Drayton 2020, the initiative set up by The Parish Council and Drayton Community Trust (the charity behind the Chronicle and the Millennium Green), is holding its second consultation on Sunday, May 12th at Drayton Community School. The event begins at 4 o'clock, (see ad below). The May 12th consultation will report back on Drayton 2020's discussions with the six Drayton landowners who have been asked to clarify their plans. "It is notable, and probably significant, that none of these six have yet applied for planning permission from the Vale" says Andrew Bax, Chairman of Drayton 2020, "so this may be evidence that our strategy of engaging with landowners will produce a more considered, long term, result".


Drayton 2020 has established working groups on 'Sustainability', 'Transport', 'Work & Play', 'Housing' and 'Look and Feel' each of which have taken an in depth look at how different aspects of the village might develop. Over thirty volunteers have been involved in these, with up to twenty also attending the fortnightly meetings of the initiative's Steering Group. Representatives of the Vale and of the County Council have joined meetings for items that directly affect them. "It has been a hive of constructive activity," says one.

Charitable donations have also enabled Drayton 2020 to commission professional advice from the Sutton Courtenay-based architects Adams Habermehl. These same landscape designers were responsible for the Millennium Green created in 2000. The resulting plans for a greener Drayton with a new Village 'Centre' will be presented for the first time on May 12th.

So come along on May12th and see the result of the working groups' suggestions and as the advert says, "What do you think?"

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FAREWELL DIDCOT 'A'

The Demise of an old friend

The Didcot A coal fired power station is no more. At least it is still standing there, but it will never be used again, though it now has to go through a period of decommissioning, and then finally demolition, so it could easily be five years before it finally disappears, and of course meanwhile there is a gradual run down of staffing levels. (The B station continues to flourish and will be expanding).

I must be one of the few locals who was resident here before the A station was conceived and then built. So readers might be interested in a few facts and salient features. The station was designed in the 1960s and built to open in 1970, and has run pretty well without a serious hold up ever since until this Spring. It took nearly 30,000 tons of steel in its construction, and the main foundations took almost 500,000 tons of concrete. Getting on for four miles of roads were constructed.

By the 1990s the A station was joined by its B sister, a gas fired station and very much smaller which started generating in 1997, and is still going strong. Didcot A survived the miners' strike but had to get special permission to bring in coal by road, since the station had been planned for exclusive rail deliveries. There were some disagreements and misunderstandings about the despatch of spent fuel to Radley lakes, but now happily resolved. There was unauthorised entry and tower climbing by Greenpeace and others, but the police and the station staff dealt with that promptly though these invasions did cost the owners a lot of money which no doubt ended up on all our electricity bills.

I doubt if I am the only one who feels a certain nostalgia about the end of Didcot A which incidentally is overwhelmingly in Sutton Courtenay despite its name. We had all got so used to it there, and you could see it for miles around, but now it is going if not gone, and we have to move on. In conclusion I would like to pay tribute to the staff who were well known in the community, especially local schools, and unlike some other major companies Didcot A was an admirable corporate citizen in the community.

Goodbye to a large part of our area

When I arrived in the wilds of North Berks at the tender age of 17, I read in the North Berks Herald that there was to be a power station built at the Didcot end of Milton Depot. The report stated that the towers would be several times higher than the floodlights, that stood up over the trees from here (Milton Road), the chimney however would be much taller. It was something that could not be envisaged at that time but slowly up came the towers followed by the chimney. Then came all the heavy equipment brought in by road skirting Hanney via the A420 and the A338 and down the Hanney Road to Steventon. No bypasses or ring roads then. All the little bridges down the Hanney road had been flattened as much as possible to allow the very large loads to pass without bottoming on the road. We were made aware of what was to arrive and when by a small blackboard and easel standing on the green by the Jubilee cross. We were by this time living on the green. This was put up a few days in advance and as the arrival time approached, people started to gather on the green with their cameras to see these large loads negotiate the corner by the Wheatsheaf. We knew it was on its way when the police motorcycle came up and parked on the junction, stopping through traffic. Then the police cars arrived and waited in the High Street, followed by the S.E.B. who lifted the overhead cables to allow the load to pass under. Then the load itself, usually carried by Wynns or Pickfords. These giant loads were guided round the corner on enormous low loaders, it was a wonderful spectacle, watching the men and this giant vehicle being steered round this tight corner. As the police car arrived, the motor cycle made off down the road to move all oncoming traffic over to allow this load to pass. On it went, through Sutton Courtenay, round the Fish corner and into the back gate of the power station by the entrance just past the old Amey offices site.

It was a sad day to see this great building cease to send steam up into the air. It was the most wonderful weather vane anyone could wish for. Seeing it in all its moods, sun shining on the towers, clouds sitting on the towers, the sun and the moon rising behind the towers. It's most remembered sight will be to tired parents, after a long journey home, telling tired children 'look there's the power station, won't be long now'. Good bye Didcot Power Station and thank-you for your hard work over the years.

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DRAYTON 2020 UPDATE Richard Williams

The Steering Group met again with representatives of the Earl of Plymouth Estates on April 10th to discuss the Manor Farm development. Drawings were presented to us which showed that the landowners had taken on board the idea of a new village centre, and Drayton 2020's vision of combining this with a new village green; but it was clear that the EoP's conception did not quite match what the Steering Group had in mind. It was agreed that further meetings should take place with a view to redesigning the plans so that both sides move closer together. It is important to reassure Drayton residents that all we are trying to do so far is agree on the shape of a proposition that will then be put to the village to assess whether it has general support, or otherwise. For purely logistical reasons - i.e. making sure there are enough people around, and not on holiday etc. to get publicity in place, displays in order, and so on, we have had to put back the date of the next public consultation meeting, but this has now been fixed for Sunday 12th May, at 4pm at Drayton School (note the venue and see ad on the front page).

Although all Steering Group meetings and working group meetings have been open for any Drayton resident to attend, it is the case that most of the work so far has been carried out by a central core of about 20 people. That being so, there is always the possibility of suspicion that deals are being arranged behind closed doors, that particular outcomes are being sought in advance, and that wider consultation with the village might be purely cosmetic. It is true that, under the terms of the Localism Act 2011, the neighbourhood development plan offers, unlike any previous type of community plan, a degree of control over planning issues. It is therefore potentially a powerful tool in the hands of local communities.

For this reason, the government have ensured that there are a number of hurdles that we have to surmount before any plan can be approved: these are, in effect, safeguards specifically designed to prevent any small clique hi-jacking the agenda for its own ends or pet projects. Firstly, the Plan has to be 'in general conformity' with the Vale's Local Plan (or Core Strategy) and also with national guidance - the NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework). If it is not, the Plan will not be accepted by the District Council. A detailed Sustainability Appraisal document must be drawn up to show that the Plan meets the NPPF's presumption of sustainable development. If the Vale is satisfied that the Plan is in line with its own strategic requirements, the Plan must then be scrutinised by an Independent Examiner, who can order changes to be made if he or she is not happy with it. At examination, the Plan must demonstrate adequate consultation with local people and produce a convincing evidence base. Finally, the Plan has to be put to a referendum of all Drayton residents and secure more than 50% of the vote. There would be little point in spending time on a Plan which does not have broad support across the village, as it simply would not pass its referendum.

In order not to mislead anyone, it should be appreciated that a neighbourhood development plan is just that: a plan for development. The Localism Act does not permit an NDP to be used to block development. The message that Drayton 2020 would try to get across to everyone is that, should the Plan fail, that will not mean an end to development. The pressure to take development will continue (just look at the other villages surrounding Drayton), but we will lose the opportunity to control the development. Drayton 2020's view is that, if we are going to have development whatever happens, let it be development that we determine, that meets the village's needs.

Most important of all, we want to hear what Drayton thinks – be it positive or negative. Don't sit at home and complain if you have a grievance. Come and air your doubts and worries, or better still, come and join us and have a constructive input into the process. If you support our ideas, that's great, but if you don't, tell us now so that we don't waste time on things the village doesn't want, and direct our efforts instead to the things it does! Reminder: Consultation meeting – Drayton School, Sunday 12th May, 4pm. Please come.

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ON BEING A PARISH COUNCILLOR

The advertisement for the Annual Parish Assembly on the front page of The March Chronicle contained the question "Ever wondered what your Parish Council does?" Those who came to the Parish Assembly on April 15th will have had the chance to find out, but for those who weren't able to be there perhaps it might be useful to explain some of the Council's responsibilities.

Having a Parish Council is very important for a well-functioning village, increasingly so as 'localism' is given more weight, and being a member of it is always interesting, often challenging and just occasionally frustrating. It demands a regular commitment of at least one monthly meeting, usually on the first Monday evening and, for most members, a willingness to sit on at least one committee or working group. Quite often training sessions, exhibitions or meetings of special relevance to Councilors' work are provided by the OCC or the VWHDC, and these are particularly helpful for new Parish Councillors.

Drayton Council has two sub committees and three 'Working Groups'. The former are 'Finance and Personnel' and 'Planning'. The Finance committee is responsible, with the agreement of the whole council, for deciding the amount of the annual precept (financial contribution) we should ask for from the District Council, for paying the clerk and caretaker, deciding how much should be allocated to village organizations, upkeep of amenities (e.g. the village hall, the Millennium green) and new projects, and for making local charitable donations. The Planning Committee considers and comments on all planning applications within the parish and reports back to the VWHDC planning department. If the Parish Council planning committee and the Vale planning officers disagree then the application has to be referred to the whole VWHDC planning committee for final decision.

The 'Working Groups' are 'Leisure and General Purposes', 'Press and Publicity' and 'Rights of Way and Conservation'. The first of these deals with such matters as care of the burial ground, the allotments, the playground and the various amenities in the The second group is involved with publicity and village. maintaining the village website, while the Rights of Way group, in collaboration with the County Council Environment department, tries to maintain footpaths and bridleways, kissing gates and hedgerows in good condition and occasionally plants new trees.

Having been a councillor for ten years I have decided that it is now time for me to stand down. Drayton parish is allowed a maximum of eleven councillors but in my time the maximum we have ever had was nine. With my departure the number will drop to six, which of course will put more pressure on those remaining. My experience in the early stages was that it took a year or two before I really felt I was getting to grips with the job and also beginning to understand the council's past history and decision making. Therefore I think that patience and some determination are required for new Councillors, and if at first some aspects of the work seem bewildering it is well worth persevering.

So if any reader is looking for a new and interesting challenge and also for a way of being part of the "Big Society", may I suggest they think seriously about contributing their particular skills and experience to Drayton's well-being by giving a few years to the Parish Council?



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
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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Richard Williams

Report of the Drayton Annual Parish Meeting and Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 15th April 2013

Some 25 people attended this combined meeting, which was held in the Village Hall. This year, Paul Mayhew-Archer, Drayton resident, and co-writer of *The Vicar of Dibley*, very kindly agreed to open proceedings as our guest speaker. Paul was the undoubted star of the evening, and his witty and frequently hilarious speech on the theme of 'reasons why people become parish councillors' will surely be remembered by all present for a long time to come. He also addressed a question which may just have crossed the minds of some other Drayton residents over the years, namely: given Paul's connections with Drayton, could the goings on in Dibley Parish Council, as brilliantly portrayed by Dawn French *et al*, have been in any way, shape or form, inspired by observations of a certain other Parish Council, closer to home? Paul's answer was an unequivocal Jim Trott-style 'No' (no, no, no, no, no, no, ...Yes). So that's that cleared up then.

This was a hard act to follow, but Daniel Scharf then presented his Chairman's Report on the activities of the Drayton Parish Council over the past year, as did the Chairs of the various subcommittees. Other speakers included Andrew Bax, who gave a brief account of what has been happening with Drayton 2020 – our village neighbourhood development plan – since the launch night last September, and Chris Willis Dixon, who spoke about the Caudwell Day Centre and its remarkably varied programme of activities. Gary Hibbins and Rita Atkinson introduced several young people from the Damascus Project who gave a presentation of the valuable work they have been doing as young leaders, and also an account of how they have contributed to Drayton 2020 at a recent consultation exercise with the young people of the village that was held in the Small Hall last month.

One or two questions were fielded from members of the public, and Julian Cook queried the costs of the Neighbourhood Plan. Richard Webber replied on behalf of the Parish Council, and explained that although there obviously are costs attached to the process, some monies are being made available by central government to help with this, and in the meantime, Drayton 2020 has hired in some outside expertise, but has minimised the use of consultants by doing much of the work 'in-house'. We have also had access to a number of free workshops put on by the likes of the Design Council and CPRE – again, their funding has come from central government. The Annual Parish Meeting concluded with tea and biscuits provided by the ladies of the Drayton Short-Mat Bowls Club, to whom we offer our grateful thanks.

After a short interval the normal monthly Parish Council meeting took place, ending at 10 pm. Pat Athawes was co-opted onto the Council as a new member, having responded to our plea for recruits. There are still several vacancies on the Parish Council, and as the next meeting in May is our AGM, when the Chairman, committee chairs and other posts will be elected (or reelected), there would be no better time to join. As Paul's speech noted, while much of the PC's business is inevitably routine, the Neighbourhood planning process entails a whole different level of involvement and interest, and an opportunity genuinely to have a say in the future of Drayton village.

Any Drayton resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents. In addition, all Parish Council minutes are now archived on the village website: www.drayton-near-abingdon.org. The latter also carries back copies of the Drayton Chronicle, information on Drayton 2020, and details of other events in the village.

The next meeting will be the Parish Council's AGM on Monday 13th May 2013, at 7.30pm, in the usual venue of the Caudwell day Centre in Gravel Lane. As ever, all are welcome to attend.

Taking part in Democracy - Elections

There is an argument for having all elections on the same day. There is an argument for making that day a National Bank Holiday. Some would go so far as to say that voting on that day should be compulsory. But none of it looks like happening in the foreseeable future. We are stuck with elections seemingly every year - most people not understanding what they are voting for or what their elected representative will be responsible for. County Council elections seem a rather distant, even tiresome and irrelevant distraction. I am told we can expect in the region of a 25% turnout on May 2nd. If so, at best some 10% of the population will decide who locally is responsible for our roads, our schools, our social services and so on. The same 10% will decide how 40% + of our council tax is spent. (The District Council is responsible for spending a little under 10%!).

It is a sad reflection on the state of our democracy when so few people decide these things. Many of us look back to the people who struggled for the right to vote for all men and women over the past 150 years and wonder how they would feel.

In tough times, we can understand why there are feelings of disinterest and disenchantment around election time. What's the point? Why should I bother? They'll do what they want anyway. The trouble with that attitude is that it changes nothing. At just the time when change may need to happen, nothing changes. The only solution is to vote. On May 2nd you will have a wide choice of candidates. I urge everyone to look at what they have to say. Decide who best represents your views and vote for them. Do not leave it to others. Please vote for someone. And please remember that these are Local elections and should be about *Local issues*. Whoever wins, it would cheer me up no end to see Drayton with the highest turnout in the area.

Planning and the Neighbourhood Plan

For whatever reason, Drayton is now the only large village in VWHDC not to have received an application to build a large number of houses. For this, we should thank two Groups of people. The first Group is the Drayton landowners who have shown patience and restraint whilst elsewhere their counterparts have been piling in. Under the current Government drive to stimulate housebuilding, Kingston Bagpuize, Shrivenham and Watchfield landowners have been granted permissions for hundreds of houses. Local people have had little or no say. Which brings me to the second Group who deserve our thanks - all those behind our emerging Neighbourhood Plan. In the next few weeks, all of us will be invited to hear and judge how much this Group have achieved so far. They have no power to make decisions without us. Their job is to offer us options. At the end of the process, we will all be able to vote it down or up. If you have strong feelings, I urge you to take part in the process. For a successful Neighbourhood Plan, everyone must have been given the opportunity to express their views, and a majority will decide what happens or doesn't happen at a referendum.

No-one can be sure that the process will work. However, I would like be part of a community which tries to find a way to keep an overwhelming number of us at least mostly happy (yes, including landowners) by producing a vision of a well-planned, sustainable Drayton in which we are all content to live. The alternative, which so many others are facing, is where local people have no say in what is happening to their communities, and residents are left unhappy and blaming 'them, up there' (as they always have done) for the fact that their villages are randomly distributed, dysfunctional and desperately short of infrastructure.

Whatever your views on the Neighbourhood Plan or Elections, I urge you to get involved and help make democracy work.
