CHRISTMAS 1914

Recent issues of the Chronicle have carried articles commemorating the 100th anniversary of the start of the First World War in 1914 and as Christmas approaches in 2014, we think of Christmas 1914, the first Christmas of that war. This was remarkable because popular opinion in the early part of the war was that "it will all be over by Christmas", it wasn't! There would be four Christmasses and most of 1918 before "it was all over".

This Christmas was also remarkable for the "Christmas Truce". This was an unofficial event that occurred in local areas of the front line. On Christmas Day, British soldiers heard sounds of carols being sung in the German trenches so they joined in. Individual soldiers then tentatively left the relative safety of their trenches to walk over to the enemy. There, they shook hands, exchanged cigarettes and some even played football! This Christmas spirit was short lived, they soon returned to their trenches to carry on the business of war.

This was not repeated in later Christmasses because the higher command frowned upon such fraternisation plus the fact that the horrors of war soon hardened attitudes to the enemy.

The July Chronicle listed the names and the dates of death of the young men of Drayton who died in that war using material supplied by John Roberts. It is our intention, over the next four years, to remember each of these soldiers in the month of the 100th anniversary of their deaths using John's list.

There are no recorded deaths of Drayton soldiers in December but the November issue carried the names of Guardsman Frank Bunce and Private Thomas Burgess who were both killed in the first battle of Ypres in November. Thomas Burgess is buried in Boulogne Eastern Cemetery and below there is an article by Richard Talbot that makes an interesting footnote to that story.

"Further to your article in the November Chronicle about Private Thomas Burgess I would just like so say that on Saturday 15th November I found myself in a very damp Boulogne. My hotel was just down the road from the Boulogne Eastern Cemetery. I thought as a Draytonian myself, I would like to find his grave. As I walked in the wet grass I thought to myself, do I really want to be here with my feet getting damper by the minute? Then I thought about what Thomas, a fellow Draytonian, must have gone through in the trenches, standing in water and mud, with rats for company for days on end. My damp feet seemed a small price to pay compared to Thomas who had made the ultimate sacrifice in order that I was able to visit him. A truly humbling experience." *Richard Talbot*



We've all noticed in recent years that there seem to be ever more special days and weeks set aside to remind us of particular good causes. I've come across two recently which particularly struck a chord with me.

The first was SUDEP Awareness Day on 23rd October. This day was set up by SUDEP Action, a charity which was set up by Jane Hanna OBE and which is based in Wantage. SUDEP Action campaigns to raise awareness and understanding of the risk of Sudden Death in Epilepsy. I was very pleased indeed to be invited to become President of SUDEP Action and to host an event at the House of Commons on 23rd October which helped MPs to understand both the risk of sudden death for those with epilepsy, and the relatively simple steps that can be taken to reduce that risk quite significantly. It was sobering to hear from families who had been bereaved through sudden death in epilepsy and inspiring to see how determined they are to help others learn from their very sad experience.

If you, or someone you know, has epilepsy even in a very mild form, please do take a look at the website www.sudep.org and spread the word about this important but little-discussed issue.

Adoption brings challenges, immense rewards and can make a huge, positive difference to the lives of children and those who adopt them. National Adoption Week, which took place from 3 - 9 November, made all of those points and more.

This is particularly important for children who often wait the longest to be adopted – sibling groups, children with disabilities, children aged 5 and over and children from some black and minority ethnic backgrounds. The campaign encouraged us all to think about, and hopefully come forward, to adopt these children and give them a loving home. As you'd expect, there's a website for this week too where you can find more information about adoption - www.nationaladoptionweek.org.uk/adoption. If you've ever wondered if this might be something to consider, why not take a look at that too.

It seems that every day or week now has a special label or significance. Not all are relevant to many of us, but some really do bring an opportunity to highlight an important issue and make a real difference.

Neighbourhood and Local Plans

At the time of writing I have no idea what progress would have been made by the Neighbourhood Plan since the end of its consultation period. However, having read and objected to many parts of the Plan, I thought that I would explain my position. Last year I resigned from the Parish Council when I became aware that my contributions to the Plan and comments on the process were seen as unhelpful. Since then I have continued to make the same argument about the need to ensure that developments carried out in accordance with the Plan would be 'sustainable'; being able to demonstrate that they would, in the words of a planning inspector, 'consume their own smoke'. I have also been suggesting ways to draft clear and unambiguous policies so that the Plan could achieve what it set out to achieve. If there was room for doubt I suggested that the draft plan be put through a 'health check' from a qualified professional before being placed on deposit for formal examination. I have been concerned that the consideration of planning applications on any land within the village, including the sites now being 'preferred', should not be prejudiced by any discussions that have taken place with prospective developers, until the Plan is finally adopted through due process. Finally, I have been arguing that the Plan should address the demand for self-building (145), co-housing (50) and smallholding (200) expressed through the village questionnaire. Although none of these suggestions have been taken into account by the current plan, I believe that Drayton would be better off with a properly drafted neighbourhood plan that would contribute effectively to the achievement of sustainable development. The Inspector might recommend minor changes or decide that the Plan should not proceed because it does not meet the Basic Conditions (or it subsequently fails the village Referendum). Given this possibility, we should all be looking to the Local Plan now placed on deposit by the District Council to seek to ensure that this would do the job of securing the right kind of (sustainable) village development and in the right kind of places.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Richard Williams

Report of the Parish Council meeting held on Mon 3rd November 2014

As most readers will know, the Parish Council keeps minutes of all its monthly meetings. The most recent of these are posted on notice boards around the village, and then held for a time by the Parish Clerk for reference purposes. The village website maintains an archive of PC minutes which at the time of writing goes back to 2008. However, for long-term safe keeping, all paper documents and associated records are periodically transferred to the county archives in Cowley. Councillors who serve for a period of 20 or 30 years or more are a distinct rarity these days, so that the collective memory of the current Parish Council does not stretch back all that far. Even if it did, from time to time it is useful to search back through the old records, to check for example when a particular decision was first made, or to ascertain the reasons for making it. Earlier this month, the Clerk visited Cowley to investigate a matter which entailed researching right back to the origins of the Parish Council in Drayton. He was intrigued and amused (given the timing) to discover that next month's Parish Council meeting will take place, almost to the day, 120 years after the very first PC meeting in the village. A handwritten entry in the record book states that this meeting took place, 'at the School Room, on Tuesday the 4th day of December 1894 at six o' clock in the evening'. A Mr H Thornton was appointed Chairman.

A snapshot of the minutes of the first ever meeting of the Drayton Parish Council – December 4th 1894

In honour of this anniversary, a minor celebration, most likely involving cake, will take place at the December PC meeting, but a more lasting recognition of the PC's history is planned in the form of a project to scan the whole of the recorded minutes from 1894 to the present day. If this works, it may be feasible to look for entries in even the oldest records using computer word search tools. A number of photographs of old Drayton have also been located, so that a 'Down Memory Lane' article might possibly appear in a future issue of the Chronicle, sometime in the New Year.

Councillors heard that later this month, Drayton, along with all other Town and Parish Councils in Oxfordshire, has been invited to a meeting which will discuss the setting up of Community Emergency Plans in all areas, with an emphasis on 'getting ready for the winter'. Currently, 50% of Oxfordshire parishes have developed a community emergency plan and the county is aiming to increase this number before the New Year. One of the lessons that emerged from last winter's terrible floods is that emergency relief can be much better organised if local volunteers co-ordinate the response in each village or community, down to the level of individual streets. The idea is that if the County's Emergency Planning Dept has to field hundreds of phone calls from different households, all asking for assistance, and each requesting, say, a dozen or so sandbags, this is immensely time-consuming and wasteful of effort. If a street co-ordinator can put in a single phone call requesting three hundred sandbags, and organise the local distribution, that is potentially much more efficient – plus local knowledge means that the volunteers are more able to identify those who are especially vulnerable or at risk.

The nature of the CEP will obviously depend on the type of risk the village is liable to. Drayton has not suffered significantly from flooding in the past, although this is no cause for complacency as flash flooding could occur just about anywhere. Volunteers could clear snow from the paths and driveways of those who might struggle to manage the job themselves, and plenty of other similar tasks come to mind. Drayton does not yet have a Plan in place, and while the Parish Council is happy to take the lead on this, it needs a lot more volunteers to come forward if the plan is to be put into practice when required. Age doesn't really matter as long as you have a reasonable level of physical fitness. If you think you would be interested in joining a Community Emergency team, please contact the Parish Clerk (see below) in the first instance who we will keep a record of people's names. If the winter is mild, then of course it may not be necessary to activate the Plan at all, but it would be good to make contingency arrangements.

COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

TO FRACK OR NOT TO FRACK

The trouble with so many of today's issues – Europe, Immigration, the Environment and so on, is that there is an ocean of misinformation out there. I am one of those attempting to sail a boat across this ocean in an effort to reach an island where sensible, achievable, evidence-based solutions are found. Solutions on which I can base my opinion. Solutions I can support with my vote.

The County Council held a full meeting dedicated to the subject of "Fracking" in general and "Fracking in Oxfordshire" in particular. Having waded my way through a flotilla of placards (I may as well stick to my metaphor) demanding "No to "Fracking", we then heard a number of speeches demanding "say No to Nuclear" "say No to destroying our countryside" and even "say No to wind farms". It seemed the easiest thing in the world is to say "No" to something.

However, there is an undeniable fact that in the next 10-20 years we, particularly in the UK, will be facing an "energy gap". If we wish to keep the lights on, we have to fill this gap. We are told that additional Nuclear power takes too long to happen, that renewable energy technology is growing too slowly, and that traditional gas and oil supplies are running out. We are told that here is a looming threat of the UK being forced to rely on energy from politically unstable parts of the world. Saying "No" to anything which might offer a solution, or even part of a solution is simply not an option.

So in this ocean of misinformation, sensible people are looking earnestly for a few "islands" of certainty. Islands where "real, undeniable facts" are to be found. For what it is worth (and to stimulate urgent debate) here are the 5 "islands" I have found, on which I will be developing my opinion on "Fracking".

- 1. The latest UN report on Global warming and its causes I find utterly compelling. Even for those who wish to argue that global warming is not man-made, to do nothing about it is a risk I would not wish the world to take. If we do not cut world carbon emissions to zero by 2100 it will be too late. I do not want our great, great grandchildren to blame us for doing nothing about it now.
- 2. A bit of good news (lost in all the current "anti-EU" rhetoric). Under the leadership of the UK Department of Energy and Climate Change, all EU nations have just signed up to an agreement to cut their Carbon emissions by 40% by 2030. Still a long way to go, no doubt, but an initiative which will encourage/shame other nations to follow suit.
- 3. Say "No" to coal. Not here, not in Europe, not anywhere. The impact on carbon emissions alone of coal burning are unacceptable and make the current targets unachievable. It is possible that carbon capture and storage technology will advance to make coal burning an option in the future but certainly not in time to do anything about the energy gap.
- 4. Fracking has much less impact on C emissions than coal. Given the shortage of options, it should certainly be considered in the mix. Unfortunately UK geology is nothing like US geology and the amount of gas which could be economically gained in the UK could only be a small part of the solution to the energy gap. In Oxfordshire, it is likely that there are only a small handful of sites which would be suitable.
- 5. For the UK at least, the answer lies in a short term mix of energy sources some of which will make the emission targets harder to achieve but we have to keep the lights on.
- 6. We need to keep up the pressure to develop renewables of all types wind (offshore and onshore), solar, tidal and others.

Anything or anyone who impedes this is, in my view being irresponsible.

If Drayton is concerned about extra houses, spare a thought for Sutton Courtenay. That village has Didcot B, FCC recycling, an extra 500+ houses (at the last count), and now the prospect of the country's largest warehouse/distribution centre right on its doorstep. If ever there is an argument for the need to consider the cumulative impact of growth on communities, it is in Sutton Courtenay. Work on the new "hamburger" interchange at Milton is about to start. With the additional commercial and housing growth, we all need to cross our fingers that the new interchange is going to cope.

The Local Plan for consultation

We now know that Milton Heights has been spared the prospect of expanding by 1400 homes from its present 200. Milton's gain is at the expense of north Abingdon and the Green Belt. The AONB area (area of outstanding natural beauty) around Harwell is also under severe threat. VWHDC is accepting the entire SHMA (Strategic Housing Market Assessment) figures in an effort to get its Local Plan accepted more quickly. This they argue will protect us from future speculative planning applications. The County Highways department have said that the road network can cope. We need to hope that they are right!

It is a moot point whether or not the damage will already have been done before the Local Plan is in place.

Anyone who feels vulnerable can choose to be 'buddied' with a nominated neighbour, whom they can trust and call, if they're unsure of someone who 'cold calls' at their door.

A 'nominated neighbour' card and other doorstep crime prevention leaflets will be provided to those who wish to participate in this initiative. The idea is that the name and address or telephone number of the buddy should be written clearly on the card which can then be held up at the



window or pushed through the letterbox if a cold caller arrives on the doorstep. The card says 'I DO NOT RECOGNISE YOU! We do not answer the door to strangers. Please go to or call [buddy details inserted] who is my NOMINATED NEIGHBOUR. They will CHECK your identity and return with you.'

November 2014 Update

Not much to add this month. Our Neighbourhood Development Plan is currently being scrutinised by the Independent Examiner, and we understand that the results of the examination should be available on or soon after 28th November. We have been told that the Plan's 6 week consultation period on the Vale's website produced some 90 responses from the public, but no detail as to the nature of the comments or the balance of people's opinions has so far been forthcoming. Obviously, Drayton 2020's ideal would be that the Plan is passed without need for further amendment, but we have to be prepared for all possible outcomes.

By the time this Chronicle is published, the Traffic in Drayton workshop, scheduled for the afternoon of Friday 21st November at the Village Hall, will have taken place, and we hope that it proves to be an interesting and enlightening session. (See below). Several people have pointed out that a Friday afternoon was not the best time to hold such an event, since many of those who wanted to come along will be at work, but unfortunately this was the only time that the experts who kindly agreed to attend were available. Suggestions that we film the event are being explored, but at this stage, it is not clear that we will be able to pursue the idea.

The next Steering Group meeting is scheduled for Fri 28th November. Further dates are unlikely this side of Christmas. Dates for the New Year will be notified in good time to all those on our E-mailing list. The meetings are open to any Drayton resident, and are normally held on Friday evenings in the Caudwell Centre in Gravel Lane at 7pm. DRAYTON'S TRAFFIC AND TRANSPORT

Drayton residents attended a meeting at Drayton Village Hall on Friday 21st of November to hear about traffic possibilities for Drayton 2020. Tom Shebbeare welcomed people and invited everybody to partake of a free lunch including home made soup, bread and cheese. Tom explained that there would be talk by Nigel Millington from Phil Jones Associates, transport planning consultants, then there would be time for questions then finally, Paul Fermer from Oxfordshire County Council would be coming to answer questions on behalf of the County Council.

Nigel gave a presentation in which he said that traffic movements are increasing with the increasing population. The obvious solution to this is to build bigger and better roads but this isn't always the answer, with bigger and better routes, people tend to use them more. Like water finding the easiest path.

Is Drayton a place, that provides a through route or should it be a place more suitable for people to live in? He gave examples around the country, in towns and villages, where the roads had been planned to focus on routes for cars and then had their areas changed to give more pleasant pedestrian access to shops and amenities. Nigel showed a picture of the area outside Vickery's and said that it had obviously evolved rather than been planned. He said that this area could be enhanced by improving pedestrian access to the amenities in that area, providing a better bus stop and some organised parking. Focus on the residents rather than making a better through route.

He said we should look upon the planned expansion of Drayton as an opportunity to improve it as a place to live, using money from the developers.

The audience then split into groups to discuss suggestions for Drayton's roads and to think of questions to put to the Oxfordshire County Council representative, Paul Fermer.

Paul answered questions from the audience on a wide range of traffic problems in and around Drayton. The A34 was a common topic. Paul explained that the County Council were aware of the problems and discussions are going on but they didn't have direct responsibility for the A34.

Other more expansive suggestions were made such as a Park and Ride system at Milton Park, a railway station at Steventon. Although these may be in the future, they should be catered for now by, for example, where railway bridges are currently being modified, they should be made wider to make provision for more tracks. Paul said that this was the most cost effective way of proceeding but there was a limited amount of money available now that had to be used for the current work and although not desirable, future work would have to be carried out with money when it does become available.

Paul said that the cost of Drayton's plans would best be met by getting money from developers, the County Council had limited funds.
