PARISH COUNCIL REPORT Richard Williams

Report of the Parish Council meeting held on Mon 7th August 2017.

The meeting was dominated by discussion on two topics. The first was raised by a member of the public attending, who suggested that the new sports facilities and pavilion planned for the Walnut Meadow site would be better located in the field to the rear of Lockway. He believed that this field, owned by the Earl of Plymouth Estates, was more suitable as it is closer to the current football ground and the Village Hall. The Lockway field was, for a short time in 2011, offered to the Parish Council for this purpose, as part of a deal regarding access to the original Manor Farm development of approx. 16 'executive' homes. Although planning permission for the latter was granted in 1998, the project was never progressed.

It was pointed out that when the Vale's previous Local Plan expired at the end of 2011, the Earl of Plymouth abruptly withdrew the offer of the Lockway field, as changes in government policy opened up the possibility of using the site for new housing. Although Drayton's Neighbourhood Development Plan has ruled out most of the sites bordering the A34 as being unsuitable for housing on noise grounds, the Earl of Plymouth Estates have shown no interest in renewing their offer of 2011. Besides which, the residents of Lockway declared that they were adamantly opposed to the use of this field for recreational purposes. Indeed, when the offer was first made, they attended a Parish Council meeting in numbers to make their opposition abundantly clear.

In any case, the sports facilities and pavilion at Walnut Meadow formed an integral part of the Neighbourhood Plan, and were voted for by Drayton residents in the referendum. The noise levels at the Lockway field, where the A34 is in elevated section, are extremely intrusive and would not provide a pleasant environment for players or spectators. Walnut Meadow is much quieter as the A34 at this point is further away, and in a cutting. To be clear, the Parish Council is wholly committed to the NDP, and the Drayton 2020 Implementation Committee is not looking for alternative sites for the new sports facilities.

The second discussion was on a closely linked subject, namely the financial viability of the sports pavilion. Councillor Colin West has worked hard to develop a business plan for the pavilion, which he proceeded to illustrate in a presentation, using different financial models to show how the figures might work out. It was emphasized that these models were only examples of what is possible. The presentation was informed by several visits that the Parish Clerk, Colin and other councillors have recently made to neighbouring villages to see how they operate their sports facilities. Drayton PC is confident it already has in place the necessary financial arrangements to cover the pavilion's basic running costs. What is less certain is the best way to generate additional revenue for the future, and investigation into this area is ongoing.

Some years ago, a Drayton Village leaflet was produced, containing useful information, contact phone numbers etc. for local businesses, and other organisations, activities and clubs. The leaflet is updated from time to time, and although available to consult or download on the village website, it was felt it would be a welcoming gesture to print some copies to be delivered direct to new residents, e.g. those who've recently moved into Walnut Meadow. However, as changes are being mooted to the Chronicle

(see last issue), an alternative suggestion was made that the info in the leaflet be put into the Chronicle as a pull-out supplement, not just as a one-off, but on a continuing basis. The PC is prepared to contribute to any additional funding required.

INTEREST RATE UP?

Not the Bank Of England interest rate, but interest in the Chronicle.

If there was a lot of response and we only published one a month, you might find that your club's article doesn't come up for a year or two, in which case we could up the rate and have two or more clubs of the month. This sort of article would be good publicity for your club, very important now that we have a lot of new Drayton residents.

Other interesting articles for the Chronicle could include gardening tips or advice, recipes or cooking tips. A few years ago we did have regular recipes submitted to the Chronicle and more than one gardening column. The scope for articles of local interest is not limited to those topics. Over the years we have had articles on Drayton's history or the background of various buildings but it might be useful to renew some of these, once again, they may be of interest to our new residents

A lot of information is now shared on digital media e.g. Facebook but a lot of people do not have access to computers or Facebook, in any case, it is nice to sit with a cuppa and read your "real" Chronicle.

DAMASCUS LETTER

From the DAMASCUS Ministry Team



St Peter's, Drayton St Peter & St Paul, Appleford St Blaise, Milton All Saints', Sutton Courtenay St Michael and All Angels, Steventon

On 1st July 2017 the five ecclesiastical parishes of Drayton, Appleford, Milton, Sutton Courtenay and Steventon became a single parish and this historical moment was marked with a special service of celebration on Sunday 30th July at St Blaise Church, Milton. The service was



conducted by the Right Reverend Colin Fletcher, the Bishop of Dorchester and the preacher was the Venerable Judy French, Archdeacon of Dorchester. During the service the re-ordering work at St Blaise was dedicated; the Reverend Helen Kendrick installed as Rector of the DAMASCUS Parish; the Reverend Rosie Bruce licensed to the new parish; The Reverend Dr Karen Hyde welcomed as the new Assistant Curate and the ministry team recommissioned to work in the single parish, across all five villages. This was followed by a splendid lunch prepared by the congregation of St Blaise. This is a challenging time for the church as we adapt to a new way of working but it is very exciting as we join closer together across our villages. We are committed to be a living Christian presence at the heart of our communities: nurturing faith, bringing hope and sharing love.

And to help in this endeavour it is good to be able to introduce the Reverend Dr Karen Hyde as she joins us as Assistant Curate of the DAMASCUS Parish: Karen writes, "Studying biochemistry led to a research career in molecular genetics in Oxford where I met my husband Jonathan. He works for the National Nuclear Laboratory and we live in Radley. We're blessed with four wonderful teenagers (aged 14-19) - the eldest, Oliver, is studying physics at Portsmouth University but you're more likely to see him in the bell towers as he's a ringer! The girls are all at school in Abingdon: this coming academic year Vanessa will take 'A' levels and Heather GCSE's, whilst Juliet will begin her GCSE subjects. Their passion is dance in various combinations through ballet, modern, tap and street! I enjoy walking, gardening and playing saxophone, but my love of wine evolved into a passion for teaching others through wine appreciation courses which I ran in Oxford between 2001-2012 as Wine-Matters, before being called to explore ordained ministry. I've just finished 3 years of training on the Oxford Ministry Course at Ripon College, Cuddesdon and was ordained deacon on 1 July 2017 in a wonderful service at Christ Church Cathedral - many thanks to those of you who came and supported me! I'll be working part-time with Helen during my curacy, so as another exciting chapter begins, I'm really looking forward to getting to know you, the people and Parish of DAMASCUS."

WESTMINSTER LETTER Ed Vaizey

Regarding the A34, as many of you will know, I initially brought the issue to Parliament by securing a Westminster Hall debate last October. This resulted in a commitment from the Roads Minister to commission a safety review. This was followed in November by the Chancellor confirming £50 million for the area as part of the 2015-20 Road Investment Strategy.

Highways England presented a first draft of the safety review in April this year. While statistically this proved that the A34 was no more dangerous than other roads, it did acknowledge the particular issues on the stretch by East Ilsley. It also recognised the huge economic impact caused by hold ups and collisions, given the increasing importance of the road as a major north-south transport link.

Additionally, I am pleased that last month Communities Secretary Sajid Javid pledged more than £9 million of Government funding to a major upgrade to the A34. Two new south-facing slip roads at the Lodge Hill Interchange will help end years of congestion and pave the way for up to 1,700 new homes in Abingdon. Oxfordshire MPs will now meet with Highways England in the coming weeks on completion of the safety review and I look forward to working with stakeholders to implement the results.

Last month, I also began a campaign to urge the government to retain our membership of Euratom after we leave the European Union. Euratom is a sixty year old treaty that allows the UK to trade freely with its European partners in the nuclear industry. It's vital for our local area, as hundreds of millions of pounds, and many thousands of jobs, are centred around Culham, the home of nuclear fusion research.

Since the start of the campaign, this issue has grown in prominence. I am pleased that the case for remaining in Euratom is increasingly gaining support from across parties and from prominent voices outside of Westminster too. Retaining membership will best serve the national interest – as has been unequivocally stated by representatives of the UK nuclear industry – and I hope that ministers are listening to the genuine concerns being raised.


In other news, I am pleased to hear that Oxfordshire County Council placed third in the country for tackling anti-LGBT bullying in schools in Stonewall's 'Education Equality Index 2017'. The council has developed nationally recognised strategies to tackle anti-LGBT bullying and has a huge array of online resources and guidance for schools and young people. Stonewall – Britain's foremost lesbian, gay, bi and trans equality charity – paid tribute to the progress made in our local area and I am proud that our schools are at the forefront of addressing this issue.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

Air Quality / Traffic and Infrastructure

Whether or not you live in Appleford, Milton, Sutton Courtenay, Drayton, Marcham or Shippon, you will be aware of and affected by the number of housing developments in our area. The expansion of Didcot and Abingdon and the threat of coalescence of our villages are going to affect us all, if it has not done so already.

Most of us accept that the country needs more houses and that our part of Oxfordshire, with its high employment and thriving economy, is an obvious prime target if houses are to be close to jobs.

Unfortunately, in the keenness (some might say desperation) to get houses built, the problem of lack of infrastructure (particularly adequate roads) has been playing second fiddle. Our road system is beginning to reach capacity. Every new development has an impact on every other. There are increasing traffic jams on major roads through our villages; even the rat runs are filling up, and air quality is becoming a major problem in many areas.

It is hard to see a solution to this, without a large-scale investment in new roads. Housing developments do not, in themselves, generate enough money to pay for this, so we depend on Government money to make up the shortfall.

And Government is beginning to address this problem. In north Abingdon, a pot of £9m is to be provided to make the Lodge Hill interchange four way to allow for over 1,000 more houses. If Marcham is to take another 500 houses, Shippon another 2000, and Sutton Courtenay any more at all, even more investment is needed. OCC transport officers, who have the unenviable job of trying to make our road system work, are pointing out the problem to government and District planners with the result that we can expect many more objections to planning developments. The message is stark, but clear – "Without more infrastructure, we cannot take more houses".

But is the solution simply building ever more roads? We know that more roads generate more traffic. Would the major investment be better spent on better bus services and cycle ways?

Thames Water drop-in session on reservoir plans

We would like to thank those residents who attended Thames Water's 'drop-in session' on the proposed reservoir held in Steventon Village Hall on Monday 10th July. The event was fairly well attended, and as GARD had a stall in the entrance to the Village Hall, we had the pleasure of meeting many residents from Steventon, Hanney, Drayton, Marcham and Hendred, as well as local councillors. It was noticeable the level of concern about these proposals and their damaging effect on the local environment.

It is a pity that Thames Water did not choose to field a team which contained any real experts on the key issues (flooding risk, construction nuisance and the issue of fixing Thames Water's appalling leakage rate). GARD thinks this is just a continuation of the Thames Water policy of appearing to engage with the local population, but conducting what is, in reality, merely a PR exercise.

We'd like to thank all those who attended and asked us relevant questions, and we will be passing on your concerns to Thames Water. Thanks also to those who took away leaflets about joining, and you can see more of that below.

One point we would like to make, and are very willing to explain GARD's position at greater length. It regards Thames Water's contiual emphasis on the supposed 'leisure and amenity' opportunities afforded by the reservoir. Apparently, people were told at the drop-in that there would be hiking, bird-watching and sailing offered by the reservoir area. It is stating the obvious, but (would you believe it?) it actually is possible at present to walk on many miles of footpaths over the area (all of which will disappear with the reservoir) and one can actually see birds and other wildlife in the area (!). All this without spending £1.5Billion and 10 years disruption on building a reservoir! As regards the sailing, Thames were asked how the sailing amenity would be achieved when there is a plan for Thames Water to float solar panels over the reservoir (as they do with their other walled-reservoirs near Heathrow) so that they can become an electricity supplier. On being asked about how this would be achieved alongside sailing, they could only answer vaguely that the 'design concept was still to be developed' (plain English translation - they don't know). This emphasis on 'leisure and amenity' is fundamentally dishonest on the part of Thames Water.

Political opposition to the reservoir plans

Recently we have received statements of support to our opposition to the reservoir from our local councillor, Councillor Matthew Barber, and our MP, Ed Vaizey. You can get some details of these at our new Facebook pages https://www.facebook.com/abingdonreservoir/. You can check out our other news there and join in the debate.

Joining GARD

Part of Thames Water's game is to try and reach a selected number of consumers (most of whom will not be local – so that they can be sold a biassed view of the reservoir) to try to show to OFWAT that they have 'public support' for the reservoir. This is a numbers game, and we need to show we have large numbers of consumers on our side. It is thus important to like our Facebook page, and above all, to join GARD if you oppose the reservoir. Our membership continues to increase, but we can never have enough, and it should be possible for all who want, to join, as the lifetime membership is only £5.

Abingdon north and A34 Lodge Hill improvements

An outline planning application for up to 900 homes - including more than 330 affordable - and 50 retirement homes, a new primary school, care home and community facilities, has been approved for Abingdon north.

Commercial Estates Group received planning permission on 26th July for the land off Dunmore Road and Twelve Acre Drive, subject to conditions. These include the delivery of, and funding for, major improvement works to the A34 at Lodge Hill.

The Government has announced funding up to £9.45 million towards works, to create two new south-facing sliproads onto the A34. Developers for Abingdon north will also need to invest over £3.3 million towards the work as part of a planning agreement. The development will also include a children's nursery, public house/restaurant, retail units, public open space, recreation area and sports pitches including a pavilion and multi-use games area.

New pay and display machines at car parks

New pay and display machines are being installed at council car parks from August. These will allow you to pay by credit or debit card as well as coins, including the new £1. Old £1 coins will continue to be accepted until they go out of circulation on 15th October. You will also still be able to pay using your mobile phone via the Connect Cashless system. When using the new machines, you will need to type in your vehicle registration on the key pad before payment is made.

Plastic bags can now be used to line food bins

You can now use plastic bags to line your food waste bins and caddies. Any thin plastic bag, such as a carrier bag, can be used except for black bin liners. You can also continue to use compostable liners, newspaper or simply put food waste into your food bin - the choice is yours!




