
Editor's Note: In the school hall on Sunday, 12 May, the Drayton 2020 team presented to some 90 villagers many of their ideas for the Drayton Neighbourhood Plan. They answered questions, asked for feedback and looked for guidance on how the various options for developing the village might be evaluated.

Parish Councillor Richard William's report on this valuable meeting starts below and continues on pages 10 & 11:

'The purposes of the 12 May meeting were twofold:

First, for the Drayton 2020 team to report back to the village on the progress made by the Steering Group and various working groups on our Neighbourhood Plan since its launch in the Village Hall last September. In the main, the ideas we have been working on are those that Drayton residents themselves raised at that time - all the comments made verbally and on the various village maps were collated, and used as guidance to the areas we should be concentrating on.



Dear Friends,

'As with so many things, the quality of the lives we live is shaped not so much by what we do but how we do it. It is so easy to trudge through life, simply missing the gems and wonder of everyday existence, not because they are absent but because we don't notice them.' Extract from 'Everyday God' by Paula Gooder.



It is so easy to become consumed by doing things, the work deadline looming,

the baby up all night crying, looking after sick relatives, our daily routine. We can often be left to feel that life is passing us by. How do you learn to take time out, to turn aside to God and to regain a sense of his presence and wonder in all you do? 


ON PARISH COUNCILS

Last month, Drayton Parish Council asked me to speak at their annual Parish Assembly in the hope of attracting more villagers to the event. Forty two villagers had attended in 2012, so, with my help, they hoped to get the number up to at least eighty.

Sleeping Dogs was a rather dull title and at one point we did think of tweaking it on all the posters - Sleeping WITH dogs we thought. Might attract a bigger crowd.



Anyway, because I co-wrote the Vicar of Dibley, I was asked to say a few words about local councils, and so I took the opportunity to ask the question "Why do people become parish or town councillors?"

I had a great aunt who, for years, was on the local Council of a seaside town in Sussex. In fact she was Mayor three times and we often wondered why she devoted so much of her life, so many of her evenings, to the council. Then we found out she was having an affair with the town clerk.

Let's face it, councils are the perfect cover because, although their meetings are open to the public, we never go. They sound so dull.

"Just off to the council meeting, dear"

"Another? That's the third this month"

"I know. You can come if you like"

"Goodness no, sounds ghastly. How long will you be?"

"Well we've got to discuss the street light not working on the corner of Whitehorns Way and Marcham Road AND people putting dog mess in the bins belonging to Vickery's - so it's a packed evening. I could be gone for 3 hours".

And they're off and nobody guesses what's really going on.

Maybe they're all at it. Maybe there aren't any local councils at all, just a network of secret sex clubs calling themselves councils. All run by parish clerks, like our own David Perrow, the orgy organiser of Drayton.

No. Probably not. Though it would explain why would-be councillors are so keen to go through the ordeal of getting elected.

I say ordeal because standing for election involves canvassing knocking on our doors, begging us for our vote and risking the possibility of being sworn at. My wife Julie, knows this only too well since she's been on Abingdon Town council for 20 years. Indeed she's devoted much of her life, many of her evenings, to the council - which reminds me, I must check out the town clerk.

Anyway she said she canvassed one lady, got her vote and then asked the question "will your husband, the vicar, be voting?" - and as she asked the question she remembered that the Vicar had just been in the local paper after running off with the pizza delivery boy. "My husband is not here" said the lady and slammed the door.

Sometimes Julie would go with colleagues for moral support. One day she went with two women friends and as they set off she said "it's probably best if we don't introduce ourselves to voters with our full names." Sensible as she was Julie Mayhew-Archer and the other two were Jeanette Rickus-Prosser and Louise Goss-Custard.

And an elderly very proper local councillor called Keith Hasnip, had an unusual encounter whilst canvassing in Abingdon. He got to a top floor flat, rang the doorbell and a middle aged woman dressed only in a see-through negligee came to the door.

"Are you my 6 o clock? " she said

"No madam I am not" said Keith in his most dignified and serious voice

"Though I could come back at 7" he added. (Actually he didn't. I'm just being silly)

And then once you're on a council, life doesn't get any easier. JIM - Me.


DAVID - But you're here.

2020 FEEDBACK MEETING

....and advice from a variety of sources: the CPRE (Campaign for the Protection of Rural England), ORCC (Oxfordshire Rural Community Council), the Design Council and CABE (the Commission for Architecture and the Built Environment), and planners at the Vale, amongst others. He also described the meetings we have had with developers, and although naturally enough most of these have been in relation to land where the landowner has clearly expressed an interest in development, Andrew explained that we have made attempts to contact all of the known landowners in and around Drayton, although not all have responded. The point was made that there may well be more sites in Drayton suitable for housing than the ones discussed in this meeting, but ultimately it is the responsibility of the landowner to put them forward if that is the case. The Neighbourhood Plan is at present considering, or negotiating around, three sites - but this does not preclude other sites from entering the equation if circumstances change.

Tom Shebbeare continued with a presentation on some of the main features of the Neighbourhood Plan so far, in particular its 'vision' of a new village centre, based around the Manor Farm site. A number of maps had been made available on each table, and people were encouraged to examine these. One showed details of the existing green spaces, tree planting, hedges etc around the village, plus Drayton 2020's proposals for new planting. Another showed the proposed new sites for housing, but it was emphasised that no decisions have yet been made, and that at this stage, unlike in most of the villages surrounding Drayton, no developer has yet made a formal planning application. It should be noted that both these maps were produced by Mike Habermehl, a local landscape architect and planning consultant, who some years ago designed the layout of our Millennium Green. Mike has been assisting Drayton 2020 from the outset and we are very grateful for his professional help which has given clarity to our plans and enabled us to visualise what a Drayton of the future could look like. As to those planning applications, no assumptions are being made as to how long we can hold them off, but it does appear that our Neighbourhood Plan has bought us breathing space, and time to consider alternatives, a luxury that hasn't been afforded to, for example, Marcham, Kingston Bagpuize, Milton or Sutton Courtenay, to name but four of our neighbours



An important point, raised by one questioner from the floor was, why do we have to negotiate with the three developers who have currently got plans 'on the table' if we feel that enough houses to meet Drayton's needs could be built on two of the sites, or even one? The answer to this is that in theory the village could choose to favour say, a single site. However, the chances are that this would not stop the other two developers from putting in planning applications, except that they would no longer feel an obligation to negotiate with us, so might increase the number of houses applied for, ignore our observations on size and type of house, and so on. No one is being complacent about the difficulties entailed in dealing with developers, especially several at once - canny businessmen as they obviously are - but it does seem that balancing the provision offered by one against another would be the best way to achieve a compromise which keeps everyone onside. No one developer is likely to get all they want (and neither will the village), but the hope is that everyone will get enough of what they want to feel that the end result is acceptable.

The last session was introduced by Janet Manning and John



Scott. Janet described the work of the 'Look and Feel' working group which she convened, and explained that we don't wish, through the Neighbourhood Plan, to simply end up with one or more 'identikit' housing estates that don't enhance the appearance of the village, or express any of Drayton's particular sense of place or identity. There is much good advice available on building codes and features distinctive to the Vale of the White Horse, and in fact the District Council has produced an admirable Residential Design Guide (available free online and well worth a look). In this document Drayton fits into the category of 'Lowland villages' and Drayton 2020 will be consulting the guide as to what design features are considered appropriate for us. It will then consult with the wider village as to what features they would like to see incorporated into new-build housing. There are indications that developers are willing to support us on this, one even suggesting that what we should be aiming for is a new Conservation Area of the future. John followed this up by listing some of the criteria which could be used to assess sites, and residents were asked to comment on these or add in their own ideas.

Those attending took part in two workshop/discussion sessions. The first followed on from Tom Shebbeare's presentation and asked people for their views on the various issues raised by Mike Habermehl's 'all-village' map – proposals on the village centre, traffic management, environmental improvement, the existing village hall, and so on. The second followed Janet Manning and John Scott's presentation, and, as indicated, asked people to consider appropriate criteria for deciding where housing should be located. Although conveners on each table have done their best to collate the comments made and gauge the range of opinions expressed, this was inevitably not a precise exercise, but the round-table discussions more than anything were intended as an opportunity for people to air their concerns, ask lots of questions, and familiarise themselves with what has been happening in the process to date.

The next stage of consultation will be the issue of a questionnaire to every household in Drayton, which will allow residents to respond to all aspects of the Neighbourhood Plan in more detail. Most Chronicle readers will recall that Drayton carried out its own Housing Needs Survey a couple of years ago, and the information provided by this has been invaluable. Nevertheless, the HNS was intended primarily to establish the need for affordable housing, which it did very effectively. But the picture is incomplete, and we need to know more about people's needs for all types of housing – do they intend to move to a larger house in the foreseeable future, or downsize to a smaller one?



▷ Do these different needs balance each other out, or do they tell us something else? We will be asking only for information which is useful in developing the Neighbourhood Plan, but it is important that the Plan be 'evidence-based', and the questionnaire will be a crucial element in making sure that it is. It will also offer plenty of opportunity for people to give their opinions not just on Housing but on all the other issues covered in the Plan. The probable timetable is that the questionnaire will go out in late June to be returned by the end of July. Please watch this space, and in the meantime, the organisers of the May 12th event would like to say thank you to all those Drayton residents who made the effort to attend. Please also put out the word to others in the village, and remember, if you have not so far participated in the process but would like to do so, we would be delighted to hear from you.

Steering Group meetings are open to any Drayton residents, and to date they have been held on alternate Friday evenings in the Caudwell Centre in Gravel Lane at 7pm, although this fortnightly schedule probably will not be maintained throughout the summer.






DRAYTON TWINNING

I frequently receive information from public bodies that may be useful for constituents, and there have been several things recently that readers may like to know about.

First, the **General Medical Council** has published a new guide to what patients can expect from their doctor. The guide is at http://www.gmc-uk.org/guidance/patients.asp. But you can also call 0161 923 6602 if you



don't have access to the internet. Patients deserve the highest standards of care and the GMC is committed to ensuring that they understand what these are. They have therefore produced this guide, which underlines the importance of dignity, mutual respect and partnership between patients and their doctor. It also sets out the duties of the doctor and that all doctors need to be honest and open if things go wrong, and to make the care of patients their first concern.

I've also received information from **Thames Valley Police** about how they have been performing locally: it's good news. Across South Oxfordshire and the Vale of the White Horse, violent crime has reduced by 15.6%. Detection rates are going up: for dwelling burglary by 27.5%, for serious sexual offences by 30.3% and for violence against the person with injury by 47.4%, and overall crime is at its lowest level for 15 years.

We are lucky to live in a part of the country with relatively low crime rates (the Vale of the White Horse was recently reported as one of the 20 most peaceful areas in the UK) but every crime committed has a huge impact on its victims, while every crime solved reassures us all about the efforts of our police force. I am very pleased indeed to see these results, which are part of a pattern of reducing crime levels over a number of years.

The **Heritage Lottery Fund** has contacted me with information about Heritage Enterprise, a new £125million grant programme specifically designed to stimulate local economic growth, generate new commercial income along with new jobs and skills by unlocking the latent commercial potential of unused historic buildings and sites across the UK. There are grants available from £100,000 to £5m. You can find out more about how your community could benefit from Heritage Enterprise by visiting their website; HLF is also offering start-up grants between £3,000 and £10,000. These grants will enable groups to create the organisational structures needed to deliver projects and to help with the associated costs, such as obtaining professional and legal advice.



DISTRICT COUNCIL Richard Webber


At the risk of boring everyone rigid, I am writing this report as well as a County Report (opposite) - and will continue to do so in future months. Well, I got what I asked for and as District and County Councillor for Drayton, I am now to blame for most things. Many thanks for all the support you gave me on May 2nd – it made all the difference.

In the past few weeks, I have had a chance to see some of the problems and



challenges of Sutton Courtenay and Marcham. COUNTY COUNCIL

I would like to thank all those who took part in the recent County Elections. I am very aware of how close the voting was in our Division and, from painful experience, I do know how it feels to be on the wrong end of a closely fought election. I would like to thank all my fellow candidates for helping to make it a fiercely but honourably fought contest. One certainty in a tight election is that every vote counted. A 31% turnout was rather better than some had forecast, but it is hardly a triumph for the democratic process. If I have one priority over the next four years, it is trying to engage and involve many more people in local issues and decisions.

Despite the widely reported anger and frustration with the state of things, I found the doorstep reception more friendly than in recent elections where expense scandals, electoral systems produced strong feelings. That there is frustration and a sense of resignation cannot be denied.

In this part of the world, immigration and the EU seem rather distant issues and, in my view, are more likely to be symptoms than causes of the frustration. Top of my list of possible causes is planning. Where we put our housing, how much we need, how we keep it affordable, how we conserve our countryside in the face of building, how we cope with the need for energy, for waste disposal, for water and so on, are all helping to produce a sense of helplessness and resentment at what "they" are doing to us. The irony is that, under the Localism Act, we should be feeling more empowered than ever before. For Localism to work two things have to happen. The first is that local people have to believe that they now have powers they have not had before, the second is that 'the powers that be' have to be prepared to hand over some power and trust local people to make sensible decisions.

Second on my list of possible causes of current frustration and depression at the state of things is the weather. We all need a long, hot summer to cheer us up. I cannot do anything about the weather, but if, after four years, I haven't done everything in my power to make people in this division feel better about the state of things and to feel more empowered, and more in control, then I will have failed.
