# DRAYTON 2020 – July '14 Update

The main event of last month was the developers' exhibition which took place over  $27^{th}/28^{th}$  June at the Village Hall – Friday evening and all day Saturday. As most readers will be aware, there are three sites in the village where **it is proposed to build new homes**, and details of all three were on display for people to look at, ask questions, and make comment.

Members of Drayton 2020 and representatives of the developers were on hand to field the questions. It should be said again that the site plans shown were indicative rather than definitive and so, for example, some of the criticisms made of the Barrow Road site made by residents living nearby in Abingdon Road, and Barrow Road itself, have been addressed, and a **later version of the site layout** now differs slightly from the one displayed.

It would be wrong to pretend that all of peoples' fears and concerns have been allayed: on a subject as controversial as new housing sites it is not possible to do this.

## URGENT Chronicle Team Info - and APPEAL!!

Our lottery manager, Jean Barton, has decided that as she now lives in Harwell it is time for her to step down from her role. We are <u>indebted to her</u> as she has been instrumental in establishing the new lottery system we introduced a year ago. <u>We send her and Peter our heartfelt thanks</u>.

It provides much needed income to the Chronicle, thus if lost, we would have to make serious adjustments either to how the chronicle is produced or how we raise additional funds.

(Abingdon DAMASCUS Youth Project, Youth and Community Acting Together). Make a note - and come along!

 $\rightarrow$ >> Despite the natural reservations of some visitors, the feedback from the exhibition indicates that most people found it very informative and professionally presented, and <u>many positive</u> <u>comments</u>, verbal and written were received. The event was very well attended, and it is estimated that over the two days, at least 250 people passed through the doors of the Village Hall.

#### **DEFIBRILLATOR**

Although not part of the exhibition directly, the opportunity was also taken to introduce people to **<u>Drayton's new defibrillator</u>**, with two hour-long training sessions on the Friday evening delivered by a volunteer from the Heartbeat Trust.

For those who have not yet seen it, the defibrillator is located on the **north side of the entrance porch to the Village Hall**. The equipment comes with its own instructions, and via recorded voice messages, tells the operator what to do. Although it is obviously helpful to have some first aid knowledge, the defibrillator can be used safely by someone without any training at all.

**Finally, a reminder** that the revised version of the draft Neighbourhood Development Plan, along with its supporting document, the Sustainability Appraisal, is now available on the village website (see below) for a second consultation period of 6 weeks which ends on Friday 1<sup>st</sup> August. On the website, click on the Drayton 2020 tab and then on 'Consultations'.

Hard copies of both the draft NDP and the Sustainability Appraisal will be posted in several locations, **including the Village Hall, the Caudwell Day Centre, and both pubs**.

Please do find the time to have a look at both documents and let us have your comments and criticisms. As mentioned last month, <u>even this second draft is not the final version</u>, which means that your input can still feed into the next revision.

Steering Group meetings are <u>open to any Drayton residents</u>, and they are held on alternate Friday evenings in the Caudwell Centre in Gravel Lane at 7pm. We shall probably take a summer break in August - but meetings will certainly resume in September.



## WESTMINSTER VIEW

Ed Vaizey's column (Wantage & Didcot MP, also he's Minister of Culture, Communications & Creative Industries)

As readers will have heard from news reports, there have been problems with passport applications recently. Over the past month I have been contacted by a number of constituents worried about passport applications for themselves and loved ones. I have been informed that over 99% of straightforward passport applications are being processed within four weeks, and the Passport Office is operating seven days a week and couriers are delivering passports within 24 hours of being produced. I would encourage anybody concerned about the status of their application to contact me well in advance of their date of travel, and I will do all I can to assist.

I have heard from constituents who are concerned that HMRC could sell anonymised taxpayers' data. A public consultation last year suggested removing the legal restrictions limiting HMRC's ability to share anonymised individual level data for the purpose of research and analysis. The Government has been clear that HMRC would only share data where this would generate clear public benefits, and where there are robust safeguards in place.

I've also received a number of emails and letters concerned about organised crime targeting endangered wildlife. I'm pleased we have continued to back the elephant ivory trade ban, as well as making poaching and wildlife trafficking "serious crimes" under the relevant UN Convention and strengthening cross-border coordination. I'll continue to support this very important work.

## PARISH COUNCIL (Richard Williams)

4 members of the public attended the Parish Council meeting, held on Mon  $7^{\text{th}}$  July.

in addition to the councillors. Melvyn Beesley and Christopher Roberts reported that there would be a meeting with Sovereign Housing Association on 10th July to discuss the provision of car parking for the residents of Caudwell Close.

There are at present 12 properties occupied by elderly residents in the Close, and parking spaces are very limited. Carers regularly visit some residents, and there needs to be access for paramedics and/or ambulances in the event of an emergency. The problem of lack of space has now been compounded by the installation of new access gates to the adjoining property at the west side of the car park.

It was noted that on the recent planning application to build a new house in these grounds, the applicant described this access route as 'existing', whereas some ten years previously there had never been any access at all, but simply a blank wall. The house owner then, circa 2004, inserted a wooden gate in the wall, but it is understood he explained this was to provide for occasional access only (i.e. once or twice a year), for a caravan.

Despite this proviso, the planning application appears to have implied a right of unlimited access through the adjacent car park. Although it is evident that such an arrangement would affect parking space for the residents of Caudwell Close, and that this land is the property of a third party (i.e. Sovereign) it is not clear that permission was sought from or approved by Sovereign.

Richard Williams attended the meeting on 10th July in support of the residents' case. At this meeting, attended by 3 officers from Sovereign Housing, it was confirmed that the access issue is being looked into by Sovereign's legal department. Meanwhile, a discussion took place on how best to manage parking on the rest of the site, and whether any additional spaces could be created by using some of the area which is at present grass verge.

Tim Atkins, the **Allotment Warden**, reported malicious damage to a number of plots and several thefts of people's vegetables. Tim agreed to submit a formal police report. It was noted that four plots are overgrown **but there is at present no waiting list for an allotment**.



A number of residents have now <u>expressed concerns</u> about the beech hedge planted on land outside the Stable Barn in Gravel Lane. Oenone Grant reported her further investigations into the matter. It is clear that the residents of the Stable Barn do not own the land outside their property. It is not included in the deeds of the Stable Barn (which was converted from agricultural use to a dwelling only in the mid 70s). In fact by custom and practice, if not in law, the piece of land in question is part of the historic village green. The law on the ownership of commons and village greens is complex, and over hundreds of years, records have been lost and it may be impossible to establish the true owners of a given area of land.

Even so, without some form of protection in place, common land would have been at constant risk of encroachment from nearby properties, and several pieces of legislation, dating back to the early 19th century were put in place to prevent this.

The Commons Registration Act of 1965 allowed the local authority or parish council in whose area an 'ownerless' common was situated to take such steps against unlawful interference as an owner in possession of the land could take. This law has now been superseded by a much more recent Act.

The Parish Council finds it unacceptable that individuals should seek to appropriate public land for their own private and exclusive use, and it intends to formally register this area as village green to prevent this and any further incursions.

## Drayton District & County Council Report

**Legal advice** In these days of targets and key performance indicators, it is very difficult for most people in public service, in private companies and in the professions, to hide mistakes or shortcomings. Most of us can be held to account. Modern society's demands for value for money and ever higher targets have certainly made us a much more efficient and productive society (if perhaps more stressed).

Strange then, that one of the most commonly used, highest charging professions of all does not seem to have fallen in line with most of the rest of society. I am, of course, talking about the legal profession - and I very much hope that there will be solicitors out there who can reassure me that I am wrong.

I have become painfully aware over the past few years of poor or inadequate legal advice given to residents I represent - particularly in the area of house conveyancing. The number of homeowners whose solicitors do not seem to have made them aware (or aware enough) of not having a "right to a view", the possibility of new developments around the home they wish to buy and the implications of living on unadopted roads, are just a few of the issues that I, a mere unqualified and non-expert politician, have had to explain to people (I am not answerable for, but then I don't charge for the advice I give). It is disappointing that the resident who has received poor or inadequate and relatively expensive legal advice has few realistic options. To be fair, there is so much housing and infrastructure development going on in our area at present, it is quite a challenge to keep up with it all. But that is what we pay our hefty conveyancing bills for, and it is surely reasonable to demand some answerability.

<u>Area Stewardship Grants</u> Well done, the hard-pressed, hard up County Council for managing to find the resources to fund these Grants for another year. If anyone has ideas on how £200-£2000 could be spent in or around their village on a "Highways" project – please get in touch.

#### **Some notices for General Interest**

In the next few weeks, work will begin on Road Surface Dressing on the Sutton Courtenay to Appleford Road and on the Milton Road, Drayton.

Work begins in October on the long awaited 'Hamburger' roundabout on the A34 Milton interchange – there is bound to be disruption while this lengthy project is undertaken. (Ed's note – Could Network Rail be waiting for this period to start altering the railway bridges in the area? Anyone checked?!)

The 3 Northern Towers of the Didcot A Power station are, as I write, due for "Blowdown" between 3am and 5am on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> July. The old central chimney and remaining 3 towers are due for demolition in 2015 and 2016.

Between 10 and 11pm on Monday August 4<sup>th</sup>, to commemorate the 100 years since the outbreak of WW1, <u>we are all encouraged</u> to turn off all our house lights bar 1 or light a single candle.

Reduce traffic on Drayton Road – use the new free cash machine at Milton Park – it's slightly closer and a lot easier to get to than any in Abingdon – ensuring that it is heavily used will increase the chances of keeping it!

**Car Parking in Villages** As the number of cars in our villages rapidly approaches the number of residents, how and where we park is becoming an ever more common theme in local councillor casework. It seems that the law is not very helpful on this issue. In law, I am told that No-one has a 'right' to park on the public highway, however, if the parking is clearly causing an obstruction, then the police can take action. As we all know, an obstruction is a very difficult thing to define. Developers of new housing are required to provide 2 parking spaces per home and 1 per flat. Many of us now have more vehicles than that. It seems, therefore, that the only way to address the issue in our ever-more crowded villages is to appeal to everyone's sense of reason and fair play.

A) <u>Please be aware</u> of your neighbour's need to access his/her own house/driveway.

B) If you own more than 2 cars in your household, please think carefully where you are parking the extra cars and be prepared to park the extras a little farther from your house than might seem convenient, particularly if your road is very full of parked cars.

C) If you believe someone is causing an obstruction by the way they park, please try speaking to them first. (Once the authorities get involved, it becomes an issue that takes a long time to go away!).

D) If C) doesn't work, <u>please let me know</u> and I will discuss it with the police. *Richard Webber* (OCC & VWHDC)

Visit the Smartwater web site at http://www.smartwater.com, or call them on 0800 521 669. Please call the non-emergency police number 101 if you would like to purchase a kit.

<u>Scams</u> The following are common scams: <u>Lottery and prize</u> <u>draw</u> scams: victims are told they've won a large cash prize but they have to send a fee to release it. <u>Banks and Building Society</u> scams: authentic looking mail or e-mails claiming to be from banks and building societies, asking for information and/or cash. <u>Debt recovery</u> scams: letters or telephone calls claiming to have bought a debt with their name on it from a reputable company or utility supplier and threatening court action if the fictitious bill or fine isn't paid quickly.

<u>Courier</u> scams: a scammer telephones, claiming to be from the victim's bank to say their debit or credit card needs replacing. The scammer instructs the victim to hang up and call their bank to verify that the call is genuine. But unknown to the victim the fraudster stays on the line; tricking the person into thinking they're calling the bank. The victim's then asked to disclose their pin number before a 'courier' comes to pick up the card to take it to the bank to be changed. The scammer keeps the card, using it to buy goods or take money from the victim's account.

<u>Parcel delivery</u> scams: a card is received, claiming that a delivery service was unable to deliver a parcel and that they should contact the service by phone. The card gives a premium rate number to call. When the victim calls a long recorded message is played and all the victim receives is a hefty phone bill.


