DRAYTON 2020

May 2014 Update

Drayton 2020 is continuing to have meetings with developers of the three potential housing sites in the village. Residents bordering the south of High St site have already attended several meetings concerning that site, and the landowner of the Barrow Rd site, Mr Paul Caudwell, was due to be meeting neighbouring residents on 19th May to discuss their concerns. The next step is to bring all three developers together to present their plans to the village in the form of an exhibition. Many readers of the Chronicle will have attended last October's display which featured all of the sites mentioned in the first draft of the Neighbourhood Plan. This exhibition will feature only three sites, the two already mentioned, and Manor Farm – but there will hopefully be much more detail, and although the layouts on display will be indicative rather than definitive – i.e. there is scope for changes to be made up to the point when bricks are laid – everyone should come away with a much clearer idea about what is proposed. The exhibition will be in Drayton Village Hall on Friday evening and all day Saturday 27th and 28th June. (See advert at bottom of this page).

On the Friday evening (27th June), we will also be introducing Drayton's new defibrillator, and the Heartbeat Trust are putting on two hour-long training sessions that evening (*details of times in the advert below*) – you can choose which session you attend. So while visiting the exhibition, at the same time, you also have an opportunity to learn how to use the defibrillator. There are no more training sessions on the Saturday, but the exhibition continues all that day. Please do come along – it's your village, and we need your participation and views! Even if you do not live close to one of the housing sites, everyone in Drayton will be affected in some way or another by the growth of the village, so the more you know about the proposed changes, the better able you will be to have your say on what you like and don't like. The second version of the draft Plan will be available for everyone's comments later in the summer.

Steering Group meetings are open to any Drayton residents, and they are held on alternate Friday evenings in the Caudwell Centre in Gravel Lane at 7pm. The next scheduled meeting following publication of this issue will be on Fri 13th June 2014. It would be great to see you there. DRAYTON GETS DEFIBRILLATOR

Drayton Parish Council is very pleased to advise that it has invested in a Defibrillator for the Village.

What is a Defibrillator? An electrical device used to counteract fibrillation of the heart muscle and restore normal heartbeat by applying a brief electric shock.

The unit is being installed on an external wall of the Village Hall with the kind cooperation of the Hall Committee.

The Defibrillator has been provided by the Community Heartbeat Trust www.communityheartbeat.org.uk, a UK Charity focused on provision of life saving defibrillation services to local communities.

A Heartbeat Representative will be visiting the Village Hall on the night of the **27th of June** (same night as the next 2020 event) to present the process and usage of the unit. There will be two opportunities to attend the presentation; **7.00pm and 8.15pm**. The talk lasts for just one hour and we hope that as many people as possible will attend. We would particularly urge the Hall's various User Groups to ensure that they have a representative join us.

Defibrillators save lives; you may be the person who has to use one.

Dear Editor

We took part (and indeed finished) Tough Mudder in Henley on 26th April and our combined total in aid of Kingfisher School currently stands at just over £1300 which is fantastic. We have been amazed and overwhelmed by people's generosity and we would like to say a huge thank you!!! Arthur has now started at the school and has settled in without a hitch - a good sign that he is in the right place! Tough Mudder is the hardest and most challenging thing we have ever done - it was pure endurance. The hills were enormous and in total we climbed over 2500 feet on the day! The mud was like nothing we have ever experienced, due to all the rain the day before. We went through ice baths, tunnels, over 9ft walls, jumped 12ft into water, got electric shocks (to name but a few obstacles) and ran-climbed-walked 12 miles. 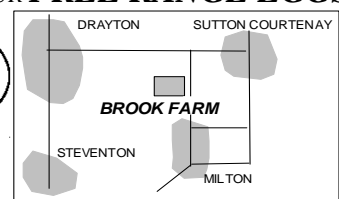

ST PETER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Monday August 4th marks the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War. This war was like no other that had gone before. 10 million soldiers died worldwide, one million from the British Empire. 19,240 of these were killed on one day alone, 1st July 1916. Many of these soldiers were very young men of only 16. It is hard to imagine what their absence from a village such as Drayton would have caused. For example, no youngsters hanging around the village green, no young men to work on the farms, no sweethearts for the young women. The impact on a small community like Drayton must have been devastating. Everyone would have been affected.

St Peter's has a war memorial and many of the names have the same surname. It shows us just how much grief was inflicted on families by the loss of more than one of their sons. Stoke Hammond is the only village in the Oxford diocese where everyone who served returned safely.

St Peter's will be open all day on August 4th with stewards on duty and light refreshments available. We hope to have a number of displays on show and there will be an opportunity to light a candle in remembrance. This is an occasion for remembering and honouring the sacrifice and bravery of those that took part. Please join us and pay your own respects.

WESTMINSTER LETTER

Ed Vaizey

As the summer approaches (we all hope) there are many events being planned across the constituency, most run by volunteers. The government has recently concluded that event guidance was unclear and inconsistent and often focused on what people can't do rather than what they can. This lack of clear guidance has resulted in an inaccurate perception that it can be near to impossible to run an event without ploughing through masses of red tape. In order to overcome these obstacles, a new, simplified set of guidance has been put together, which can be found at: www.gov.uk/government/publications/can-do-guide-for-organisers-of-voluntary-events. This provides straightforward advice to help anyone planning to run an event and is well-worth looking at.

If your idea is a bit broader than a single event, then you might also want to take a look at www.justact.org.uk, where lots of advice about how to get involved in all sorts of ideas, plans and projects locally can be found on one website. Both sites will be an enormous help both to those who are already involved in all sorts of things and those who are just dipping their first toe in the waters.

Those are excellent supports for adults, but my final signpost this month is for younger constituents. We have armed forces cadet units across the Constituency, and I recently learned that there are Army Cadet Units in Didcot, Shrivenham, Wallingford and Wantage. All parade on a Wednesday evening at 7.30 pm, and all provide young people from the ages of 12 to 18 with a fantastic opportunity to develop in all sorts of ways. As well as adventure training and Duke of Edinburgh awards, there are opportunities to travel and learn a huge range of skills. If you'd like more information, do visit www.oxonacf.org.uk or call them on 01869 259681.

This month I have received many emails from constituents wanting to know what action the Government is taking to ensure that the Public Forest Estate (PFE) is on a sustainable footing for the future. Other issues raised range from the use of wild animals in circuses to energy policy in the UK. As a society, we must never underestimate the value of trees and woodlands. I am therefore delighted that England's PFE will remain in public ownership, and that funding is to be maintained. Longer term, the Government is committed to setting up a new public body to hold the PFE for the nation. This body will have greater independence from government, and greater freedom to manage its resources and maximise income.

A number of constituents have welcomed email updates I've been able to send about specific issues such as plans for new housing or concerns about the electrification of the railway line. I plan to send occasional emails which I hope will be of general interest. 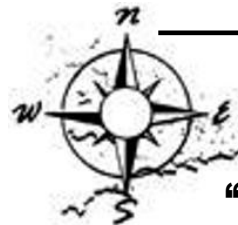

Do you know or care for someone who is affected by dementia or memory problems?

Do you feel more could be done to make your local community more dementia friendly?

Those affected by memory problems and dementia, and their carers, can sometimes feel that they don't know where to turn for help or how to find out what assistance they are entitled to, which can lead to feeling isolated and unsupported. Members of NAG5 recently attended a course run by Oxfordshire Rural Community Council at Sutton Courtenay Village Hall as we wanted to have a better understanding of dementia, what it means to live with it and how best to communicate with those who have it.

We also learned more about **Neighbourhood Return**, which was set up to help to find people who are lost. People at risk of getting lost can be registered with Neighbourhood Return. If they're reported lost, volunteers are quickly contacted by text message to request a search in their neighbourhood, enabling the person missing to be found quickly and returned home or to a safe place.

Oxfordshire is working towards Dementia Friendly Communities. We would like to hear from anyone who has suggestions or ideas about how we might make the NAG5 community – villages of Appleford, Drayton and Sutton Courtenay - more dementia friendly.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Report of the Parish Council AGM held on Mon 12th May

Elections for 2014/15 took place and most of the councillors continue to serve in their existing posts or committees. Naomi Broomfield is still Chair of Finance, but due to pressure of other commitments, asked to stand down as Vice-Chairman of the PC: Laurence Zipson takes over in Naomi's place.

Daniel Scharf, attending as Transport rep, drew the PC's attention to the serious road accident which recently occurred on the Abingdon Road, on the bend near the Oday Hill turn-off. On a number of occasions in the past few months, torrential rain has resulted in the road being flooded across half its width. The road dips at this point, but drainage is also very poor. The Highways Dept have recently dug a drainage pond at the side of the road just south of the A34 bridge, which is presumably intended to relieve the flooding under the bridge. However, the flooding further up the Abingdon Road is potentially more dangerous as a 50mph limit applies, and especially at night, motorists may approach the bend at speed, not realising until too late that the road ahead is under water. In the accident in question, a motorist approaching from Abingdon lost control of his car on hitting the water, and veered across the road colliding with an oncoming vehicle. The PC resolved to write to OCC pointing out the dangers and asking whether the drainage could be improved along this part of the road.

Two gentlemen from the bungalows in Caudwell Close (opposite the Day Centre) raised the issue of parking for the development. There are a limited number of parking spaces between their houses and the Day Centre, and it was emphasised that, as the people living in the Close are all elderly, it is quite possible that on occasion, ambulances, or other emergency services may need parking access. In addition to the residents' own vehicles, they also need spaces for their family, friends, and in some cases, carers. A recent planning application was made to build a new house in the grounds of one of the properties in Gravel Lane. The application referred to Gravel Lane as being the main entrance to the new house but also requested vehicle access through the fence bordering the above car park. The owner of the original property has now put a gate in the fence, which effectively removes several parking spaces.

The Planning Committee of the Parish Council did comment on the application, pointing out the problems that this proposal would cause, but the Vale Planning Dept appears not to have taken the issue on board. The two residents also said that only one property in the Close received any advance notification of the application: no one else had been informed. The Parish Clerk explained that he has raised the matter of parking with Sovereign Vale, who manage the properties in Caudwell Close, several times, but to date has received no satisfactory reply. The new development appears to vary from the application in other ways also, and the PC undertook to take the matter up with the Vale planners. Residents of the Close were asked to put their own complaints in writing to the Vale.

A resident living near the Green had expressed concerns about the condition of some of the trees on the Green, believing them to be a potential hazard. The extreme weather earlier in the year has weakened many trees across the country, and the problem now is that the same trees are bearing the additional weight of new leaves, which of course they were not through the winter. Unfortunately, high winds earlier this month resulted in a large branch of one of the horse chestnuts on the Green breaking off and falling to the ground. Thankfully, there was no damage to persons or property, although the fallen branch narrowly missed the bus shelter. The PC has arranged for the branch to be removed, but the affected tree is now in need of some TLC at the point where the branch snapped off. Ironically, a safety assessment commissioned by the Parish

Clerk was scheduled for the day after the incident occurred. We will report its findings in due course.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 2nd June 2014, at 7.30pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre in Gravel Lane. As ever, all are welcome to attend.

TREE SAFETY

Please, act now if this occurs on your boundary, and cut back overhanging growth before it becomes too large (as it surely will!). This will enable everyone to get the best benefit from the village's network of paths.

DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCIL REPORTS

Dear All

Please forgive the brief and generic appearance of my report this month. It is not that things are quiet on the Council front – far from it. What with FCC planning appeals, giant warehouse applications, the Drayton Neighbourhood Plan, further housing applications for Marcham, the Vale's Local Plan (and the "SHMA" figures on which it is currently based) all of which I will return to next month.

Taking a break in the foothills of the Pyrenees (back on 12/5) does at least allow me to reflect on a recent personal experience I have just been through. About a month ago I received an early morning phone call from a close friend who said "Ah! Good, glad your there, not stuck in the Crimea without a passport and money and needing a few thousand pounds to get you home - I am afraid you have just been hacked." This was followed by a whole day of phone calls from friends and contacts telling me the same thing. In that time I watched my email list slowly emptying. Thankfully, all my friends are far too sensible to have been duped and no-one sent any money. It is, of course possible, that I need to find a new set of friends.

Anyway, the point of all this is that I have been made to feel rather foolish and I want to share what I have learnt. Like anyone born deep in the 20th century, I find memorising passwords a complete pain. The more of them and the more complex they are, the less likely I am to remember them. The official 20th century advice of "never write down your passwords" just doesn't work – I must have changed some of them 20 times or more.

Now it just so happens that May was "SCAMS AWARENESS MONTH" (a bit late for me, but in time for anyone reading this, I hope.) So here are my suggested tips on how to survive the 21st century:-

School News

Classroom updates:

Robins Class:

Are going on a dinosaur hunt, which covers two themes, dinosaurs and transport! They have been using non-fiction text to find out about dinosaurs, and using their imagination to paint their own dinosaurs and to move like one. HALL REPORT

It was the Hall Committee AGM as this issue was going to print, so apologies for a rushed report. We've just heard that the final pieces of the Grants Funding 'jigsaw' have been approved, so we now have to try and plan how to do the work. It's intended to replace the aged fire doors, and the old windows, the latter with double glazing and better ventilation. The major project is the kitchen, which will involve some disruption. Thanks to Camilla King and the Corneville Charity, we've already been able to get a large new fridge, and a new cooker, to help those hirers needing catering until the major revamp happens.

Finances have been under pressure this year, due to a number of repairs, and the painting of doors, loos and corridor (the new colour scheme has been praised by hirers). Bookings are holding up well, and the overall picture across the last 2 years is that fees received just about equal costs. We did have a monster gas bill recently, being disputed with British Gas as it seems their service person left the thermostat at the top setting.

Ann Webb (chair) gave a report of the year, referring to the exciting times, both with the upcoming kitchen project, and the discussions with the Drayton 2020 group and architects about possible improvements to the Hall in the next couple of years. She thanked Irma Strelczuk, who has been the Wives' rep on the committee for some time; Irma is leaving the area, we wish her well, and welcome Jackie Walker for the next meeting. Ann also thanked Helen (our cleaner) for her sterling efforts, including a recent major re-polishing of the Main Hall floor (6 coats!).

Officers of the committee will continue for another year (though perhaps any experienced site foremen could volunteer their services to aid the kitchen work?!).

The new village defibrillator (organised by the Parish Council) should be fixed to the Hall any day now, we're told that it's simple to use, and that if needed a call to the emergency services will reveal the entry code. But hopefully of course it'll never be needed.

Residents of Steventon Road, and Lockway, should be aware that we have a dog show booked for a weekend in July (18/19/20). They have people coming from quite long distances, (Orkney in one case!) and a few will be at the Hall for a night or two, either camping, in caravans or in motor-homes. The camping element will be at the far side of the rec, near to the back door of the Hall for access. And the overall numbers are not that great, it's the Briard club, quite an unusual breed. So please don't panic and assume that 'travellers' are invading!

From 12th May, Thames Valley Police will be using the Facewatch App to upload pictures of unidentified people they would like to speak to in connection with low-level crime. The App works on any smartphone, is free to download and the images are searchable by postcode. Chief Inspector Colleen Lavery, from Neighbourhood Policing and Partnerships, said: "The Facewatch App gives members of the public the opportunity to see images of people police would like to speak to in their neighbourhood. If they recognise anyone they can choose to submit information, in confidence or openly, via their smartphone directly to the police by clicking 'Identify'". The App is already used by a number of forces across the country, including the Metropolitan Police Service, West Midlands Police, City of London Police, Surrey Police, Northamptonshire Police and British Transport Police. "We hope residents in the Thames Valley will also download the App to help us reduce crime and keep their communities safe."
