Drayton 2020 – July 2013 Update

The decision of the Planning Inspector regarding the housing site in South Abingdon has now been received, and planning permission has been granted for the building of 159 houses on the field immediately to the south of Virginia Way, and east of Drayton Road. This news, though disappointing, was not unexpected, since the barrister acting for the developers is believed to have won 7 out of 8 similar cases in different parts of the country in recent months. The Inspector's report is long and detailed, but a couple of items look to be particularly relevant to Drayton. The Inspector acknowledges that the impact of this development on peak hour traffic flow along the Drayton Road towards Abingdon is potentially 'severe', and has ordered that mitigation works should be carried out either side of the double mini-roundabout at the junction of Drayton Road with Ock Street/Marcham Road. Specifically, the report says that the pedestrian crossing immediately west of the junction should be moved further west along Marcham Road. A new pedestrian crossing should be installed to the east of the junction in Ock

These measures are intended to ease congestion at the miniroundabout, but the Highways Dept of OCC and other concerned authorities like the Police, first have to be convinced that the proposed alterations will do the job. The Inspector has ruled that the development can only go ahead when the mitigation measures are actually in place. Building work is not permitted to even start before this. The implication is that if the measures are deemed insufficient, the development might be blocked. The developers will certainly challenge this part of the judgement as they are obviously keen to start work as soon as possible, but it will be interesting to see how the situation progresses.

The Inspector also remarked that this site was 'not subject to any Neighbourhood Development Plan'. This is true, since the site is located outside Drayton Parish, but it seems odd not to have mentioned the fact that Drayton does have an NDP, with a parish boundary line lying not more than a few hundred yards away. What sense does it make for central government to claim that it is devolving planning down to a genuinely local or village level, if at the same time it permits a planning free-for-all as it were 'next door', such that the adjacent area covered by the NDP is bound to be affected? The words 'free-for-all' are used advisedly, since the Vale's own refusal of planning permission for this site has been overturned, and similar things are happening to district councils up and down the country. Yes, we can agree that more houses are needed, but in present circumstances, it is speculative builders

who are deciding where the sites will be, and they are using expensive barristers to bully local authorities into giving way, in the full knowledge that the LAs cannot afford the cost of repeated appeals. These are tactics reminiscent of those used by the big supermarket companies in recent years to squash local opposition to new stores. An E-petition protesting against the current planning arrangements has been circulating, which may be of interest - see: http://epetitions.direct.gov.uk/petitions/49495

For the time being, Drayton 2020 are not letting the South Abingdon development affect our own plans and we are pressing ahead with the next step in the process of public consultation. This is, as promised, a questionnaire which will shortly be delivered to every household in Drayton. It is really important that as many people as possible fill in the questionnaire, as it is your answers which will form the evidence-base for the draft NDP, which we hope to publish in October. It is also your opportunity to have your say on what Drayton of the future should look like. If you do not participate, your views cannot be taken into account. A team of helpers will be knocking on doors with the questionnaire, so that they can explain, if necessary, any aspects of it which are not clear; and the same people will call back at a later date to collect the completed form. In cases where this is not possible (householders away on holiday etc), contingency arrangements will be made available - all in the interests of maximising the return!

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Oxfordshire councils challenge fly tippers to clean up their act

A toilet, several sofas and bags of raw meat are just some of the things councils across Oxfordshire have had to clear up from bring bank sites in the last few months, as fly tippers continue to blight community facilities. The bill for removing waste tipped at the sites, typically located on housing estates or in supermarket car parks, reached over a huge £100,000 last year, and councils are clamping down on this illegal practice. Enforcement Officers will be making regular visits to sites to ensure they are being used correctly and using covert CCTV cameras to catch offenders.

Councillor David Dodds, Chair of the Oxfordshire Waste Partnership said "we provide local bring banks to help residents recycle items that can't fit into their recycling boxes or bins at home. Unfortunately some people are abusing this service and leaving behind items which can't be recycled, costing us a huge amount to clear up every year. Often business waste is also tipped at the sites, which are provided for householders only."

District councils provide bulky waste collection services for large electrical items and furniture, and there are seven Household Waste Recycling Centres across the county that accept a wide range of materials for recycling and disposal. 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DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCIL REPORTS Richard Webber

District Council

Since I was first elected in October 2005, I estimate the proportion of my time spent on Planning matters has averaged about 10%. In the last 2 years, it is more like 90%. People still have Housing issues, benefits issues, car parking issues and there is still the occasional neighbourhood dispute but there are far fewer than one might expect given the economic situation. Our problems in this District seem to be more the problems of success or the prospect of success than problems associated with economic difficulties. We live in a prosperous area where most people are employed, most people feel safe, and most people live a long time. With our Enterprize Zone, our Business Park, and our international science centres, more and more people are going to want to live here and we have every prospect of becoming more prosperous as a result. With our 1960s and 1970s infrastructure, our medieval towns and our proximity to London - demanding power, waste disposal, and water – we are going to have to plan very carefully. The Vale is said to be one of the most rural districts in the South East. We have space. Some of it is knockout beautiful and must be kept that way. Some of it (Abingdon and all villages around) is already very congested, and further development makes it ever harder to maintain community integrity. Development in this part of the Vale will need to be very carefully planned if our roads and schools are going to cope.

Last month, I wrote a piece suggesting some improvements and frustrations with the way we run our local Planning meetings. I have had my knuckles politely, but firmly wrapped for doing this. It was not my intention to try to score political points – indeed, I believe I have managed to avoid that over the last 8 years. However, I am pleased to say that some of my suggestions and frustrations have been taken on board and as a result, I hope some heat will be taken out of Planning meetings – particularly over the next eighteen months until our Local Plan is in place.

The upholding of the South Abingdon Development Appeal is bound to have profound implications for us in Drayton. It should not, and must not stop us from pursuing our Neighbourhood Plan. This is our best chance to resist "planning by appeal" and to create a Drayton village which is sustainable and a place that people wish to live

County Council

As I write, decisions are about to be taken which will give us all more time to debate this issue and come up with a fairer, and more understandable scheme than what had been proposed. After all the effort that had been put in by Drayton residents over the "safe route to school" issue, it seemed incredible that we could be arguing the whole thing again so soon. On behalf of all Drayton parents – present and future, I would like to thank Mrs Jacqueline Cook for all her efforts on this issue. Her persistence and calm reason were noted by OCC representatives, and were certainly important in helping to get the authorities at least to pause and reflect.

As you will have noticed, we now have a new VAS (Vehicle Activated Speeding sign) in the High Street. We have a working streetlight in Marcham Road, and the Grass is cut in Hilliat Fields. As with my golf, I am sure you will allow me to dwell a little on the few bits that are successful!

After 8 years of pushing, I am delighted to say that the pavements in Whitehorns Way are due to be fully upgraded this autumn.

The area Stewardship Fund - £15K per county division has allowed me to ask the Highways department to treat all roadside weeds throughout the villages of Sutton Courtenay, Drayton, Marcham, Milton, Shippon and Dry Sandford. Where there are

village gates these too will be getting a new lick of paint. Although £15K does not go far over such a wide area, there is still money left over. Any suggestions for improvements to our highways would be gratefully received.

I am also given a Community Grant of some £10K across the division. This is for start up projects of any type – so again, if anyone has suggestions or need of help up to say £500 for a community project, please let me know. At least I can promise plenty of help with the form-filling!

(Editor's note: The following letter from Tony Holmes was sent to Richard Webber but Tony is happy that it is reproduced here. Richard announced the Appeal Decision at a Hall committee meeting, hence Tony's reference to that committee.)

Richard

Thanks for letting us (Hall Committee) know about the appeal decision.

I've just had a chance to look at the decision document, and I've posed the points below to the case officer working with the appeal Inspector. The decision document is long, and packed with worthy sounding stuff, but there are several examples of 'facts', which have been taken as evidence, which actually could be considered at least questionable, and in a couple of those cases, extremely unlikely.

You and others will doubtless be picking over the decision to find avenues to get it overturned. I found a few clues just in a quick look.

As you say, it seems ridiculous that the appeal for the South Abingdon development is being ALLOWED – despite masses of evidence that it's a horrendous location, ("the most senseless place in the county for more houses") and every local decision being to reject it.

I've now seen who ran the appeal, and the 'decision' document, but presumably they didn't look too closely at all the evidence, didn't appreciate all the issues, weren't made aware of some, and definitely (see below) have made a couple of influential assumptions that to me, are plainly irrational.

It's not long since the campaign to stop local kids being forced to walk up to Abingdon (withdrawal of school buses); that campaign was won, it was acknowledged the road is too dangerous, and that's exactly the same road this development's houses will be using (if they can ever get out onto it?!). There was NO MENTION in the decision document of this, is this an illustration that Mr J P Watson wasn't fully informed?

Did the Inspector come and sit in Abingdon's traffic mess to help them decide? I see reference to visits, but not an indication of what time. Was he aware that a boy was severely injured the other week in Abingdon when going to school?

I see there IS a rider, about 'a new pedestrian crossing' along Ock Street. That will do less than nothing to help, more evidence that the decision didn't fully take on board local issues. Abingdon's traffic is already a complete mess, and South Abingdon especially bad, with the morning rush hour in gridlock thanks to people trying to get into Abingdon, to the trading estate, and out to the A34. An extra crossing will slow cars and buses even more.

One particularly optimistic point made in the decision document is that just 41 cars will be using the Drayton road from this new estate, 30 north and 11 south each morning. Really? 41 cars from 160+ houses? Are the other homes to be occupied by pensioners or people working from home?! If there is some assumption that people will walk or cycle to work, well, maybe a few will – especially if having little choice thanks to worsening traffic and that the local buses will be even further delayed!! But rain and/or cold weather forces people into cars, no mention of that either.

According to Hallam, an average morning rush-hour queue in this area towards Ock Street last about 9 mins. Was this tested? I'm told by a rush-hour user that this is shall we say an optimistic length of delay, but in the document one questioning of this 'timing' was flushed away in the developer's favour. Added to what appears to be an unlikely estimate of vehicles coming from the development, it makes you wonder why the document is taking such a light view of this issue. You can certainly look at this evidence and take quite a different verdict.

I also see in the decision document that the need is for affordable housing, a major factor in allowing the appeal. If Hallam actually do get a final go-ahead, and end-up providing expensive housing, will Mr Watson come back and tell them to drop prices, or tear the houses down? Seems unlikely.

Oh, a further point, I see a reference to the local 'food plain'. I presume this is some reference to the need for more supermarkets, perhaps that a new one should be plonked in the development to save extra journeys to Tesco, etc?!

I believe further appeals to try and reverse this will be undertaken, BUT local opposition, whether private or council, costs money, and if councils are having a hard time with budgets, do they really want to spend valuable funds having to fight endless proposals and appeals from developers?

Yes, new houses have to go somewhere, as mentioned in the decision. But that should not be an automatic mantra to allow such appeals!

Abingdon is NOT the place; the river and A34 place extreme demands on local roads, and unless this developer is paying for a new Thames bridge, or better still, two, plus some sort of Abingdon relief road, this idea is just madness. Big chunks of Oxfordshire have wide open spaces, hence the developments going ahead or planned for Didcot, Grove, and others.

If it does eventually go ahead, it will be further clear evidence why ordinary people feel they have zero say or input into decisions that actually affect them in a major way. Despite the Govt saying, oh yes, we want to devolve more power, involve local people, etc etc, blah blah, it quite clearly hasn't got the processes in place to really take any notice.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Richard Williams

Report of the Drayton Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 1st July 2013

In addition to the councillors, two members of the public attended this meeting. One of them, Graham Webb, expressed a wish to join the PC and was duly co-opted as a new councillor. This brings us up to 9 councillors, the most for some time, but if anyone else would like to join us, please note that we still have two vacancies! Richard Webber, now wearing no fewer than 3 hats, as Parish Councillor, District Councillor, and newly elected County Councillor, reported the unwelcome news that the whole issue of school transport is again under review. It was hoped that this had all been resolved, but evidently across the county, routes which have been declared 'unsafe' for children to walk to school (which includes the pathway from Drayton into Abingdon), may revert back to being deemed 'safe'. Although Drayton's case was very ably put by Jacqui Cook, Karen Sharman and other concerned parents, it looks as if common sense may be overturned for no other reason than to save money. Everyone is aware that spending cuts are being forced onto local government, but it is difficult to see how this particular decision could be justified. The 3 mile limit (within which free transport is not provided) is arbitrary, and there are anomalies in the way it is applied, but Richard was not optimistic about the outcome if OCC does indeed change its policy.

A couple of unfortunate incidents involving the bridleway that runs from the B4016 to the Millennium Green (along the back of the pony paddocks and burial ground) have been brought to the attention of the Parish Council. On 23rd June, some young men illegally drove along this bridleway, continued onto the narrow footpath and got their four-wheel-drive vehicle jammed in the ditch running alongside the path. In so doing, or in trying to get the car out, three sections of the railway sleepers that were originally used to reinforce the side of the path were dislodged. The men chopped down a tree and threw it onto Lime Close fence, then destroyed a sizeable section of Haywards Farm garden wall, using the stones to raise the vehicle out of the ditch. There has been considerable damage to both private and Parish Council property. Photographs of the vehicle and its number plate have been taken and both the Parish Council and the house owner have reported this criminal damage to the police.

As a matter of public information, it is illegal for any motorised vehicle, other than those of the landowner, to be driven along a bridleway. Bridleways are for the use of walkers, horse riders and cyclists. Footpaths are for walkers only. The actions of the driver of this vehicle were both irresponsible and criminal. Sadly, within a fortnight of this damage another irresponsible person dumped on the same bridleway a huge quantity of raw meat. This too was reported to the police and also to BIFFA who speedily removed what was a disgusting sight and a potential health hazard. One would hope that none of the persons involved in these acts were Drayton residents, and these appear to be isolated and unconnected incidents. However, if walkers come across any further instances of damage to paths (no matter how caused), flytipping or the like, the PC would ask that they report the incident as soon as possible to the Parish Clerk (see below), and if appropriate, to the Police as well.

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WESTMINSTER LETTER Ed Vaizey

As I write this newsletter, the sun is finally beginning to shine and the weather is warming up. It may seem an odd time to mention the problems some of us have with keeping warm in the winter, but as some recent information from Energy UK reminded me, the spring and summer is the best time to think about taking measures to improve your home to reduce winter fuel bills. There is a helpful service, the Home Heat Helpline on 0800 33 66 99 or www.homeheathelpline.org.uk, where advisors can provide information about how to:

- Apply for your Warm Home Discount all the major energy suppliers give £135 off to customers who are struggling with their bills and are over 70, living with longterm disabilities or bringing up young children at home. Avoid the rush and apply now.
- Get a free home energy check.
- Fix the leaks summer is the perfect time to install insulation in your home to ensure you are warm through the winter. Companies offer to do this work for free or at heavily subsidised rates for some customers and the Home Heat Helpline can help you find out if you might qualify.

I've also recently come across a great initiative about expanding the horizons of secondary school students. Speakers for Schools brings enthusiastic, knowledgeable, and authoritative speakers who are leaders in their respective fields into state secondary schools and colleges, free of charge. It occurs to me that we have lots of enthusiastic, knowledgeable and authoritative speakers across the Constituency, so if you are an expert in your field why not think about contacting Speakers for Schools at www.speakers4schools.org and asking about joining their list of speakers?

Finally, on a local note, I am delighted that the Department for Transport has allocated £5 million to help sort out the Milton Interchange on the A34. This junction is a significant 'pinch point' which has long needed addressing. The scheme will improve the operation and increase the capacity at Milton Interchange, by providing a 'hamburger' style roundabout of the type which has so improved the traffic flows around the Oxford bypass. It should enable the junction to operate effectively even with planned growth in traffic, and help all of us living and working in the area.

This month I've had emails and letters focussing on the European Union Referendum which was debated in the House in early July. My colleagues and I want to allow the British people to decide the UK's European future with an in-out referendum by the end of 2017, and we want to turn this commitment into law so that future governments will be held to it. Like last month I have also continued to receive emails about the proposed badger culling to stop the spread of TB. As I understand it, the "Good Practice Guidelines" for the badger cull pilots agreed with Natural England set out the features to be complied within the pilots as the best basis for badgers being killed humanely under controlled shooting - and even that is still in the pilot phase.

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In addition, Natural England will observe six nights of controlled shooting and carry out a series of follow up visits and telephone interviews with marksmen to check what happened on the previous night's shooting. I am assured that this information will then be reviewed by a group of independent scientific experts.



Everyone from Drayton School would like to "wish you all a lovely summer" and we will return with more news in September.



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
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

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GARD

Last month I provided an outline of the Thames Water proposals for the next 25 years. The public consultation closed on 23rd July 2013. The thrust of the Thames Water plan is to make up the very significant forecast shortfall in supply by much more re-use of treated effluent, provided the customers in London will accept this. It will be 100% safe but there is an inevitable "yuck" factor in the public perception of re-use.

The Thames Water proposals really only address the supply for the next 15 years and say that the next plan covering 2020 to 2045 will involve a new major resource to meet forecast population increases and climate change. This new resource will be one of three options: a reservoir, more re-use of waste water or transfers from the Severn to the Thames. These options are listed and costed in the documents provided by Thames Water and put the Abingdon reservoir back onto the agenda. GARD has responded in a detailed and robust criticism of the plan and the costs which be put onto our website www.abingdonreservoir.org.uk. Things will now go quiet until Thames Water respond to the consultation in November, but we will keep on pressing them on many unanswered questions.

We hope that defra and the Environment Agency will analyse our input and support our alternative suggestions which show that transfers from the Severn are economic and far less environmentally damaging than a reservoir.

Summer burglary campaign South Oxon & Vale area

Thames Valley Police would like to ask all residents living in the South Oxon & Vale area to give consideration to their home security when going out or spending time in the garden during the summer months.

With the recent hot weather, residents are advised to check their home security and not to leave doors and windows open when the house is unoccupied. Please do not leave any valuable items in view of windows as this could attract the opportunist burglar.

Residents are also advised to make sure any tools are locked away when not in use and to secure their sheds, garages and outbuildings

Council Tax Scam

Residents are being warned to be on their guard against bogus officials offering council tax refunds or threatening them with fines. There have been several incidents reported recently across Oxfordshire, including South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse.

The fraudsters operate by ringing, texting or visiting residents claiming to be from the local council, valuation office or some other company which deals with changes to council tax banding. They suggest that you are either due a council tax refund, or owe more council tax and must pay it promptly to avoid a fine. They will then ask for personal information and bank details to process the refund or payment or they may ask for a fee to secure a refund or band reduction for you.

If you receive one of these calls, texts or visits, do not give out any personal information, end the call as quickly as possible and do not give any money to anyone who visits your home. The fraudsters can get aggressive and ring back if you put the phone down but this is all part of the scam to make you act as they want.

Neither South Oxfordshire nor Vale of White Horse District Council would ever call residents directly to demand bank details in this manner. Where it is believed that someone either owes or is owed money they will be invited to contact the council themselves to arrange payment. You will never have to pay a fee to have your council tax band reduced. It costs nothing to make an appeal against the band your home is in.

If there is any change to the amount you have to pay you will receive a bill through the post explaining the situation.

If you are in any doubt as to the authenticity of a call concerning your council tax account, please call 0345 302 2313 (South Oxfordshire residents) or 0345 302 2315 (Vale residents).

To report a suspected incident of the scam, residents can contact Oxfordshire County Council Trading Standards on 0845 0510845.

HALL REPORT

Hall Committee meeting held on Mon July 15th

News has been received that a Parish Council grant had been allocated to the Hall, towards a small building extension, which will greatly improve the storage capacity for the various regular user groups. A variety of local builders have been contacted, or soon will be, regarding tendering. The PC grant is a starting point, there are several possibilities for a much larger grant which will be needed for the project to go ahead.

A new grant application has been made, to the ORCC (Oxon Rural Community Council) regarding a kitchen refurbishment, much needed as parts of it date back to the Hall (1975). Better facilities would improve the capacity, make it more attractive for potential hirers, and perhaps allow some new events requiring more ambitious catering. Jane Pimm has been checking other hall kitchens, on her Bowls travels, so if we get a go-ahead, the initial 'wish-list' can be refined. Grateful thanks to Lynne Newin, of the ORCC, for her guidance, and extending the deadline; despite the famous recession, from the time that some traders take to supply quotes (& not all ever answer!), you'd wonder how bad it is?! The PC also acknowledge that there's an ongoing need for Hall maintenance, so we'll hopefully be liaising more closely with them in the near future.

Whilst referring to the kitchen, on a less positive point, it's been noted that things like trays, mugs, and even mops (!) do occasionally disappear. Though it's mostly quite trivial items that are affected, it's a sad comment on human nature that people feel the need to take 'souvenirs'. The Hall's finances struggle as it is to get enough 'ins' to balance the ever-mounting 'outs', without helping to subsidise anyone else's household.

Ann Webb has organised flower tubs by the front door, these have been admired, but their arrival coincided with the heatwave, so a water rota has been organised (probably temporary, given UK weather). Also improving the appearance are new curtains, which look good so far and hopefully will be finished for two August wedding receptions. If the heatwave does extend a bit, could regular users PLEASE make sure that the fire doors are properly closed if they've been opened for extra ventilation.

The bar grille needs replacing, and a reasonable estimate has been received for the work, which will be approved. The old one dates back to the Hall, so has given good service, but is starting to fall apart, and that firm no longer exists. On the topic of the bar,

for those functions that require it, we presently have to organise an outside source. This does at least give hirers that facility, BUT profits do not come to the Hall. This would be an extremely welcome source of revenue, so IF ANYONE can put themselves forward as occasional bar manager – or suggest someone – please contact us (see back page details).

The recent Crime Prevention review suggested some good ideas. More research is being done to check the best and most cost-effective methods to both try and deter intruders, and also record any that decide to ignore the warnings which should appear in due course. Advances in the internet, and mobile phone technology, now mean that images can be sent to a safe source, also a silent alarm can be triggered to the police.

The Hall has been given a small electric organ, so if any local players would like to try it out, again see back page details to make contact.

Now, a topic for the ladies:- the Committee gave the go-ahead for a charity collection point, for your old BRAS (new ones too, I suppose, if not suitable). An Abingdon charity organises them to be sent to Africa, to help local traders (bras are apparently expensive there). Funds also benefit the Breast Cancer charity here, so it's a double winner. Oh, and this usage saves them going to landfill, so an extra bonus! Regular users should look out for a PINK 'Bra Bank', which should appear soon; we need to identify the best location in the Hall (may well be in the ladies) but do start collecting, and tell your friends!

Ann also mentioned the increasing pressure on Hall storage space. The proposed extension for more storage is some way off, so can regular groups who have material stored PLEASE review what is held, and try to make more space?
