DRAYTON VOTES YES

A Great Community Achievement

By the time you read this everyone will know the result of the Referendum on the Drayton Neighbourhood Development Planyes 643, no 64 (with two spoiled papers). This conclusive result follows nearly three years of persistent, hard work by a great many people. Everyone who came to the four big consultation events, the fortnightly public meetings and who made their opinions known verbally, by letter and by email, contributed to the process. The 64% of all Drayton households who completed the extensive questionnaire provided a firm structure for the Plan which, after the many hurdles it then had to cross, won the support of 90% at the Referendum.

Everywhere, it seems, will soon be engulfed in housing. But in Drayton any significant development will be restricted to the number, type and location determined by Drayton residents. Smaller homes will predominate because Drayton residents have said that is what is needed, including homes which young people can afford to buy or rent, or to which older people can downsize. None of these developments will be like traditional housing estates because the Plan requires them to include considerable publiclyaccessible open space, with footpaths and recreational facilities.

As a price for building in Drayton, we can expect significant financial contributions towards improving village amenities: a refurbished village hall and new sports fields, play areas, footpaths, cycle tracks and tree-planting are on the shopping list. How the roads are going to cope with all the new housing in Abingdon and surrounding villages remains uncertain, but Drayton has a traffic plan designed to slow it down and make our main roads safer for pedestrians.

The Referendum marks the end of one phase and the beginning of another. In order to achieve the community benefits we must manage the opportunity with care. \rightarrow



This needs the involvement of more people with vision and determination: those who want Drayton to provide a good future for themselves and their children.

If you are one of these people, don't sit back and leave it to others, ring me on 531512 or, for the Parish Council, 07909 176061.

Getting us to this point has involved over 7000 recorded manhours by village residents. Too many people have been involved in the steering group, working groups, research and publicity for me to list them all, but they know who they are and that their work has been greatly valued. However, two Richards and two Davids need special mention. It was Richard Williams who saw how such a Plan could benefit Drayton before most of us had heard of the prospect; he led it through the Parish Council and, with David Mercer, wrote much of the final document. Richard Webber used his influence in the Parish, District and County Councils to get the support it needed and ensure it did not get bogged down in bureaucracy.

Throughout the process we had the good fortune to have our affairs managed with meticulous attention by David Perrow, a commitment all the more remarkable because he does not even live in Drayton. Neither, now, does the other David - David Mercer, who immersed himself in the language of planners to write some 20,000 words while, at the same time, buying a house elsewhere.

People will be enjoying our rather larger but much-improved Drayton long after all the work has been forgotten.

Well done, everyone.





POLICE WARNINGS

SHEDS, GARAGES AND OUTBUILDINGS BURGLED IN THE LOCAL AREA

There has been a recent spate of burglaries to sheds, garages and outbuildings in the South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse area over the last few weeks. Offences mainly occur overnight in rural locations, with offenders stealing items such as garden hand tools, high value power tools and bikes. Offenders see sheds and outbuildings as easy pickings because they can be unprotected and lack basic security measures. Please property mark items of value. This may stop it being sold on and if recovered will assist police in identifying the owners so it can be returned and could also help catch criminals.

Please be extra vigilant and report any suspicious activity to the police as soon as possible on 101 or call 999 for crime in progress.

LEAD THEFTS

Thames Valley Police is appealing for information after several incidents of lead theft across the local area.

On Wednesday 4th March at 7.25am, a man was seen removing lead lining from the roof of the Abbey Baptist Church, Checker Walk, Abingdon. When the offender was disturbed he ran away, leaving extensive damage to the roof and a pile of lead behind. While a monetary figure for the stolen lead is as yet unknown, approximately quarter of the roof has been damaged during the incident. The offender wore a pale blue hooded jumper and a scarf around his face.

Between midnight on Tuesday 3rd March and Wednesday 4th March, around 22sq ft of lead was stolen from the roof of Saint Edmunds School in Abingdon. Between 8am on Saturday 28th February and 3.20pm on Tuesday 3rd March, attempts have been made to steal the lead that surrounds the front door of the Abbey Church of St Peter and St Paul (Dorchester Abbey).

If you have any information please contact Thames Valley Police via the 101 number. No personal details are taken, information is not traced or recorded and you will not go to court.

FRAUDS

Auction fraud

Online auction sites are regularly targeted by fraudsters advertising desirable items for sale which are below market value, but do not exist. Fraudsters use a variety of techniques to persuade the potential buyer that the item is genuine and that any advanced payment will be protected or reimbursed should the product be faulty or not received.

Protect yourself:

Stay within the auction guidelines stipulated on the website. Payments made via bank transfer, money transfer or e-money are not protected, should you not receive the item.

View the item in person if possible.

If the item advertised seems too good to be true, it probably is. If you need to report a fraud, report it to action fraud on 0300 123 2040 or using the action fraud reporting tool via the action fraud website - http://www.actionfraud.police.uk/

Fraud of the Rings

Please look out for a fraud which is being reported around the South-East of England at the moment.

Whilst driving, the victim is flagged down by a man (or men) next to a broken down vehicle. The man states that he needs money to get petrol. As payment, the man offers the victim one to three "gold" rings and may also provide a business card suggesting links to Berlin, Germany or Glasgow, Scotland. The amount of cash taken is between £20 and £300. However, the rings are worthless and definitely not precious.

Offences are occurring on 'A' roads and slip roads at major junctions in the South of England. One victim reports seeing the same offender(s) back at the same spot (the A41 bypass near Tring, on this occasion) two days later at approximately 12:50pm. All suspects are described as male and with dark hair. The description of the "broken down" vehicle varies.

Offenders seem to target men over the age of 55.

Do not accept jewellery as payment!

Dear Editor.

Following Alan Bourne's letter I thought I could supply some evidence to support arguments on the heating and cooling of the Earth. A Russian scientist, Milankovic, worked out a formula for this.

The discovery of the Bermuda Steppes in following years confirmed his theory. This is supported by caves in Northern Spain, where data has been extrapolated from mineral deposits, to provide a chart over 30,000 years showing an average change of 2 degrees Centigrade up and down.

The theory is that the Earth's orbit around the Sun is elliptical, it also wobbles about 22-25 degrees as it spins on its axis. So as the Earth spins around the Sun it receives a varying amount of energy i.e. when furthest from the Sun it receives very little and if its inclination is away from the Sun ice ages can result.

MILLENNIUM GREEN


DRAYTON MILLENNIUM GREEN TRUST

Recently, whilst driving up the Eastway Track to tend to my sheep, I passed a couple of ladies with 3 dogs, I stopped to check if they had 3 dogs as they only had 2 with them, the response from them was unacceptable. "Yes there's a black one, but he's running around in the field somewhere"!!!! Whilst then tending to my sheep, I watched the said dog running up and down the hedgerow of Little Smiths Farm and it then ran in to the Farm where my sheep were.

A couple of years ago we had a dog chase our sheep which resulted in a Ewe with a broken foot; we had to keep this Ewe alive with a broken foot as she had two 6 week old lambs. This Ewe was only two years old with her first set of lambs, we were put in an unnecessary position due to a dog owner's lack of responsibility.

The reasons for preventing dogs from chasing sheep especially at this time of year are:

- To reduce the risk of sheep miscarrying.
- To reduce the likelihood of harm or fatality of Ewe's or New Born Lambs.
- To reduce the potential of damage to fencing and equipment.

Dog owners should be aware that they can be prosecuted if their pets are let off their leads while in a farmer's field or enclosed space with sheep present.

Also, farmers are within their rights to shoot and kill dogs if they are deemed to be causing distress to flock.

Facts about sheep worrying

Under the Animals Act 1971, a person acting to protect livestock may be able to kill or injure a dog that he/she reasonably believes is "worrying" without incurring any criminal or civil liability.

As a dog owner or a person for the time being in charge of a dog, you could be committing an offence if your pet worries livestock on agricultural land.

Worrying includes attacking or chasing livestock in a way that might reasonably be expected to cause injury, suffering or loss.

It is also an offence to have a dog in a field or enclosed space where there are sheep when the dog is not on a lead or under close control.

If sheep worrying is proved, it can mean the dog owner or person in charge being sued for damages to recompense that loss.

By ensuring dogs are kept under control when sheep or other livestock are present, owners can significantly reduce the chances of any of the animals involved coming to harm.

When walking with dogs in/alongside fields with livestock, keep your dog close, under effective control, and on a short lead.

Remember that our animals can be part of or our livelihood and we can't risk having them distressed, hurt or killed by dogs with irresponsible owners. So please be responsible and keep your dog under control.

Anyone who witnesses sheep being chased or attacked should call 101 immediately.

YOUR DOG WILL BE LOST WITHOUT A CHIP!

Having your pet microchipped is one of the best ways to increase your pet's chances of getting home. Unlike dog tags and collars, which can fall off or be removed, microchipping is a more permanent form of identifying your dog. But don't forget the law says all dogs must wear a collar and tag, with their owner's name, address and telephone number on it.

How does it work?

A tiny microchip about the size of a grain of rice is inserted under your dog's loose skin, on the back of the neck. This gives the dog their own unique code. If your dog becomes lost or stolen and is picked up by the dog warden or turns up at a shelter or vet's office, the microchip can be scanned and matched to your contact details, which are kept on a database.

Register the chip.

This is extremely important! If the vet or whoever is chipping your dog does not submit the paperwork for you, make sure you complete the form and mail it to the company. And even if the chipper submits the paperwork, it's a good idea to follow up with the database to make sure the chip was registered correctly.

Keep your dog's chip details updated!

Please remember that if your phone number, address or e-mail address change, you must update your dog's microchip information – it is the only way it can be used to reunite you with your best friend.

The law is changing; all dogs will have to be microchipped from April 2016.



WESTMINSTER LETTER Ed Vaizey

As the General Election looms I have been reflecting on what an honour it has been to serve the Wantage and Didcot constituency over the past ten years. One of the most fantastic aspects of my role as your MP is meeting so many dedicated volunteers and getting involved in some of the many great causes in the constituency.

I am incredibly proud to have become president of SUDEP Action, a charity based in Wantage, which is working towards the prevention of sudden unexpected death in epilepsy. This charity was set up by local resident Jane Hanna and provides information and a support network for the bereaved. Last month there was an important Parliamentary debate which called on the Government to address major issues facing people with epilepsy and resulted in a commitment from the Government and MP's to do all they could to raise awareness of the risks associated with epilepsy by "redflagging" those at increased risk of fatality. They also pledged to try to reduce avoidable epilepsy related deaths.

Friends of OSCAR is a national charity, based in Didcot, of which I am also a recent patron. This charity helps children, and their families, when they are diagnosed with brain or spinal tumours. I recently attended the launch of a bag of essential items, such as toothpaste and overnight necessities, given to parents when they arrive at hospital often without time to pack. This is one of the many ways the charity supports families at such a traumatic time.

Another very worthy cause that I have recently become involved in is Mission Motorsport. The aim of this national charity, based near Wantage is to aid the recovery and rehabilitation of those affected by military operations, by providing opportunities through Motorsport. Not only do they provide a support network but focus on training and direct vocational skills to help those affected to get back into the workplace.

These are just a few examples of the many good causes I have encountered and I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who volunteers and helps to make this constituency such a wonderful place to live.

This month I have received letters and emails on a wide range of topics including protecting the wildlife, dementia and beer duty. However, the issue I received most correspondence on, some 100 plus emails, relates to concerns over the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP). I believe the agreement does not carry the risks that some have put forward, and I am reassured that as Parliament will scrutinise the proposals and ultimately has the final veto power, a final agreement will only be reached if it is in the United Kingdom's interests.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT David Perrow

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Mon 2nd March 2015

One member of the public was present in addition to the councillors. Emma Greenland, a Drayton resident, expressed an interest in the further development of the Lockway playground. Emma has set up a 'Families in Drayton' Facebook page that, at the time of writing, has 119 members. Pat Athawes, the PC's representative for Drayton Primary School, and Naomi Broomfield, the DAMASCUS Project representative, are still consulting Drayton's clubs and groups as to what type of play equipment they would like installed. Emma also reported that her family are being woken up at night by lorries thundering through the village. This complaint has been echoed by a number of other residents. The increase in traffic is thought to be linked to road works on the A34 at the Milton Interchange and the electrification of the Great Western railway line. It was noted that OCC are consulting on 'Connecting Oxfordshire', the draft local transport plan, and Daniel Scharf, the PC's Transport representative will submit a written response to the consultation, which ends on 2nd April. Richard Webber agreed to raise the traffic disturbance issue at the next Neighbourhood Action Group meeting.

The Clerk reported on the progress of the Parish Council's request to the Vale that the Drayton Conservation Area be extended to cover the area around the Sutton Wick pond, which contains a number of buildings of historical significance. This proposal is linked to the PC's research into the existing Conservation Area and its documentation by the Vale. It is a Local Planning Authority's responsibility to produce detailed descriptions of conservation areas, information which is used, amongst other purposes, to assist in making decisions on any planning applications that fall within the area. In the case of Drayton, the 'official' descriptions of our Conservation Area consist of little more than a couple of paragraphs of general observations, with scant detail about character, local building materials etc, and none at all about specific buildings. The Vale has replied that it does not have the resources to conduct the necessary detailed survey at the present time, although it is looking at ways to improve those resources.

An E-mail was received from a resident concerned about cars parking at the village green, specifically about vehicles going off the tarmac and parking partly on the grass. The resultant muddy tracks across the edge of the green obviously cause damage to the grass and look unsightly. This practice is inconsiderate and unnecessary, and the Parish Council will investigate possible ways of protecting the green. On the subject of lack of consideration, a number of residents have commented on the amount of litter to be found around the village. There is no excuse for dumping glass and plastic bottles and other assorted rubbish in hedgerows, grass verges and the like. This not only looks terrible; it is dangerous to young children and indeed to small animals as well. We do have a Village Caretaker, but collecting litter is only one of Steve's many tasks, and the sheer volume of stuff being dropped is more than any one person could cope with if they were doing the job fulltime. Often the items are dumped just feet away from a half empty waste bin, which suggests that the perpetrator is either bone idle or being deliberately anti-social. This isn't a task for one person alone; it is a collective village responsibility, and the Parish Council would welcome volunteers to take part in an organised litter pick, possibly as a regular event. Let's keep our village clean, and a better place to live.

An enquiry was received, via the Village Hall, as to whether a 'refresher' course could be provided on the use of the defibrillator. It was explained that the defibrillator is designed to be used by laypersons and does not require any medical expertise to operate. The equipment comes with very clear instructions, which are spoken aloud by a pre-recorded voice. The defibrillator carries out

its own assessment of the patient and it will only deliver an electrical charge where it is appropriate and safe to do so. You cannot inadvertently harm a patient by using the equipment, which is as near to foolproof as such an item could be.

You will read elsewhere in this issue that Drayton's Neighbourhood Plan passed its referendum with a 90.8% 'Yes' vote, a convincing endorsement, which I believe reflects the nearly three years of very hard work put in by Drayton 2020 and many other Drayton residents. The first formal planning application for new housing following the referendum result will be discussed by the Planning Committee of the Parish Council on Tues 17th March in a public meeting at the Village Hall. It relates to the 'Barrow Road' site at the north end of the village. The closing date (25th March) for responding to this application will have passed by the time this issue is published, but most concerned residents have already posted their comments, which can be seen on the Vale's website under the heading of 'Planning'. Just enter the application number: P14/V2504/FUL in the search box.

To contact any members of the Parish Council, all enquiries should be directed to the Parish Clerk, David Perrow, in the first instance. David may be contacted via E-mail at draytonclerk@yahoo.co.uk or by telephone on 07909 176061, and he will ensure that any messages are passed on. Any Drayton resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents. In addition, all Parish Council minutes are now archived on the village website: www.drayton-near-abingdon.org. The latter also carries back copies of the Drayton Chronicle, information on Drayton 2020, and details of other events in the village.

The next Parish Council meeting will include the Annual Parish Assembly. This is the meeting where the Parish Council reports on its work over the previous year. It will be held in the Village Hall (Main Hall) on Monday 13th April 2015, at 7.00 pm, prior to the usual Parish Council meeting which follows at 7.30pm. Please note that, due to Easter, the date is a week later than the normal first Monday in the month. All residents of Drayton are welcome to attend both meetings.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

The problem for the poor, cash-strapped County Council is that much of the infrastructure requirement and costs resulting from all the growth going in the County falls on them. Even "New Homes Bonus" (the Government's incentive to get more building going) goes 80% to District Councils and only 20% to the County. As a result, the Districts are relatively wealthy whilst the OCC budget grows a little more desperate each year. This has meant that the infrastructure which the County must provide is getting harder and harder to fund. And this is key infrastructure around Education, Transport and Social services – all high cost items.

In Education, we have a problem of how to manage increasing pressure on our schools. Tricky decisions on "when" new classrooms, more teachers or even whole new schools are needed have to be made. Contributions from developments are supposed to generate the funding for this, but get the timing wrong, then decisions are wrong, and we wind up having to bus children (even very young children) around in an effort to find school places.

In Transport, new development is supposed to fund all the new roads and road improvements we need. Our problem is that this takes no account of the fact that many of our roads are already in a poor state from past under-funding.

It all points to the desperate need for a "Grand Plan". But we have one of these (maybe not at a national level but certainly at a local level. We call it, or called it Science Vale UK. (It now seems to have become Science Vale Oxford). We applied for, and received large amounts of government money to fund infrastructure to cope with future growth from hi-tech industries. We are due to become, if all goes well, "Silicon" or "Bio-tech" Valley UK. To get there, we will require the right amount of the right type of housing to accommodate the employees of such industry – be they PhDs, technicians or support personnel. As we generate these jobs, we will need to be building the houses at the appropriate rate. What we must not do, and, in my view, we are in danger of doing, is anything which makes this "Grand Plan" harder to achieve. It makes no sense at all,

- 1 To be filling up our little available space with more Distribution centres providing far more low pay jobs than we currently need.
- 2. To be putting ever more stress on our infrastructure and most importantly,
- 3. To be clogging up our already congested transport network such that Science Vale UK industry has no room to expand.

I hope that the next government, whoever they are, accepts this message and I hope that the next District administration, whoever they are, gets a robust Science Vale Planning strategy document in place just as quickly as possible.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

The Neighbourhood Development Plan Process – some conclusions.

It is an undeniable truth that, in the last 3 years, Drayton is the *only* large village in the whole of the District which has not been subject to speculative development – i.e. Planning applications by developers and landowners seeing the opportunity to get permission to build in places which would not normally be allowed - the opportunity given by our lack of Local Plan and a shortage of "5 year land supply".

It is also undeniable that Drayton is the only large village in the District which, for the past 3 years, has been in engaging in a "Neighbourhood Plan" - an opportunity granted under the Localism Act. This is not a co-incidence.

Many other villages are now following Drayton's example. They may find it easier and quicker. They may even find it cheaper, but they have all had to take many extra houses in places decided by developers and landowners while Drayton has not.

Now that the residents of Drayton have voted "yes" in the Referendum, the development which now happens in Drayton will be better planned, in more considered locations, and better laid out than it otherwise would have been. As a result, in my view, the village will function better, people will feel more involved, traffic will flow better, and all of us will be able to enjoy life more.

The momentous position, in which we now find ourselves, is the result of the Neighbourhood Planning process. It has been possible thanks to the hard work, over three years of many, many people together with the hard work, co-operation and engagement of our landowners and their developers and agents.

I very much hope that everyone gets the benefit they deserve. I hope that landowners, agents and developers get credit for their engagement, patience and restraint. I hope that builders get credit for the quality of the development they build. I hope that the professional planners, of VWHDC and OCC get credit for their support, encouragement and willingness to allow, for the first time, local residents to be part of the planning process. And, most of all, I hope that all of us residents, present and future, will think Drayton a much better place as a result of all the effort.

NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP (NAG5)

You've won the lottery! Or have you ...?

A lottery scam occurs when criminals pretend you've won a prize, often a lottery. Criminals will normally get in touch either by letter or e-mail and try to engage you in a dialogue. Once they've convinced you that they are 'genuine' they will ask for a fee to be paid to release your winnings. They may claim this fee is to pay taxes or duty or for a solicitor, banker or judge to authorise the transaction. No genuine lottery will ever ask for any sort of fee to be paid.

This first fee will often be small, but once they know you're willing to pay they will ask for more and more money, with everchanging excuses as to why they need it. Victims can end up losing tens of thousands of pounds over the course of months, or even years.

You may be surprised that anyone could fall prey to such a scam when they haven't entered any lotteries. Why would they have to pay money when they're supposed to have won millions? The sad truth is that these criminals are incredibly persuasive and prey on people who are very trusting. Even if you know you would not be defrauded in this way, please spread the message to family, friends and neighbours.

Prevention: If you haven't entered a lottery or prize draw <u>you</u> haven't won one.

Delete any e-mails which say you've won money or are in a position to make a fortune.

Look out for unusual behaviour in anyone you know, e.g. someone paying money via money service bureaux such as Western Union or MoneyGram, or buying Ukash vouchers.

Never discuss your bank account with strangers

Fraudsters are targeting people by 'cold calling' them on the telephone.

They will state that they are from the Bank Fraud department, the police or other law enforcement.

They will say that fraud is being carried out on the victim's bank account and, that to prevent it, the victim should do any of the following: access their bank account online, hand over their pin numbers and bank cards to a courier/official sent to collect them, hand over money to a courier/official sent to collect it or

- 1. Transfer money to a 'safe' bank account that the fraudster will provide details of.
- 2. Victims will then be told that once the call is terminated they should check the caller's credentials by telephoning the 'fraud' number they may have on the reverse of their bank card, telephone their bank or even telephone the police to check that there is an investigation.

Don't be fooled! **Do not make any more telephone calls** as the fraudster will not have terminated the call. The phone line will remain open and you will be telephoning them back without realising. They will then continue, with your assistance, to steal your money.

Protect yourself:

- Neither a bank nor the police will ever telephone you out of the blue to ask you to transfer money into another account or to ask you to hand over any money or bank cards. It's your money!
- The bank and police will never ask for personal bank account details or pin numbers over the phone.
- If you really want to check a caller's credentials go into your bank and speak to the bank manager, or use another phone to call the bank or the police.
- If you are still unsure go to a police station.
- <u>Never discuss your bank details with strangers</u> <u>who call you</u>.
