The Drayton Road from Abingdon, between the Mill Road and Ock Street junctions, will be closed for resurfacing for about 6 nights from 31 July, from 8.00 pm to 6.00 am each night. This means that drivers coming south to Drayton later in the evening will have to come via the A34 to the Milton interchange and then Steventon Hill (the route recommended by the Oxford County Council engineers) or via Culham and Sutton Courtenay. Driving into Abingdon late will also have to be done via the A34 or presumably, for family cars, via Preston Road and the bridge over the Ock to West St Helen's Street. Happy motoring!

PAYING for PRINTING


Ticket-selling agents are key

By far the largest cost incurred in producing the Chronicle is for printing the paper copies. Despite seeking competitive bids from printers using the latest technology these are still considerable. Sometime in the far future we may be able to abandon printing altogether and rely instead on the electronic copy placed on the village web-site, but that time is still far off. Too many readers don't have computers, and even those of us who do have them find a paper copy very convenient to read and for reference.

The charges we insist that all advertisers pay do cover the costs of printing their adverts and more, paying for some (but not all) of the material from village clubs and societies and from our elected representatives, for which we do not charge. The residual cost of printing that other material is covered by selling lottery tickets but their sales have fallen quite a lot over the last few years.

We're fairly sure that this is NOT because readers are unwilling to buy tickets to help keep the Chronicle going, though a few are, but because we can't find enough 'agents' who are **able and willing to sell lottery tickets as well as deliver the paper copies**.

The marked streets on this village map show where agents currently don't sell tickets - or where we have no agent at all.





If you think you know **someone who might be an agent** for one of these roads, someone who would sell tickets as well as deliver the Chronicles, can you please contact Gareth Davies (the Chronicle team leader) on 01235 529510.

If you yourself are thinking about whether you could be a Chronicle agent why don't you read Keith Clough's article (opposite), about being one, and then call Gareth? You will see that Keith, like many others in our agent team, enjoys doing it.

If you're an existing agent who doesn't feel able to sell tickets now, perhaps you would tell Gareth what, if anything, would persuade you to sell tickets as well. Would it help if we simplified the task some more and found some way of persuading more people to pay for several months at a time, or even a year? (Giving a discount on the ticket price is illegal unfortunately).

Finally, if you're one of the leaders of an organisation which uses the Chronicle to inform members and villagers about your activities, perhaps you could help us recruit more ticket-selling agents, so that we can continue to offer you the free service!

THE JOYS OF BEING AN AGENT Keith Clough

I enjoy being a Drayton Chronicle Agent.

It is a good way of keeping in touch with one's neighbours and meeting and welcoming new residents. It does not need to be too time consuming, if you apply a systematic approach to the task and get your customers organised, too!

I am now in my second stint of being an Agent. I first volunteered in the 1980s and although my 'Area' has remained the same (albeit with some additional houses and a few barn conversions), three different agent-organisations have been tried. My experiences may be of interest to other agents or to those thinking of volunteering for the task.

When I and my co-Agent decided to give up, a new Agent was found. Luckily he was a good organiser. He:

- persuaded people to subscribe for either 5 or 10 tickets each month, i.e. to pay £1 or £2.
- encouraged subscribers to pay for two or more months at a time.

Since I took on the task for the second time, two further factors have made my task simpler:

- there are no longer any counterfoils to fill in
- a number of subscribers now pay for 5 (or even 10) months at a time.

I have to keep accurate records because the subscribers cannot remember whether they are in credit or not and tend to offer me money whenever they see me - in the street, on the Millennium Green and even in Tesco and Waitrose!

My round is probably one of the Chronicle's largest. I deliver 60 *Chronicles* to 57 houses. Only 4 have opted not to participate in the lottery but 8 take 10 tickets each month. I usually go round 3 times. After the first round (when I deliver the *Chronicle* and prepaid tickets and attempt to sell ticket to those who are not in credit), I usually have fewer than 10 call-backs to make. Sometimes, I just leave the tickets and collect the contribution the following month.

The downside of the simpler procedure is that I speak to my subscribers less often – and I find meeting my neighbours the most rewarding part of the job. Perhaps they prefer to talk to me less frequently but I like to think that they want to pay for several months to save me work!

PLANNING TOMORROW

DRAYTON NDP IS MADE

The Drayton Neighbourhood Development Plan has now been 'made' by VWHDC, i.e. it is now formally part of the plan of the legally-constituted planning authority for our area, the VWHDC.

Their minutes note that:

Council considered the recommendations of Councillor Mike Murray, Cabinet member for planning policy, made on 7 July 2015 to make the Drayton and Great Coxwell neighbourhood plans part of the Development Plan for Vale of White Horse.

(The Council) RESOLVED: to

1. make the Drayton Neighbourhood Plan part of the Development Plan for Vale of White Horse;

2. make the Great Coxwell Neighbourhood Plan part of the Development Plan for Vale of White Horse.

DRAYTON 2020 UPDATE Richard Williams

As explained in the May issue of the Chronicle, an Implementation Committee has now been formed to continue the work of the NDP Steering Group, post-referendum. The committee aims to move forward on various community projects which formed part of the NDP - Drayton's Neighbourhood Development Plan. Not everything can be accomplished at once, and there is sufficient work ahead to keep us occupied for a long time to come. However, early priorities must include the proposed new sports pavilion and sports facilities at the Barrow Rd site; playground facilities at all three housing sites in the NDP, plus the existing play area at Lockway; and a replacement home for the pre-school, whose present terrapin classroom is inadequate and in poor condition, with a leaking roof. Also on the agenda are a major refurbishment of the Village Hall, the new Village Green at the Manor Farm site, tree planting, generally enhancing our open spaces and adding to biodiversity, upgrading of the main footpath network around the village, and increasing the number of allotments.

To maintain continuity with the work of the NDP Steering Group, as well as momentum, four out of the seven voting members of the new committee have been involved with Drayton 2020 since its inception, although there are three new members (2 of them new parish councillors) who have not. Even so, many more people contributed to the NDP than just the Steering Group up to around 30 residents, who participated in one or other of the 5 working groups (Housing, Sustainability, Transport, Look and Feel, Work and Play) set up to report back to the Steering Group. We hope to open out the implementation process in a similar way by setting up a number of project groups. Anyone at all who has an interest in one of the NDP projects, but especially anyone who has relevant background experience or qualifications, is invited to get in touch with the committee, initially by contacting the Parish Clerk (details below). The Implementation Committee itself has deliberately been kept small in terms of voting members (seven) as its role is primarily one of organisation and co-ordination, a task which becomes more difficult if numbers expand. However, there is no reason why additional non-voting members should not be appointed if they have a specific skill that would enable them to assist or advise the committee (accountants and architects particularly welcome!).

Mainly though, we are looking for people to participate in (or lead) project groups which will research and come up with proposals for advancing the projects in the NDP. These groups (or sub-committees) will then report back to the main committee at its meetings. The latter are likely to be on a Friday evening, 7-9pm (same as the Steering Group), but monthly rather than fortnightly. The groups will arrange their own meetings and agendas in between times. Although 'qualifications' have been mentioned, and are always useful, the most important factors we are looking for, by far, are an interest in the life of Drayton's village community, and a degree of spare capacity that allows you enough time to get involved. No one person should find themselves doing anything too arduous, but there is certainly work to be done.

GARD

Many local people have been under the impression that the threat of the massive Thames Water reservoir on our doorstep (The Upper Thames Reservoir proposal) had disappeared following the success of GARD and others in 2010 Public Inquiry.

There was therefore some surprise expressed by those who visited the Parish Council Tent at the Steventon Church Fete when they saw that, on the Vale of the White Horse map of possible building development options, the whole of the proposed reservoir site remains reserved for the possible reservoir. Added to this there was a leading article in the "New Civil Engineer" on water shortages written by the editor which stated "I know for a fact that Thames Water will be soon be ramping up its case for building a major new reservoir in Abingdon, Oxfordshire." He goes on to say more encouragingly "But is there another option? Long distance water transfer tunnels have been mooted before. Do we need to look at that again?"

GARD is certainly pressing Thames Water hard to follow up comprehensively the water transfer Severn to Thames alternatives, supported by offers of additional water from either Severn Trent or United Utilities. The necessary research on water quality and ecology is being done, albeit slowly, and GARD remains hopeful that this less expensive, less damaging, and sensible option will win in the end. No decision is likely until 2018, meanwhile GARD is represented at all the important Thames Water technical meetings.

Torrent Locker Alert

A scam e-mail claiming to be from British Gas or the Ministry of Justice is currently being sent to victims. The attachment (a document or a link) leads to the Torrent Locker ransom-ware.

This malware encrypts files on the victim's system and requests a ransom be paid in order for the files to be decrypted. One reported amount has been £330 worth of Bitcoins.

Protect yourself online:

If you receive an e-mail that you are suspicious about do not follow any links or open attachments until you can verify that the e-mail is genuine. To do this phone the organisation that sent the e-mail, sourcing the number independently rather than using any numbers supplied in the e-mail. If you believe the e-mail to be fake you should report it to your e-mail provider as spam.

Ensure your anti-virus software is up to date. This will help reduce the chance that a virus is downloaded. Anti-virus software is constantly being updated and may not stop all viruses, particularly if they are new or have been adapted.

If you have opened an attachment or followed a link which you believe to be suspicious you should run your anti-virus and/or take your machine to a reputable company to have it cleaned.

In cases where files have been encrypted it can be very difficult to retrieve them, and in most cases they will be lost. Files should always be backed up on a separate device or using cloud storage to ensure they are not lost. Please remember that if a device is connected to an infected machine those files could also be encrypted with the virus, so ensure they are kept separate.

Rules for Cyclists:

The following extracts are taken from the Highway Code, Rules for Cyclists (59 to 82). Full details can be found in printed copies of the Highway Code or online by visiting https://www.gov.uk/rules-for-cyclists-59-to-82.

- You MUST NOT cycle on a pavement. Laws HA 1835 sect 72 & R(S)A 1984, sect 129
- You MUST obey all traffic signs and traffic light signals. Laws RTA 1988 sect 36 & TSRGD reg 10(1)
- You **MUST NOT** cross the stop line when the traffic lights are red. Some junctions have an advanced stop line to enable you to wait and position yourself ahead of other traffic (see Rule 178).

Laws RTA 1988 sect 36 & TSRGD regs 10 & 36(1)

• At night your cycle MUST have white front and red rear lights lit. It MUST also be fitted with a red rear reflector (and amber pedal reflectors, if manufactured after 1/10/85). White front reflectors and spoke reflectors will also help you to be seen. Flashing lights are permitted but it is recommended that cyclists who are riding in areas without street lighting use a steady front lamp. Law RVLR regs 13, 18 & 24

Cyclists who, understandably enough, have safety concerns about using the road at Sutton and Culham Bridges, or who have concerns about getting through the lights, could dismount and walk on the footpath with their bicycles.

PARISH COUNCIL Richard Williams

Report of the Meeting held on Monday 6th July 2015.



The July meeting was attended by five members of the public as well as the councillors. Although one of the five was only a few weeks old, he showed that it's never too early to get involved in the democratic process! Peter Coville reminded the PC about the educational charity ACCESS he has helped to set up Drayton. ACCESS stands in for 'Abingdon Centre for а Caring, Enlightened and Sustainable Society' and

Peter has organized a number of events (roughly one a month) framed around important topical subjects, such as the future of the NHS, the economy, housing, and so on. The format could best be described as part seminar, part debate, with plenty of opportunity for group discussion. Several of the speakers so far have been nationally known authorities in their field, so that Peter's initiative, and success in luring them to a relatively small place like Drayton, is doubly commendable, and, I believe, well worth supporting. Tickets are free (though donations are welcome) and available online. Details of how to book, times and venue, are usually posted in local shops and various noticeboards in Drayton. The title of the next event is 'Orwell Today': a discussion about the life and writings of George Orwell, with talks spread over 2 days, the weekend of 1st/2nd August. There's also a visit to Orwell's grave, which is 2 miles up the road in Sutton Courtenay.

Richard Seamark enquired whether the PC would fund, or contribute towards, the cost of a new lawnmower for the football club. No commitment was made to a specific sum, but it was felt that, as a number of other local activities and organizations are supported by grants from the PC, there was no reason in principle why similar support should not be given to Drayton FC. The football club has certainly been helped out financially by the PC in the past, but usually on an ad hoc basis, as and when requested by the club committee. The PC said it would consider a lawnmower grant, but undertook also to look at alternative ways of assisting the club, possibly on a more regular basis.


Whilst on this subject, it is worth pointing out that the range of grants made by the PC in recent years is quite large, the only stipulation being that the organization must offer a proven benefit to Drayton residents in some way. For example, DAMASCUS, which is a youth project serving Drayton and its neighbouring villages, is supported by grants from a number of sources, including from the parish councils of each of those villages, but Drayton PC alone contributes £3000 each year to DAMASCUS. The Village Hall is another regular recipient of large sums to cover refurbishment projects of one kind or another. Smaller grants have been made to bodies such as the Air Ambulance, Abingdon Citizens Advice Bureau (often used by Drayton residents) and many others. To apply for a grant is fairly straightforward. It involves filling out a simple form with some essential details about the purpose and scope of the organization involved. If you represent a suitable organization or project, please feel encouraged to apply, as in the last year or so, the number of applications received seems to have dropped off. Incidentally, a village litter pick was carried out on July 13th by youngsters from the DAMASCUS project, assisted by some of the parish councillors (!) This event, hopefully to be repeated at regular intervals in the future, is described elsewhere in the issue.

It was agreed that a couple of new notice boards should be installed in Drayton, one at Sutton Wick, close to the post box and pond, and one south of the A34 bridge, alongside the bus stop on the west side of Steventon Road. Modern communications and the Internet notwithstanding, there still seems to be something rather reassuring about an actual physical notice board which helps to make people feel part of a community. The northern and southern extremities of the village have hitherto been somewhat neglected in this respect, so in a small way we have now attempted to make them feel more 'included'.

The Vale planning meeting on June 10th in Wantage was discussed and it was noted that the Barrow Rd housing site from Drayton's Neighbourhood Plan had been approved by the Vale Planning Committee. One of the Parish Councillors and Daniel Scharf pointed out however that the Vale's decision has not yet been formally ratified, and the Vale website acknowledges this. Daniel Scharf again registered a number of objections that he continued to make to this site (he had previously spoken at the Wantage meeting) and informed the PC that he had written to the Vale challenging their decision on the planning application. Richard Williams added that Drayton Parish Council's own 8 page response to the Barrow Rd planning application could still be read, also on the Vale's website, and that it addressed many of the points raised by Daniel, although obviously not to his satisfaction.

Any Drayton resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents. In addition, all Parish Council minutes are now archived on the village website (see above). The latter also carries back copies of the Drayton Chronicle, the latest information on Drayton 2020, and details of other events in the village.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 3rd August 2015, at 7.30pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre in Gravel Lane. As ever, all are welcome to attend.

The Vale of the White Horse District Council has a legal obligation to cooperate with neighbouring councils to ensure that regional housing targets are met. In practice, a consequence of this requirement is that this area may need to accept additional housing because neighbouring councils claim they cannot accommodate more housing units.



Oxford City Council's inability to meet projected housing needs has

resulted in mounting pressure for this district to take even more housing, over and above the large housing target already being tackled by the Vale.

At the last full meeting of the council I supported a successful motion which called on Oxford City Council to review its own Local Plan to ensure that it maximises the use of land within their City boundaries. This should happen before looking to rural districts to take the strain.

The motion recognised the need to cooperate with other Councils and set out the way in which it intends to tackle what is known as Oxford's 'unmet need', including proper public consultation on the options available.

Here in the Drayton, as with the wider Vale, we have faced the tough reality of future housing needs with realism and determination. Continued opposite ⇔

COUNTY COUNCIL

This is an appeal to all residents for understanding of the very difficult position in which County Officers (not to mention Councillors!) find themselves.

The age of austerity has not been even handed with local government. Cuts in government grants have hit all councils, but the New Homes Bonus (the grant awarded to councils for every house they allow to be built) has been split 80% to Districts and



only 20% to Counties. Unfortunately, the bulk of the expensive infrastructure that the new houses need (roads, schools and social services) fall on the County Council budget. This imbalance has led to increasingly wealthy District Councils and increasingly cash-strapped County Councils.

Few of us involved in local government thought that the only decisions we would be making were "What should we cut next to balance the books?". Local government officers have to face often angry and frustrated residents with the only answer they can give – "I'm sorry, we would love to do x and y, but we have no budget for it".

Adjusting the New Homes Bonus split (to say 50:50) would allow the County to save many services - roads, buses, children's centres and so on - services which are at the moment under threat. It would not involve asking government for more money - the money is already there. At the Council meeting on Tuesday 14th July, I proposed a motion calling on Central Government to take another look at the way New Homes Bonus is apportioned between Councils. I am delighted to say that it was past unanimously, gaining full support even from those councillors who were also District Councillors. No-one wants Districts to be under the same strain as Counties, but until the split is more fairly apportioned, we will be in danger of having superb Leisure Centres with gold-plated taps (District responsibilities) which noone can get to through the potholes and lack of bus services (County responsibilities). We all now need to persuade our MPs to take the message to Westminster before we lose any more vital services in the next budget round.

Despite recent tragic events in Tunisia and economic uncertainty in the Eurozone, many of us are thinking of traveling overseas for some guaranteed summer sunshine.

If you are planning a family holiday abroad this summer please do double check that your passports and EHIC cards are up to date. The government has tightened up border controls and strengthened child protection. This is of

course welcome, but it does mean that it is no longer possible to renew a child's passport at the last minute using the "same day appointment" system.

Please also remember that the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) is **not** a replacement for full travel insurance. It can be used in state-run hospitals in cases where immediate treatment is necessary across the EU. Do make sure you check out the details of the country you are visiting as it can be advisable to have a comprehensive plan as well. You do not need to pay for an EHIC card and information is available online at https://www.ehic.org.uk or by calling 0300 3301350.

I am also very pleased that overseas roaming charges – which make it expensive to use a mobile phone when abroad – will be abolished in two years' time in Europe. This welcome change will be preceded by a 14-month interim period in which companies can still add surcharges but at a reduced rate. It is estimated that roaming in the EU will be 75% cheaper during the interim period.

This month's postbag has been dominated by insecticides and bees, and in particular calls for restrictions on neonicotinoids. Bees and other pollinators play a vital role in the security of our food supply and the quality of our natural environment. In this constituency, Rowes Honey based in Wallingford is one of the largest producers of honey for our tables, and recently sponsored an important event on bee-keeping hosted by the BBC presenter Martha Kearney. I am pleased the Government has done considerable work over the last few years to understand and protect them, most recently through the National Pollinator Strategy. I have been assured that my Ministerial colleagues are keeping evidence on neonicotinoids under close, open-minded scrutiny and will restrict their usage if the evidence shows the need to do so.


