first **bone marrow register**. <u>Registering is easy</u>, and as at least 2 former Mayors of Wallingford have found out, if you are chosen to donate, it's a fantastic thing to be able to do. So, if <u>you'd like to do something remarkable</u>, why not contact the Antony Nolan Trust at www.anthonynolan.org and join the register too?

The Government has recently announced measures to tackle welfare and irresponsible dog ownership, following consultation last year. Measures will include requirement that dogs are microchipped with details of the owner (which was supported by 96% of respondents to the consultation) and a change in the Dangerous Dogs Act to extend the offence of a dog being dangerously out of control to all places, including private property.

The Dogs Trust are giving very generous support to the measures which means a free microchip will be available for all unchipped dogs throughout England. The Government is working with the Dogs Trust to ensure that free microchips will be offered to local authorities, housing associations and veterinary surgeries. Some other animal welfare charities are offering free microchipping at their centres including Battersea Dogs and Cats Home, and Blue Cross. This will mean that the measure can be introduced in 2016 without a cost to dog owners who might struggle to pay for it.

Finally, this month my mailbox has been dominated by two campaigns. The campaign for an amendment to the Energy Bill, (to outline a clean electricity target), and the campaign about competition regulations in the NHS. Between them these campaigns account for almost 300 individual letters and emails. I've also received almost 50 emails from members of the fair fuel campaign who wish to lower fuel duty, 20 or so on the Justice and Security Bill and another 20 from people concerned about the level of duty on alcohol.



The approval follows a cabinet meeting that was held in February, where the consultation and original application were reviewed. The consultation yielded no contentious issues and the Head of Planning for the district council recommended that the area should be approved.

Now that the application has been given the green light, Drayton Parish Council can move forward with confidence in developing their neighbourhood plan. A neighbourhood plan being a key tool in empowering local communities in shaping how their local area develops and grows in the future.

PARISH COUNCIL (March 4th)

Our County Councillor Mike Badcock reported that OCC has decided to increase its Council tax rate by 1.99% this year, despite the fact that central government would prefer to see the rate frozen, and had written to the Council to express its disapproval. Obviously, an increase in tax is not in itself a cause for celebration, but the alternative was to see further serious cuts in spending on local services, often those that help protect the most needy and vulnerable. The PC felt that the decision was the right one in the circumstances, and that they should be commended for acting to defend vital services. It was resolved to send a letter to OCC, supporting them and approving their 2013/14 budget.

It was noted that the Vale have proposed that Abingdon should have a two-kilometre southern bypass running between the A415 at Culham and Marcham Road just east of the A34 (i.e. at the Tesco Roundabout) if any major new housing developments are accepted. This isn't the first time such a project has been suggested – before the recent headline it was previously featured in the Abingdon Herald about 5 years ago, but such are the number and scale of developments either already on stream, or now being put forward in the Vale area, that the need for radical infrastructure improvements becomes more pressing by the month. Most people appreciate the need for new housing, but clearly there is a problem if it's built without providing for the consequences.

Whilst on this subject, the PC received from Dr Sheila Worsley a letter written on behalf of 'Keep Sutton Courtenay Rural', a group of local residents campaigning against large scale housing development there, regarding two planning applications recently submitted to the Vale, by Pye Homes (ref P13/V0233/FUL) and Redrow Homes (ref P13/V0401/O), both viewable on the VoWH website. The letter explained how their residents object strongly to both these applications for a number of reasons, not least the impact of the additional traffic they will generate on local roads, and the fact that the Pye Homes site encroaches onto the open space separating Sutton Courtenay from Drayton parish. The PC has responded with a letter recommending that a better bus service and new cycle paths should be supported and agreed before these applications are approved. The PC met last month with other surrounding parish councils to discuss matters of mutual interest, and given the level of concern about the cumulative impact of new housing developments, it was agreed to organise a series of follow-up meetings on relevant topics. The next meeting will be on April 8th, to discuss neighbourhood planning issues. $\rightarrow >>$

Drayton 2020 - March Update

In the last few weeks, members of the Steering Group have met with all the local landowners (or their representatives) who have so far declared a definite intention to develop sites within Drayton parish. The sites are:- <u>south of the High St</u> – a meeting with Savills (the land agents) and Bloor Homes; <u>Manor Farm</u> (where planning permission for approx 20 houses has already been granted) – a meeting with representatives of the Earl of Plymouth Estates; and <u>east of the burial ground</u> – a meeting with Paul Caudwell and WYG Group (planners). As indicated, only the Manor Farm site has planning permission (granted some 15 years ago); <u>applications have not yet been put in on the other sites</u>.

The Steering Group is continuing its efforts to contact other landowners who have expressed an interest in development, and in the interests of completeness, those who have not, but who might do so in the future.

It should be stressed that none of these meetings imply approval or disapproval of any particular proposal, because these are not decisions that Drayton 2020 can make: the village will be asked to give its collective opinions in **consultation meetings** later in the spring and summer. They are essentially 'fact-finding missions', whereby the Steering Group have been able to explore what landowners and developers had in mind, and on our side, to explain some of the problems of the village, and indicate the sort of facilities we might be looking for in terms of 'planning gain'.

Nothing is yet resolved, and what the Steering Group has requested is sufficient time to consult with the village, since it is clearly not in the spirit of local control if a developer is allowed to by-pass the Neighbourhood Plan process with a pre-emptive application. As to the Manor Farm site, which could in theory proceed immediately with development, the Steering Group discussed the possibility of a new village centre in this location. The representatives of the EoP Estates were not empowered to give any answers at this stage, but undertook to refer our ideas back to the landowner, and agreed to meet again with Drayton 2020 in April.

The latter put forward **their ideas for a future meeting** with the members of Drayton 2020, whereby they and other youngsters from Drayton (it is hoped around 20-25 will attend) will do a presentation on their own '**Hopes and Dreams**' for the village. In turn, Drayton 2020 will put some of the results of its working group discussions to the young people for their reactions and comment. This session will take place later in March at the Village Hall.

Drayton School



School news ... There are a good few changes to be seen around school at the moment. The school is benefitting from a new roof, complete with new skylights. Also, lots of the older windows have been replaced making the school a nicer environment for both staff and children alike.

The outdoor play equipment has been surrounded by wood chip, and paths have been improved so that children can enjoy more of the outdoor areas throughout the year. The main playground area has been re-painted with special designs which are allowing the children lots of playground play activities, especially with the help of the play leaders and their imaginations. It's certainly more than just hopscotch!

Classroom updates ...

Robin (Reception) Class learnt about the artist Kandinsky. They learnt that he lived a long time ago (1866) and liked to listen to music by Wagner when he painted. Robins made their own piece of art work in the style of Kandinsky's 'Squares with Concentric Rings' piece.

Puffins (Year 1) Class have become quite expert on the topic of Outer Space. Learning about the history of the moon landings and the life of Neil Armstrong inspired them to create some very descriptive moon poems. Chinese New Year was celebrated in style by writing their names using Chinese symbols and designing their own kites and lion heads for their own dance.

This term, the Pufflings have also developed a love of Traditional Tales. They have explored how they begin and end, different versions of the same story, good and bad characters and how the problems that occur in each tale have been resolved. The favourite tale at the moment is 'Little Red Riding Hood.' Children have role-played the story each taking the turn of being Mr Wolf and have written wanted posters to help find him. Of course, a few games of 'What's the Time Mr Wolf?' had to be played which also help them learn about time!

Ravens (Year 2) Class are still enjoying their Pirates topic. They have found out about famous pirates, what they got up to, and where they sailed. They had a really fun Jamaican afternoon when they all made Jamaican flags, ate coconut, pineapple and mango and danced to Bob Marley. They are now reading and writing pirate adventure stories and making treasure maps.



Red Kites (Year 3) Class have moved on from bread to chocolate! They've already carried out a survey of children in the school to find out what their preferred chocolate types are and are now going to use their experience of making chocolate crackles to design and make chocolates to suit their target market. Later this term they'll be designing wrappers for the chocolates, and producing adverts for TV using the iPads. Hopefully they'll be able to sell their products and make a profit.

Red Kites will be visiting to the Living Rainforest to experience the type of environment where cocoa grows - they've already found all the tropical countries on a world map, and seen some of the process that turns cocoa beans into chocolate. They've learnt all about the history of chocolate, drawing a picture story to help follow all the tricky names and places before using literacy skills to write the story of chocolatl (no, that's not a spelling mistake!) : 'Chocolatl' is the Aztec name for a drink consumed by Aztec royalty around the time of first European contact (early 1500s), sometimes thought of as 'hot chocolate' but nothing like the hot chocolate we drink today.

Kingfishers (Year 4/5) Class are lucky enough to have been on two recent trips. The first, as already reported, was to Whitehorse Hill to look at the white horse cut out of the chalk in the hillside.

The second visit was a little warmer, but not much. Thankfully the children were very enthusiastic about **the visit to The Cotswold Wildlife Park**, and this prevented the cold from dampening their spirits. They were studying the park's approach to conservation, and one of the aspects that the children had to consider was the size of the cages and enclosures that different animals were kept in. The park came out very well for size of enclosure, most of the children thought that the majority of the animals had plenty of room and showed no signs of distress. We split into two groups and each group had a talk and tour by one of the park's conservationists. As always one of the highlights was the visit to the shop! Everyone agreed it was an excellent day. Both of these visits were funded by Mr Mayer's 'wow' factor fund. Thank you very much, Mr Mayer!

Eagles (Year 5/6) Class have had great fun covering the Sasquatch as part of their Curious Critters topic. If you're not familiar with 'Sasquatch', it's another name for a Bigfoot.

They have used this topic in literacy to cover many genres of writing, such as the Sasquatch life cycle, a description, and at present a biography, which the children have embarked upon with great gusto. There are some very interesting displays both in and out of the classroom as well as some models of the Sasquatch displayed in reception. Within this Sasquatch topic the **Eagles have visited the Natural History Museum in London** and had a very memorable day out which was enjoyed by all. They have also created their own NHS Top Trump cards.

The topic the children have chosen for next term will be What Lies Beneath, loosely based on the Minecraft games, which undoubtedly will lead to an exciting and enjoyable term for all involved.


