## ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY and PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Richard Williams

The Annual Parish Assembly was held on Monday 4th April and was followed by the Parish Council meeting.

#### **Annual Parish Assembly**

The Chairman and sub-committee chairs reported on events of the previous year. Amongst the items recorded, it was noted that the Parish Council:

- maintained a full complement of 11 councillors throughout the year 2015/16
- created a Drayton 2020 Implementation Committee and appointed Nigel Porter as Implementation Director
- considered 40 planning applications, including major developments at Barrow Rd (Walnut Meadow) and South of High St
- objected to planning applications at Halls Close (28 houses) and Eastway (8 houses)
- gave grants totalling £8960 to five Drayton and four other local organizations
- planned and ordered the Phase 2 upgrade of the Lockway playground
- authorised new Sutton Wick Lane air crash memorial, unveiled on 5th March 2016
- authorized Blue Plaque to Rev F E Robinson (bell-ringer) to be unveiled on 22nd May 2016
- maintained village footpaths, burial ground and allotments, and cleared litter
- assessed village trees for safety and pruned them
- provided a new notice board along Steventon Rd, south of the A34 bridge
- cut grass throughout summer months; awarded new 3 year grass contract

Other reports were given on various village activities by Tom Shebbeare (Implementation Committee); Roxy Elford and Gary Hibbins (DAMASCUS Project); Keith Clough (Millennium Green Trust); Ann Webb (Village Hall); Andrew Bax (Drayton Community Trust); Daniel Scharf (Drayton Diners and ACCESS) and Shirley Thomas (Caudwell Day Centre).

Stuart Davenport, our Vale councillor, gave an update on district matters, particularly the various proposals now being discussed for local government reorganization.

#### **Parish Council Meeting**

It was noted that the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations are in June and communities have been asked to notify the Vale of any special events they have planned. Drayton School are holding a summer fete on 12th June, the theme of which will be 'Kings and Queens'. Any ideas for or assistance on the day with stalls would be gratefully received.

A number of issues regarding drainage on the Barrow Rd housing site have arisen, and our Implementation Director has been liaising with Miller Homes to try to resolve them. Nigel is a civil engineer with considerable expertise in site construction and associated drainage problems. Hopefully, he can put his experience to good use in this area.

Both the Halls Close and Eastway sites have put in second applications for planning permission. Neither of these

applications differs significantly (if at all) from the original, so it was not felt necessary to hold additional planning meetings to discuss them, but both will be objected to by the Planning Committee, as before.

David may be contacted via E-mail at draytonclerk@yahoo.co.uk or by telephone on 07909 176061, and he will ensure that any messages are passed on. Drayton residents may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents.

The website also carries back copies of the Drayton Chronicle, information on the latest activities of the Drayton 2020 Implementation Committee, and details of other events in the village.

The next Parish Council meeting will be the AGM, at which office-holders must be re-elected. Please note this meeting will be held on Monday 9th May 2016, at 7.30 pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre in Gravel Lane. This is a week later than usual due to the first Monday of the month being the May Bank Holiday. As ever, all are welcome to attend.

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## **ALL AROUND**

#### HALL REPORT 2015/16 Ann Webb

We have had a very busy and constructive two years. At a meeting held in 2014 a committee member remarked that his caterer had said the cooker was not very good these days. After we had recovered from the shock, we realised that the cooker was probably over 30 years old and not treated with much respect over the years. On closer inspection there were a few things that needed attention in the kitchen, it was looking tired after forty years of loyal but hard treatment it had stood up well. At the next meeting it was decided to replace about 80% of the kitchen cupboards and all the equipment, plus retiling the walls and renewing the floor covering.

We had received a grant from the Corneville Trust to start with, which meant we could replace the cooker and the fridge, install them and get them working. We also received grants from WREN. OCC. and the Parish Council plus donations from the regular hall users which meant we could install a really nice kitchen.

The work was scheduled to begin during half term week 2014, and the kitchen was stripped ready for the event. It did take longer than we had planned, getting all the trades together when they needed to come in and complete the necessary fixings was an art, as well as keeping the hall up and running at the same time. This required a great deal of co-operation between users and hirers for quite a long time. We had a deadline given for a function at the end of March 2015, 5 months after we began all 2,500 items of crockery, cutlery and various other notices, accessories, fitments and users cupboards were all back in their place and ready to go. The end result is a stunning kitchen, we hope we have achieved what we set out to do, replace a well used kitchen with a beautiful new one.

When we had paid all the bills and taken a deep breath we decided the next things on the agenda were the windows and the three fire doors in the large hall.

They were metal framed windows and very prone to mildew from condensation. The doors were very hard to shut from weather damage. So Tony Holmes fired up his computer again and began searching for grants to do the work. We obtained enough in grants to do the replacements which took place at the end of last year. We have removed the window guards to allow the fitting of the new windows, also from the lounge windows at the front of the building as well. I say this with fingers crossed, "we haven't had any damage to the building for some considerable time." We are extremely grateful for this, we still suffer the occasional theft and small damage to the interior but on the whole quite good.

Our next project is to replace the front doors, purchase a portable wireless P A system and if there is enough left, fit the final piece in the kitchen, a commercial dish washer.

The hall remains very busy with most weekdays booked on a regular basis. Weekends are favoured for children's parties, weddings and family celebrations. We have several dog clubs that hold shows at the Hall because we are centrally placed in southern England. The bar is now up and running very well and the Hall receives a small income from it. In May last year the committee raised a mug of tea and cut a cake to celebrate the Hall's 40th birthday. Heres to the next forty years.

#### **Drayton Women's Institute 95 years**

(Editor's note: although the December date of the 95th anniversary of Drayton's WI is past, this long history makes interesting reading)

Drayton W I was founded 95 years ago on Dec 2nd 1920. The first meeting was held in the Wesleyan Chapel in Church Lane under the auspices of Lady Rucker, the Voluntary County Organiser for this area of Berkshire. During this meeting a committee was formed and Mrs Hobson elected the first president. Prices were set, annual fee 2/-, the mode of new member entry was agreed and tea 11/2d or 2d a cup. At this meeting it was suggested that maybe we should meet at the Y M C A in the Lodge in the High Street, because the Wesleyan Chapel was thought not appropriate for Ladies to meet. The Red Triangle Club made their Lodge available and the venue was decided. The committee met with the men from the Lodge to discuss the fees for usage, a sum of five shillings was stated and the ladies accepted this, but felt that another venue should be sought for the next meeting as the fees seemed quite high, and returning to the Chapel was ruled out as inappropriate. The school was chosen but members soon found it 'tiresome' having to rearrange the desks for each meeting.

The first event of 1921 was a jumble sale which made £7; this was probably the beginning of the building fund towards a Hall of our own. On June 18th a piece of land was gifted to the group by A T Lloyd of Lockinge. The land was opposite the church, and large enough for a good size 'hut'. By October a hut had been found, inspected, found suitable and purchased. The hut cost £130 plus a further £100 to remove and re-erect it on the site. Many events followed to raise the money for the purchase and erection of the building. Folk dancing classes, infant clothes and food sales and tennis tournaments were held and a choral society was formed, all these to raise funds.

In our first year, a member made us our first banner from some material she had. The completed banner won the competition at the first group meeting. At each meeting we held a competition for members to show their skills. Here are a few examples, a cake costing no more than a shilling, best use for a pair of old stockings and best dinner costing no more than 1/-.to include a pudding, pepper and salt.

In January 1922 we were given the keys to our hall, there followed days of wallpapering, painting, distempering, scrubbing and cleaning ready for the first event, a party for over 65s in February. The hall's official opening was June 22nd by Hon. Lois Greville. There followed a fete in the Grange, and a concert and dance in the evening. The hall now officially open, fund raising began in earnest. Tennis tournaments, gymkhanas, dances, and concerts were held as well as other village events. Coke for the stoves and oil for the lamps together with cleaning and fitting out the new hall was a constant drain on funds. Electricity was installed, by the father of a young member, who found it very dark in the winter to attend the meetings.

This carried on until the outbreak of the war in 1939, membership dropped away because of other commitments, some speakers were unavailable, and working parties ceased through lack of materials. In August Miss Hope brought a canning machine to the hall and showed the ladies how to use it. 200lbs of plums were canned in one day, we hoped to be more organised for next year. In September 1940 the hall was requisitioned for use as an emergency reception centre for the arrival of refugees from Canterbury. They were welcomed, fed and billeted, by the WVS and the WI; following this, Berks Education Committee requisitioned the hall to use as a school room for the evacuee children billeted in the village. The hall was also used by the Home guard for meetings, but they weren't happy with all the desks piled up, they thought them 'unsafe'.

After the war when things got a little easier to obtain, the hall was redecorated and new curtains hung, all done by members and friends. In the winter 1962/63 we had one of the worst winters in living memory, meetings were seriously disrupted during the bad

weather. During this year one of our members was elected County Chairman for Berkshire, this was a great honour for her and for us.

The years went on, a relentless round of fund raising to keep the hall to an acceptable standard. The coke stoves replaced by oil heaters, and the Elsan toilets removed and new flush toilets installed. Many events were held in the hall, weddings, parties, dinners, produce shows and plays. It became increasingly clear that something had to be done. In 1965, there was suggestion made by the Charity Commission that we should approach the Parish Council and that the Hall should become a village hall, mainly because the costs were spiralling as the hall got older and rules more stringent for public buildings. It was becoming a great burden. Half of the land had already been sold for upkeep costs.

This was also our Golden Jubilee year and a scrapbook was made, by members, of the village people, the fashion, the industries and any items of relevant local news. We still have the scrapbook and it is fascinating to look back on those times.

Members of the Parish Council and any interested bodies, met together and formed the 'The Drayton Amenities Society'. Primarily to discuss the future of the hall, but other events were also organised by this group, including the Hall News (now the Chronicle), several village events, and the monthly raffle. The position became more urgent in 1967 when a 7 year inspection threw up many things that needed attention to keep the hall up to the expected standard to qualify for the Performing Rights Licence. After many letters going to and fro between the Society, the Solicitors and the W I, the Hall was finally signed over to the village in 1969. Certain usage privileges for us were agreed.

We arranged a meeting, in 1970, for several groups to join us and watch a postal film and talk, but sadly there was a postal strike, so the programme didn't arrive and the meeting contents hastily reorganised. The next disruption to our programme was the miners' strike and the rotational power cuts, who remembers them? The relentless search for candles, that became increasingly expensive as the strike went on.

The years that followed were exciting. Plans for the 'New Hall' were being developed for viewing. The hall was built and opened in 1975, what an amazing achievement for the villagers and the Amenities Society. Over the years we have run various events, Table Top sales, jumble sales, our Grow Cook and Sew produce Show that ran for many years, and more recently the Wit and Wisdom Quiz now in its 22nd year. We moved our meeting to the Day Centre a few years ago, this freed up the hall for a group to use the space on a more regular basis with no interruptions and more funds for the Village Hall. We have now reached 95 years of continuous meetings. We are now a small group, but a very friendly and loyal group, over the years many long lasting friendships have been made. Long may we continue.

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# WESTMINSTER LETTER Ed Vaizey

During March I met with the Environment Agency to discuss their work across the constituency. An area of concern was that only 59% of the 1,578 properties at risk of flooding from rivers were registered to receive their Flood Warnings Direct service. The service is the Environment Agency's free 24 hour warning service for properties at risk of flooding from main rivers. You can find out if your property is at risk and sign up for the service http://tinyurl.com/EAPrepareforflood.

The Environment Agency also offers support for community groups. For example, they can host a workshop if you want to know more about maintaining watercourses (they recently held one in Charney Bassett). The Environment Agency is keen to meet landowner or community groups, and if you would like to arrange a meeting their Operations Manager Peter Collins can be contacted at peter.collins@environment-agency.gov.uk.

Last month I also launched the Government's white paper for culture, the first in more than 50 years. It is the latest contribution to our approach to public support for art and culture. The white paper seeks to spread the gifts of our arts, heritage and culture to more people, and communities across the country and abroad and free the creative genius that can make a better world for all. 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#### Drayton2020 Neighbourhood Plan Update May 2016

- Sports Pitches and Pavilion. A Sports Needs Questionnaire for people/families in the village to complete will be available in May and will be advertised on the village website, via the email list and Families in Drayton Facebook page, and in the next Chronicle. It is intended to be filled in mainly online, but printed copies will be available for those who cannot complete it using a computer. Once the results are available a report will be produced for us by the Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association (OPFA) to assist in designing the sports facilities at Barrow Road and elsewhere in the village. An architect is now being briefed on the Barrow Road pavilion design, and once we have the questionnaire results the design will be finalised and costed, and planning permission sought from VWHDC. Advice on the layout of the playing fields is also now being sought from contractors.
- Funding. A generous donation of £90,000 towards the Barrow Road sports pavilion has been received from Paul Caudwell of Caudwell and Sons
- Barrow Road/Walnut Meadow. Work on the site is progressing at a pace, as you can see. Peter Penycate, the Miller Homes Site Manager, is now on site full time and is liaising with Nigel Porter, the Drayton2020 Implementation Director to deal with day to day issues as they arise.
- South of High Street Site. No further news yet. Planning permission for 140 houses has now been granted by VWHDC. Work on site is expected to begin in late summer/early Autumn.
- Manor Farm. Drayton2020 representatives have now had an initial meeting with CALA Homes, who have acquired the site from the Earl of Plymouth, to discuss their plans and timescales. CALA are using Strutt and Parker as their agents
- **Playgrounds**. The Lockway playground refurbishment design has now been agreed and work is expected to begin in late May and take a couple of weeks to complete
- Pre-School. Architects are now being approached for designs and funds are being sought from grants to fund this preparatory work
- Cycle ways through Drayton. A meeting has been held with OCC planners in charge of the Oxfordshire cycle network. Their preference is for cycle ways through Drayton to follow the main roads to link Abingdon/Steventon/Sutton Courtenay and through to Milton and the Science Vale. These will be made safe through the traffic calming scheme slowing traffic in the village and using the 'shared space' concept within the village. At the meeting attention was drawn to the unsatisfactory nature of the currently designated cycle path from Drayton to Abingdon, and the fact that this in not a safe cycle route for school children.

SmartWater kits and Personal Safety Packs are available to Vale residents from the police.

SmartWater is a brand of forensic marking fluid containing millions of microscopic particles that make up an individual property identification code. The liquid is invisible to the naked eye, but glows green under UV light. It can be painted onto valuable items such as lap tops, televisions, MP3 players and antiques. If marked items are stolen, and later seized by police, the markings can be checked and the items linked with and returned to their owners through the SmartWater individual identification code.

The South and Vale Community Safety Partnership have provided funding for the provision of ultra violet lanterns to detect items that have been marked with SmartWater, ultra violet pens or other forensic marking products. These lanterns are being used across the area by Neighbourhood Policing Teams and other crime teams during stop checks, when carrying out warrants and on regular checks on local scrap yards and in various other instances.

The Local Police Area can supply SmartWater kits at a greatly reduced, one-off, cost of £15 per kit, with no annual fee. The normal retail price for such kits is £60 plus an annual fee of £60. #### **Personal Safety Packs**

Priced at £4, each pack contains the following items:

Personal defender alarm torch - the alarm reaches 130dBs, is key-ring activated and has an LED torch. It's a really great way to help users feel safer when out and about.

Purse bell – alerts an owner that someone may be trying to remove their purse from their bag, since the bell will 'ring' as soon as the purse is moved.

UV property marking pen – can be used to property-mark smaller electrical items.


