Oxontime : Real-Time info for buses

'Oxontime' is a partnership between independent bus operators & Oxfordshire County Council to provide Real Time Information (RTI) for bus users. Buses with Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL) equipment use 'GPS' (Global Positioning) technology to track their location; by comparing that to timetables, the system calculates when buses should arrive at stops on specified routes.

Note – Only RTI enabled services can be predicted. Generally this means all Oxford Bus Company and Stagecoach services, and most of Thames Travel routes (for a full list of RTI-enabled services, please see <u>http://www.oxontime.com/coverage.aspx</u>

Please note that, with a very few exceptions, **only Real Time Information is supplied to users of Oxontime** – in the format '3 mins', 'DUE' etc rather than <u>scheduled timetable</u> departure times, displayed in the format '13:00' (HH:MM).

Bus users can access RTI using 4 methods

1) RTI signs at the bus stop At some stops, electronic signs are provided which show predicted departure times.

18	JR Hospital	4min 1
1	Blackbird Leys	14min
10	JR Hospital	16min

No prediction will be shown for a bus until it is within 30 minutes of the stop. Predictions will count down, reflecting the position of the buses on the network. When a sign prediction changes to 'DUE', this indicates that a bus should arrive within a short period of time, subject to local road conditions.

Note. Where a bus is RTI enabled, but for some reason it cannot be predicted via satellite tracking, it will not be shown on the sign and a 'please refer to timetables' message will be displayed.

2) Oxontime Website The Oxontime website (see intro above) allows selection of a bus stop by SMS number as shown below, but also provides additional sophisticated search options, so that stops can be selected by any combination of stop name, road, town/village, postcode and service number.

Full instructions on how to use these various features can be found from the Oxontime home page link above.

3) Mobile Phone Applications A Mobile Internet version of the Oxontime website is available for users of Smartphones and a specific Oxontime application with enhanced functionality can be downloaded for use on Microsoft Windows Mobile, Google (Android) and Apple (iPhones) operating systems.

NB1 Some buses, particularly on rural services, are not fitted with RTI equipment and cannot be shown. See website link above for full list of included services.

NB2 Both the outgoing and incoming text messages will be charged at your network provider's usual text message rate.

4) Text messaging to mobile phones

RTI information can also be obtained via a simple text message request using Mobile Oxontime. Each bus stop has a unique reference number, known as the <u>SMS number</u>. Where the stop is used by RTI equipped buses, a special plate will be attached to the bus stop pole containing its number, see example below.



To find out when the next buses are due, simply create an SMS text message containing the SMS number (which always starts with 693) and send it to 84637 (that's 'TIMES' on a phone keypad); within seconds you will receive a text message listing the next few RTI service bus departures from that stop.

It you know the number of the service you wish to use, leave a <u>space</u> after the SMS number and add the service you want, e.g. 69345486 4A. This will exclude all services except the 4A.

You can ALSO :- get times for buses later in the day, so text the stop code, leave a space, followed by a time in 24 hour clock e.g.

 $69312345\ 0845\ \ldots$ or both, simply leave another space after the service number, then add the time e.g. $69312345\ 400\ 0845$

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK – May 11 to 18th

If you had to leave your home at a moments notice what would you take with you? Most probably you would think of things of personal value like photographs or treasured items. But in reality what you would need are the basic items for survival. Being a displaced person brings you right down to what is most important for life - water, food, shelter. These are not easy to find when everyone around you is facing the same crisis. But these three basics also have needs: water needs a container to collect and put it in; food needs something for cooking; shelter needs strong materials easily erected.

Over the past 12 months there have been a number of conflicts and natural disasters around the world which have displaced people from their homes - often as refugees in a neighbouring country. At that point of desperate need something needs to be done quickly before more organised materials can be put in place. So Christian Aid has come up with an emergency survival kit which helps to meet those immediate needs, <u>each kit costs £15</u>.

In previous years the churches in Drayton have done a house to house collection and over the years raised considerable funds for Christian Aid work. This year we are encouraging people to give £15 to provide a survival kit for refugee families in South Sudan. If you want to know more about this **PLEASE come along** to the Christian Aid Service at 10am, Sun May 18th at the Church, this will be an informal service with a focus on Christian Aid work.



WESTMINSTER VIEW

Ed Vaizey's column (Wantage & Didcot MP, also he's Minister of Culture, Communications and Creative Industries)

The subject of new housing has been top of my recent list of correspondence. People are understandably concerned about the large numbers of houses that the authorities say need to be built in our area over the next fifteen years or so - something like 100,000, an increase of almost 40 per cent (doubled in 15 years) in the numbers of houses in Oxfordshire

It is clear to me that the figure may be too high, and I am therefore going to lobby for a change in the way housing need is predicted so that it reflects actual, current housing need and a well-grounded view of new jobs, also based on what can, realistically, be delivered by developers in the local area, bearing in mind what can be planned and constructed within available resources. I shall also ask that the constraints imposed by the Oxford Green Belt, floodplains and the Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty locally are taken into account.

I have no doubt that this debate will continue for many months: I will continue to do all that I can to represent the views of my constituents to ensure that we get genuinely sustainable new housing to meet real need, but that we don't damage our local area in the process.

I have continued to lobby Network Rail to try to ensure that the impact of the electrification of the line will cause the minimum possible disruption. There are clear signs that Network Rail are taking more account of the comments they have received, particularly re the needs of local residents as closures are planned.

I have also received a number of emails and letters from constituents regarding the Care Bill. Many of those who have been in touch are campaigners for Macmillan Cancer Support, and I think it is important to pay tribute to the work done by this fantastic charity in their efforts to raise awareness of the most pressing issues facing cancer carers. It is vitally important that cancer carers receive the support they need to help them to continue this invaluable work. A particular concern has been on the identification of carers by the NHS. I am therefore pleased that the Care Services Minister has confirmed that accompanying guidance to the Care Bill will reinforce the importance of cooperation between the NHS and local authorities re their (the authorities) duty to identify carers.

County Council Report

Many thanks to Drayton PC, to Milton PC, to Milton Park and to OCC for their financial contributions which have made the installation of a 40mph zone between Milton Village and Drayton a reality. This must, at last, reduce the risk of any more fatalities on that stretch of road (NB Ed:- decision to be ratified by OCC as we go to print).

It is no secret that OCC is short of money. Indeed as the District Council gets richer on the back of New Homes Bonus, it seems the County gets poorer. With the arrival of Academies and Fee Schools, many of the County's Education responsibilities have gone. The Roads and Transport budget is under huge pressure and the incredibly wet winter has not helped. The Social Service budget too is squeezed. There are outstanding OCC officers trying to take on ever more work.

Given the pressures, it is great to see OCC standing up for itself as it has over the proposed extra pedestrian crossing in Ock Street, Abingdon. This proposal was the result of the Planning Inspector's decision to allow 160 homes to be built on the Drayton Road provided that the pedestrian crossing was completed. His decision effectively meant that "The need for housing" had trumped "the severity of the traffic". The question would now be would "the reduced safety of pedestrians including schoolchildren" be similarly trumped. To his great credit, the Cabinet member for the Environment said "No, the need for housing should not trump the safety of people". As a result, the house building cannot begin. A great result, but I fear the saga will not end there.

In conclusion, for Drayton, it has been a tough year, but also a landmark year. One on which people may well look back and say "that was the year that Drayton took charge of its own destiny".

District Councillor

With the arrival of new figures (the SHMA) predicting the need for 20,500 extra homes in the Vale, the administration has undertaken a consultation as to where these houses might go. There is general anger and confusion from Vale residents who see their towns and villages being swamped.

Having lived and dreamed 'planning issues' for the past 3 years, three general points occur to me:-

Given that we face the prospect of changing the Vale's villages out of all recognition and putting further pressure on an already strained infrastructure, it seems only sensible that we check that the predicted figures of housing shortfall are as accurate as possible. We are not short of boffins in the Vale – people well able to scrutinise the figures and the methodology which produced them. Before we act on the 'data', these people should check it.

The reason for 'Green Belts' is to prevent the coalescence of cities, towns and villages. We tamper with them at our peril. It is perfectly possible that the precise location of the Oxford Green Belt could be re-arranged. In places it is several miles wide, but Abingdon and Drayton are about 2 fields apart. A full Green Belt Review might well be useful, but each District nibbling at its bit of the Green Belt as currently suggested weakens the whole point.

The consultation has been delivered as though there is no alternative – we have to take the housing and it can only go where we are told. For a consultation of such major importance, it has been carried out in the minimum legal period required. Parish Clerks have been asked to organise the distribution of publicity material and most people have not seen it. Meetings have been arranged in rooms with inadequate seating and poorly functioning sound systems. The whole exercise appears to be a **rushed, short** term solution. But is it a solution at all? It is very doubtful that we have the bricks, or the builders to build houses at the rate suggested. We have never come close to it before. It is very doubtful that we will generate the jobs at the rate predicted, we have never done so before.

As your elected representative on the DC, I will continue to argue, as strongly as I can, that once we have verified the figures, we should plan to solve the problem over a realistic period. After all, our shortage of housing has been built up over at least 20 years, it is simply unrealistic to think we can solve it in 5. Trying to do so risks doing untold damage to the Vale of the future.

In the midst of the Vale's planning mayhem, our Drayton Neighbourhood Plan nears completion. I believe that we have truly engaged with Localism over the past two years, we have accepted the need for growth and we have planned for it in a controlled and sustainable way. Our Plan already carries planning weight, indeed more than the emerging Local Plan at present. Eventually, it will have to comply with that Plan, but the Drayton2020 Steering Committee is working incredibly hard to make sure that its ambition to produce a well laid out, fully functioning and interconnected village, with good facilities, is not going to be upset by all the ructions going on in the wider Vale. I believe that our Neighbourhood Plan needs all our support more than ever as it nears completion. **Richard Webber** (OCC & VWHDC)

Young Dementia ?

Over 64,000 people in the UK are thought to have young onset dementia, and yet information and services for younger people with dementia can be very hard to find. However, Young Dementia UK have recently launched a new website:www.youngdementiauk.org to try to help.

This will be full of **advice and information** on living with the condition as well as inspiring stories, many written personally by people who are living with young onset dementia.

Volunteers Key to Locks

Volunteer Lock Keepers (assistants) work alongside paid lock keepers. They help boats pass through the lock safely: taking ropes, directing traffic, and operating sluices and lock gates. They help maintain the site, by painting, tidying and gardening, and also provide information to visitors, to enhance their time on the river.

The Environment Agency, (navigation authority for the Thames), is now recruiting for this season – they're looking for **volunteers** who can commit to assisting at least one day a week between May and the end of September. Volunteers can agree their hours with lock keepers but need to be available at least from 11 to 5, they're especially needed between Reading and Lechlade.

It's a great way to meet people and discover more about the river, its history, wildlife and management, and volunteers know they're doing **something worthwhile and really appreciated**.

<u>All applicants are invited to a local assessment</u>, to have the role explained and be shown what it involves. They'll also be assessed to decide which site may be most appropriate, and to ensure they have the physical capabilities required. On successful completion of the assessment, they attend an induction course which focuses on safety and preparing them for the lock side.

The volunteers follow a **documented training programme** before being signed off to take charge of the lock on their own. This is only for short periods, maybe while the paid keeper is at lunch. The volunteers are there to augment the service provided by paid staff rather than to replace them.

Volunteers are provided with some uniform and can claim mileage for travel; they also receive a monthly newsletter which keeps them in touch with what is going on along the river and other activities of the Environment Agency.



PARISH COUNCIL (Richard Williams)

Report of the Annual Parish Assembly, and Parish Council meeting, held on Mon 7th April in the Village Hall.

The Parish Assembly was attended by 20 or so people, in addition to the councillors. All were served with free refreshments in the break between the Assembly and the usual PC meeting. **Our thanks** must go to <u>those who supplied the tea and coffee, and especially to Janet Manning</u>, who made the excellent muffins!

Richard Williams gave his **Chairman's Report**, summarising the work of the PC over the previous year. In it, he acknowledged that planning issues had dominated the agenda in recent times, and for better or worse, would probably do so for many years to come. He pointed out that most people recognise the need for new housing and accept that the Vale is a relatively prosperous area with good prospects for economic growth. Even so, they wonder how the present road network will cope with the expected increase in traffic without more radical improvements to the infrastructure than are currently promised, and they worry about the creeping urbanisation of what is still a predominantly rural landscape.

Richard Webber, in his District and County reports, stated that in his opinion, building new garden cities might be a better way to resolve the housing crisis than the present strategy (or lack of it) of allowing houses to be imposed on villages in unsustainably large numbers - 1400 new homes in Milton Heights being an extreme example. Although it appears that the Vale have ruled out the garden cities approach, on the grounds that it would not deliver the required housing fast enough, at the national level Nick Clegg recently made a speech suggesting that garden cities are the way forward. Other than an announcement about Ebbsfleet in Kent, the government has been carefully unspecific about locations, although sites 'between Oxford and Cambridge' have been mooted. A start has already been made on one so-called 'ecotown' in Oxfordshire (i.e. North West Bicester), but it will be very interesting to see how this debate develops, and whether the Vale are persuaded to change course in the light of it.

Other items mentioned in the Chairman's Report included the newly created Parish Council logo, soon to be visible on equipment belonging to the PC, such as the bus shelters on the Green; the 40mph speed limit along Milton Rd which has been agreed and funded; the blue plaque for St Peter's Church, celebrating the life of the Rev FE Robinson, Vicar of this Parish in the late 19th century and famous in bell-ringing circles (which also influenced the design of our logo); and the defibrillator which will be installed outside the Village Hall later in the summer. Graham Webb gave a short report on the work of the Rights of Way Committee and expressed the PC's thanks to Steve Sadler for another year's hard work keeping Drayton in trim as Village Caretaker. Laurence Zipson also spoke briefly about the Press and Public Relations Committee and the PC's work in responding to the Airports Commission about the proposed London (Oxford) Airport. The Commission does not finally report until summer 2015 (after the general election, be it noted), but its interim report, published in Dec 2013, rules out any options which do not involve existing airports, except for an indication that it will look again at the feasibility of proposals for a Thames Estuary site.

Gary Hibbins and Roxy Elford spoke about the very important work <u>DAMASCUS</u> does with young people in Drayton and the surrounding villages, and, representing also the football club, Gary explained how the recent <u>improvements to the Drayton FC clubhouse</u> have boosted morale and attracted more users of the bar and other facilities.

Ann Webb and Tony Holmes from the Village Hall committee spoke about various improvements to the Hall, a new cooker and fridge, the recent redecoration (re-painting of the main entrance and foyer), and further upgrading of the kitchen, and new windows (if grants do get approved). Bookings are holding up and the hall appears to be well-used, which is encouraging news.



In the ensuing PC meeting, a question was asked about the petition from some residents of Barrow Road/Abingdon Road regarding the proposed housing development behind their properties at the northern entrance to the village. It was explained that this would be treated as part of the response to the Draft Neighbourhood Plan consultation. It was not possible to reply to every respondent individually, but a report reviewing all the replies would be compiled, and their comments would be taken into account when the Plan is revised. The residents have already been invited to send a representative along to the next meeting held with the developers of this site.

The Parish Council received an offer of assistance from OALC (Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils) to help it set up a Twitter and/or Facebook account. After a brief discussion it was felt that the village has a very good website, and that anyone wishing to know about the activities of the PC would find all the information they needed on there. The general opinion was that Twitter or Facebook would require constant maintenance, could be open to abuse, and would not add any particular additional benefit to the Council. It was decided not to take up the offer.

David may be contacted by phone on 07909 176061, or email at draytonclerk@yahoo.co.uk and he will ensure that any messages are passed on. Any Drayton resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents. In addition, all Parish Council minutes are now archived on the village website: www.drayton-near-abingdon.org. The latter also carries back copies of the Drayton Chronicle, information on Drayton 2020, and details of other events in the village.

The next PC meeting will be the AGM, to be held on Mon May 12th, 7.30pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre in Gravel Lane. Please note that this date is a week later than usual, as the first Monday in May is a Bank Holiday. As ever, **all are welcome to attend**.

Drayton 2020 - latest update

Only a short report this month as we are in something of a transitional phase. We have to process the responses received from all those who replied to the consultation on the Draft Neighbourhood Plan. These include a detailed critique from the Vale which addresses both content and formatting. To sum up, there will be a lot of work involved in amending the Plan in the light of the comments made and producing the next version.


We also have to contend with the Vale's proposals as outlined in their Housing Delivery Update, and will continue to argue the case for restricting the number of houses on the 'South Drayton' site to no more than 100. There will be a further consultation period of 6 weeks probably around May/June time for people to submit their responses to the revised version.

There have been no further face-to-face meetings with developers since the last report, but it is planned to invite all of them to display their designs for the three proposed Drayton housing sites (south of High St, Manor Farm, and Barrow Road) at a **special exhibition to be held in the Village Hall** at the end of June (planned for 27th & 28th). If the weather is good, there may also be outdoor activities arranged on the rec outside to encourage people to attend, a barbeque being one suggestion.


